# **Drivers reminded to obey traffic** laws as new school year begins

"DPS will not tolerate motorists who disregard school zone speed limits or illegally pass stopped school buses-these reckless drivers not only break the law, but they put our children in danger."

One of the most dangerous times of a student's trip on a school bus is when they are entering or exiting the bus. Drivers are urged to slow down and pay attention in school zones since children may step into a roadway without checking for oncoming traffic.

State law requires that approaching drivers stop when a bus is stopped and operating a visual signaleither red flashing lights or a stop sign. Drivers should not proceed until the school bus resumes motion; the driver is signaled by the bus driver to proceed; or the visual signal is no longer activated. A driver does not have to stop for a school bus if it is on a highway with roadways separated by an intervening space or physical barrier. (If a highway is divided only by a left-turning lane, the roadways are not considered separated, and drivers must stop for school buses.)

Drivers who illegally pass school buses face fines up to \$1,250 for a first offense. For individuals convicted of this offense more than once, the law allows DPS to suspend the driver license for up to six months. (A ticket for illegally passing a school bus cannot be dismissed through defensive driving.)

#### 1. Who can get free meals?

•Income-Children can get free or reduced-price meals if your household's gross income is within the limits described in the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.

•Special Assistance Program Participants-Children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), are eligible for free meals.

•Foster-Foster children who are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.

•Head Start, Early Head Start, and Even Start-Children participating in these programs are eligible for free meals.

•Homeless, Runaway, and Migrant: Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. 3. My Child's Application Was Approved Last Year. Do I Need To Fill Out A New One? Yes. An application is only good for one school year and the first few days of this school year. Send in a new application unless the school has told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.

4. If I Don't Qualify Now, May I Apply Later? Yes. Apply at any time during the school year. A child with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced-price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.

5. What If My Income Is Not Always The Same? List the amount normally received. If a household member lost a job or had hours/wages reduced, use current income.

6. We Are in The Military. Do We Report Our Income Differently? Basic pay and cash bonuses must be reported as income. Any cash value allowances for off-base housing, food, or clothing, or Family Subsistence Supplemental Allowance payments count as income. If housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include the housing allowance as income. Any additional combat pay resulting from deployment is excluded from income.

7. May I Apply If Someone Is Not a U.S. Citizen? Yes. You, your children, or other household members do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced-price meals.

8. Will Application Information Be Checked? Yes. We may also ask you to send written proof of the reported household income.

## Changing credit card technology: What consumers should know

Almost half of all credit card fraud in the world occurs in the United States. Consumers have recently become more aware of this problem as a number of large retailers have reported data breaches. Fortunately, credit card companies have taken action.

Surprisingly, compared to other nations, the United States is using outdated credit card technology.

The familiar swipe-andsign system is easier to hack than we would like to think. However, this outdated technology will soon be replaced by a microchip technology known as EMV (Europay, MasterCard and Visa) that is planned to begin in the fall of 2015.

have the ability to issue cards with microchips and have been issuing them for years to customers who frequently travel overseas and must use EMV technology.

Whenever n e w technologies are introduced, consumers often have questions. Below is a general overview of some common questions regarding the unique features of EMV credit card technology:

•How are EMV cards more secure than traditional credit cards? Traditional magnetic debit and credit cards store unchanging data. In other words, if someone were to copy the magnetic strip on your card, the information can easily be replicated and used for fraudulent transactions. EMV cards contain a microchip that creates a unique code for each individual transaction. Future data breaches will still occur but will happen much less often. •How do I use my EMV card? EMV cards are "dipped" into a terminal slot. Essentially, you will insert your card into a slot and wait for the transaction to be processed. EMV cards will

also support contactless card reading where you will tap your card against a terminal scanner.

•Will I sign for my purchases? EMV cards will require you to either sign for your transaction or enter a PIN number. Because many businesses have yet to adopt EMV technology, signatures will remain the dominant form of verification over the next few years. Eventually, credit card users will be assigned a pin that will be entered for all transactions.

•If I want to use my EMV card at a retailer that does not yet support this technology will I be able to? Yes! The first rollout of EMV cards will contain both a magnetic strip and microchip to ensure that you are able to make all of your desired purchases.

You may not realize it but many U.S. credit card terminals are already capable of supporting EMV technology. For those businesses that do not have this technology, credit card terminals will gradually be introduced over the upcoming years. Additionally, banks that issue credit cards already

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What can I do to take care of my feet?

•Wash your feet in warm water every day. Make sure the water is not too hot by testing the temperature with your elbow. Do not soak your feet. Dry your feet well, especially between your toes.

•Look at your feet every day to check for cuts, sores, blisters, redness, calluses, or other problems. Checking every day is even more important if you have nerve damage or poor blood flow. If you cannot bend over or pull your feet up to check them, use a mirror. If you cannot see well, ask someone else to check your feet.

•If your skin is dry, rub lotion on your feet after you wash and dry them. Do not put lotion between your toes.

•File corns and calluses gently with an emery board or pumice stone. Do this after your bath or shower.

•Cut your toenails once a week or when needed. Cut toenails when they are soft from washing. Cut them to the shape of the toe and not too short. File the edges with an emery board.

•Always wear slippers or shoes to protect your feet from injuries.

•Always wear socks or stockings to avoid blisters. Do not wear socks or knee-high stockings that are too tight below your knee.

•Wear shoes that fit well. Shop for shoes at the end of the day when your feet are bigger. Break in shoes slowly. Wear them 1 to 2 hours each day for the first few weeks.

•Before putting your shoes on, feel the insides to make sure they have no sharp edges or objects that might injure your feet.
