Straus prevails in race to become next Speaker

AUSTIN-State Rep. Joe Straus, R-San Antonio, pulled together 88 vote pledges in the first week of 2009-more than enough to earn his election as speaker of the Texas House.

Incumbent Speaker Tom Craddick, R-Midland, dropped his bid for a fourth term when it became clear Straus would prevail. Shortly thereafter, Rep. John Smithee, R-Amarillo had gained the support of many long-term Craddick allies and other House members, but he ended his quest, seeing that the projected vote count for Straus would be insurmountable.

First elected in 2004, Straus is recognized by fellow members as a Republican who works well with Democrats. He represents District 121, which includes the communities of Alamo Heights, Olmos Park, Terrell Hills, Windcrest and northeast San Antonio.

Secretary of State Hope Andrade will preside over the House in its ceremonial and routine order of business, including the vote for speaker. She will turn the gavel over to the new speaker.

Background on speaker's role

The Texas Constitution requires the House, each time a new legislature convenes, to choose one of its own members to serve as speaker.

The 150 members of the House will elect the new speaker on the afternoon of Jan. 13, opening day of the biennial 140-day regular session of the 81st Texas Legislature.

It is the speaker's job to maintain order during floor debate, to recognize legislators to the Texas Education Agency who wish to speak and to rule on parliamentary matters.

Members determine the speaker's duties by adopting rules by a majority vote at the beginning of the session.

The speaker:

•Signs all bills and joint resolutions, and as a member of the House may vote on all questions before the body;

•Appoints members of each standing committee and designates the chair and vice chair for each committee;

•Refers proposed legislation to committee; and

committees, creates select committees and directs committees to conduct interim studies when the Legislature is not in session.

Greg Abbott and a bipartisan coalition of attorneys general representing all 50 states and the U.S. Virgin Islands on Jan. 8 took legal action to defend the constitutionality of prayer during the inauguration of Barack Obama as president on Jan. 20.

In a friend of the court brief written by Abbott and filed with the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia, the state attorneys general defended the president-elect's right to say the words "so help me God" while reciting the presidential oath of office.

Abbott's office said the brief was filed in an effort to defeat a legal challenge filed on Dec. 30 by parties claiming that the traditions of an inaugural prayer and an oath of office that includes the words "so help me God" violate the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment.

Legislative bill filing continues

Texas House and Senate members have been able to pre-file legislation since early November. Here are a few more bills recently filed by House members:

•Rep. Ruth Jones McClendon, D-San Antonio, filed House Concurrent Resolution 14, a measure that would allow the Texas House and Senate to stand adjourned from Jan. 16 to Jan. 26. If passed, members would be free to travel to Barack Obama.

•Rep. Veronica Gonzales, legislation that would require each school district to report on an annual basis, information regarding each incident of bullying that occurred during the preceding school year in the district on school property, in a school vehicle, or at a schoolsponsored or school-related activity, including at a school bus stop.

•Rep. Rob Orr, R-Burleson, filed HB 499, a bill that proposes to change the name of the Railroad Commission of Texas to the Texas Energy Commission, effective Jan. 1,

•Rep. Lois Kolkhorst, Appoints conference R-Brenham, filed HB 508, ordering a study of the effect on this state's economy of replacing all state and school district ad valorem tax revenue with revenue from a tiny tax placed on every financial transaction that occurs in the

Support group for Alzheimer's sufferers to start

A new Alzheimer's Association program will allow people in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease to turn to each other for understanding and information. A peer support group for individuals in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease will be offered by the Alzheimer's Association-North Central Texas Chapter in Abilene. Peer support groups have proven to help deal with the problems that emerge with the diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease.

"There are many support groups for caregivers of people who have Alzheimer's disease, but very few groups for the individuals who have the disease. We want to offer them an opportunity to learn about their disease and talk to others in the same situation," said Libby Connally, Regional Director of the Alzheimer's Association Abilene office.

"People in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease often can communicate well enough to talk about the disease, the changes it has caused in their lives, and the ways they and their families deal with these changes," Connally said. "But individuals with the disease and their families typically find few opportunities to talk candidly about these issues. The new support group will allow individuals in the same situation an opportunity to discuss the changes in their lives since the diagnosis."

An early stage support group will meet two times per month starting in February. A caregiver support group will meet at the same time and location. Participants are being sought for the group, funded by the Alzheimer's Association and the United Way of Abilene. changes coming to your favorite television channels. Television watchers need to be prepared for a significant change that may affect their ability to watch broadcast stations with existing equipment. Beginning Feb. 17, all full-power broadcast television stations in the United States will switch their broadcasting signals from an analog to digital format. While this change may sound technical and complicated, Texans do not need any technical expertise to successfully navigate the transition to digital TV

The switch to digital TV, which was mandated by Congress, will end analog television signal broadcasts. These soon-to-be-extinct transmissions are received via a traditional set-top ("rabbit ears") or rooftop antenna. DTV will enable broadcast TV stations to provide an improved digital picture and sound quality. It will also give viewers a wider array of programming options.

Importantly, digital signals require less bandwidth, so

many digital channels using the same amount of broadcast analog program. The DTV transition will free up parts of the broadcast spectrum for public safety communications, such as those used by police and fire departments. More airwaves also will be available for advanced wireless service providers, like those that offer broadband Internet connections.

Many television sets are already equipped to receive digital signals. Since March 1, 2007, all televisions imported to or shipped through the United States have been required to include a digital tuner. Texans can look through labels or statements in owners' manuals to learn whether their television contains a digital tuner. Words commonly used to indicate digital-ready equipment include "Integrated Digital Tuner," "Digital Tuner Built-In;" "Digital Receiver," or "Digital Tuner;" "DTV," "ATSC" or "HDTV."

Devices that are labeled "Digital Monitor," "HDTV Monitor," "Digital Ready" or "HDTV Ready," may not have digital tuners and

device's manufacturer.

To continue watching television on an analog device, Texans can obtain a digital-to-analog converter box. Connecting a converter to an analog TV allows nondigital devices to play overthe-air digital broadcasts.

To help consumers with the DTV transition, the federal government established the Digital-to-Analog Converter Box Coupon Program. This program allows each U.S. household to receive up to two \$40 coupons that can be used to purchase qualified digital-to-analog converter boxes. Texans can use these coupons at participating consumer electronics retailers. Most converter boxes are priced between \$40 and \$70 each. The coupons expire 90 days after they are mailed to the requestor. For more information about the Digitalto-Analog Converter Box Coupon Program, visit www. dtv2009.gov, or call 888-388-

Cable television subscribers already receive digital signals and will not be affected by the Feb. 17 cut-off date for analog broadcasting. Satellite TV subscribers who receive their local TV stations through their satellite service will not be affected. If local TV stations are not available through the satellite service, viewers may have to obtain a converter box to receive those stations.

The majority of broadcast stations in U.S. television markets are already broadcasting in a digital format. To verify the channel numbers currently broadcasting digital programming, Texans should contact their local broadcast stations.

Texans who choose to discard old analog televisions may want to participate in a TV recycling program. The Web site MyGreenElectronics.org explains disposal options and offers help locating recycling programs in their area.


