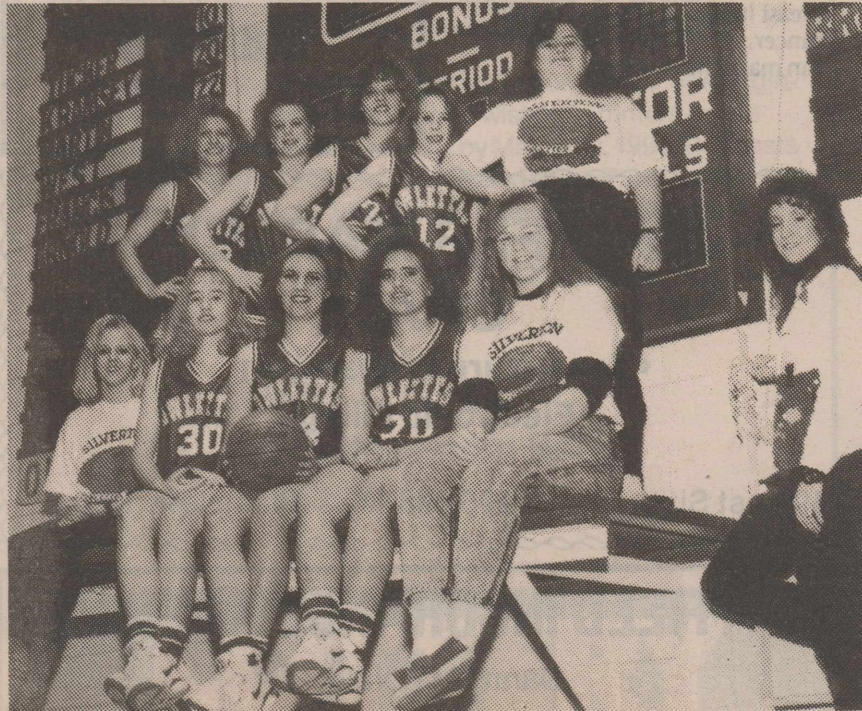

January Wetter Than Normal on South Plains

The weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of January 1992 turned out to be wetter than normal with near normal average temperatures.

Temperatures did average 0.1 degree above normal and ranged from 2.0 degrees above normal at Silverton to 1.5 degrees below normal at Seminole.

Maximum temperatures averaged 3.1 degrees below normal and ranged from 0.3 degree below normal at Paducah to 5.6 degrees below normal at Seminole. The highest temperatures of the month occurred on the 31st when Matador and Paducah both reached 72 for the highest. Silverton's maximum temperatures averaged 49.5 degrees, near the South Plains average of 49.8 degrees.

Minimum temperatures averaged 3.5 degrees above normal and ranged from 6.2 degrees above normal at Post to 0.9 degree above normal at Plainview. The lowest temperature of the month was seven above zero at Muleshoe on the 14th. Silverton's minimum temperatures averaged 25.1 degrees, quite a bit below the South Plains average of 27.3 degrees.

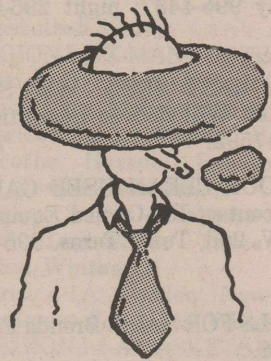
Precipitation was frequent throughout the month and averaged 0.87 inch above normal while ranging from 0.06 inch below normal at Friona to 1.64 inches above normal at Jayton. Two main snow events combined to result in an area average of 5.7 inches of snow while ranging up to 10.5 inches at Seminole down to only one to two

inch totals in some northwestern counties.

Silverton's precipitation was .89 of an inch, above normal for Silverton, but below the South Plains average of 1.42 inches. Silverton measured five inches of snow.

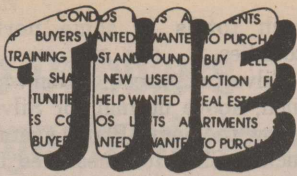

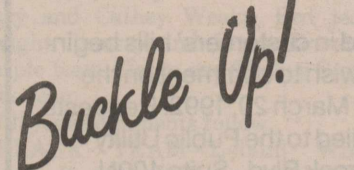
