Candidates from the Courthouse to the White House will be nominated by their political parties in elections to be held Tuesday, March 10, from 7:00 a.m.

Three Councilmen Have Terms Expiring

Three of Silverton's City Councilmen have terms that are expiring this year. They are Jim Estes, Dwain Henderson and F. E. Hutsell. Hutsell has filed for a place on the ballot and is a candidate for re-election.

The City General Election will be held from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, May 2.

Prospective candidates have until 5:00 p.m. on March 18 to file an application for a place on the ballot. Application forms are available at the City Hall.

Voters beware! You may have been moved into a different Precinct since the last election due to redistricting, and it might be well if you would refer to the map run recently in the Briscoe County News if you live near the boundary of any Precinct before election day. If you are unsure, someone in the courthouse could probably advise you if you are involved in the change.

Local races include the one for County Sheriff between incumbent Richard (Dick) Roehr and challenger Steve Miller, and a hotly-contested Justice of the Peace race at Quitaque between Arthur (Prof) Patrick, Dale Ramsey and Vonaceil Chandler.

On the Democratic Party ballot, Presidential preferences are Rufus Higginbotham, Ted Howard Hawks, J. Louis McAlpine, Bill Clinton, Edmund G. Brown, jr., Charles Woods, George W. Benns, Lyndon H. LaRouche, jr., Bob Kerrey, Tom Harkin and Paul E. Tsongas.

No local candidates are listed on the Republican Party ballot and choices for President are George Bush, Tinnie Rogers, David Duke, Patrick Buchanan, George A. Zimmerman and Uncommitted.

Candidates for U. S. Representative are Ernie Houdashell, Bob Price, Beau Boulter and Ray Powell.

Also on the GOP ballot is a question regarding limitation of terms of certain

state and federal officers.

Both ballots have write-in lines for County Party Chairman and Precinct Chairman.

All the regular voting places will be open. The Republican precinct votes at the home of Mrs. Floyd Williams.

Voting places for the Democrats are: Precinct 1, Silverton City Hall; Precinct 2, Quitaque Community Center; Precinct 3, Pioneer Room, First State Bank, Silverton; Precinct 4, Towe Office Building in Silverton; Precinct 5, Lake Mackenzie Office.

Trustees Call For Election

The board of trustees of the Silverton Independent School District have called an election to be held on Saturday, May 2, 1992, for the election of three trustees for full three-year terms.

Absentee voting by personal appearance will begin on April 13, 1992, and will continue through April 28, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day which is not a Saturday, Sunday or official state holiday.

Absentee balloting in person will be conducted at the Towe Agency. Applications for absentee ballots should be mailed to Colleen Reed, Box 429, Silverton, Texas 79257.

The polling place will be at the City Hall and will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

Current trustees completing their terms of office are Carolyn Lowrey, Jack Graham and Zane Mayfield. Application forms for filing for a place on the ballot may be secured from the School Administration office. The deadline for filing is March 18, 1992 at 5:00 p.m.

Burial was under the direction of Geo. C. Price Funeral Directors of Levelland.

Mr. Dunn died at 1:05 p.m. Tuesday, February 24, at Methodist Hospital - Levelland following a lengthy illness. He had suffered a stroke the day before his death.

He was born November 30, 1938 at White Flat and moved from Spur to Levelland in 1987.

He was a former Silverton resident, having attended Silverton Schools and graduated with the Class of 1957. He was preceded in death by his mother, Fay Whittemore, and a brother, W. P. (Pete) Whittemore.

Mr. Dunn married the former Joyce Harris on August 5, 1967, in Lubbock. He was a retired welder.

Perkins Receives Degree at Tech

Tommy Perkins, son of Thomas Lee and Rosemary Perkins received his PhD in February in animal breeding and genetics from the School of Agriculture

at Texas Tech University.

In January, Perkins accepted the position of assistant professor in the Department of Agriculture at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. In addition to teaching, he has research responsibilities involving the use of medical diagnostic real-time ultrasound to estimate carcass composition in beef cattle.

A graduate of Silverton High School, Perkins received his AS at Clarendon College in 1981. He earned a BS degree in agriculture economics in 1983 at West Texas State University and the MA degree in agriculture economics in 1986 at WTSU.

He received his auctioneering license in 1987, and served six years in the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, from 1983 to 1989.

While working on his PhD, he was doing research and working as a teaching assistant in the Animal Science Department at Tech.

hand drawn pictures to illustrate each line. The words of his story and one of Drew's original drawings also are shown.

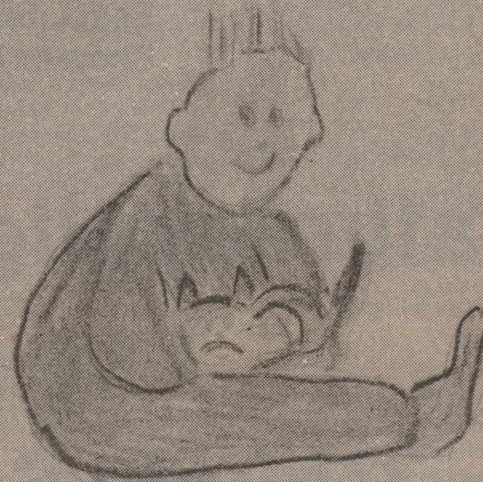
The Lovington youngster was the overall county winner of the CSW free enterprise competition which included entries by other fourth graders in the county. His winning prize was a \$100 savings bond.

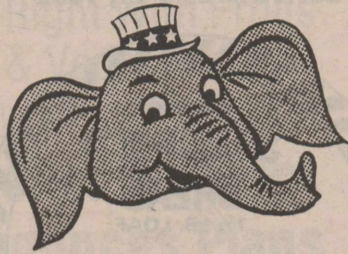

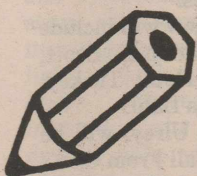

important part of our diet. Many fruits and vegetables are low in calories and fat and high in fiber, vitamins and minerals.

The new Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommends increasing your fruit and vegetable consumption to a minimum of five servings each day, two fruits and three vegetables.

USDA-recommended servings per day are two to four fruits and three to five vegetables.

A few simple steps can help preserve the nutrients in produce and improve the taste, texture and appearance. Select product that is not damaged, bruised or wilted, since rough handling leads to vitamin loss. Choose dark green, orange or yellow fruits and vegetables. They are highest in beta-carotene/a precursor of Vitamin A, which has been associated with lower cancer risk.

Fresh fruits and vegetables should be sun ripened, then chilled immediately to preserve the Vitamins A and C and other nutrients. Another thing to consider is to avoid washing produce until just before it is eaten, to conserve the C and B vitamins.

Wash produce without soaking to prevent nutrients from being drawn out into the water. Don't peel your fruits and vegetables since many nutrients are contained in the skin. Rinse and brush thoroughly instead. As an added bonus, skins also contribute dietary fiber.

Prepare fruits and vegetables as close to serving or cooking time as possible to minimize exposure to light and air. Steam, stir-fry or microwave vegetables, since these cooking methods preserve the most vitamins. Cook vegetables until just tender-crisp; overcooking destroys vitamins. If you must boil, use as little water as possible.

Boiling, soaking or canning draws water soluble vitamins such as C and B, and minerals such as potassium from the food into the cooking utensil. After boiling, save the vitamins and minerals by using the remaining water in soups, stews or sauces.

If you eat and enjoy plenty of fruits and vegetables, you can't help but eat right, America.

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Deadline Coming For Retailers Who Want To Sell Lottery Tickets

"Texas retailers who want to sell lottery tickets when the games begin this summer need to submit their license applications by Tuesday, March 31," State Comptroller John Sharp has announced.

"We will guarantee businesses that meet the deadline—and have clean records—will be able to sell tickets when the Texas Lottery picks its first winners," Sharp said. "Experience in other states shows that the first day of

sales is one of the busiest, and we want as many Texas merchants as possible to join in the fun and profits from the beginning."

The Lottery expects to license as many as 15,000 retailers in time for the anticipated July 1 sales of the first instant-winner, scratch-off tickets.

"We've tried to make it as easy as possible for any interested Texas business to join the Lottery," Sharp said. "All it takes is a \$125 fee and a

clean record—and an application postmarked by March 31."

To help Texas businesses with the application process, the Comptroller's Office has conducted retailer assistance seminars across the state and established a toll-free hotline. That retailers-only number is 1-800-37-LOTTO.

The completed application packet must include the fingerprint card, which is part of the criminal background check required by state law.

"Interested businesses should call our toll-free number to find out who must be fingerprinted," Sharp said. "Then they should contact their local sheriff or police department to arrange to get printed."

Licensed retailers also must make arrangements with their financial institutions for their accounts to be accessible to electronic funds transfer transactions. The Lottery and licensed retailers will then be able to handle the required financial transactions automatically without having to visit the institution to fill out deposit or withdrawal slips.

Benefits for retailers who meet the March 31 deadline include:

- A large statewide advertising campaign promoting the Lottery kickoff;
- A 5-percent commission on all sales;
- Increased sales from customers redeeming winning tickets; and
- Increased sales from customers visiting the stores to buy tickets.

Gym Use Rules To Be Enforced

The gym will NOT be available for team reservation on Sundays.

*Anyone not abiding by these rules may forfeit their right to use the gym.

Properly-Planned Windbreaks Make Homes Comfortable

Windbreaks make Briscoe County homes more comfortable and less expensive to heat and cool. Properly-located tree rows shield homes, livestock and crops from winter winds, summer heat, blowing dust and drifting snow. Mature windbreaks provide protection at least for 40 years.

Conifers or evergreens form the best protection and they should be at the heart of any windbreak. Even a single row of evergreens with the trees set about 15 feet apart will give good protection. This is the most common windbreak around homes and farmsteads in Briscoe County. Two rows of evergreens with the tree lines spaced 20-30 feet apart provides even better protection.

If space is available, a three-row windbreak with two rows of evergreens and a row of shrubs or hardwoods will grow into an attractive shelter that will protect against the coldest winter winds. The shrubs or hardwoods provide some early protection until the slower-growing evergreens become effective barriers. The evergreens should be planted in the outside rows (toward the wind), so in Briscoe County that means the north or west edge of the windbreak. Enough space should be left between the tree rows to allow plowing or shredding weeds during the early years of tree growth.

The Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District is currently taking orders for windbreak trees. The following evergreens are available: Afghanistan Pine, Rocky Mountain Juniper, Austrian Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce, Pinon Pine, Ponderosa Pine and Scotch Pine. Hardwood varieties available are: Cottonwoods, Willows, Green Ash, Honeylocust, Little Walnut, Nanking Cherry, Native Plum, Pecan, Russian Olive, Sandcherry, Caragana, Sumac, Lilac, Elm and Lombardy Poplar.

Prevention of Alcohol, Drug Abuse Among Youth Starts at Home

Peer pressure to try alcohol and other drugs can begin as early as the fourth grade, and by the sixth grade more than 40 percent of children have used alcohol. But children who have strong bonds with their family and school are far less likely to try alcohol or other

drugs. When parents work with their children, the school, and the community in a prevention program, the use of alcohol and other drugs by young people declines sharply.

Texas PTA has joined the National PTA's celebration of National PTA Alcohol and Other Drug Awareness Week, March 1-7, by informing parents of their vital role in combatting their children's involvement with alcohol and other drugs.

According to a survey by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, the high-risk years for children's first use of illegal drugs begin at age 12. And approximately 100,000 10- and 11-year-olds reported getting drunk once a week.

The 1990 Texas School Survey of Substance Abuse, conducted by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, reported that only one-third of the Texas secondary students remained drug-free during the 1990 school year; the remaining two-thirds used either alcohol, tobacco, inhalants, and/or an illicit drug.

To help Texas youths abstain from the use of alcohol and other drugs, parents need to be positive role models. Teens often will tune out lectures, but they watch their parents' every action. Following are suggestions for parents to help combat their children's use of alcohol and other drugs:

*Show the value of freedom to think

and act independently, that one doesn't have to do something because "everyone is doing it". This helps teens see that negative peer pressure can be rejected.

*Demonstrate a sense of self-respect and self-esteem. For example: taking care of your health through exercise and diet offers a strong model for your child.

*Show respect for your child's concerns by being a good listener.

*Be cautious in using prescription or over-the-counter medicines as a quick fix for pain or stress. Your example can counter or reinforce the media message that any problem can be cured by chemicals.

*Be aware of how personal use of alcohol can influence your teen. Avoid using excuses for drinking, like having a rough day.

*Talk honestly about personal stress or conflict. Children need to know that such struggles are a normal part of life. They have a good model when they see parents coping with problems without relying on alcohol or other drugs.

*Celebrate National PTA Alcohol and Other Drug Awareness Week by talking to your child about alcohol and drug use and its impact on his environments.

Brooks Scrambles to Win at Houston Livestock Show

Speed, strength and perseverance paid off for Jeremiah Brooks, a 4-H Club member from Silvertown, during the calf scramble at the February 22 performance of the 1992 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Brooks was one of the 28 determined contestants who was challenged to halter and maneuver one of only 14 unruly calves across the Astrodome floor into the winners' square.

In exchange for this effort, Brooks received a \$1,000 calf purchase certificate donated by V. Bruce and Brenda Grossie which will be used to purchase a registered dairy or beef heifer.

The scrambler is required to maintain monthly progress reports, monetary records and a scrapbook detailing the project which will culminate in 1993 when the heifer will be returned to the Houston Show for a special showing competition with other 1992 scramble winners.

Working along with Brooks on this project will be Bob Robinson, District Extension Director, and his County Extension Agent, Scott Strawn, who will supervise all work with the animal.

Robert Norwood, chairman of the all-volunteer Calf Scramble Committee, said, "The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo calf scramble program offers a unique opportunity to young men and women who choose to participate. Each contestant must demonstrate the tenacity to catch and halter a calf—plus the desire to dedicate the time and resources to raise a heifer for at least one full year."

"This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Houston calf scramble. To date, this program has put more than \$2.9 million, or 12,144 animals, in the hands of the youth of Texas," he added.

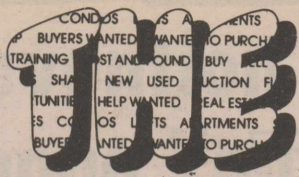

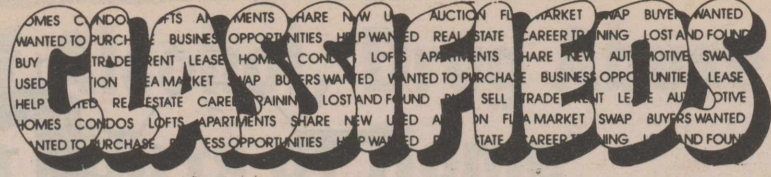
