County Voters To Decide Three Runoff Elections On Saturday

Voters will go to the polls in Fisher County this Saturday to decide three runoff elections on the county level and several state runoffs in what is expected to be a light turnout.

In the closest of the May 1st Primary elections Stanley Now-

lin and Jay R. Hendon will face each other on Saturday to see who will be the Commissioner of Precinct #3. Nowlin polled a total of 210 votes to Hendon's 223 in the first primary.

In the Sheriff's race, Kenneth Hardin and Mickey Counts are

in Saturday's runoff to see who will replace retiring A.E. (Bus) Rollans. Counts came within a few votes of getting a majority on the first primary. He had a total of 1257 votes to Hardin's 452.

The remaining local runoff election will be between Margie B. Hale and Robert Buck for the Tax Assessor-Collector's job. In the May primary Buck had a total of 1044 to Hale's 495.

All county elections will be held at the same voting boxes with the exception of Precinct #3. Precinct 3 voting place will be moved from the Community Center to the Rotan School Cafeteria.

Through last Tuesday morning the Fisher County clerk had a total of 57 absentee voters vote at his office and mailed out about 20 ballots.

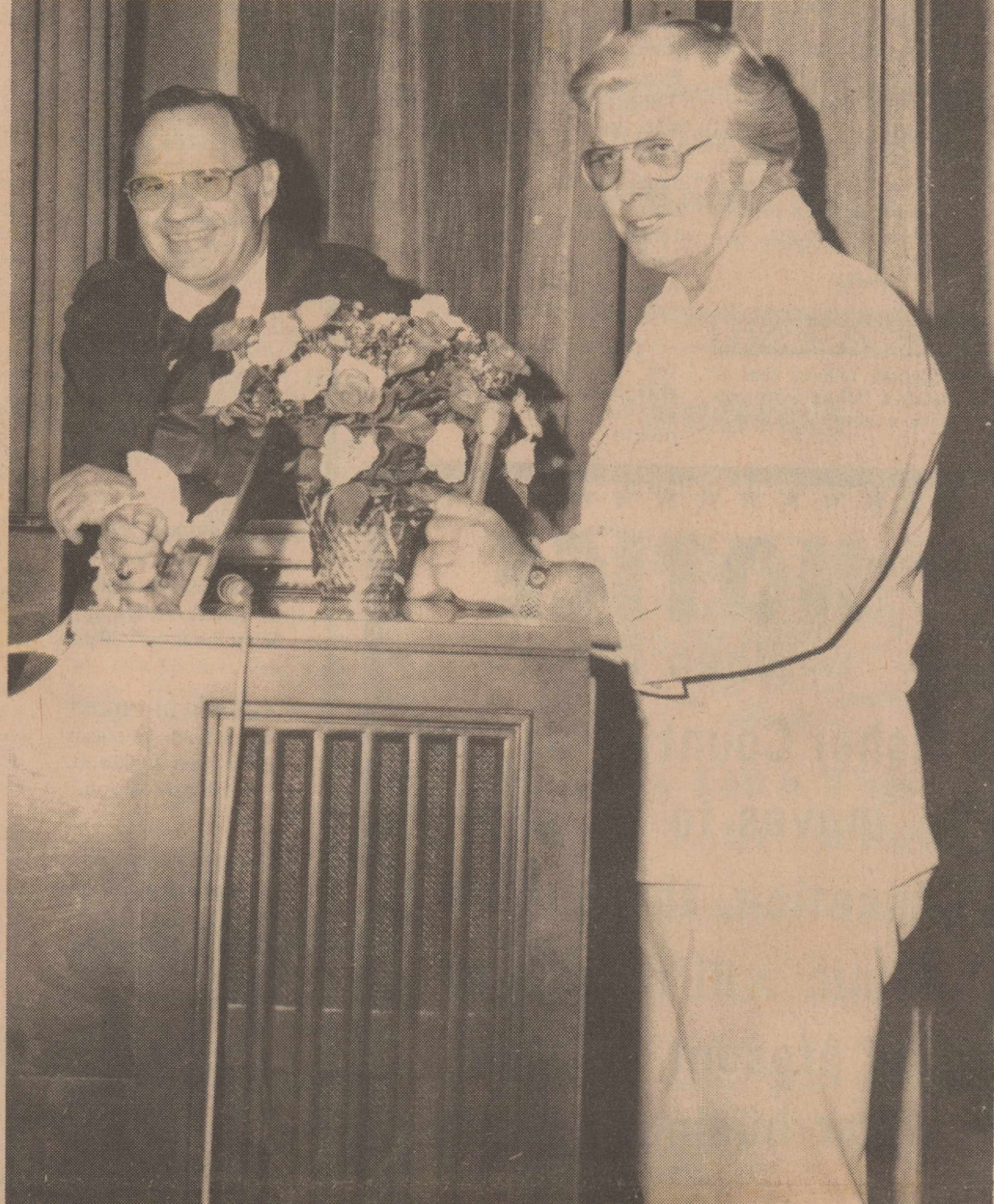

Resource Room In Rotan Has Project

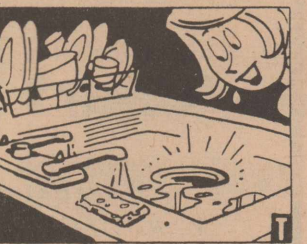

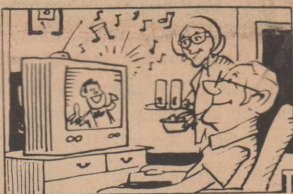

Saturday WTC Summer Courses Are Offered

Saturday morning summer school courses in psychology and sociology are being planned at Western Texas College according to Dr. Joe Reaves who will be instructor for the unique week-end schedule.

"The purpose of the Saturday schedule is to allow college students a chance to pick up six hours credit and still hold full-time summer jobs. The offerings should be particularly appealing to students home for the summer from other colleges," Reaves said.

Psychology 231 (General Psychology) will meet from 9-11 a.m., with Sociology 231 (Introduction to Sociology) following from 11 a.m.-1 p.m. Classes will begin on May 29 and continue through July 24.

Registration for all Snyder campus summer school courses will be May 26 in the office of the registrar in the WTC Administration Building. Complete schedules of course offerings, times and dates may be obtained by calling or writing the office of the registrar at Western Texas College, Snyder, Tex. 79549.

Local Doctor Retains AAFP Membership

Chester M. Callan, M.D., has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy formerly was called the American Academy of General Practice.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every three years. Members become eligible for reelection at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, is the only national medical group that requires members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The Academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

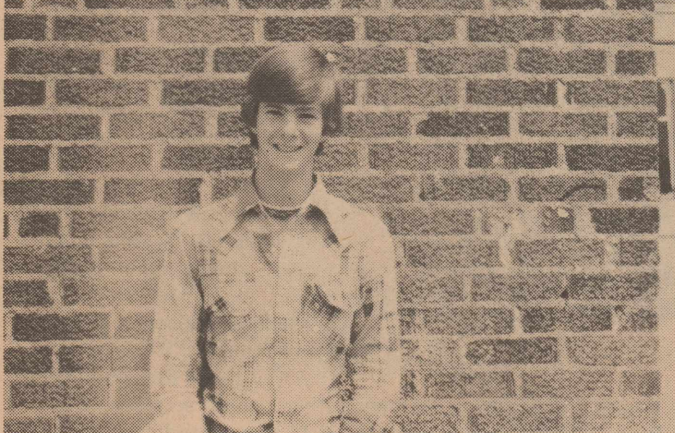

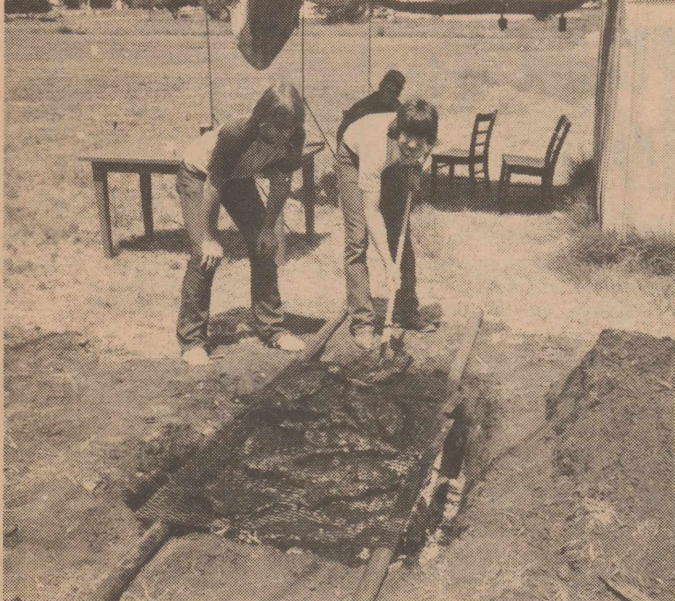

Carl Dally Is Running For High Judgeship

A Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals will be elected on Saturday, June 5, in the Second Democratic Primary (runoff) election. This is an important position on the state's highest court for the appeal of criminal matters.

One of the candidates is Judge Carl Dally, 52. He is now serving as Commissioner of that Court. In September, 1971, the five elected Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals elected Judge Dally to serve with them as Commissioner where for almost five years he has now gained judicial experience doing essentially the same work as he would do in the elected position he now seeks.

Judge Dally, prior to his appointment as a Commissioner, was a prosecutor, a defense attorney, and a teacher of criminal law and procedure in Houston.

Judge Dally asserts that he has the support of all members of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association and support of almost all members of the Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association. Judge Dally has received from virtually all of the leading newspapers of the state editorial endorsements which point out as did the Dallas Morning News that he is "easily the better qualified candidate in the race."

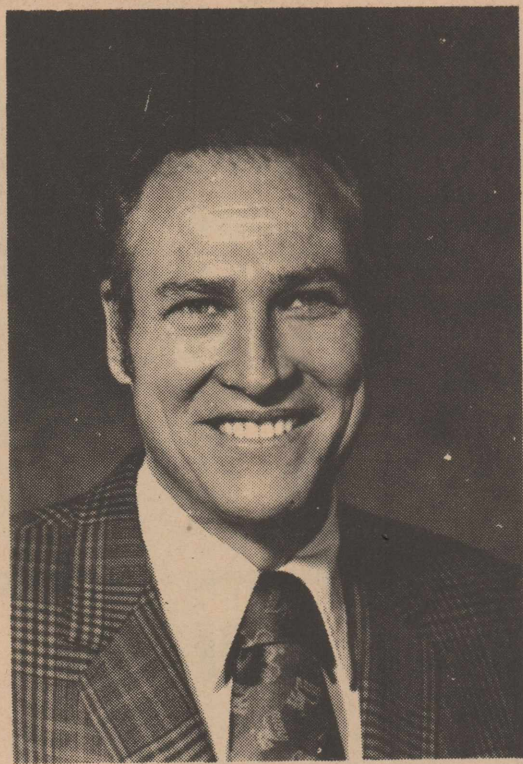
One of the many newspaper endorsements is that of the Austin American-Statesman. In speaking of the other candidate in the runoff election, W.T. Phillips, 63, of Waco, it says: "Phillips is a man with no judicial or appellate experience in criminal cases..." That editorial then continues, "We urge (Texas Democrats) not to vote for a vaguely familiar name, but to vote for the best man..." The best candidate is clearly Carl Dally.

Judge Dally appeals to all voters to examine the records of candidates before they go to the voting booth. He urges them if they are not acquainted with the candidates' qualifications, to ask their own attorney, their district attorney, a judge or informed friend, about the candidates' qualifications or to inform themselves in some other way about the candidates' qualifications.

Not all candidates for high judicial positions are qualified for the positions they seek. Any lawyer who has a \$1,000 filing fee who is over 35 years of age and who has been licensed to practice law for more than ten years may have his name placed on the ballot for the position of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas or Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas.

Judge Dally is a veteran of World War II. He served as a sergeant and as a tail-gunner in the European theater of operations. He also served in the staff Judge Advocate's Office of the Air Force during the Korean conflict and was discharged as a captain.

Judge Dally's wife is the former Edith Carr of Port Arthur, Texas. They have a son, William Carl.

Pat E. Shipp, a native of the Rotan area, has completed all requirements for the Doctorate of Education at Northern Arizona University of Flagstaff. His work has been done in the area of Educational Administration.

Dr. Shipp is the son of Mrs. A.R. Shipp and the late Mr. Shipp. His mother is now a resident of Snyder but maintains ties with her many friends in Rotan.

Dr. Shipp graduated from Rotan High School in 1950. Following graduation he entered West Texas State University

where he earned a B.S. Degree in Education. After four years of teaching in the Texas School System, he moved to New Mexico and entered private business. The call to teaching was too strong to be ignored so he went to work with the Bureau of Indian Affairs. He has worked at various locations on the Navajo Reservation in Arizona and New Mexico. He is presently the principal of Wingate Boarding School, a 750 student Navajo Indian School at Ft. Wingate, New Mexico, near Gallup. Since 1963 he has earned a M.A. Degree in guidance and counseling, and an Ed. Special degree in School Superintendency in addition to the recent Doctorate in Education from Northern Arizona University.

Dr. Shipp's wife, Jane, has also devoted her career to Indian Education. She completed her M.A. in Bilingual Education from Northern Arizona University and has taught from the primary grades through the university level. She is presently an Employee Development Specialist with the Branch of Personnel, Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Dr. and Mrs. Shipp are also active in civic affairs.

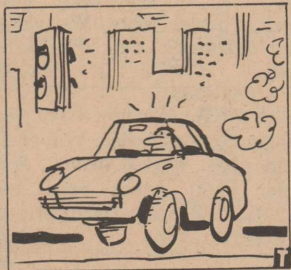

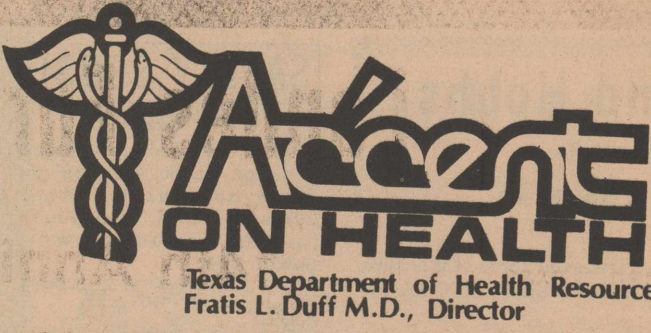
In recent years, dramatic advances in life-support equipment and in the medical treatment of victims of accidents and sudden illness have resulted in a revolution in emergency medical care. According to John Murphy, Assistant Director of the Emergency Medical Services Division, Texas Department of Health Resources, Texas is one of the states leading the revolution.

Murphy explains that emergency medical services can be divided into three categories: "One is just a transport system, to transfer the patient from the scene to the hospital," he says. That kind of service is still being provided by many private ambulance companies, primarily in rural areas of the state. "Then we have the basic life-support systems with well-trained attendants on a properly-equipped ambulance," Murphy says. Such services are generally provided either by private companies or by city- or county-owned ambulance services. Finally, Murphy says, "The advanced life-support system has even more sophisticated equipment and a much higher level of training of the attendants--the paramedics."

Paramedics, after several hundred hours of classroom and practical instruction, can do almost anything on the scene of an accident that a doctor would be able to do there. Murphy says, "With direct ambulance-to-hospital communication, via radio or telephone telemetry, the paramedic at the order of

the physician in the emergency room, can defibrillate (electrically shock the heart to restore proper rhythm), can start I-V's (intravenous injection of drugs), can administer anti-arrhythmic cardiac drugs, taking the 'emergency room on wheels' to the patient." Many paramedics think of themselves as "the doctors' hands" on the scene.

As might be expected, starting and operating a full-fledged emergency medical service is no easy task. Murphy says that there are seven or eight such systems in Texas now: in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, and Odessa among the major cities, as well as a city-county system in Victoria. The smallest community supporting a full-fledged EMS is Luling, with approximately 2,900 people. City-operated



ambulance services in Abilene, Lubbock and Austin, among others, are moving rapidly toward the paramedic concept. Where populations are so sparse that a full-fledged EMS operation is impractical, much interest has developed in the concept of "stabilization centers." Murphy explains, "A stabilization center can be a store-front or a small hospital clinic where the patient can be taken for stabilization before transport to a large medical center for more definitive care." At a stabilization center, he says, "the first emergency treatment is given. Bleeding is stopped, hemorrhaging is controlled, I-V's can be started, thus giving the patient a much longer time to safe transport to a definitive medical center."

Any community that wishes to upgrade its emergency medical services, either in the form of a stabilization center or an improved ambulance system, will find ready partners at both

the state and federal levels. However, Murphy emphasizes, the help available is limited.

"We will help them organize and plan," Murphy explains, but, "unfortunately, there are no state or federal funds available for continued support. Once a program is established in the community, it becomes their responsibility to carry on."

The cost, he says, is not immoderate. "It takes two injections of money. The start-up costs, and then the carrying-on costs: approximately two dollars per capita (annually) for the on-going work", Murphy says. "We have found that communities as small

as 30,000 can adequately support the advances life-support system and the stabilization center concept."

The primary benefit of an upgraded emergency medical service is, of course, the saving of lives. Well-trained attendants responding quickly with sophisticated equipment have not only saved thousands of lives, but have prevented serious illnesses or injuries from becoming life-long disabilities.

In addition, Murphy says, another benefit is coming to be recognized. He explains, "We look forward to a time down the road when perhaps this might have some bearing on insurance

rates." He says that state authorities would like to see insurance companies develop "key rates" for life and/or health insurance, just as they do for fire insurance and other kinds of insurance, but with the rates based on the availability of the different levels of emergency medical care.

Whether or not Texans ultimately receive reduced insurance rates, there's no doubt that they are already receiving the benefit of vastly improved medical care when an emergency strikes, thanks in part to the Emergency Medical Services Division of the Texas Department of Health Resources.

John Newton Is Running For R.R. Commission

Rep. John Newton of Beeville says the central issue in his Democratic race for the Texas Railroad Commission this Saturday (June 5) is which of the two candidates is better qualified to cope with modern energy and transportation problems.

"If the voters compare my public record with the record of Jerry Sadler I have no doubt that I will win Saturday," declared the 34-year-old attorney, who is a member of the Governor's Energy Advisory Council and the Interstate Oil Compact Commission.

Newton and Sadler, 68, emerged as runoff opponents from an eight-candidate field in the first primary. Sadler has been in retirement since his defeat for State Land Commissioner in 1970.

"My public record is one of accessibility to the press, an open door policy for the public, full disclosure of personal financial information, and policies to strengthen confidence in government," Newton said. "My opponent's record is just the opposite. When he was Land Commissioner in the 1960's he pulled down the shades of the General Land Office and excluded the press and the public. He made a mockery of the people's right to know what goes on in government."

Newton pointed out that Sadler's defeat six years ago followed an official reprimand by the House of Representatives for refusing to cooperate in an investigation of his handling of Spanish treasure discovered off the coast.

Newton said that Sadler had the worst absentee record of any state official. "He was drawing a full-time salary, spending a few hours a week on the job, and apparently spending the rest of his time running his private motor hotel in Palestine," Newton said.

"Sadler was missing in action in the 1960's and he will be missing in action in the 1970's if he goes on the Railroad Commission."

"In the words of the San Angelo Standard-Times, 'under Sadler, the Railroad Commission just might become the laughingstock he once made of the General Land Office.'"

Newton has been endorsed by nearly every major daily newspaper in Texas.

"Newspaper after newspaper are pointing out that the Railroad Commission is too important an agency to be left to the tender mercies of Jerry Sadler," Newton said.

During his legislative career Newton was a strong advocate of a Public Utility Commission and sponsored the new law regulating strip mining. He was recently appointed to the Mining Council of Texas.

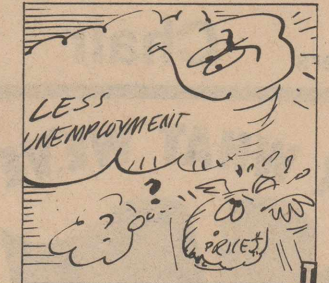

Improving The Economy

There's good news for consumers who are tired of ever-increasing prices. Concerned legislators are working on ways to prevent unemployment — which has had such a bad effect

on the economy — from increasing at a greater rate than it otherwise would.

These congressmen are supporting the legislation sponsored by Chairman James M. Hanley of the House Postal Service Subcommittee and Chairman Gale W. McGee of the Senate Post Office and Civil Service Committee, which would grant a substantial subsidy to the Post Office.

If the bill is not passed, the resulting misery could affect the entire American people, as well as the many postal workers who would lose their jobs. These legislators do not think the Post Office should be expected to pay its own way. No postal service in the free world comes anywhere near breaking even. Great Britain loses millions every year, and it's supposed to be a postal administrator's dream — with short distances, low wages, small volume and a tightly impacted population. The United States has huge distances, comparatively scattered population and an enormous volume of mail.

The Post Office already has 39,000 fewer workers than it did in 1970. If it were to economize further, the result could be bad for the economy and the consumer.

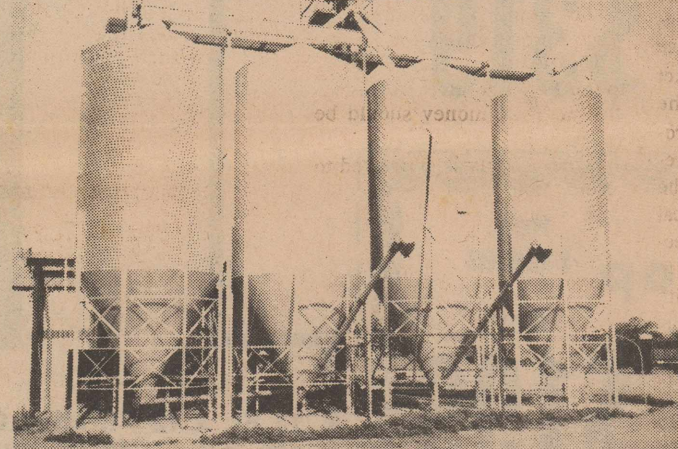

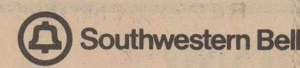

Dear Mr. Pease and Fellow Texans:

A great deal of concern has been expressed to me from both recipients and providers of health care about the complexi-

ties of P.L. 93-641 and the effects it will have on the distribution and quality of health care.

I have studied the National Health Planning and Resources Development Act most carefully, and I have very serious reservations about its long-term implications. I strongly oppose the passage of this Act originally because I felt that the comprehensive regulatory provisions and federal requirements would undercut the flexibility of state and local governments, impede the freedom of individual citizens to determine their own health needs, minimize input by the medical community, and lead to overall decline in the quality and availability of health care provided. At present I am even more convinced of these reamifications, and I particularly fear the impact this legislation will have on non-metropolitan communities and the health facilities and services in those communities.

I am carefully investigating the situation and will make every effort to repeal or modify the existing legislation. You can be assured that I will continue to support only those programs which are in the best interest of the health of all Texans.

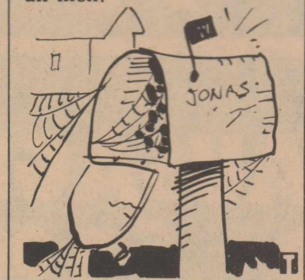

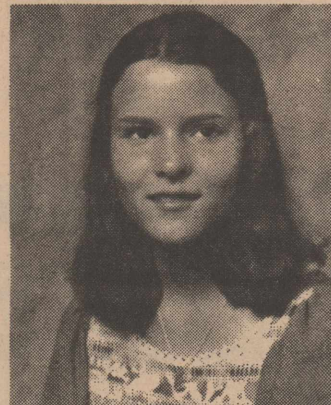

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The U.S. farm population continued to decline between 1970 and 1974 but at a slower rate than during the 1960's, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The farm population declined 1.2 per cent a year from 1970 to 1974 and stood at about 9.3 million people in 1974. The decline was 4.8 per cent annually in the 1960's.

Losses from farm production are continuing in the South, North Central and Northeast regions while there is an increase in the West.

During 1970-74, the farm population declined about 143,000 persons through migration from farms or from reclassification of residences from farm to non-farm.

The volume and rate of movement away from farms were both lower than for any other four-year period in the last 40 years.

The purpose of 4-H, as a youth development program is to educate young people.

4-H is a program for youth between the ages of 9 and 19 and is administered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System.

4-H can help youth develop intelligent behavior by providing them information or knowledge, a positive self-concept and an awareness of their social setting.

Without information or knowledge, a young person has no basis on which to act. But just learning a list of rules and facts will not satisfy personal or social needs. Instead, an effective youth program focuses on relevant knowledge and the development of a knowledge-getting process. When a 4-Her identifies what 4-H project he wants to do and how he wants to do it, he is learning how to learn.

Along with information and a knowledge-getting process, a young person must feel that he or she is capable of solving a problem. When he does feel able or capable, he has developed a positive self-concept. In contrast, when a youth has a negative self-concept, or feels inadequate, he will not act even if he has the necessary knowledge to solve the problem confronting him.

In any youth program, the interaction of a young person with an adult leader and other youth allows opportunities for praise, encouragement and rewards. And this kind of feedback can strongly influence the way a youth thinks about himself.

Living in a social setting also leads to the development of

intelligent behavior. A youth's behavior is motivated by his needs. For a newborn, physical needs such as food and comfort are a main concern. But the older the youth, the more his behavior will be motivated by acceptance from his peers.

As a youth learns through trial and error the kind of behavior that is expected of him, he also learns the

acceptable values, beliefs and goals of society.

Through individual projects, group activities and adult volunteer leadership, the 4-H program attempts to help boys and girls acquire skills that will lead to self-directed and lifelong learning.

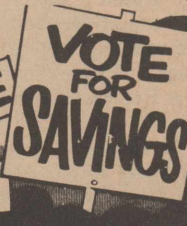
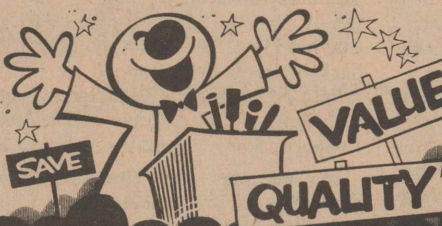

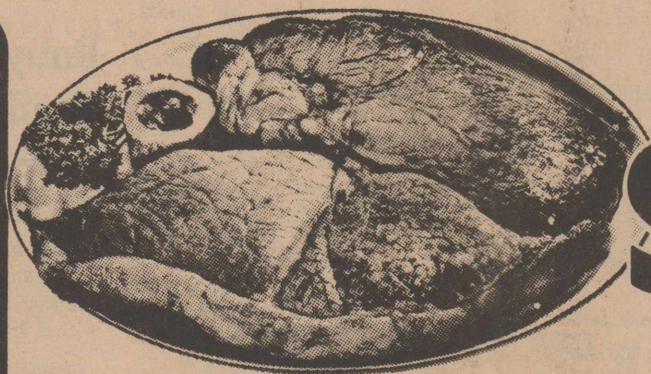
