

Roby Lions Trounce Borden County Eleven

The Roby Lions spoiled the Borden County Coyotes' debut in 11-man football last Friday night by handing Borden County a 42-0 defeat.

Roby racked up a total of 437 yards on offense for the night and had an additional 188 yards in penalties. The Lions scored six touchdowns and had two called back.

Roby halfback Ricky Morton scored a two yard touchdown plunge from the two-yard line early in the first period to break the ice for the Lions. The extra point attempt kick failed.

Roby's second score came on a Brad Stuart to Ricky Morton pass for 42 yards. Again the PAT went wide.

Late in the second quarter Brad Stuart arched another long pass, 47 yards, to Morton for the third score. Morton converted the PAT for two points.

In the third quarter James Putnam got into the scoring column with a 5-yard drive to

give the Lions a 26-0 lead.

The Lions recovered a fumble on the Coyote one and 2 plays later Ricky King scored his first touchdown of the year on a 2 yd. run. Morton converted the extra point.

Roby's last score was made by James Putnam. He snagged a 24 yd. pass from Brad Stuart and King converted the extra points to give the Lions a 42-0 first of the season victory.

Roby travels to Hawley on Friday night for the second season contest. Game time is 8:00 p.m.

The FHA members hope to have many activities in the community this year.

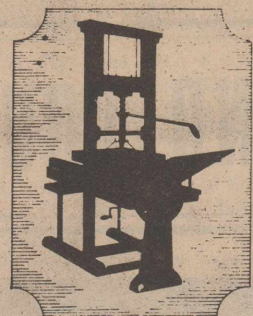

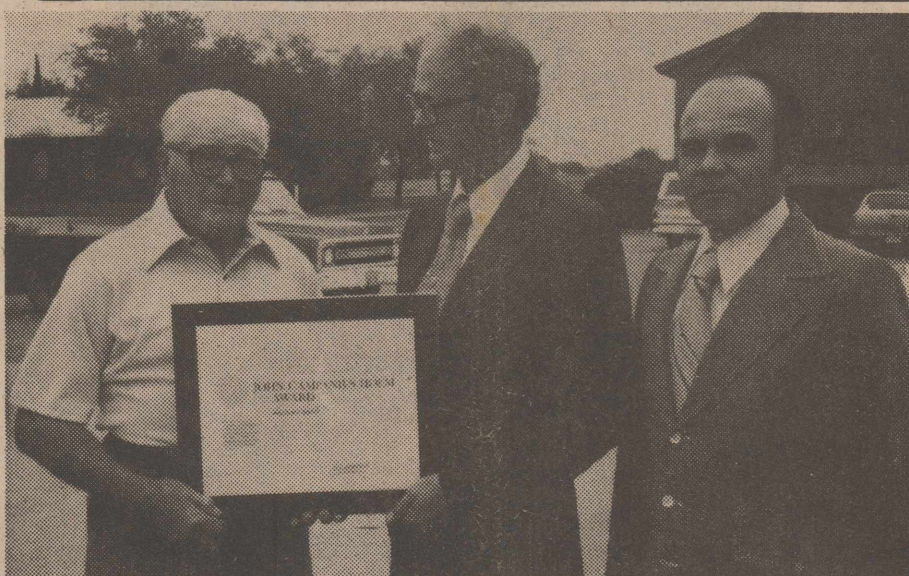

Weather Service Pays Fred Byerly Honors

Malcolm F. Byerly has been the official weather observer at Rotan for over 30 years. Today, it was announced by the U.S. Department of Commerce's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), parent agency of the National Weather Service, that Mr. Byerly is one of 35 observers selected to receive the John Campanius Holm Award.

John Campanius Holm Awards, created in 1959 by the National Weather Service, are made annually to honor volunteer observers for outstanding accomplishments in the field of meteorological observations. The award is named for a Lutheran minister who is the first person known to have taken systematic weather observations in the American colonies. The Reverend John Campanius made records of the climate, without the use of instruments, in 1644 and 1645, near the present site of Wilmington, Delaware. These observations were published in Sweden by his grandson, Thomas Campanius Holm, in 1702.

Mr. Byerly, a retired rural mail carrier, is honored for his unselfish and dedicated public service to the community and the state in observing the weather for the National Service. He is also a past school board member and one of the Directors in the Rotan Methodist Church.

The National Weather Service has nearly 12,000 volunteer observers who make and record daily weather observations in all

valuable information they gather is processed and published by the Environmental Data Service, another major component of NOAA, and becomes a valuable part of the Nation's weather history.

The Homecoming Dance will be held in the Rotan Community Center from 9 p.m. until 1:00 a.m.

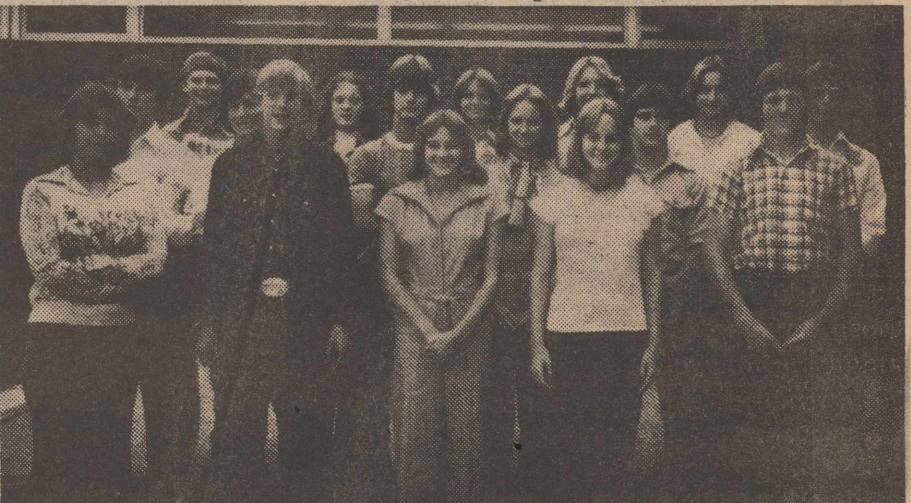
Rotan School Student Congress Organized

We made more mistakes than anyone could image but won the game 42-0. Our offense had a total of 437 yards but we were penalized 188 yards. We scored six touchdowns and had two called back. Devenisively, we played good aggressive football, but we overran the ball too much. Borden could not move the ball and we stayed on offense most of the night. They had everyone on the line defensively therefore we threw the ball rather easily. Brad Stuart threw three TD passes from his HB position and ran well with the ball. Ricky King ran the option very well and scored one TD from his QB spot. Ricky Morton caught two TD passes and ran for another. James Putnam caught one TD pass and ran for another. Brad Boyd did a credible job blocking at the fullback position.

Our offensive line had a real experience as they were trying to block an eight man front with linebackers stunting on almost every play. Tackles Jessie Castor and Steve Evers look better than ever and Danny Terry looks to be improved at his guard spot. Jay Hilliard is very quick off the ball at right guard and should be a dandy before district play begins. Rod Whitfill has improved at center and should handle that spot well when he begins to come off the ball quicker. Mike Terry is going to help us on defense with his quickness. He plays a three tech but may be moved to cornerback. He will start at left guard on offense this week as Jay Hilliard will miss the Hawley game due to a bruise on his calf. We had several pluses and a few minuses, but over-all we functioned pretty well for this early in the year.

We carried 21 players to the game and they all played. We left several players home and they will make the Hawley trip this week. Most of the boys graded out in the high 50s and low 60s, and that's a pretty good grade for the first outing.

We play Hawley at Hawley Friday night and they are better than the team we beat last year. They run the veer and play an even and odd defense up front. They will line up in a 27 defense one time and then jump into 6-1 monster the next. We will be working on line calls with the offensive line this week and perfect our passing game. Con Games Will Be Exposed at W.T. Fair

"Bunco"—or the art of con games—will be exposed for visitors to this year's West Texas Fair and Rodeo, according to Sg. Harold Emerson, chief of Abilene's Crime Prevention Unit (CPU).

Two "bunco" programs are scheduled from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Sept. 12 and Sept. 17 in the Modern Living Mall on the fairgrounds.

"Bunco is a problem in Abilene," Sgt. Emerson said. "And it's growing all the time."

Several "bunco" films will be presented along with lectures on the types of con artists and con schemes Abilenians may encounter.

According to Emerson, building materials schemes and phony insurance offers are most prevalent in the Big Country. Emerson said senior citizens are the most frequent victims.

"We will look at all different types of con artists and schemes

like the bank examiner, the phony insurance salesman, land schemes, three-card Monty, roofing schemes, Bible and book sales," Emerson said. "We want to make people aware of these tricks so they can be avoided and reported."

In addition to the "bunco" presentations, there will be a booth manned by CPU officers throughout Fair week in the Modern Living Mall. The booth will inform fairgoers about home security measures including burglar alarms and locks.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Garden check list for September:

1. Now's the time to groom pot plants that have been outdoors this summer. Repot, cut back, or take cuttings of overgrown plants. Make the last application of fertilizer to established plants before bringing them indoors.
2. Divide and transplant iris, daily, and shasta daisies in late summer or early fall. Mulch newly transplanted plants in North Texas to prevent freeze damage.
3. Continue insect and disease controls on roses for maximum beauty and flower production. Remove spent flowers to prolong blooming season.
4. Keep alert for the first sign of brown patch symptoms in lawn areas. PCNB (Terraclor) used according to instructions will give good control if used early enough.
5. Continue to fertilize and water chrysanthemums until they show flower bud color. Use

about 1-1/2 pounds of 10-10-5 fertilizer per 50 feet of row.

6. Pinching or removing slide buds on mums will increase the size of the remaining buds.
7. Complete digging, drying and storing gladiolus corms.
8. Water fall gardens when needed.
9. Clean established garden beds. Cut back or pull out faded annuals.
10. Purchase spring flowering bulbs as soon as they become available and store in the refrigerator until proper planting time. Tulips in late December others in late October and November.
11. Prepare compost bins to compost those leaves that will start falling next month.

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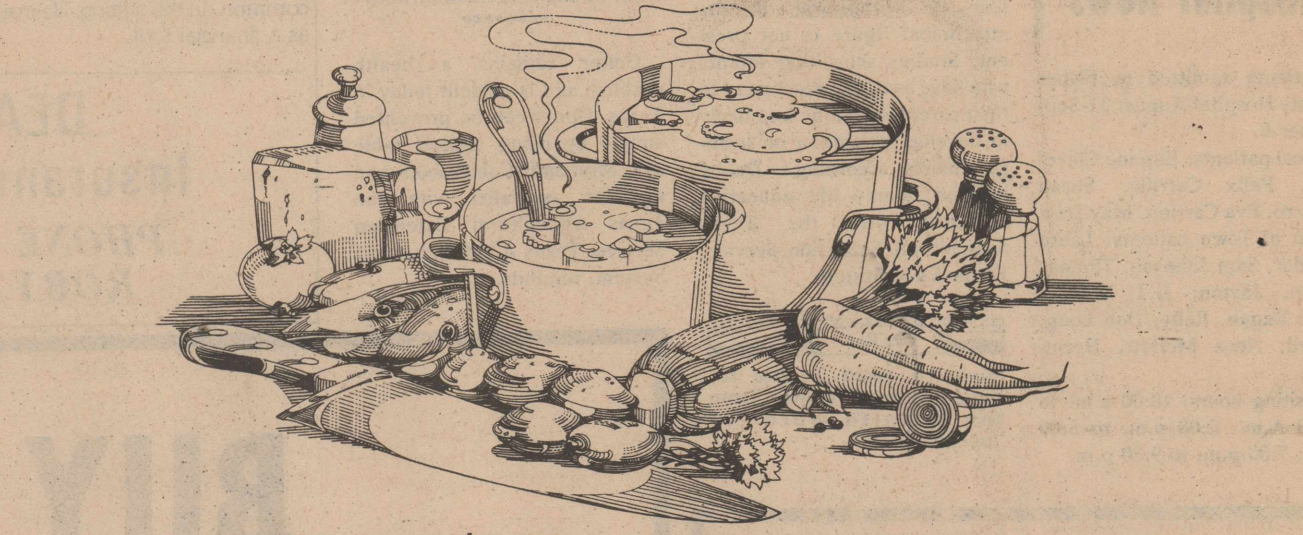

b) Chop tomatoes. Stir tomatoes, reserved liquid, wine, clam juice and salt into vegetables in Dutch oven. Heat to boiling; reduce heat and cover. Simmer 10 minutes.

c) Mix flour and 3 tbsp. butter until smooth; stir into chowder. Cook and stir until slightly thickened.

d) Cut fish into 1-inch pieces, and add to chowder. Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Simmer uncovered until fish flakes easily with fork, 8-10 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in cream.

e) Ladle chowder over sliced, toasted French bread. Garnish with snipped parsley. (Makes six 1 1/2-cup servings).

2. SEAFOOD CHOWDER

3 cups water	2 cups milk
2 cups chopped pared potatoes	1 lb. cod fillets.
1 cup chopped celery	1 tsp. dried dill weed
1 1/2 tsp. salt	1 cup chopped unpared seeded cucumber
1/2 tsp. pepper	2 tbsp. lemon juice
1/2 tsp. ground allspice	1/2 tsp. paprika
1/2 cup butter or margarine	1 hard-cooked egg, sliced
1/2 cup all-purpose flour	

a) Heat first 6 ingredients in saucepan to boiling; cover. Boil until vegetables are tender, 10-12 minutes. Drain vegetables, reserving 2 cups broth.

b) Melt butter in Dutch oven; stir in flour. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture is smooth and bubbly. Remove from heat. Stir in milk and reserved broth. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Cut cod into 1/2-inch pieces, stir into mixture. Add dill. Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Simmer uncovered until fish flakes easily with fork, about 8 minutes.

c) Stir cucumber, lemon juice, paprika and vegetables into chowder. Heat until hot. Garnish with egg slices. (Makes eight 3/4-cup servings).

Hobbs Pigsaw Talk

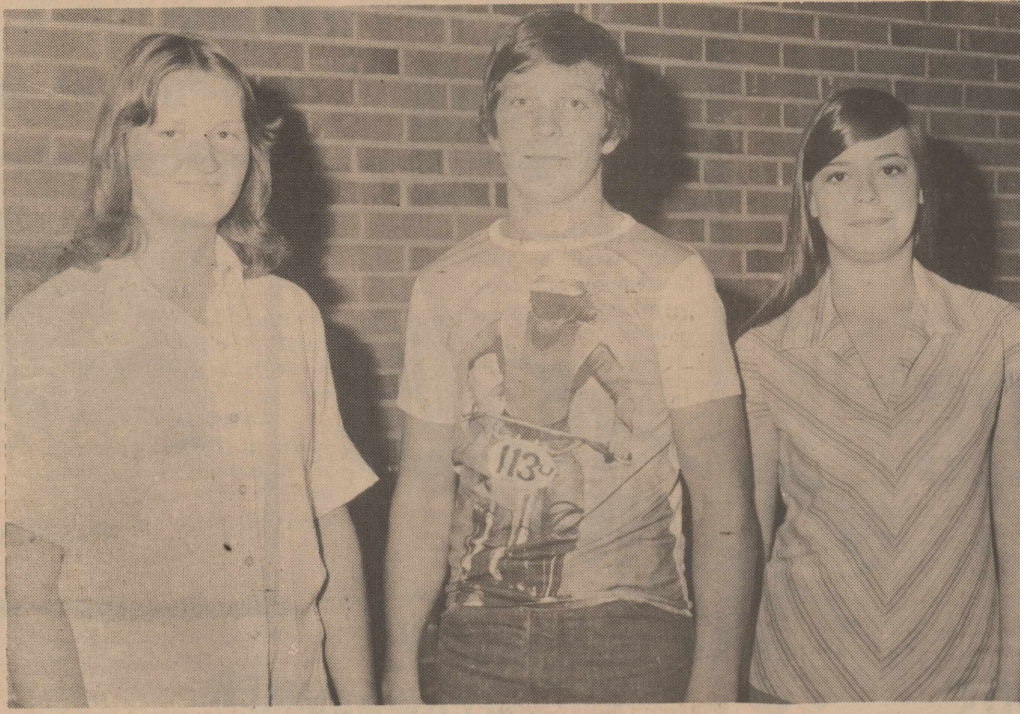

The Divide Trojans come to Hobbs this Friday at 8 p.m. The Panthers are thinking positive about getting in the win column and are looking forward to a very exciting game.



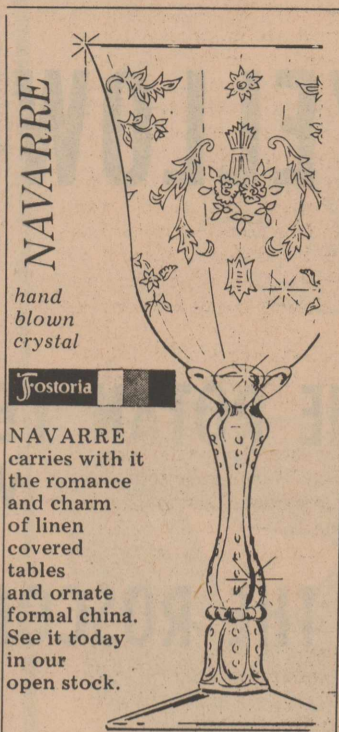

County Entomologist Column

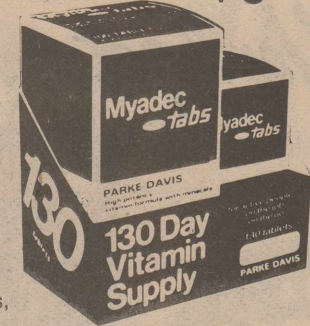
COTTON: Dry weather conditions and heavy boll weevil populations have destroyed many squares and small bolls in the tops of the plants. Boll weevil infestation causing from 10-90 percent square damage are present in many fields.

Bollworm infestations have increased in a few cotton fields where cotton is still growing well. Five-ten small worms per 100 terminals can be found in some of these fields.

GRAIN SORGHUM: Most sorghum fields in the area are mature and some harvesting is underway. Sorghum that is blooming or will bloom in the future should be watched closely for Sorghum midge.

PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

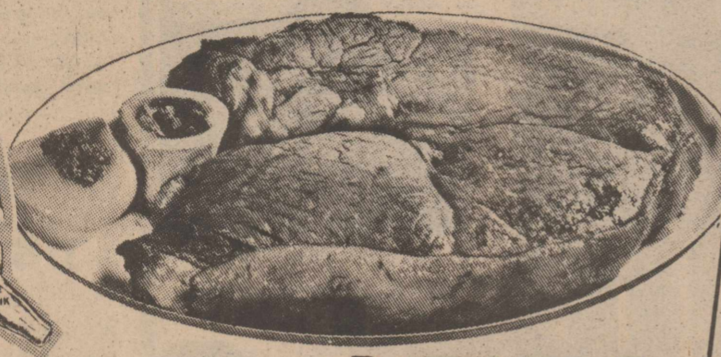
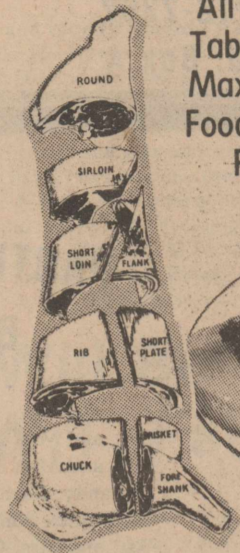

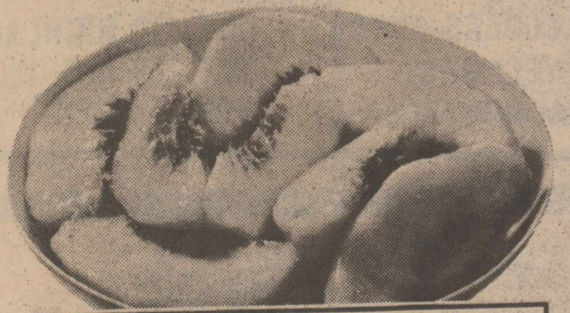
