
Hospital Administrator Hands In Resignation

The ACT Assessment's other important section is a two-part questionnaire that is completed by students at home as part of the registration process.

PUMPKIN CAKE

2 cups sugar, 11/2 cups Wesson Oil, 1 teaspoon salt, 3 teaspoons cinnamon, 4 eggs, 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons soda, 11/2 cups pumpkin.
