The guest speaker will be Bill Shipman, current athletic director at Andrews High School. Shipman has served as a head coach at Abilene High, Lewisville and Denton.


The McCaulley school board recently hired Bennie Rathke as the athletic coach. He replaces Bill Goree for the 1978-79 school year.

Cave is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Haldean Cave of Rotan.

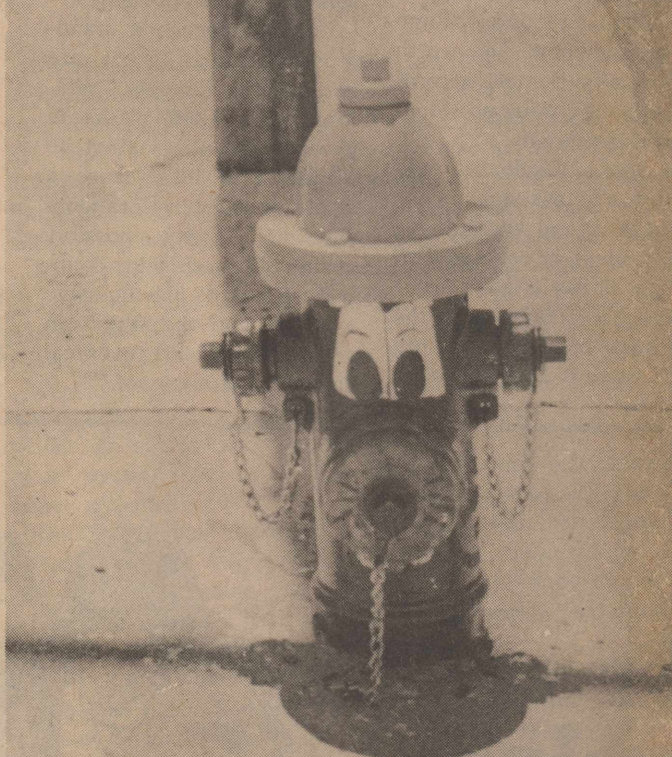

Fred Acorn Fastest In State In 100 Yard Dash

Fred Acorn charged out of the blocks at the State track meet in Austin last Saturday and 9.8 seconds later came away the winner of the 100 yard dash and the first place gold medal.

Acorn also won 3rd place in the 200 meter dash with a time of 21.4 seconds, finishing one-half a step behind the second place runner.

Of all the outstanding dashmen at Austin in all five

classes, only one had a better double than did Acorn.

After finishing third in the 100 yard dash at last year's regional meet in Odessa, Fred Acorn was overlooked for a 2nd and 3rd place finish in the 220 yard dash. Acorn set his goal on winning first in both events this year.

There was no doubt at this year's district or regional meet who was first place, so the trip to state he earned by determination and hard work

while competing in 8 meets plus district, regional and state.

Fred lost six races out of the 22 individual running events he entered this year. In three losses he finished 2nd and the other three he finished 3rd. All of these losses were runners from either AA or AAA schools. He was never beaten by a Class A runner until the state meet in the 200 meter.

Next year Fred is aiming for the state gold medals in both the 100 and 200 meters, and is planning on having some of his team mates competing with him.

This is the first meet for a trackster from Rotan to go to the state meet since Howard Van Loon and David Baugh won the team title in 1962.

There were well over 100 fans from Fisher County in Austin to support the runners from Roby and Rotan.

Resignations have already been accepted by the Rotan School Board on Coach Sid McCown, high school English teacher Virginia Attensil and elementary principal John Harbison.

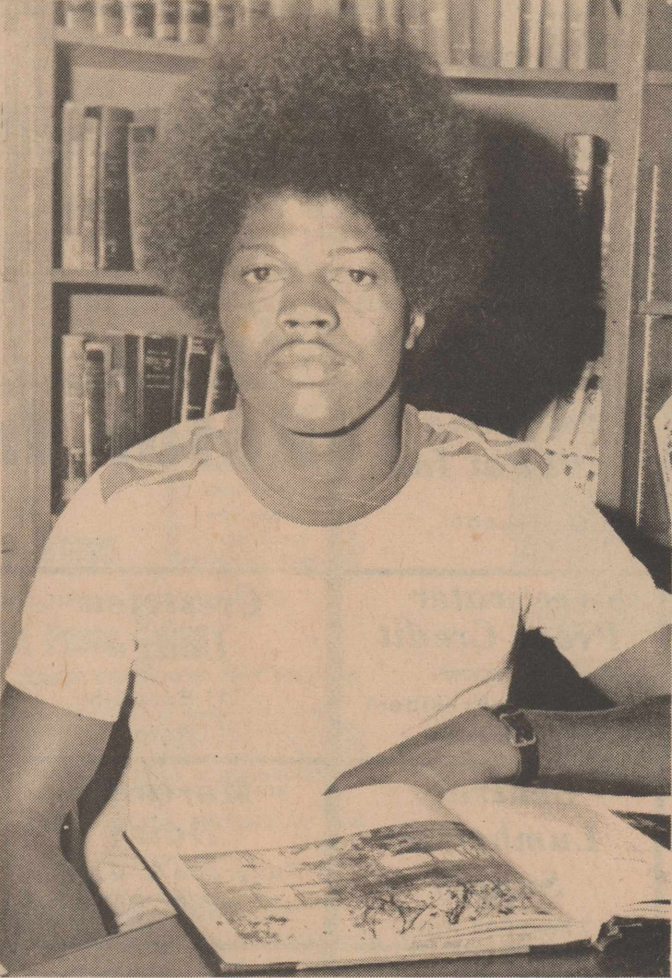

Hospital Board Lowers Tax Rate Raises Assessment Percentage

In a surprise move, the members of the Fisher County Hospital District Board of Directors passed a motion to lower the tax rate on real and personal property from 75 cents to 70 cents per \$100.00 valuation while agreeing to raise the percent of assessment to 25 percent of the actual value.

The action took place last Monday night during the regular monthly meeting of the Fisher County Hospital Board.

Dave Posey, who was hired by the Hospital Board and Fisher County Commissioners to undertake the job of overseeing the re-evaluation process, told hospital board members that he anticipated being in a position to begin turning

over new figures to Fisher County Tax Assessor-Collector Robert Buck in the near future. Posey and two assistants, Roger Blackwelder and Rafor Hargrove, have completed their re-evaluation of all Fisher County land. The improvements on all land in the County (houses, barns, etc.) have been classified and are in the process of being calculated as to the new actual value. The re-evaluation team has not completed the re-evaluation of the businesses but expected to within the next 30 days.

Both Posey and his assistant Rafor Hargrove were present for last Monday night's meeting. At that meeting Hargrove gave several examples of what the new tax would be on numerous pieces of land and selected homes in order to familiarize board members with the new procedures.

Posey indicated that the re-evaluation team is approximately 80 percent finished while telling the board that he still expects to be fully completed by July 1, 1978.

Current plans are to begin sending the gathered information to Robert Buck in order that the full Fisher County Hospital District Tax roll can reflect the re-evaluated figures when tax statements are mailed out in October 1978.

A few of the examples given by Hargrove on selected pieces of land and specific homes included a Rotan residence classified by the re-evaluation team as RV4 (relatively new brick structure). This property owner previously paid hospital district taxes on the old value (actual) of \$15,000. The new value was computed on 1991 square feet at \$10.75 per square foot for a total

new value (actual) of \$21,403. The 1977 taxes on this property amounted to \$22.50 and was computed by taking 20 percent of \$15,000 or \$3,000 and multiplying that by 75 cents per \$100.00. The 1978 taxes will be figured on \$21,403.

To compute the 1978 tax the following method would be used: 25 percent of \$21,403 would equal \$5,350.75 multiplied by .70 cents per \$100.00 valuation would equal \$37.14.

The taxes for the owner of the Rotan brick home previously valued at \$15,000, and now valued at \$21,403 would increase from \$22.50 to \$37.14 or would increase a total of \$14.64.

Hargrove gave the following example of a 112 acre Roby area farm with most

land in cultivation. The old value was \$90.00 an acre the new value was set at \$125.00 an acre. The 1977 tax paid on the land was \$15.15, the 1978 tax would be \$24.45.

A large county farm of 1246 acres was valued on the 1977 roll at \$77,110.00, after re-evaluation the farm with over 1,000 acres in cultivation is valued at \$118,456.00. The 1977 tax was \$115.65 the 1978 tax will increase to \$207.29.

The final example was a large ranch (mostly in pasture) amounting to 6,156 total acres with two houses and a barn on the property. The old total value of the property was \$172,200 and the new value amounted to \$171,021. The old taxes amounted to \$258.00 and the new taxes will be \$299.28.

JESUS, MAGICIAN OR MESSIAH

Jesus became very popular in His early ministry. As Jesus went about ministering to people in need He healed the sick, cast out demons, raised the dead, and preached the Gospel of the Kingdom of God. After Jesus cast a demon out of a man in the Capernaum Synagogue His popularity grew. "And at once His fame spread everywhere throughout all the surrounding region of Galilee." (Mk. 1:28) After healing a leper Jesus' popularity grew so great that He could no longer speak in city homes. "But Jesus could no longer openly enter a town, but was out in the country; and people came to Him from every quarter." (Mk. 1:45)

How did Jesus view this great increase in His popularity? What was His understanding of why so many people followed Him? And for what reasons did Jesus call people to follow Him? It is clear from the first three chapters of Mark's gospel that most of those who followed Jesus misunderstood Jesus' mission and message. The crowds came to Jesus to be healed or be set free from demons and were not interested in the meaning of these miracles or the message of Jesus. They did not give evidence of concern for the meaning of Jesus' mission nor were they concerned to know His identity. To them Jesus was the miracle worker of the day. As long as Jesus worked miracles they were close behind Him. What did Jesus think of this misunderstanding of His mission and message?

One morning Jesus got up very early to avoid the misunderstanding crowd to pray and to start for the next town in which He would preach. But His disciples and the crowd found Him and tried to convince Him to stay because there were still people to be healed and demons to be cast out. What was Jesus' reply? "I must preach the good news of the Kingdom of God to the other cities also, for I was sent for this purpose." (Lk. 4:43) (read Mk. 1:35-39; Lk. 4:42-44) Jesus left an opportunity to work miracles that He may preach the Gospel. This tells us that Jesus wanted people to follow Him because they accepted His Message and were willing to submit to His lordship in their lives. Do we follow Jesus for the right reasons? Do you follow Jesus because you love Him and want Him to be the Lord of your life? Or do you follow Jesus for selfish reasons? Jesus will accept only one kind of follower; those who lovingly accept Him as Lord of all their life. Amen.

As It Looks From Here

The President's tax proposal has now been before the Ways and Means Committee since January 21, 1978. Since that time, long and tedious hearings have been conducted with literally hundreds of witnesses testifying pro and con. We are now out of the hearings stage and attempting to write a bill and there are about as many ideas as there are Members of the Committee.

It is certain that the President's proposal has little chance of approval in the form submitted. If the measure were approved as the Administration proposes, we would end up with a \$67 to \$70 billion deficit. The bill provides for cuts of \$22.5 billion for individuals and about \$6 billion for business for the year 1979. It further provides that certain tax cuts of 1977, which expire at the end of this year, be partially extended, bringing the total to about \$34 billion.

Tax reforms, which means closing what some want to describe as "Loopholes", recover \$9 billion in tax revenues, leaving a net reduction of approximately \$25 billion.

For an average American family of four with a \$15,000 income, the proposal would cut their tax by \$258. In the meantime, the family would lose the \$35 tax credit per person now provided. This is not nearly the whole story. The net tax cut to such a family would be offset two to three times over, by the increased rate of inflation to which the increased deficit would contribute. In short, it amounts to giving with one hand and taking it away with the other.

There is a proposal before the committee to extend the tax cuts enacted in 1977, including the \$35 credit per

person, the small business surtax exemption, earned income credit and a few other provisions for reduced taxes. It would reduce the deficit of approximately \$60 billion now projected to about \$35 billion. The reduction of this approximately \$25 billion from the deficit would result in the Federal Government not having to borrow this sum, making it available to the private sector for industrial expansion at lower interest rates. It would result in an attack on inflation and make possible more employment in the industrial sector and, in the longer term, reduce pressures on material and labor costs, contribute to American exports and a healthier economy generally.

It is not so much the dollar which remains after taxes to the individual and businesses; it is the value, the quality of the dollar and the measurement of what it can buy. Dollars developed through tax cuts resulting in higher deficits, are certainly less useful than the dollars that remain after a tax policy which reduces the deficit to around \$35 billion.

If there is the wisdom to move in this direction, in time it will create economic conditions which can turn this Country around in its problems with inflation, depreciation of the dollar world-wide and reduced imbalance of payments. Some argue that this is a case for high taxes. It isn't. Rather it's a case for responsibility--against continually rising costs of everything, instability in our economy--the integrity of our dollar. With this must go a drastic reduction in Government spending if we are to bring sanity to our fiscal affairs.

Second Recall Of Imported Canned Beef Upsets Krueger

The second recall in a month of an imported canned beef product has prompted U.S. Cong. Bob Krueger to call for immediate Congressional action on his meat import bill, H.R.8684.

The bill, authored by Krueger, would require that foreign slaughterhouses be subject to the same inspection standards as American slaughterhouses and that

foreign meat be labeled as such. The bill is currently pending before the Agriculture Committee of the House of Representatives.

The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture announced Friday, May 12, that it is recalling cans of cubed beef packed in water that were produced by a South American country as a precaution against possible food poisoning. The Department on April 14, issued a similar recall for canned beef produced by another South American company.

"I have said many times before, that if ever a potentially dangerous health situation existed, this is it," Krueger said Friday while in San Antonio. "A rash of problems with imported meat occurred several years ago and still inspection standards are inadequate."

"Unsuspecting Americans each month consume tons of foreign meat, contained in everything from fast-food hamburgers to deluxe cui-

sine restaurant dishes, which do not always meet the same health standards that domestic meat does. These consumers should have access to clear labeling so they can intelligently decide whether

or not they wish to purchase meat not packaged or inspected in the U.S.," Krueger said.

Krueger's bill would require the cost for inspection and labeling be borne by the foreign producer and that all meat and meat products entering the United States be labeled as imported and state the country of origin. The bill would also correct inequitable loopholes in the annual meat import quota which exempt live cattle, preserved and prepared meat from the quota regardless of country of origin.

Current inspection standards of foreign meat are inadequate Krueger said. More than 1,000 plants in about 45 countries must be inspected at least twice a year, he said, but "brandom checking cannot possibly ensure that another country's standards are the same as ours, and the American consumers who eat this meat should know it cannot."

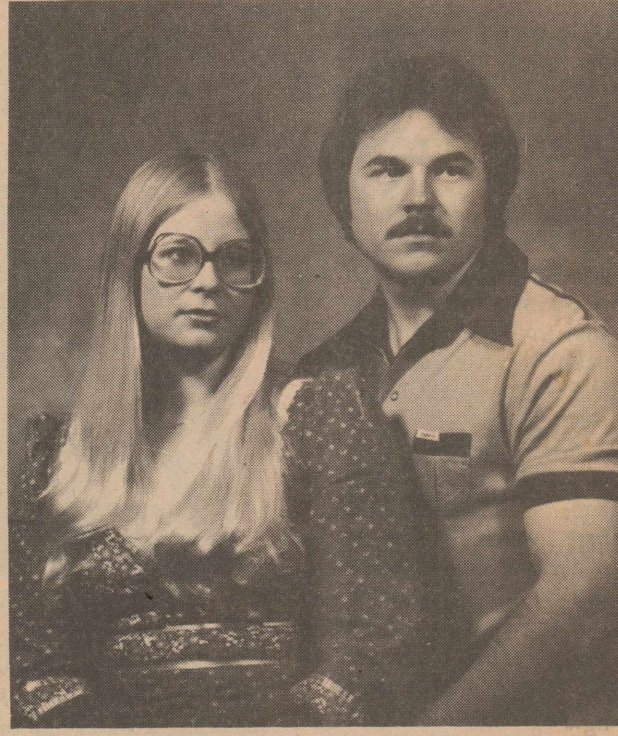

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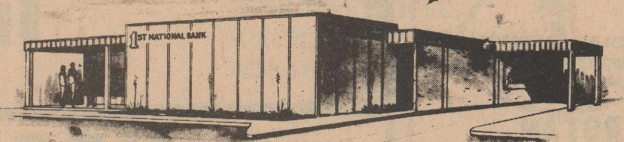

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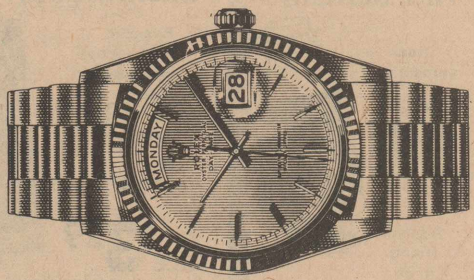

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COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Texas livestock producers have the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University working for them.

The laboratory, opened in 1969, was established so that tests on animal specimens could be done promptly to reduce the cost of animal diseases in Texas. This, in turn, increases the efficiency of livestock production and reduces the cost of animal products to consumers.

The services of the laboratory are available to any citizen of Texas, but about 99 percent of the cases are sent in by veterinarians. Specimens sent or brought to the laboratory for testing might include sick or dead animals, pieces of tissue or blood samples.

The laboratory includes departments of pathology, toxicology and microbiology, with the department of microbiology divided into sections of virology, serology and bacteriology. Pathologists evaluate lesions and organs for changes in tissue. Toxicologists run tests for poisons while microbiologists look for viruses, bacteria and fungi that cause disease.

With these various personnel working on each case at the same time, a powerful

In addition to serving as a facility for testing animal specimens for disease problems, the laboratory serves as a disease detection center and animal disease information center to keep veterinarians and livestock producers abreast of disease outbreaks and related information.

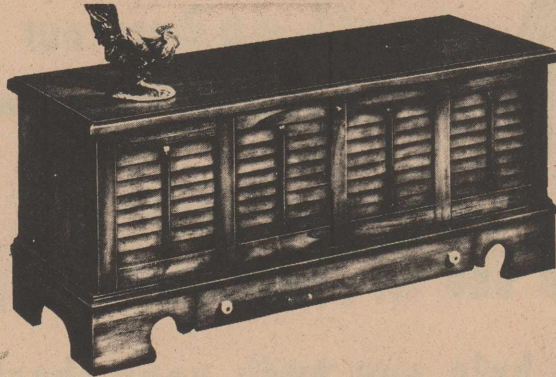

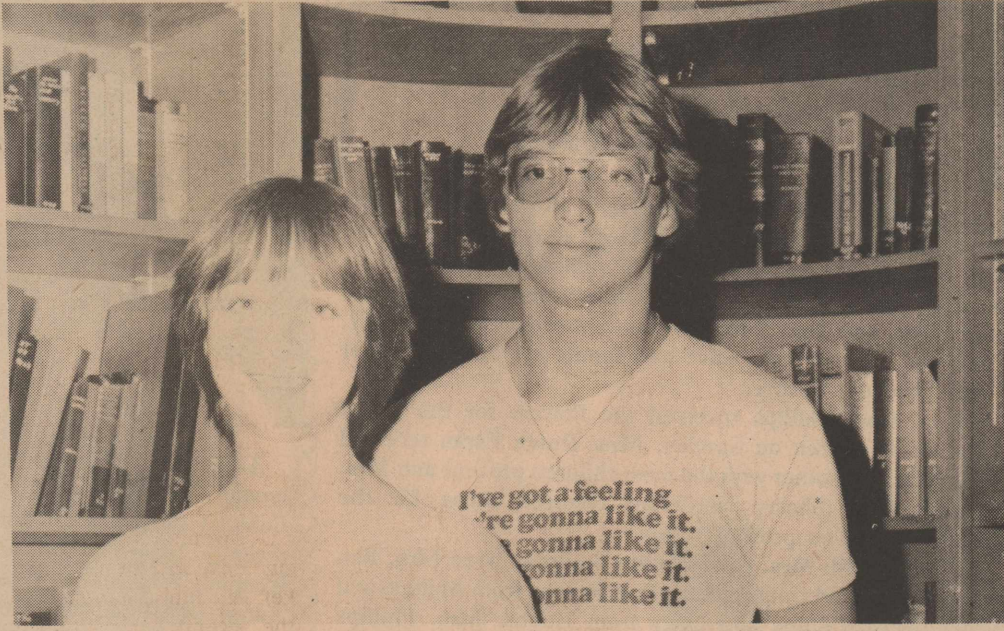

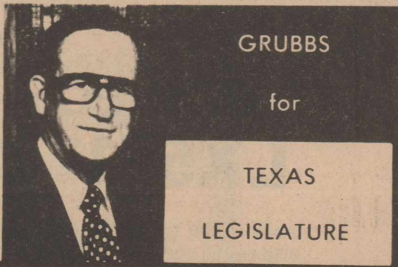

Proof Of Age Needed For S.S.I. Benefits

People who plan to apply for supplemental security income (SSI) payments can help speed up the application process if they get certain information together beforehand, Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene said.

SSI is the Federal program that provides monthly cash payments to people in financial need who are 65 or older, or blind, or disabled. The basic monthly federal payment is \$177.80 for an individual and \$266.70 for a couple. Some people receive less because of other income or their living arrangements.

Hammons also pointed out that it makes no difference how old or young a person is to become eligible for SSI payments because of disability or blindness.

The kind of information needed to process an SSI claim includes the following: Proof of age, unless the person already gets social

security checks; The latest tax bill or assessment notice if the person owns a house or other real estate; The latest rent receipt if the person pays rent, or information showing how much the person contributes toward maintaining the household; Bank books, insurance policies, and other papers that show what the person owns; Pay slips or other papers that show the person's other income; If the person is applying because of blindness or disability, he or she should also have the names, addresses and telephone numbers of doctors, hospitals, institutions, or clinics that provided treatment for the condition and the dates the person was treated.

More detailed information about the eligibility requirements for SSI payments can be obtained at the Abilene social security office, 142 S. Pioneer, phone 698-1360.

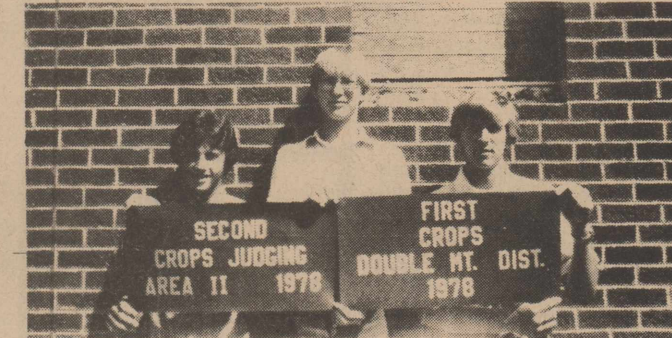

Hospital Chops Expenses To Cut Overall Losses

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board met last Monday night for their regular meeting and heard a report by Fisher County Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker concerning the financial condition of the district.

Hunsaker told the directors that the hospital was showing a net profit (year to

year) from the operation of the hospital of \$4,546.69 excluding the provision for depreciation. If the depreciation figure (year to date) is computed the hospital district reflects a net loss of \$28,553.31.

In other figures, Hunsaker said that the revenue per patient day in 1977 amounted to \$118.40 while through the first 4 months of 1978 it figured \$119.78.

The expenses per patient day (without depreciation) amounted to \$131.44 in 1977 but has been chopped to \$112.00 for the first 4 months of 1978.

Hunsaker attributes the \$4,546.69 profit from operation of the hospital through the first 4 months to the fact that the expenses have been reduced drastically in the operation of the facility.

In other action, the board agreed to discuss the possibility of constructing a Fisher County Clinic at the Hospital at the June board meeting.

The board also voted to purchase a medical kit (approximately \$50.00) and a scanner (approximately \$160.00) for the Roby area ambulance. The board also voted to reimburse Jimmy Hayes \$200.00 for tuition, travel and expense of attending the advanced medical training school at Abilene.

Check the quality, consider needs and shop sales for best handbag buys. Spend the most money on the handbag that is carried frequently and that will be used for a long time.

For dressy occasions or to accessorize a single garment, consider a less expensive bag.

Quality handbags are made of sturdy leather, plastic or fabric, and they have strong closures and heavy zippers.

Double handles are more durable and the bag won't flop open if the clasp gives way. Also, look for feet on the base of stiff, solid cases. This will minimize wear on the bottom. Look for metal parts on hinges, closures and handle attachments. Good

materials will not rub off, bleed or fade.

Inspect fastenings—they should be secure and easy to operate. Zippered compartments offer security and help separate certain items like wallet, glasses case and keys.

When shopping at sales, choose an incoming style from the sale table. It will be in fashion longer.

When buying an expensive bag, check to see if the store has a handbag repair department. Some department stores or shoe repairmen will accept handbag repairs.

For the do-it-yourselfer, repair parts are often available at sewing notion counters and in catalogs.

Compile Information Before Making App.

People planning to apply for social security disability benefits can help speed the application process if they get some information together beforehand, Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene said today.

Social security disability benefits can be paid to disabled workers under 65 and their families, unmarried persons disabled before 22 and on the record of a retired, disabled, or deceased parent, and disabled widows and widowers 50 or over.

People in these categories can receive benefits if they have a physical or mental impairment which prevents them from doing any substantial work and is expected to last 12 months or more or result in death. Workers

must meet a test of recent work covered by social security to get benefits. People disabled before 22 and widows and widowers may qualify on the social security record of a parent or husband or wife.

People considering applying should do so as soon as it appears their impairment will keep them from working for 12 months or more. This is true even though no payments can be made to workers and widows or widowers for the first 5 full months of disability.

Before applying, people should get together as much of the following information as possible. But they should not delay applying if they cannot obtain all the information. People at the social security office will help them get the rest:

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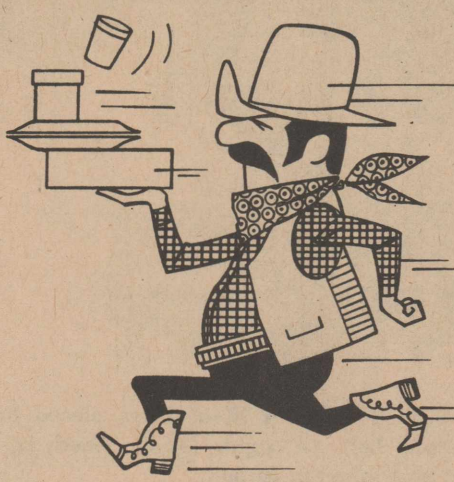

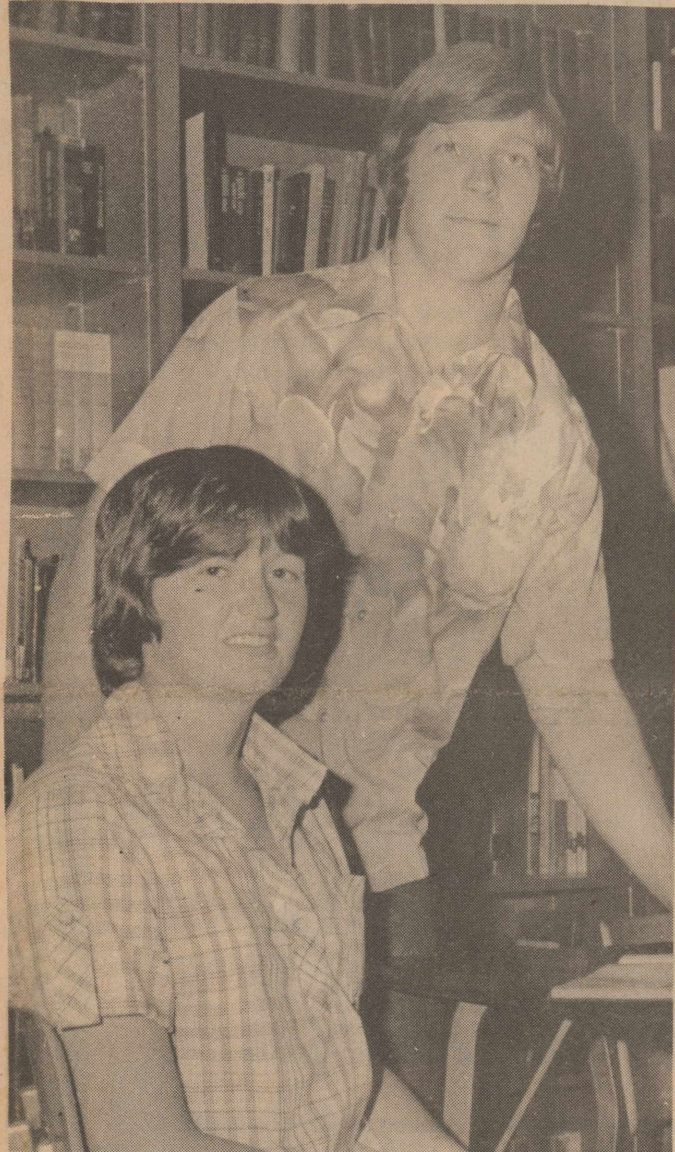

A supporting structure of closely knit parents and teachers at the local level is the second most important factor. Frustration and discouragement felt by parents and teachers are often in direct proportion to the distance we feel from the sources of intrusion by requirements and programs from the federal government that are not tailored to our local needs," said Stenholm.

Stenholm also believes that "much attention and research must be devoted to making the financial foundation of public education more equitable for students and all others concerned."

Recent figures provided by the Texas Education Agency say that eight percent of the money required to operate the local school districts in Texas for the 1976-77 school year came from the federal government. "Red tape pressing down from Washington, even to the classroom level, was far out of proportion to this contribution," noted Stenholm.

"I believe that when federal funds are wanted and needed, they should flow directly as possible to the

local school district with a maximum amount of local control and a minimum amount of federal control," stressed Stenholm.

As an example, Stenholm expressed his concern for the importance and the continuation of Bill 874, impacted aid to school districts serving military and federal employee dependents.

Pointing out the fact that there are schools in the 17th District which fall under Bill 874, such as Abilene, Mineral Wells and Big Spring; Stenholm noted the impact of such legislation.

"Impacted aid to such schools is crucial, because the schools do not receive property taxes from parents living in base housing," stated Stenholm. "It is essential that these school districts continue to receive this aid. Impacted aid to schools is a perfect example of federal funds with no strings attached," Stenholm commented.

"Our country's commitment to education has always played a vital role in our history. Schools have done much in creating opportunity for the removal of barriers that frequently separate our people," he added.

"Yet it has not been enough," Stenholm continued. "The fiscal pressures of today seriously threaten and undermine educational advantages we have produced."

Realizing that education has always played a vital role in our nation's history, Stenholm said, "I will back legislation that will continue to support education and seek to find ways to strengthen our educational

system".

Stenholm, born and reared in the 17th District, is a native of Stamford, A working farmer, he has taught vocational agriculture for two and one half years. "Having lived and worked in the District all of my life, and due to the fact that I have experience as a teacher; I feel that I can relate to and understand the problems facing education today," commented Stenholm.

Stenholm received his M.S. in agricultural education from Texas Tech University. Since his graduation, he has been involved in numerous civic, church and political activities which have led him to local, state and national leadership recognition.

The father of three, Stenholm received the nod of the voters of the 17th Congressional District in the May 6 primary by receiving the highest number of votes cast in the election. He will face his opponent in the June 3 runoff election.

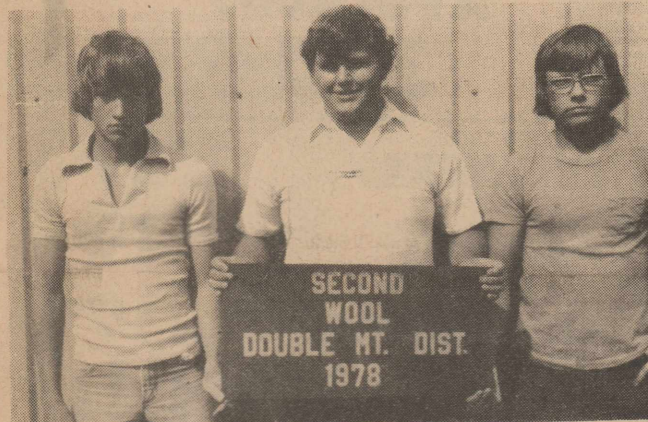

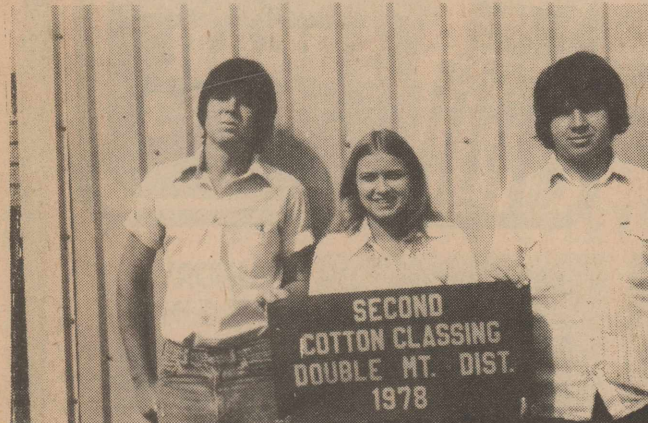

1978 Pest Management Program For Sign-Up

Time is here for sign-ups of acreage for the 1978 pest management program. We are extremely late this year in beginning our sign-ups, but it cannot be helped because of the weather situation. We have been holding off for a little moisture and that's what we have gotten, a little. Before anything is said about paying in money for cotton that may not be planted, let me clarify the situation. As has been the case in the past, if money is paid in for cotton or grain acreage to be scouted and something happens to that acreage ie. hail or drought causing it to be disestered, the unused portion of the money is paid back to that producer. In our case this year, if you pay in money and do not plant, than all of the money paid in will be refunded. Consequently, if you plant the cotton and it grows for awhile and then dies and is disestered, that unused portion of the money will be returned to you. So you see that you will not pay for something and get nothing.

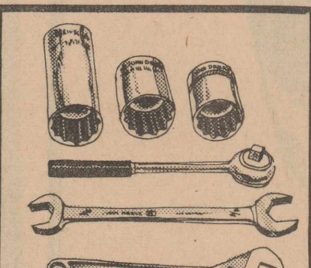

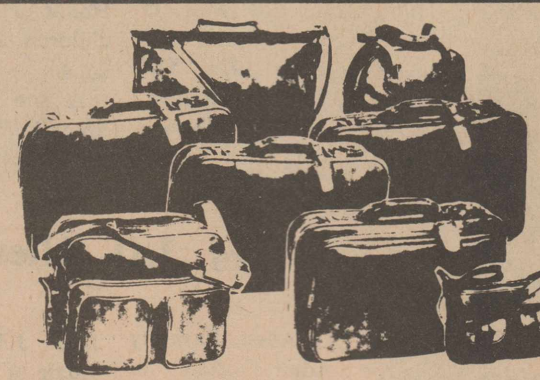
