



She was known as "Miss

Empress' to her friends. Born on a ranch near San Angelo, she came to Rotan in 1908 when the town was less than a year old. She was the daughter of the late Mr and Mrs William David Beauchamp.

She taught at Luzon, Sim's Ranch, Cross Roads, and Rotan before her marriage to James B. Day in Rotan in 1914. Mr Day was a Rotan founder. While raising three children, she taught kindergarten for a number of years. Mr Day died in January, 1946.

After his death, she was principal of Rotan Elementary School, then studied for her bachelor's degree and Danny Parr of the her master's degree at mother at both schools. She also did graduate work at West Texas State.

She taught social studies and reading in Rotan Junior High until her retirement in 1964. She did substitute teaching until 1977.

She was a life member of the International Delta Kappa Gamma Society, honorary women teachers organization, and she was charter member and past president of the Gamma Tau chapter, local chapter of that organization. She was an organizer of the Anne Pettus Shelburne chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, of which she was past chapter chaplain and current chapter historian. She was a member of Tejas Chapter of the National Society, Colonial Daughters of the 17th Century, establishing her Beauchamp ancestry to the 1600's in Maryland. She was a member of the

### Words of Life

Johnny T. Robertson, Pastor First United Methodist Church Rotan, Texas

SYMBOLIC WORDS AND ACTIONS

Third in our series on repentance is the topic of symbolic words and actions which are often substituted for genuine repentance. Often people will repeat the words of an ancient creed or act reverent in worship and assume this alone pleases God. Jesus refused to accept reverential words as a substitute for obedience when He said, "And why do you call me, Lord, Lord, and do not the things I say?" (Luke 6:46) We often think that since we are not saved by works that God only requires to hear us speak reverential words to Him by repeating a creed of the Church. Christian loyalty means more than having intellectually correct theology. Rather, it means living in obedience to God's Word and living a life that loves God in word and deed.

Some believe that by participating in Baptism and the Lord's Supper that they are put right with God. They think God is more interested in how they worship than how they live. This too is a serious error. Anyone can claim to be Christian on these terms. But God requires a life that proves its love and devotion through obedience. Others believe that God takes particular pleasure in their grief over sin. Therefore, they constantly confess sin to God even if they do not know what they have done wrong. They substitute an expression of sorrow for sin for a real amendment of their life and somehow think God is pleased. And then they return to their sin as if nothing ever happend between them and God. Again I am reminded by my professor, Dr. Mavis, that "the habit of confessing sins, by word or act, without a will to forsake them, is deadening spiritually. It tranquilizes the questing spirit. The worshiper naively assumes, in such case, that he has found an expeditious way of handling his sin problem. He can follow the sinful ways of the world and yet right himself with heaven with a minimum of inconvenience." Virtue then consists of confession of sins and not the avoiding them. One develops a cold and insensitive heart, believing that God care little for righteous living inas much as He apparently accepts the substitution of santimonious words for right living. Please do not get caught in this self-deceit thinking you are right with God when in reality you have refused to genuinely repent of you sin. The Lord desires to help you overcome sin. If you will ask God, He will give you the victory over sin and free you from sin's result, death. Repent and believe the Gospel! Amen.



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



The disgruntled attitude taxpayers have today is aimed more at their frustration with what is happening at the Federal level than problems here in Texas."



### 21 Cotton Producers Visit Cotton Inc.

Twenty-one cotton producers from the Rolling Plains region of Texas visited the Cotton Incorporated research center here recently to find out how their dollars are invested by the company to improve otton markets and cut beir production costs.

Cotton Incorporated is the fiber company of American cotton produ-

In their one-day visit, the xas toured laboratory ilities and heard Cotton recorporated officials dethe research and momotion work of the company.

Counties represented in the tour were Cottle, Collingsworth, Fisher, Hall, Haskell, Jones. Kent, and Runnells.

At the conclusion of the trip, one tour member, ginner D.F.Miller of Memphis, commented: "We've always been interested in Cotton Incorporated and wondered just how our money was being spent. So we came up and went through their facilities and laboratories. We certainly understand now where our money's being spent and that it is being well spent. We're real proud of this trip."

One of the tour members, ginner Foy Mitchell of Roby admitted he had some reservations about the work of the company, but he came away impres-

Said Mitchell, "We were invited up to Raleigh to see their facilities, and I was very much impressed with what they are doing. They seem to be doing a real god job of research and promotion of cotton products."

Another tour member, cotton producer Billy J. Holley of Paducah, explained that he made the trip "because we wanted to look at our facilities and see what Cotton Incorporated is doing to improve the sale of our products to the

"It looks real good," he

Said Davis Weaver, a cotton producer from Hamlin: "I was interested in where my approximately \$2 a bale went. I wanted market. They also heard to see what kind of stuff was going on here. And I think they are doing a pretty good job at it. They're doing a lot more than I thought."

about and saw new equipment developed by the company to cut the costs of using cotton for textile mills to make cotton more competitive with synthetic fibers.

Charles Lapidus, director of merchandising in the New York marketing office, explained to the producers the company's marketing and advertising strategies.

He told the group that through advertising the cotton seal had become the most widely recognized symbol of a textile product in the minds of the American public.

Commented one of the tour members, Carl Wischkaemper of Memphis, at the end of the visit: "I think they're doing a wonderful job. There are a lot of things going on that we didn't realize were going on in the way of research and new products that are coming out and new methods. I think they're doing a wonderful job of it."

Concluded another Memphis cotton producer, George Williams: "I came to see where my \$2 a bale was being spent. It's been very informative, and I think we're getting our money's worth."

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### **Counties Record First Screwworm Cases**

Additional pressure was put on Texas livestock producers and on the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program the first 11 days of July, says Dr. James Wommack.

In that interval six counties recorded their first 1978 screwworm cases and the Texas count climbed from 121 to 173 cases. Wommack, Southwest Regional Director for Veterinary Services of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), says 41 Texas counties have tallied screwworm cases this

Counties recording their first cases in early July are Coke, Floyd, Medina, Nolan, Reagan and Real. El Paso County has the most recorded cases with 20; Live Oak follows with

16; while Irion and Borden are tied with ten each.

Arizona has tallied 1,518 cases so far this year; New Mexico count stands at 338; and California has 31.


