County Fair And Rodeo

Don't guess anyone knows for sure just how many schools have operated in Fisher County---but one local resident made a list of over 40 that operated at one time and were either disolved or consolidated with larger school in the county.

George Moore of Rotan recalls starting school at Chickenfoot in the first grade back in 1908. Chikcenfoot was located on the old Roby to Snyder road approximately 6 or 7 les due west of Roby. According to George it was a typical old time, one room school house with one teacher and 30 to 35 students.

George graduated from Avelon School in 1919. Back in the early 1900's if you successfully completed high school you were considered a well educated person. By today's standards a high school education is a basic necessity. A college education is more the norm, and those that have masters degrees and doctors degrees are considered the better educat-

You had to be tough and really want an education back in the early 1900's in Fisher County to get a high school diploma.

Dillard Smith, co-owner of Smith and Cyphers Gulf in Rotan, recalled having to walk to school a distance of 21/2 miles. He didn't get to start to school until he was 8 years old because of

the distance involved. W.E. Hale started school in 1920, walked 21/4 miles each way to school until the Dorris school consolidated with Dowell in about 1925.

Some of the schools rememberd by Moore, although probably not a complete lits, included: Avelon, Busby, Barronview, Crossroads, Greasy Corner, North Roby, Center, Claytonville, Chickenfoot, Dowell, Dorris, Old Fisher, Pledger, Rotan, Roby, Pleasant Valley, Sardis, Hood, Wright, Whiteflat, Allwright, El Paso, Hackberry, Dallas, Sylvester, McCaulley, Palava, Hitson, Royston, Capitola, Adair, Rountop, Gannon, Grady, Mountain View, Longworth, Sweedonia, Hobbs, Cactus Flat and Pyron.


4-H Leaders Training In **Roby Tuesday**





Fisher County Entomologist Column

Cotton made good growth in areas where adequate moisture is present, while in those places that missed the majority of the rains, you can find wilting cotton. Insect activity is increasing in some irrigated fields, while in most dryland fields it's too dry


Boll weevil activity is on the increase in one irrigated field as 36 percent of the squares are punctured. Mature larvae and pupae can be found in squares on the ground and more adult weevils will be in the field in a week or so.

Dryland fields are hanging in with punctured square counts ranging from 0-13 percent with most fields less than 5 percent. Look for damage to increase over the next couple of

Bollworm activity still remains light with egg count ranging from 5-5/100 plants in all fields. Worms range from 0-8/100 plants with most fields having less than 2/100 plants. These worms are rather large in most fields. Damage ranges from 0 to 24 percent with most fields standing at less than 5 percent. No control measures have been applied at the present time and should not be until worm pressure is present.

Beneficial insect activity has remained steady as green lacewing flies are still the most prominent. Lady beetles are getting more scarce as time wears on. It looks as though we'll have to rely on the green lacewings the remainder of the year.

arrowheads, a Texas fly swatter and a rattlesnake rattler. "They were most fascinated by the rattler", said Harris. "They don't have poisonous snakes in the Polk County area".

Kip Pease stayed with the Robert Hanson family in Rice Lake, Wisconsin, a town of approximately 7,000 people. The Hansons are operators of a small dairy farm and grow corn on their 75 acre farm. The Hansons operate their farm without the benefit of hired hands. "They are a very dedicated family", said Pease. "Everything the family does revolves around a very rigid milking schedule and they take their dairy business very seriously."

The Hansons are one of the few in the Barron County area that milk their dairy herd three times a day. According to Pease, Hanson said that he receives a 30 percent more vield by milking three times a day instead of the customary two times. Milking is done at 6:30 a.m.; 4:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m., seven days a week--no holidays.

Pease worked with the two Hanson boys, David age 12 and Mark age 10, feeding animals, hauling hav and assisting with the milking.

Hamlin had a scrape with the law back in 1973--well a little more than a scrape--he pulled a shotgun on two Fishr County law officers. That incident saw him placed on probation and in 1976 that probation was revoked after he was picked up in Stamford for driving while intoxicated.

Since 1976 Danny Smart has changed his life. He is currently in the Fisher County Jail and has gained the respect of not only Sheriff Mickey Counts, but the entire Commissioners Court and several influential area judges and law officers.

Danny Smart has saved Fisher County between 30 and 40 thousand dollars since first being placed in the Fisher County Jail. He has been in the county jail for the past 6 months. According to Sheriff Counts, "Danny voluntarily wanted to stay here and help out with some of the work on the jail remodeling". For Smart it was a move that would mean his wife and two children would not have to drive to Huntsville for visiting rights.

After his probation was revoked on the DWI charge, Smart was sentenced to three years in the Texas State Prison at Huntsville.

Counts estimates that Smart has easily saved Fisher County \$30,000 in work. According to Sheriff Counts, he received a bid from Southern Steel in San Antonio for between \$55,-000 and \$60,000 for welding, steelwork and Breck Weathers remodeling to bring the Fisher County Jail up to Piano Recital the new jail standards.

nave spent in the area of \$75,000 to \$80,000 to finish all the work-this includes the bid from Southern Steel", said Counts.

Instead of spending 75 or 80 thousand--we were out a total of \$29,000 including raw material, new required fixtures, paint and everything, according to Counts.

Smart did all the welding and steel work on

Danny D. Smart of two floors of the remodeled jail, built tables (steel) in the day rooms, constructed steel tables and chairs in all cells, completely built a woman's cell and day room on the 3rd floor of the jail, built two storage cabinets in the kitchen area, extended all bunks to the required width, built television stands in all day rooms, assisted with the electrical wiring and plumbing, did plaster work, cement work and single-handedly repainted two floors of the remodeled jail.

"I put in a lot of 14 and 18 hour days", said Smart. In answer to where he received his talent to weld and do metal work, he said. "I got most from my Dad--he taught me how to

weld and I picked up a lot while in the Navy", said Smart.

His hard work will hopefully be rewarded. According to Counts, Smart has been a model prisoner. "He has done everthing within his power to help Fisher County and any consideration that could be shown Danny, within the law, would certainly be appreciated", said the Sheriff.


