## Emergency Louns For The County Available

A new Economic Emerency loan service for armers or ranchers who lave financial problems or cost-price squeeze is now in effect through the .S. Farmers Home Ad Edward B. Merrick, gency's supervisor for Fisher County, reports that FmHA is prepared to take applications at the colunty office, Rotan.
Economic Emergency loans are authorized under the Agricultural Credit Act of 1978 signed by Presient Carter August 4. They offer special help to pressed by recent shortage credit from their regular enders, or by debts accumulated during the prices.
Mr. Merrick said the conomic Emergency loan program was enacted by Congress, with Administration support, in recog"economic conditions, as well as weather, are often beyond farmers' control., FmHA emergency creidt has previously been conined to loans for recovery rom natural disaster, or he guarantee of private enders' loans to livestock producers affected by economic conditions.
Under the new Econom ic Emergency program, rator-individual partner ship, corporation or coop rative-experiencing carce credit or an oan of debt coming due may apply for up to $\$ 400,000$ or credit through FmHA in order to survive in farming and continue their normal level of peration.
