Tax Mess

This may prove to be a very timely article--since all of us in Fisher County are just a few weeks from paying county, state, hospital and school taxes. Because we sell office supplies and job printing and withhold social security and income tax from our employees, we are required to pay quarterly taxes plus a quarterly estimated personal income tax payment.

When this time of the quarter comes around--inevitably we [my wife and I] have a few bucks in the bank, and I do mean a few--then socko, the government wants their share and Bob Bullock wants his share for the Lone Star State and we're back to eating bologna instead of roast and dried cereal instead of bacon and eggs. It happens every quarter.

This quarter was no exception, but something unusual happened. The very day that my wife gave me the bad news on the amount of money that we owed, the very day, as I was running here, there and yonder--collecting past due accounts, withdrawing savings and trying to scrape up the darn tax money, I bumped into a long tall welfare recipient.

I'm going nuts and here he comes sauntering down the street without a care in the world. I'm in one of those situations where you're almost forced to speak--I'm one foot from this guy, dressed in high heel shoes, bright colored balloon sleeved shirt and Italian cut pants--that look like they haven't been washed in six months--but he's cool. He's got the world all figured out.

I'm working my fool head off for this turkey--and at 2:00 in the afternoon he's taking a tour of the town. I nod as we pass and he says, "Hey, what's going on man?". I should have told him what was going on. I should have preached him a tax sermon. I should have asked him why he wasn't working. I could see that he wasn't blind, he didn't appear disabled, so, how come he's not working. I don't mind paying hospital taxes or school taxes. I don't mind paying taxes to help the blind, elderly or disabled--but it burns me to pay taxes knowing that this guy and others like him are laughing up their sleeve because they're beating the system.

I'm going without sleep, taking time away from the kids, trying to hustle an honest buck at night and this guy is asking me--what's going on. I should have told him.

The Idalou Beacon recently ran the following in their paper. It was copied from the Ruidoso News. It's about taxes--thought you'd enjoy reading it.

So without further ado, enjoy the comments of this unsung tax critic:

"I think I'm in big trouble.

"I was going through my pockets today and I found something I can't explain.

"A dollar. A whole dollar!

"I've paid my income tax and my state tax; I've paid amusement tax, sales tax, hospital tax. I've paid taxes for Medicare and old age benefits. I've paid the liquor tax, the cigarette tax, the automobile tax, the school tax and the tax to put up a bridge at the other end of the county.

"When I paid my lawyer 600 bucks, I paid tax on that and so does he. I pay tax on the money I give the baby sitter and the real estate salesman and the man who makes out my income tax form each year.

"So, how come I've still got a dollar? Obviously, I've made a mistake somewhere and overlooked a tax.

"But, I distinctly remember paying my road tax, the excise tax, and the tax to provide more scholarships for kids to go to the university so they can tell me how rotten the system is. I've paid my taxes for sewers, bombs, wheat for India, the Senate, public transportation, and yes, my water tax. And when they charge us an air tax to clean up pollution, I'll pay that, too. I confess I haven't paid my death taxes yet--but I will.


"I've paid my taxes for parks, fire protection, law enforcement--

"I'm not sure, but I know the government is going to be sore when they find out I've got it."




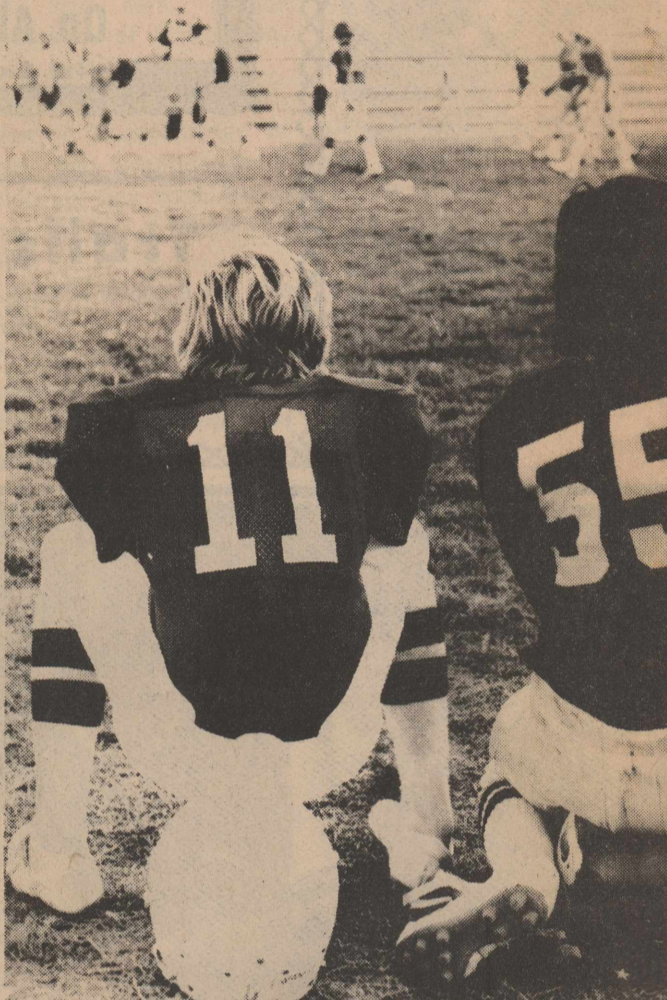

Letter Confuses Tax Payers

The blanket mailing of form letters to all Fisher County taxpayers last week has caused some misunderstandings with respect to people appearing before the equalization board, advised Dave Posey, County Hospital re-evaluation team.

In the second paragraph of the letter, readers were notified "to be and appear before said Board of Equalization at 10:00 a.m. on September 2, 1978, at the Court House in the town of Roby, Fisher County, Texas, at which time and place said board will then consider any evidence you may submit as to the value of said property for taxable purposes."

Raford Hargrove, a member of the re-evaluation team, indicated last Tuesday that interested residents desiring to know what their taxes will be can call the Fisher County Tax Assessor-Collector, Robert Buck, at 776-2181.

Contrary to what the letter implies, residents are not required to be present for the meeting. Those interested in attempting to get their taxes lowered because of an error or what they feel is an injustice can, at the meeting, present supporting evidence to the board of equalization.

Those that do not appear are in essence saying that they do not object to the proposed increase and are willing to pay the amount of tax as computed through the re-evaluation process.

"In some cases the tax on homes and ranch land went down", said Hargrove. "Although the average increase amounts to a tax increase of 2.67 times--that doesn't mean that each person will receive an increase of over 2 1/2 times", said Hargrove.

Dave Posey estimated that he expected the September 21 meeting to last approximately a week. "It will probably take that

long to show people what changes have been made" said Posey.

Fisher County is using the new values as established by the re-evaluation

team. The county will be computing the tax on the basis of 20 percent of the assessed value while the hospital board is using the 22 percent figure.

The equalization meeting will take place in the district courtroom. The commissioners will sit as the equalization board.

T.E.C. Rules On Diamond Case

The Texas Aeronautics Commission has returned their findings in the case of a complaint by Gary Diamond, aerial applicator, whereby he claimed that Fisher County has discriminated against him in the use of the Fisher County Airport.

The hearing, where each side was given the opportunity to present

supporting evidence concerning the charges, took place in Roby on June 21, 1978.

Sam A. Lindsay, examiner with the Texas Aeronautics Commission, issued the following conclusions. "That in respect to the use of the Fisher County Airport for aerial application, the County of Fishr has not violated any

provision of the grant agreements". His second conclusion was "That in respect to the sale of gasoline at the Fisher County Airport, the County of Fisher has violated the provision of the grant agreements which require that the airport be available to the public for all types of aviation activity."

Swaffars Buy Roby Drug Store

She worked for the Sun Drug chain in Selienople, Pa. and served as manager of a pharmacy in Cleveland, Ohio before the couple purchased Noles Drug.

Dan Swaffar spent four years in the Air Force as a pilot and has been in computer management for the past ten years. He has worked in Cleveland, Chicago, New York and Seattle. Dan will have charge of the management of Noles Drug and will be taking care of ordering, accounting and bookkeeping.

"My wife and I are open for any type of suggestion from our customers concerning the operation of the store. We plan to get rid of some of the obsolete

merchandise currently in stock and replace it with new lines of merchandise. We would like to also point out that we plan to continue to allow monthly charge accounts at the store", said Swaffar.

Diane Swaffar has been looking for her own store for several years. When she read that the local pharmacy was for sale in the Pharmacy Journal, she made arrangements to visit Roby; the visit took place about two weeks ago.

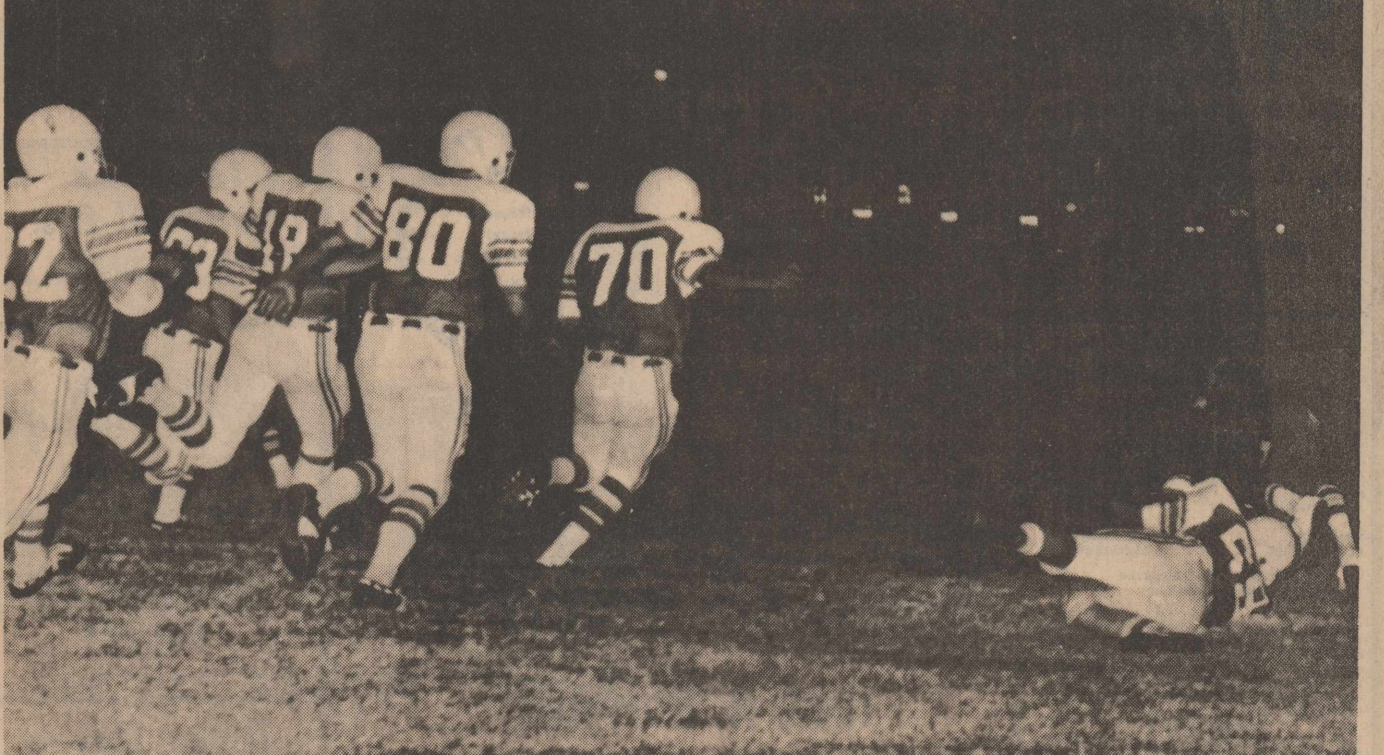
Noles Drug will now open at 8:00 a.m. each

THE NEW PRINCIPLE

Jesus said, "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me." (Matthew 25:40) These words of Jesus in Matthew 25:31-46 were revolutionary in His day and if heard clearly today their power is still overwhelming. The Jews expected to be judged on two standards. First, had he or had he not kept the law? If he had carried out the regulations of the law and had kept the Ten Commandments he felt completely safe. Second, he expected special treatment because he was Jew. He was sure that God would judge the other nations with one standard and the Jews with another, and that a man, just because he was a Jew, would be to all intents and purposes exempt from the judgment all together. To these self-righteous and comfortable people Jesus gave a new principle of judgment, that everything depended on our reaction to the needs of others.

This parable is packed with truth for life and living. You may wish to read that parable in order to follow the lesson better. Notice that Jesus said judgment will be pronounced by a new standard, "as you did... to these, you did it to me." We will be judged by how well we react to the needs of others. But also notice that in every case given in the parable the help given is in simple things. So often we ask ourselves, "What can I do for others?" and because we cannot give thousands of dollars, or build a great hospital or change social conditions, we decide that we can do nothing. But the main point of this parable lies in the fact that in every case quoted the help given is the kind of help that anyone can give. It does not require skill, fortune, or fame. While Jesus gives a great and powerful standard for the coming Judgment, He does not place the standard beyond the reach of anyone. What are you doing to help others?

God is calling His people to do the simple things in life that will tell more of His love than any gift of money or great skill. He calls us to tell the Gospel as we visit the sick, lonely, imprisoned, and lost. Why do nothing for God? He wants you to do the simple things in life. How do you stand under this principle? Amen.

We finally got the that tough test I was looking for and Bryson beat us 15-0. However, a 15-0 six man football game is still a very good game. We were haunted by 5 interceptions one of which set up Bryson's first touchdown on the 20 yard line. Another Bryson TD came on a turnover and set them up again, so obviously we played tough defense once again. No points were scored for either side in the whole second half. Bryson was very quick and ran a down-the-line option that was very tough. Once we crushed their offense they could not move the ball. We physically bruised them, injuring 3 or 4 of their players that will not be able to play this coming week. We have a physically tough defensive team, but we are hurting for offensive quickness and speed and we now lack the good passing attack that we had which opens up the opposing defense and allows our running game to work.

However, when we got back at 2:00 Saturday morning I took one of our new players in the gym and, now we have our passing game back. Our boys talked Pafirrio Molano and Raymond Cantu (two basketball players; into coming out for the team and Pafirrio can

throw the ball, so look out Hobbs is coming back.

Blocking has become a very weak spot on our team and I am still looking for another running back that really wants to play football and carry the ball tough, along with Wayne Jones who is doing a great job running the ball. We need an even backfield with two good runners and this week Walter Cave may get a chance to see if he is tough enough to run the ball.

The 3 1/2 hour trip to Bryson weakened our team, but I was very pleased to see us "keep on playing" to the end. We ran out of time at halftime on the one inch line with Walter Cave catching a pass from Jeff Anderle but once again the breaks were against us. We had a total offense of around 400 yards but we could not score, which is the mark of a good offense. Three times our fastest man got behind the Bryson secondary, caught the pass, and was still caught from behind. Bryson had great speed and we need to just simply use the speed we have.

punter trapped behind the goal line with the ball bounding around and we let him get away, throw a pass, and make the first down which was 35 yards away. Clipping penalties cost us good field position and simple pass patterns which were wide open, turned into big interceptions for Bryson. All of this is to say that we just were not ready to play football, and we beat ourselves.

However, looking on the good side of it, we stopped a very good football team from scoring in the second

half and when we get our offense going we will be able to score. If we can hold our opponents to 15 points, we can win football games.

Wayne Jones played a great football game at running back and at linebacker, too. David Etheredge did a great job of tackling and really helped out on our total defensive scheme. Bennie Medrano played well at offensive and as well at defensive back. Mike Porter played very good at deep safety and during the middle of the game we moved Jeff Anderle from defensive back to defensive lineman and he did great. Jeff is very tough

and he has found a home as defensive lineman, if he can continue to play tough football.

Two teams have to show up at a football field to make it a football game, and one team must lose that game. There's no disgrace in losing, every team does it before long. No team has ever gone on winning game after game, year after year, without once losing a game. We learn more from a loss than a win, they just don't feel as good. Now we will see how mature our young team is, whether we will be strong and come back or be losers and quit.

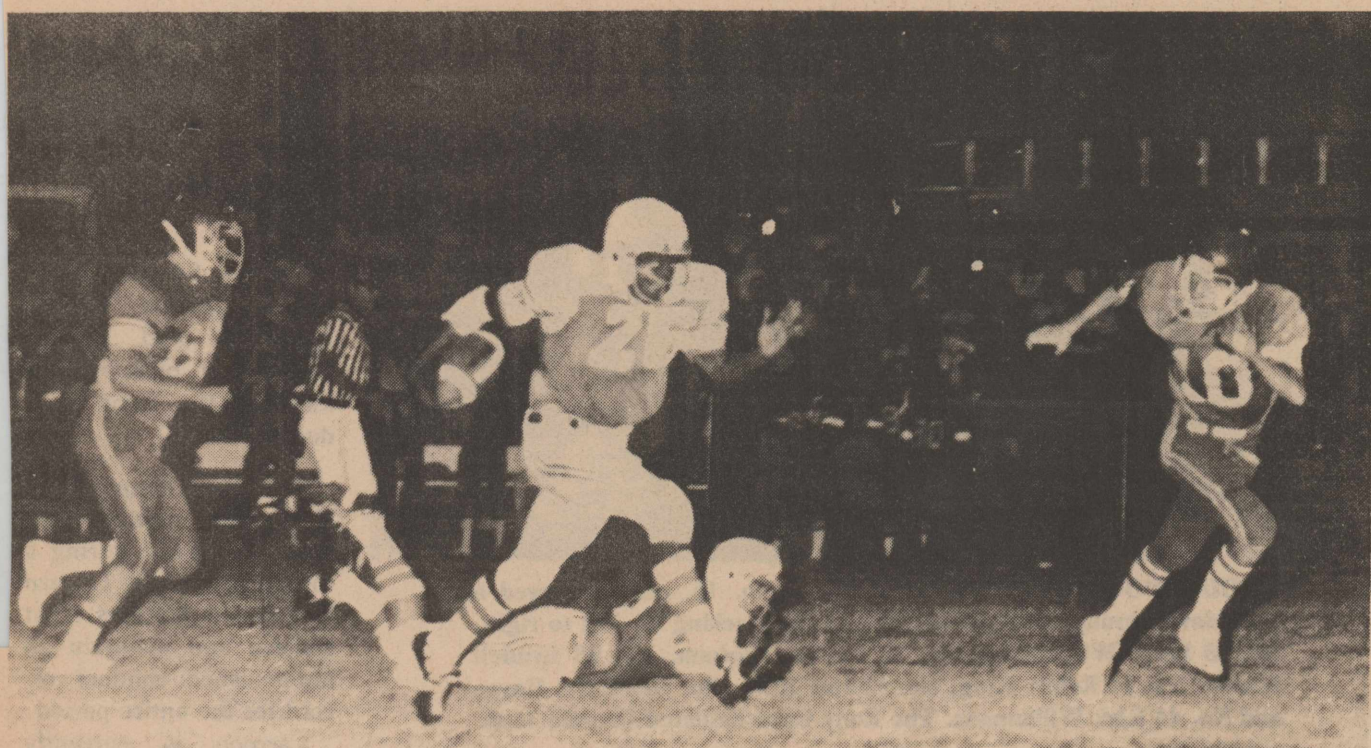
Clarence Moon

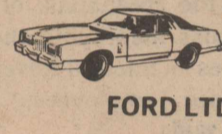

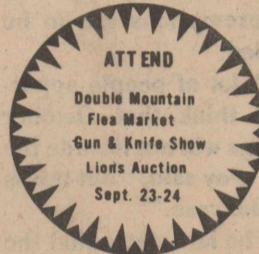

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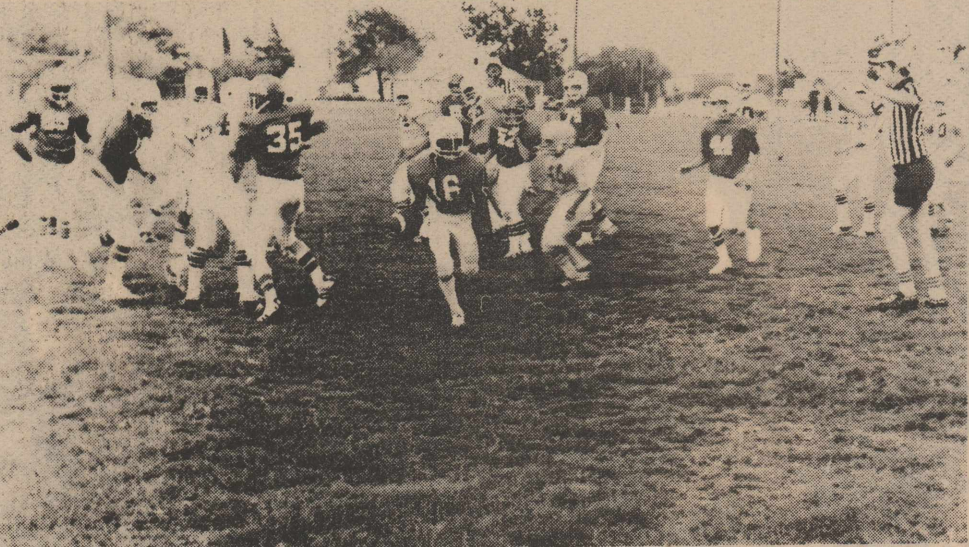

Utility Tax Will Be Dropped

The state's four per cent sales tax on utility bills for residential customers will be dropped after October 1, but an overlap for billing periods beginning during the month of September will cause the tax to appear on all bills received during October and on some received in November.

Fred Foy, supervisor of statistics and state taxes for West Texas Utilities Co., said that instructions issued by the State Comptroller are specific on how the recently approved tax exemptions are to be applied.

"A lot of people apparently think that October billings will not include the tax," Foy said, "but this is not the case."

"The law states that the exemptions shall apply to each regular monthly billing period beginning on or after Oct. 1. This means that if we bill a customer for service from any time prior to Oct. 1, the four per cent sales tax will be applied to the total bill."

Citing an example, Foy said that if the meter is read on Sept. 29, that particular customer will be taxed on the bill he received in October and also on the bill he receives in November, since his November bill is for services from Sept. 30-October 29.

The tax exemption was enacted during the special

session of the Legislature this summer and applies to residential use of electricity and natural gas. Residential use is defined as "a family dwelling, a multi-family apartment, a housing complex, or building or portions of a building occupied as home or residence."

The Legislature provided a local option on the one per cent city sales tax on

utilities, but most of the towns in the West Texas Utilities service area have indicated they will continue the tax. Foy said that so far, Junction is the only WTU town which has announced it would abolish the tax.

"Our company will continue to collect the tax for the cities that wish to keep it," Foy said.

Ask For Credentials

Taxpayers should ask to see the credentials of all persons identifying themselves as Internal Revenue Service employees, the IRS said.

From time to time, individuals have posed as employees of the Internal Revenue Service to collect money for what these imposters refer to as unpaid taxes.

Taxpayers should bear

in mind that every public contact IRS employee carries distinctive identification and is required to produce identification when conducting official business.

If, after seeing an employee's identification, a taxpayer still doubts his or her authenticity, the taxpayer should immediately contact his or her nearest IRS office.

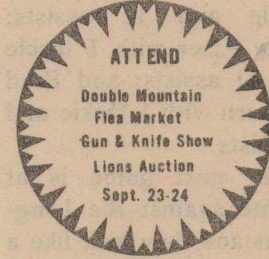

HOME ECONOMICS

Court House Roby

Determine a fabric's right side before cutting and sewing it--for better wear and a nicer look longer. Several "clues" can help "detect" a fabric's right side.

Check the center of the fabric to determine how it was folded on the bolt--because many fabrics are folded with right sides together to protect surfaces. This is particularly true of cottons, wools, linens, and other fabrics made of natural fibers.

Locate pin holes along the edge of a fabric--the pin holes will feel rough on the fabric's right side.

Most fabrics have these holes made by pins that held the fabric on frames for an application of finish during the final stages of preparation.

On most twill-weave fabrics, find the "right hand" twill to determine the fabric's right side. If the fabric is a twill weave, such as gabardine or flannel, the twill will almost always be a "right hand" twill on the right

side of the fabric. This means the usual appearance of diagonal lines formed by the twill weave will extend from lower left to upper right across the fabric from selvage to selvage. A few fabrics have a "left-hand" twill, particularly denim, but since the right and wrong sides are different colors,

this does not cause a problem.

On tricot knit fabrics, it is simple to find the right side--the cut edge will always roll to the right side if stretched slightly.

Single knits, except rib knits and some novelty fabrics, also roll to the right side along the cut edge.

I was really impressed with the effort and desire of the Eagles. Despite being down throughout the game they kept fighting back. They moved

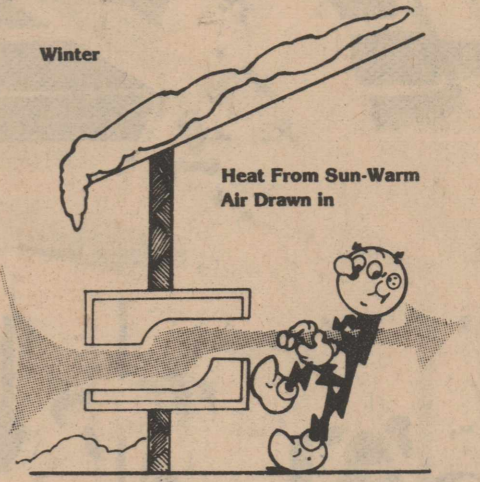

The Eagles will be working real hard on techniques and blocking assignments and will be a much improved team this week.

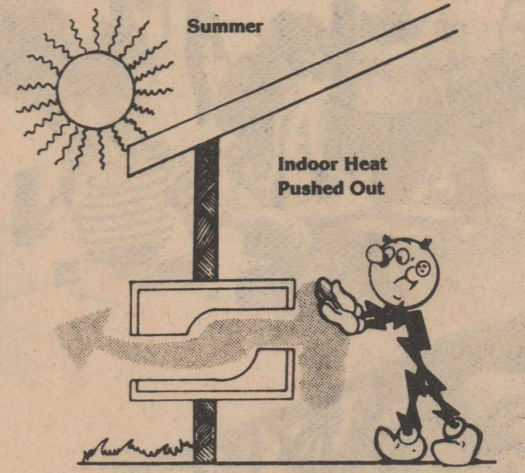

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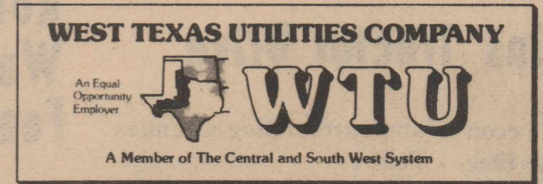

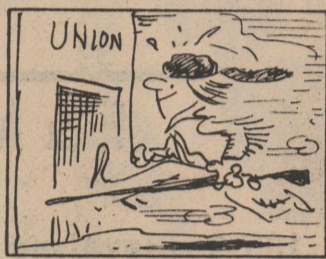

provision of the grant agreements". His second conclusion was "That in respect to the sale of gasoline at the Fisher County Airport, the County of Fisher has violated the provision of the grant agreements which require that the airport be available to the public for all types of aviation activity."

these self-righteous and common new principle of judgment, that everything depended on our reaction to the needs of others.

This parable is packed with truth for life and living. You may wish to read that parable in order to follow the lesson better. Notice that Jesus said judgment will be pronounced by a new standard, "as you did... to these, you did it to me." We will be judged by how well we react to the needs of others. But also notice that in every case given in the parable the help given is in simple things. So often we ask ourselves, "What can I do for others?" and because we cannot give thousands of dollars, or build a great hospital or change social conditions, we decide that we can do nothing. But the main point of this parable lies in the fact that in every case quoted the help given is the kind of help that anyone can give. It does not require skill, fortune, or fame. While Jesus gives a great and powerful standard for the coming Judgment, He does not place the standard beyond the reach of anyone. What are you doing to help others?

God is calling His people to do the simple things in life that will tell more of His love than any gift of money or great skill. He calls us to tell the Gospel as we visit the sick, lonely, imprisoned, and lost. Why do nothing for God? He wants you to do the simple things in life. How do you stand under this principle? Amen.

UN RESUMEN DE LAS ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCION ELECCION GENERAL 7 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1978

LA ENMIENDA PARA ALIVIO DE IMPUESTOS (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas permitiendo a la legislatura que exente propiedad personal intangible; requiriendo que la legislatura exente ciertos artículos caseros y efectos particulares; y permitiendo a la legislatura que exente todo o parte de la propiedad personal del hogar seguro, de la imposición de impuestos estatales y locales sobre propiedad.

La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga la imposición de impuestos sobre tierras agrícolas y rancheras basada en su capacidad productiva en vez de su valor de mercado y permite a la legislatura que disponga la imposición de impuestos a bosques de madera basada en su capacidad productiva.

La enmienda permite a los gobiernos locales que extiendan la exención actual de no menos de \$3,000 del hogar seguro residencial para personas de 65 años o más de edad para incluir ciertas personas incapacitadas.

La enmienda concede una exención de \$5,000 en el valor de mercado del hogar seguro residencial en los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre propiedad. Autoriza a la legislatura que conceda una exención adicional de los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre propiedad de una cantidad que no exceda \$10,000 del valor de mercado de hogares seguros residenciales de personas 65 años o más de edad y ciertas personas incapacitadas. Si la persona de 65 años o más de edad es elegible para esta exención la cantidad total de los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre el hogar seguro de aquella persona no puede incrementarse.

La enmienda previene que gobiernos locales incrementen los impuestos sobre propiedad a menos que el cuerpo administrativo provea aviso público y lleve a cabo una audiencia pública. La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga por ley que cada propietario reciba aviso de la revaluación de su propiedad y la cantidad de incremento en sus impuestos.

La enmienda limita las apropiaciones de los ingresos de impuestos estatales en una cantidad que no exceda la tasa de crecimiento económico estatal que se anticipa, con la legislatura autorizada para conceder exenciones de emergencia. La enmienda prohíbe la valuación de propiedad inmueble a través del estado para los fines de impuestos sobre propiedad. Se requiere que la ejecución de

normas y procedimientos uniformes para la valuación de propiedad con el propósito de impuestos sobre propiedad, se origine con la autoridad que impone los impuestos sobre propiedad.

NO. 1 (S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas para eliminar la referencia arcaica al "Instituto de Sordos y Mudos." La enmienda permitiría al estado de Texas que compre productos y servicios de individuos incapacitados en facilidades de rehabilitación no lucrativas sin cumplir con los requisitos de oferta que se aplican a otros contratos estatales. La enmienda también eliminaría la formalidad de la aprobación de ciertos contratos estatales por el Gobernador, el Secretario de Estado, y el Contralor de Cuentas Públicas.

"La enmienda constitucional eliminando la referencia arcaica al "Instituto de Sordos y Mudos," permitiendo que ciertos productos y servicios de personas incapacitadas sean usados por agencias y departamentos del gobierno del estado, requiriendo que otros productos y servicios requeridos en la operación del gobierno del estado sean obtenidos por ofertas concedidas al postor responsable que ofrezca el precio más bajo, haciendo que todos los procesos de procuración sean sujetos a las leyes establecidas por la legislatura y eliminando el requisito que el Gobernador de Texas, el Secretario de Estado, y el Contralor de Cuentas Públicas de Texas participen personalmente en tales negociaciones."

NO. 2 (S.J.R. 55)

S.J.R. 55 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas para permitir que gobiernos locales emi-

tan bonos para la reconstrucción o adquisición de facilidades (terrenos, equipos y mejoras) con la intención de desarrollar oportunidades de empleo. Estos bonos se pagarán solamente de los ingresos de la venta o arriendo de éstas facilidades. Gobierno local debe determinar que la construcción o adquisición de tales facilidades es necesaria para desarrollar oportunidades de empleo.

"La enmienda constitucional para disponer que la legislatura puede permitir que las subdivisiones políticas emitan bonos de ingresos, para desarrollar oportunidades de empleo para sus ciudadanos."

NO. 3 (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas que permitiría que la legislatura autorice a ciudades y pueblos la emisión de bonos de impuestos incrementados para financiar el desarrollo de áreas deterioradas. Solamente se pagarán los bonos de los ingresos de los incrementos en impuestos municipales. No pagos se pueden hacer de los ingresos de impuestos municipales, servicios públicos u otros servicios.

NO. 4 (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas para permitir que la legislatura exente de la imposición de impuestos, aparatos para energía o de viento.

"La enmienda constitucional autorizando a la legislatura para exentar de impuestos aparatos de energía solar o de viento."

NO. 5 (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas para conceder competencia exclusiva a jueces de paz en causas civiles cuando la cantidad en controversia no excede \$200, a menos que la legislatura conceda competencia exclusiva a otra corte. La enmienda concede a jueces de paz competencia concurrente con cortes de condado cuando la cantidad en controversia sea entre \$200 y \$500, a menos que la legislatura conceda a la corte de condado competencia exclusiva.

La enmienda también concede a jueces de paz

competencia concurrente con ambas cortes, cortes de condado, y cortes de distrito, cuando la cantidad en controversia sea entre \$500 y \$1,000, a menos que la legislatura conceda a la corte de condado o distrito competencia exclusiva.

La terminología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue:

"La enmienda constitucional para extender la competencia de los jueces de paz en causas civiles."

NO. 6 (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas para permitir que la legislatura aumente el número de jueces en cualquier corte de apelaciones civiles. Al presente, cortes de apelaciones civiles están limitadas a un juez presidente y dos jueces asociados. NO. 7 (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas eliminando la Comisión de Edificios del Estado y el Fondo de Edificios del Estado. La autoridad de la Comisión de Edificios del Estado ha sido trasladada por ley a la Junta de Control del Estado.

"La enmienda constitucional autorizando que ciertos distritos participen en actividades contra incendios y emitan bonos o de otra manera presten crédito para tales propósitos."

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

"The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 propone una enmienda a la Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

authority where the property tax is imposed.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment deleting the archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum," allowing certain products and services of handicapped individuals to be used by agencies and departments of state government, requiring the procurement of other products and services required in the operation of state government to be made under bids awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, making all such procurement processes subject to laws enacted by the legislature, and eliminating the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas be personally involved with such transactions."

NUMBER TWO (S.J.R. 55)

S.J.R. 55 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit local governments to issue bonds for the reconstruction or acquisition of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) designed to develop employment opportunities. These

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bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds to develop employment opportunities for its citizens."

NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."

NUMBER FOUR (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices."

NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.

The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction.

The amendment also grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction

tion with both county and district courts where the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$1,000, except where the legislature gives the county or district court exclusive jurisdiction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment also would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."

NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)

H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or other indebtedness or otherwise lend its credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit to support such activities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendments authorizing certain districts to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit for fire-fighting purposes."

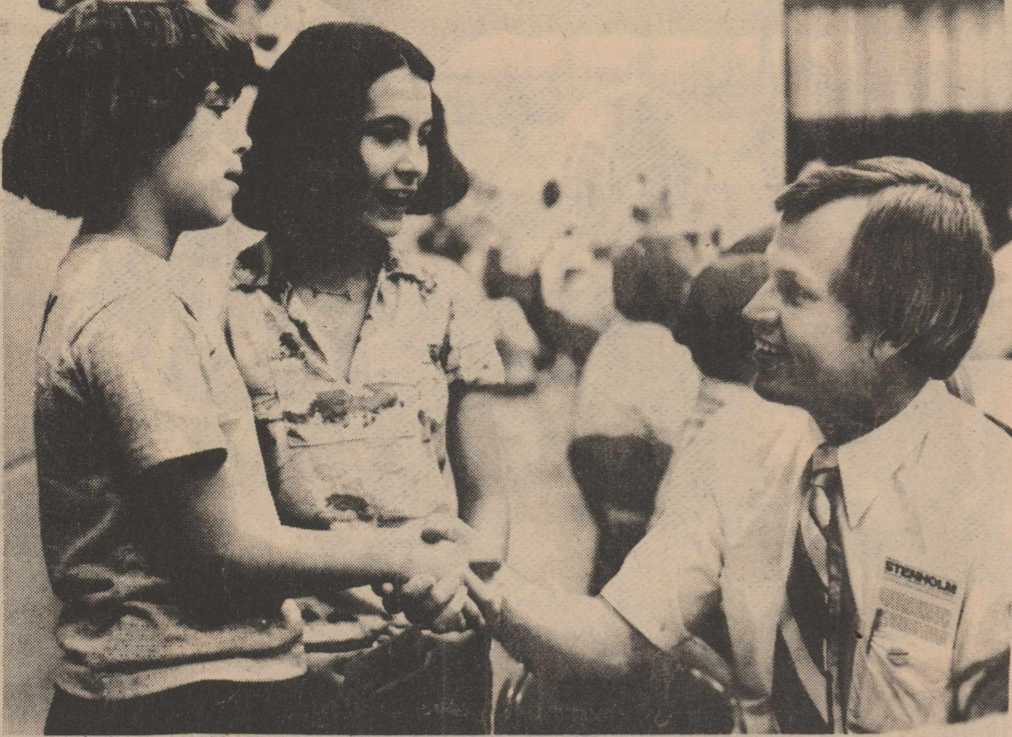

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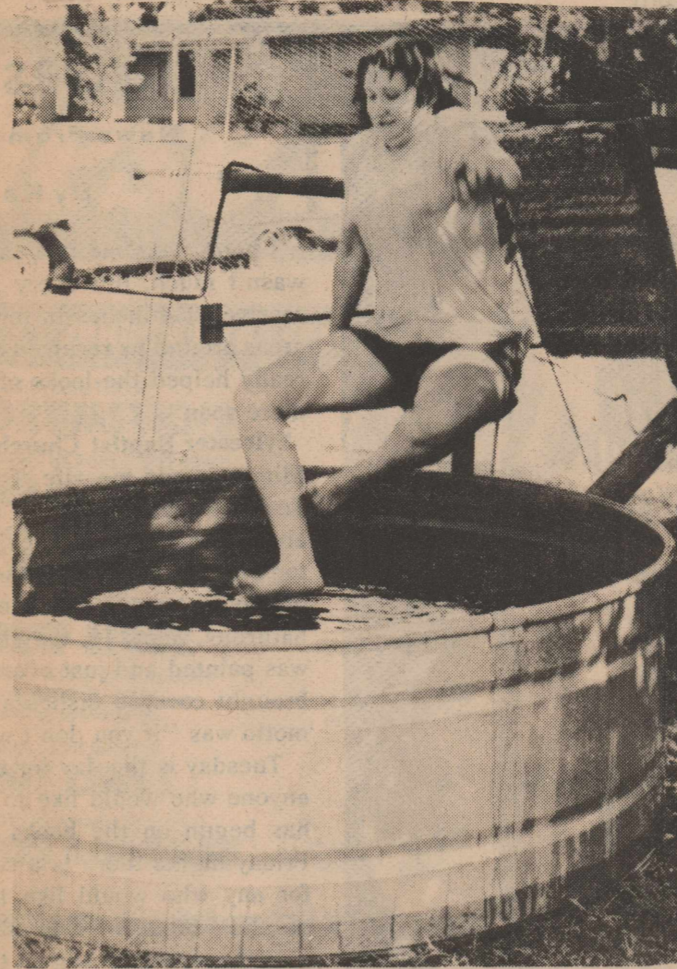
Tech Offers Grad Level At W.T.C.

Cattlemen's Roundup Needs Cattle, Cash

Cattle drives from all over the Southwest in years past had Abilene, Kansas as their destination. Each fall since 1960, Southwest stockmen have also rounded up cattle to go to Abilene--but in this instance, Abilene, Texas.

The 19th annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children is in full swing with proceeds benefitting the handicapped of the Southwest through the West Texas Rehabilitation Center and its campuses in San Angelo, Abilene and Snyder.

This unique fund-raising event for this private non-profit treatment and diagnostic complex each year provides the necessary monies to operate a diverse program of services to the handicapped regardless of age, race, creed, color, place of residence or ability to pay.

Shelley V. Smith, executive director of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center said, "At this point we have received pledges for 70 head of cattle for our September 25th sale at Abilene Auction." Smith added: "In order to offset our operational deficit of \$225,000, we are going to need about 400 head of cattle this year, so we're hoping that the pledges will pick up quickly as September 25th approaches".

Smith went on to say, "As we must arrange to pick up many of the donated cattle from a wide area, we need to have the pledges as quickly as possible." Pickups, trailers, and trucks will be roaming the roads and highways of the entire state with their loads of livestock that will ultimately turn into rehabilitation for the handicapped of the Southwest. Pickups have already headed for the tip of Texas near Raymondville to pick up the famous King Ranch cattle and others from the southern portion of the valley.

Last year's Cattlemen's Round-Up raised \$153,000 to help operate the Center. This year's operational budget for WTRC's three campuses is \$1.8 million to serve more than 6,000 handicapped individuals.

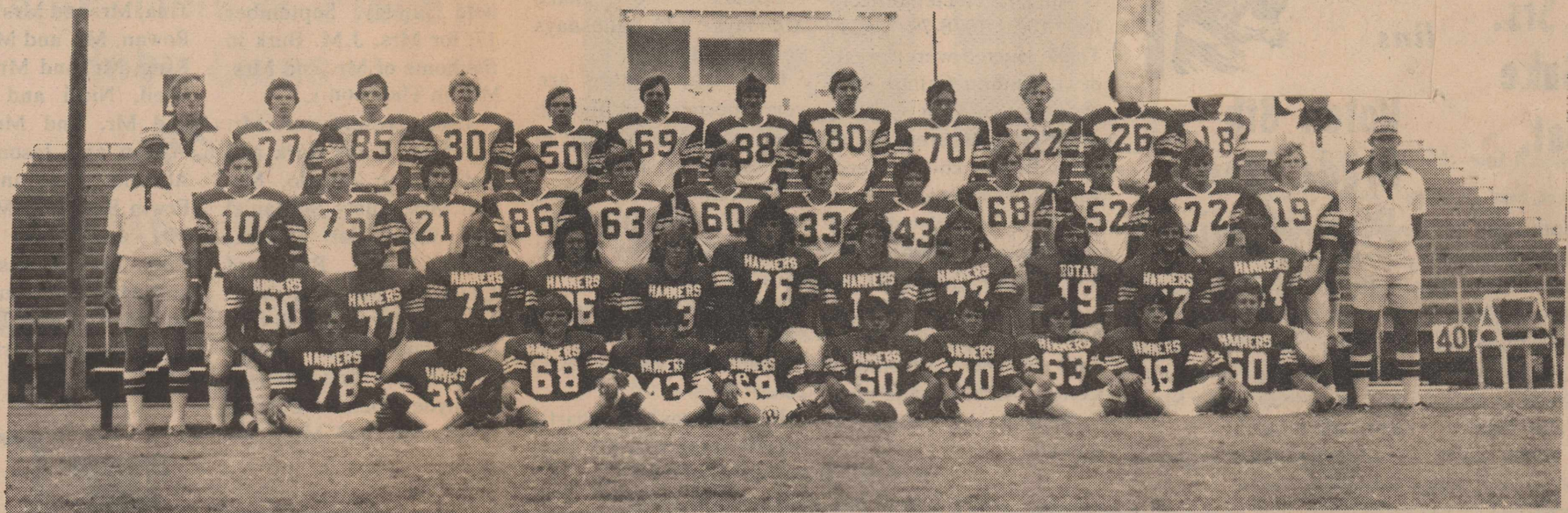

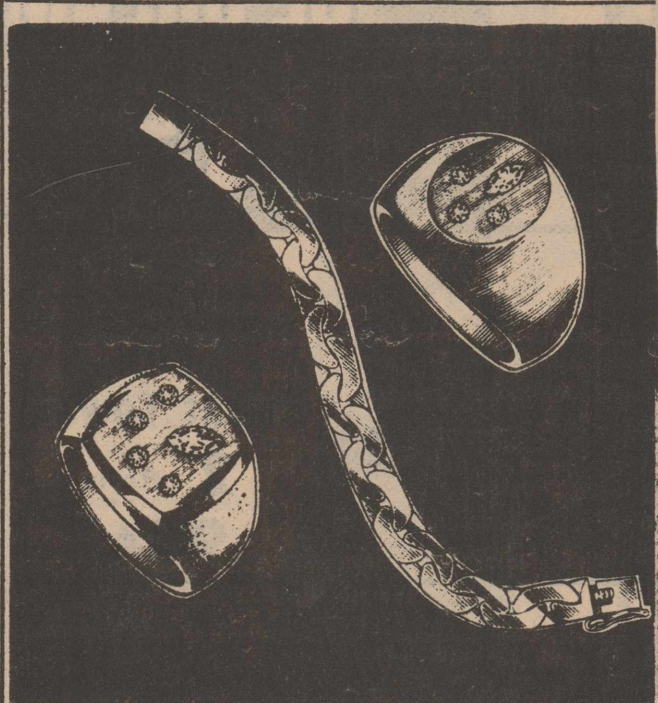

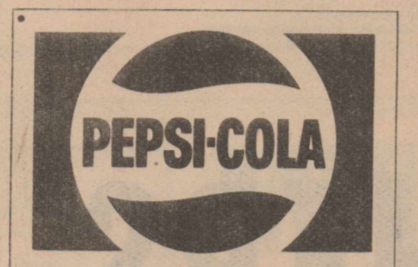
