

## Roby Lions To Help Build Baseball Field

The Roby Lions Club is underwriting the purchase of a block of land on the east side of Roby for the development of a baseball park.

For a long while Roby boys and girls have had no baseball field and have had to go elsewhere to play ball. This has made it difficult or impossible for some to be a part of organized baseball. Even those who just like to get together occasionally for a little less competitive game have had no place to play. It is the aim of the Roby Lions Club to see that such a place is provided.

While the full development of the project may not be completed for a year or so, plans are for the park to be sufficiently developed to being using next spring.

Other service clubs and

interested individuals will be called upon to assist in this community development program. Any financial support would be appreciated and would help expedite the building of facilities. The grounds need to be cleared and leveled, fences built and so many other things that call for a labor force. The Lions can use a lot of help.

The aim is to coordinate the playing schedule so that little league, girl's softball, men's and women's slow pitch softball and also those who are not a part of organized ball may all be able to use the facilities. The Lions want it to be available to as broad a spectrum of the community as possible and call upon as many as can to help provide it.

Ah, here's a scribbled note written on a plain white piece of paper, can't believe it. Says, mention S&L Texaco's new addition to their building. Ok.

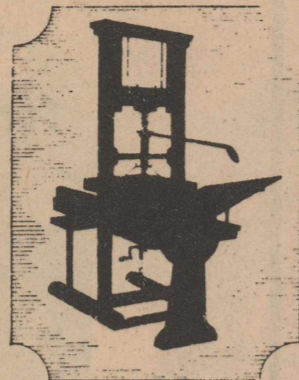

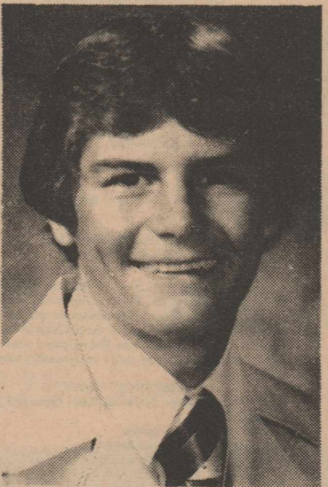

### National Gypsum Votes Second Yearly Dividend

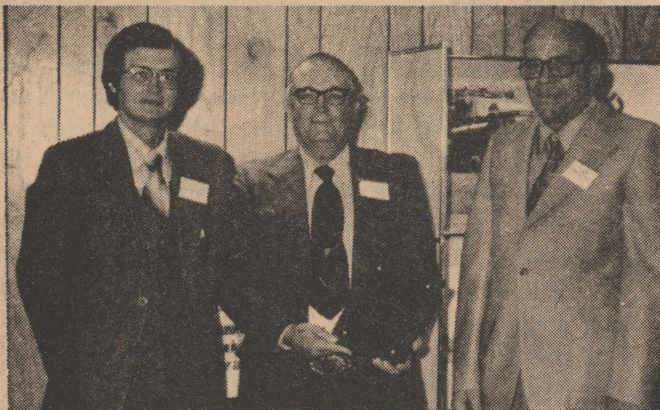
## C. D. (Monk) Herron Receives An Award

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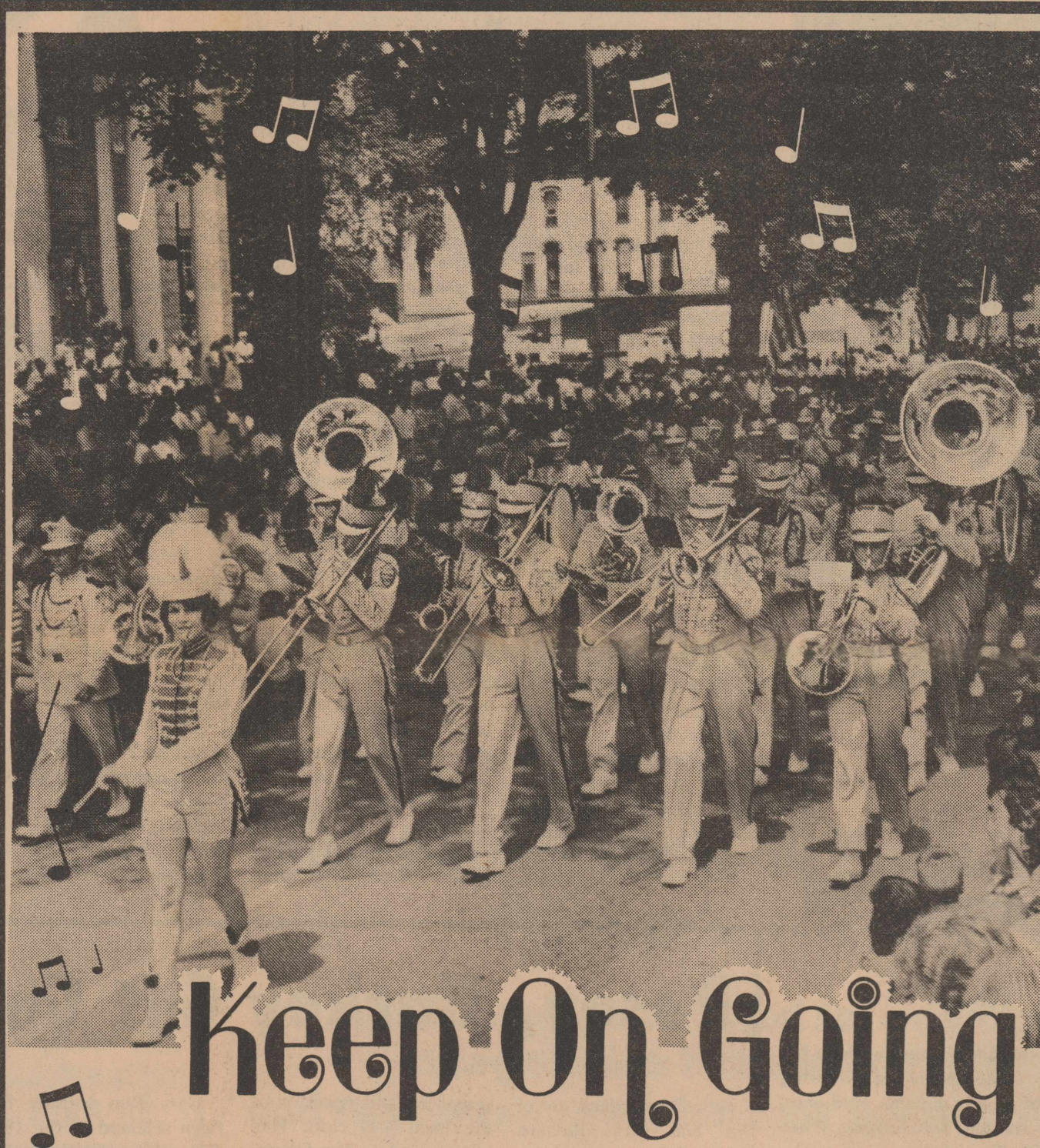
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# Keep On Going

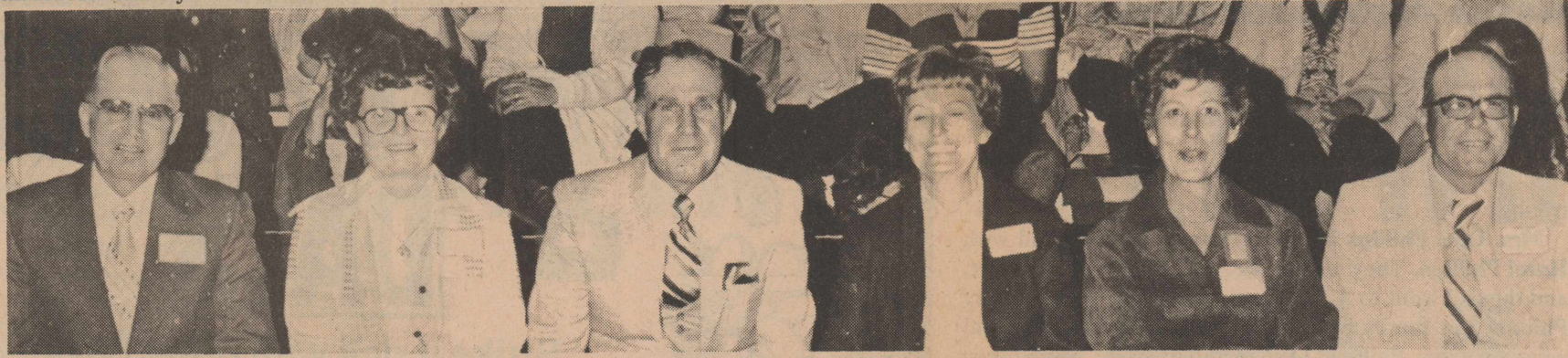

HOME ECONOMICS

Court House Roby

This week we will continue our discussion of saving energy in the kitchen. However, this week we will discuss energy saving in cooling. Of course this deals with the refrigerator and freezer.

1. Put a note up on the refrigerator reminding the family members to think about what they want from inside before opening the door, and to take out what they want in as few trips as possible. Loitering in front of an open refrigerator door and frequent door openings waste energy by allowing cold air to escape.

2. Make sure the refrigerator door gasket has a good seal. You can check this by placing a piece of paper between the door gasket and the cabinet. If the paper can be pulled out easily without any resistance, the seal needs replacing. If

your gasket does not seal properly it will let cold air out-the refrigerator will have to work harder to maintain the proper temperature.

3. Keep your freezer and freezer section of the refrigerator well stocked. Less electricity is used to maintain temperature when the freezer is full.

4. Don't put steaming

hot food into your refrigerator. And try to allow time to defrost meats before cooking.

5. If you have a manual defrost refrigerator, be sure to defrost before the frost builds up to one-quarter of an inch; too much frost will interfere with the cooling operation and place a strain on the motor.

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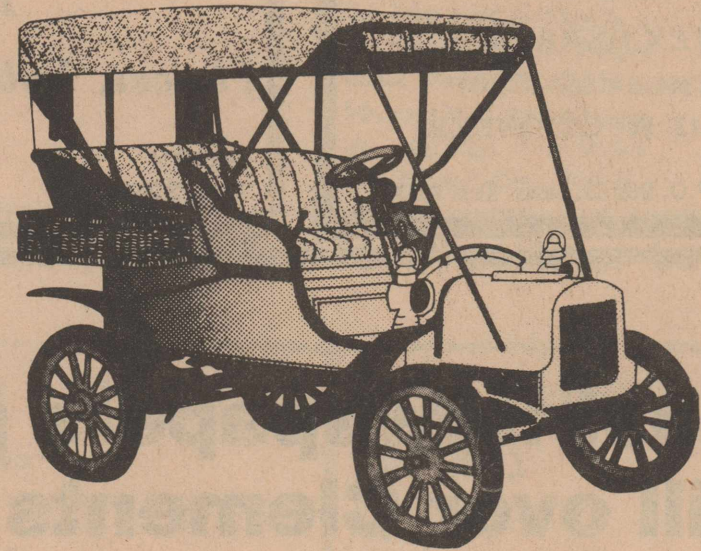
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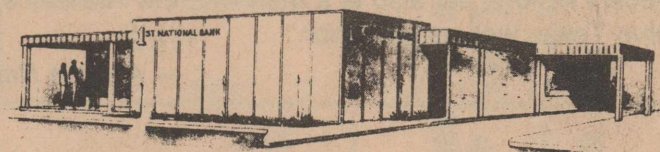


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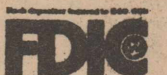


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## Hustlin' Round Hobbs

It is one of the six key nutrients necessary for good health in humans, without the protein our bodies cannot take care of our muscles, red blood, white blood, nerves, skin and bone cells, and lack of it can cause edema or dropsy, low resistance to disease, slow healing of wounds, tendency to age early, slow thinking, poor tissue development and repairs." Meats, eggs, milk products, peanut butter, dried beans and peas are good sources of protein. With green and yellow fresh or cooked vegetables, tomatoes, citrus fruits and cereal daily one can have nutritious meals and better health, according to the program.

## County Benefits High

Social Security benefits were being paid to residents of Fisher County at the rate of \$252,265 a month at the start of 1978, Glyn Hammons social security manager in Abilene said today.

Social security benefits can be paid to retired persons age 62 and over, to workers who become severely disabled before age 65, and to survivors of deceased workers.

Monthly social security checks are also paid to certain dependents of a worker who has retired, become disabled or died.

Of the 1,394 social

security beneficiaries living in Fisher County, 718 are retired workers and 67 are disabled workers. Another 231 persons are receiving benefits as the wives or husbands of retired or disabled workers. Widows, widowers, and dependent parents of deceased workers number 228.

In Fisher County, 376 people under age 65 and 1,018 people age 65 and older are receiving monthly social security benefits. Of total beneficiaries, 523 are men, 721 are women and 150 are children.

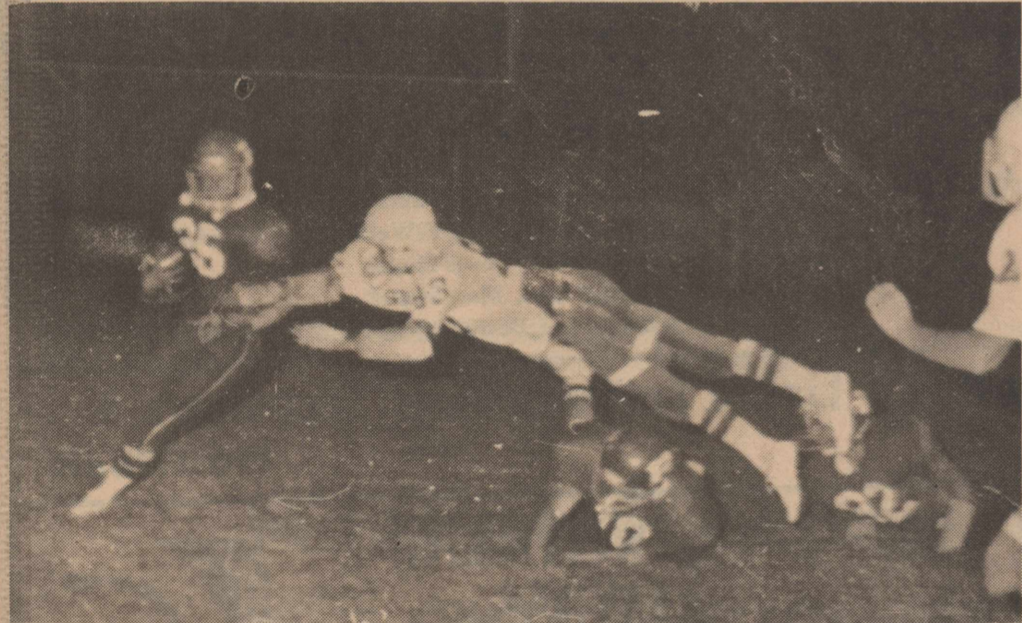

Dear Editor:

I hope you are as concerned as I am over the continuing leftward drift of political developments in our nation.

As each day passes, you and I and your family and the people of Texas are losing personal freedoms we have taken for granted since the founding of our Republic.

The liberals have had so much success that I sometimes wonder if it is fair to continue to ask you to help in our battle against them. Still, if we do not put up the fight, if we do not continue the battle, we can be certain that all will be lost. We can be certain that all will be lost.

I know you have helped in the past because of your love for this country and your belief in the principals of government that set this nation free.

In fact, your concern and involvement have formed one of the three principal reasons that America survives. The other two reasons being the beliefs we share and the grade of Almighty God.

I hope you care enough to help again. The liberal forces, in particular eastern labor bosses, are already at work raising money to defeat John Tower.

He recently organized and led a filibuster against passage of the National Labor Relations Bill, which is an insidious attempt by organized labor to undermine and eventually destroy Texas' right-to-work law and force millions of Texans to join unions against their will.

His opponent Congressman Krueger has worked for and voted for passage of this bill.

This law contains provisions that would allow labor unions to haul small businesses into court time and again and have them fined as organized labor attempts to exert its influence deeper into the Texas labor force.

The bill calls for employers to finance, in part, union organizing drives. The bill would allow the federal government to intervene and dictate wage and benefit increases in disputes between Texas businessmen and labor unions.

The bill would also be

away a Texas businessman's right to due process and his right to appeal NLRB board decisions in the federal courts.

Employers, especially those in smaller establishments, will find it difficult to resist compulsory unionism demands when the alternative may be costly litigation or harsh financial penalties.

Employees will find it more often the case of joining a union or losing a job. Texas consumers will foot the bill in the marketplace.

This bill is not dead. Organized labor intends to bring it up next year if they can elect enough pro-labor Senators like Bob Krueger.

Tower has also been selected for defeat by radical leftwing pressure groups like the Americans for Democratic Action who attempt to control America's foreign policy.

He is in disfavor with these organizations not only because of his views but because he serves as the ranking Republican on the Armed Services Committee which is the principal oversight committee for our intelligence agencies.

It is also the committee where he has thwarted time and again, liberal efforts to cut defense spending, stop development of vital weapons systems and approve treaties that would weaken this country's defenses.

I believe that people like yourself who have enough awareness of what is going on in the world today oppose the dangerous changes that these radical left-wing groups and supporters are proposing.

Tower will continue to oppose the liberal defense advisors in this Administration who were responsible for passing the disastrous Panama Canal Treaty and who have set upon a naive course which I believe could seriously weaken our national defense. Once again his opponent Bob Krueger voted for Panama Canal treaty legislation while he was a member of the U.S. House.

This Administration has censored generals for warning the American people--that Russia is on the brink of a scientific breakthrough that could neutralize our missile de-

fense system--that the Communists have the capability to overrun Europe in 36 hours, and a reduction in troop strength there is playing with the future of this country--that this Administration's decision to reduce our troop strength in Korea in the face of North Korea's military buildup could seriously endanger peace in that area of the world.

At the same time we have heard incredible proposals about increasing trade and diplomatic relations with Communist Cuba and we have seen the liberal members of America's delegation to the United Nations praised for their performance, which has included publicity supporting Castro's goons and thugs by calling them a stabilizing influence in Africa.

A few months ago these liberals pushed for the appointment of Ted Sorensen as the Director of the CIA. The appointment of a conscientious objector to one of the most sensitive national security jobs in our government was totally unacceptable to many Democrats who joined in stopping this nomination.

However, these liberal forces were successful in getting Paul Warnke to head up the SALT talks. Warnke was McGovern's defense advisor during the 1972 presidential race and his first acts as head of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency included the disbanding of a department that monitors Soviet compliance with our treaties and the reassignment of conservatives on the staff to non-policy making positions.

This is not time for America to gamble in any way with the security of your home and family. If the SALT treaty calls for America to cut back on our arms development in the hopes that the Russians will follow suit, we will have no choice but to oppose it.

I believe, and I hope you do, that we must offset Soviet military and political aggression wherever we find them.

Although the Communists have appeared to be willing to negotiate at SALT, let us never forget that they do not permit people to worship the God of their choice in freedom nor have they renounced

their goal of total world domination.

Tower opponents will be working "hand in glove" with big labor and leftwing pressure groups to raise substantial national funds to defeat him. They have proved in the past just how effective they can be by defeating numerous conservatives throughout the country like Bill Buckley, Bill Brock and Bob Taft.
