

HOME ECONOMICS


This week we will continue our discussion of saving energy in the kitchen. However, this week we will discuss energy saving in cooling. Of course this deals with the refrigerator and freezer.

1. Put a note up on the refrigerator reminding the family members to think about what they want from inside before opening the door, and to take out what they want in as few trips as possible. Loitering in front of an open refrigerator door and frequent door openings waste energy by allowing cold air to escape. 2. Make sure the

refrigerator door gasket has a good seal. You can check this by placing a piece of paper between the door gasket and the cabinet. If the paper can be pulled out easily without any resistance, the seal needs replacing. If

your gasket does not seal properly it will let cold air out--the refrigerator will have to work harder to maintain the proper tem-

perature.
3. Keep your freezer and freezer section of the refrigerator well stocked. Less electricity is used to maintain temperature when the freezer is full.
4. Don't put steaming



5. If you have a manual defrost refrigerator, be sure to defrost before the frost builds up to one-quarter of an inch; too much frost will interfere with the cooling operation and place a strain on the motor.
