

# SUCCESSFUL SALE HIGHLIGHTS STOCK SHOW

The Fisher County Jr. Livestock Show and Premium Sale held January 5 and 6 was a gigantic success. Fifty three market hogs, 51 lambs, 4 heifers, and 47 steers were shown. The weather hurt the number of entries but all animals sold high in the

Premium Sale. Johnny Smith of the Rotan FFA showed the Grand Champion market hog. The Grand Champion was a 242 Crossbred. Johnny is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Smith of Rotan. The Reserve Champion was a 207 pound

Crossbred Gilt owned by Kip Pease, also of Rotan. Kip is a 4-H member and son of Mr. and Mrs. Kim Pease. In the lamb division, LaRhea Smith of the Rotan FFA showed 3 of the 4 Breed Champions. She won the Finewool, Fine-

wool Cross and Southdown divisions. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alton Smith of Rotan. Reggy Spencer won the other breed Champion, the Medium Wool Division, with his 130 pound Suffolk Lamb. Reggy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard

Spencer of Roby and a 4-H member. The Reserve Champion lamb winners were Ricky Spencer, Reserve Champion Finewool; Britt Stuart, Reserve Champion Finewool Cross; Davis Colwell, Reserve Champion Medium Wool; and Robin Harris, Reserve

Champion Southdown. Spencer, Stuart and Harris are 4-H members while Colwell shows for Rotan FFA. In the Angus Heifer division, Tony Terry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Terry of Roby, showed the Grand and Reserve Cham-

pions. Tony shows for Fisher County 4-H. In the Steer Division, the Grand Champion Steer Heavyweight went to Darren Jeffrey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Jeffrey of Sylvester. The 4-H member's steer was a Maine-Anjou Cross weighing 1317 pounds. Reserve Grand Champion Steer honors went to Dana Nowlin, also a 4-H member, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Nowlin of Rotan. The steer, a Chinana-Angus Cross weighed 1144 pounds.

Bank of Roby. The Reserve Champion Steer sold for \$1200 to the First National Bank of Rotan. The four Lamb Breed Champions sold as follows: Champion Finewool, \$350 to Rotan Gin Co.; Champion Finewool Cross, \$375 to Hobbs Coop Gin; Champion Medium Wool, \$450 to Nowlin Farm Supply; and Champion Southdown, \$300 to Longworth Gin Co. and Sylvester Coop Gin. The Reserve Champion Finewool Lamb sold for \$3.75 a pound to Farmers Gin Co. of Rotan. This dollored out to \$427.50.

Showmanship winners were Darren Shipp, swine; Jeff Anderle, sheep and Tony Terry, cattle. Showmanship awards were sponsored by the Fisher County Young Farmers. Words cannot express appreciation to the public for the success of the Premium Sale. The Grand Champion Steer sold for \$1750 to Citizens State

The Grand Champion market hog sold for \$500 to First National Bank of Rotan. The Reserve Champion pig sold for \$400 to Farmers Union Coop Gin of Roby. The sale grossed over \$32,500. The hogs sold for \$1.75 a pound average with the average price per head being \$396.91. There were 14 hogs in the Premium Sale. The lambs averaged \$2.34 a pound with the average price per head being \$253.30. There were 22 lambs in the Premium Sale. The average price per pound on steers was 82.11 cents a pound. The average price per head was \$894.48 a head. Twenty four steers sold in the Premium Sale. Britt Jeffrey's steer collected over \$3900 from the Premium Sale.

The floor price for hogs was 49.00 cents a pound paid by John Schumacher. The lamb floor bid was 75.00 cents paid by Billie's Jr. and Teen Shop and Sweetwater Livestock Auction. Sweetwater Livestock Auction also paid 57.50 cents for the floor on the cattle.

Large volume buyers at the sale included Farm Tractor and Service of Rotan, First National Bank of Rotan, Sweetwater Cotton Oil Mill, Sweetwater Livestock Auction, Billie's Jr. and Teen Shop, Pied Piper Mills, Rotan Insurance Agency, Nowlin Farm Supply and Big 3 Pork Producers. 

## Accidents Few Due To Storm

The year 1979 may go down as the year of the "big freeze" as Fisher County residents anxiously await the sunshine to melt the ice and snow that has hampered almost all travel, school opening and activity since the first of the year.

Many Fisher County law enforcement officials are amazed that there have not been any serious injuries or accidents attributed to the unusual weather. Police Chief Charles LeFever at Rotan

indicated that "we have only had one accident and one hit and run reported since the bad weather set in over a week ago". He indicated that he was sure there were a few minor accidents but only two have been reported to the police department.

LeFever said that J.E. Van Loon of 709 East Lee in Rotan reported that his 1962 Pontiac, parked in front of his home, was hit in the left front fender by another vehicle. Police arrested Edwin Jack Ca-

denhead Jr. and charged him with leaving the scene of an accident. He was driving a 1977 Chevrolet Camaro belonging to Robert Baker of Baytown, Texas.

The other accident is still under investigation and reports were incomplete at press time. Chief LeFever did say that the accident took place at the intersection of Garfield and Snyder Ave. at approximately 11:00 a.m. on January 6th and amounted to bent fenders

on both vehicles. Rotan City Secretary Kenneth Vann indicated last Tuesday morning that he felt the city was most fortunate in only having had two broken water lines

## Ginning Will Pick Up After Freeze

The seven Fisher County gins recorded a combined total of 2,162 bales last week to give them a yearly total of 24,501 bales through last Tuesday morning.

The largest gin in total yearly production continues to be the Rotan Gin with 8,424 bales. Hobbs Gin has 4,754 bales; Farmers Gin in Rotan reported 3,589 bales; Farmers Union Gin at Roby has a total of 3,568; Terry Gin 1,620; Sylvester Gin 1,323; and Longworth Gin 1,223.

Some of the gins were closed a few days this past week because of the bad weather.

## School Re-Hires Harkey

The members of the Rotan School Board approved the purchase of a new 53 passenger school bus and employed Super-

intendent Tom Harkey for the 1979-80 and 1980-81 school years at their monthly meeting last Monday night.

The board authorized Superintendent Harkey to order the new 53 passenger bus immediately with anticipation of delivery in November or December of 1979.

The Rotan School had previously ordered a new 48 passenger bus in February 1978 and received delivery on December 22, 1978.

In other action the board agreed to accept bids on installing lights at the tennis courts and discussed the recent water damage to the Rotan Primary building.

The Primary Building received substantial water damage from a broken water pipe during the Christmas holidays. School officials estimated approximately \$750.00 to \$1,000.00 in damages to f or tiles. According to Harkey, the school is covered under a \$250.00 deductible insurance policy.

The board discussed the make-up of the four missed school days and tentatively set up a make-up schedule providing there is no further loss of days this winter. Tentative plans are to hold school on March 2, Friday, which was a teacher work day, and to hold school on Friday, April 13, (Good Friday) and move school closing or the last day of school from May 29 to May 31st.

In final action the board employed Superintendent Tom Harkey for the 1979-80 and 1980-81 school years at the same base salary.

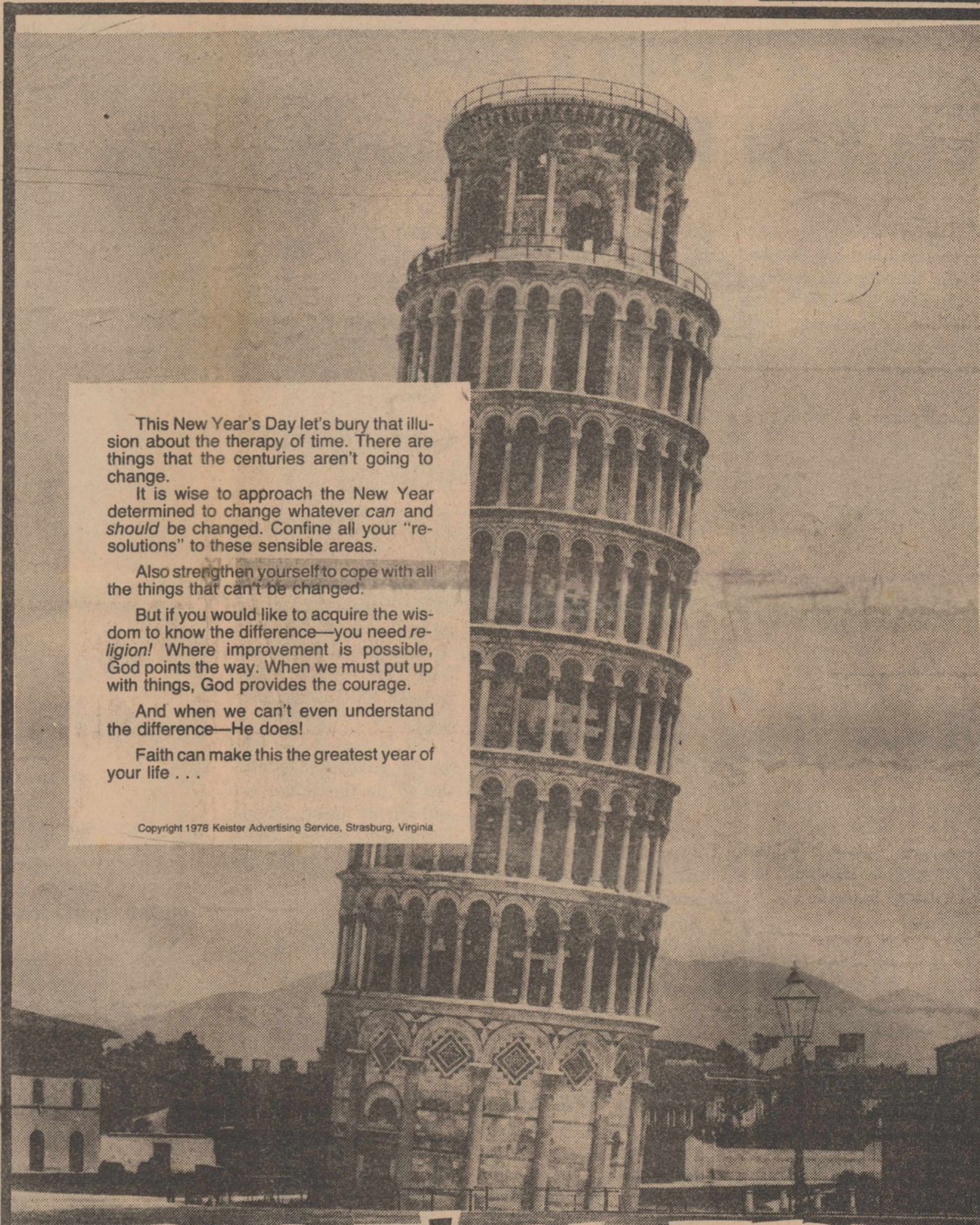

The cost of meals for the lunchroom is 50 cents per day and can be paid weekly, monthly, or by the day.

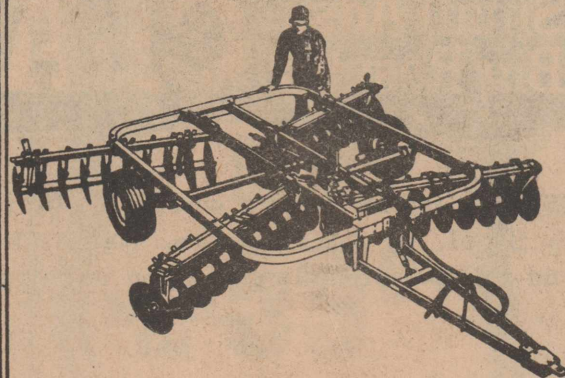

## Friends Show Steer In Memory Of Britt

When Britt Jeffrey, 16, died in the Dec. 8 collision of the McCaulley High School bus, it didn't mean that he or his Fisher County 4-H project work would be forgotten.

Had there been no accident that fatal and bitter cold Friday, Britt would have been showing a steer along with his friends less than a month later at the Fisher County Livestock Show Saturday.

His friends and fellow 4-H'ers groomed and showed the young steer in honor and memory of the youth.

It only weighed 966 pounds and naturally was beaten by heavier steers. But it still earned eighth place in the exotic lightweight steer competition.

The steer and the family of Britt Jeffrey were the big winners in the afternoon sale, however, as Fisher County folks showed what they think of their friends--and the warm and tearful atmosphere at the sale was almost enough to melt the thick ice outside the barn.

The steer originally sold for \$1.60 per pound. But then a friend in the crowd pledged an additional \$100. Then another tacked on \$200. Then another and still another. And, so it went.

The Fisher County 4-H Club, of which Britt was a part, gave \$150 which represented its entire proceeds from the club's successful chili lunch that had also helped fight the cold.

The Future Farmers of America then gave additional money on the steer. Fisher County Young Farmers contributed. The Fisher County Livestock

The bottom line was that at the end of the auction, the "lightweight" steer had brought \$3,900 to help the family of Britt Jeffrey. Britt's sister, Tami, 15, remains in Methodist Hospital at Lubbock. Parents are Mr. and Mrs. Jackie Jeffrey of McCaulley.

It turned out not to be such a cold day here after all. It was one of the warmest places in Texas Saturday--typical of Fisher County folks.

during 1977, the Texas Department of Agriculture has announced.

The total included \$23,333,000 in cash receipts from all crops and \$9,991,000 from livestock and livestock products. Government payments made up \$682,000 of the total.

Across the state, agriculture added \$7.1 billion to the economy last year, Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service surveys

showed, with receipts from all crops almost balancing those from livestock and livestock products. Livestock receipts totaled \$3.5 billion, followed by \$3.3 billion for crop receipts. Government payments made up \$206 million of the total, including over \$120 million through drought and flood assistance programs.

"With improved livestock prices this year,

particularly cattle, we are optimistic that 1978 cash receipts will be higher," commented Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. "These figures only tell half of the story, however. In any discussion including agricultural statistics, the true picture is only presented when you

can balance the cash receipts against the actual production costs. During last year, unfortunately, those production costs outstripped most of the profit margin for many farmers and ranchers.

Texas maintained its third place national ranking in cash receipts,

despite problems throughout the year. Other first place rankings included: number of cattle and calves, 14.5 million head; Upland cotton production, 5.5 million bales; wool production, 21 million pounds; mohair production, 8 million pounds; number of farms and

ranches, 197,000; and farm and ranch land, 139.8 million acres.

The state ranked second in the production of grain sorghum, grapefruit, cantaloupes, carrots, rice, green peppers, cabbage, onion, American-pima cotton, pecans, honeydew melons and cucumbers.

due to the ice and snow. Vann said that he does anticipate further problems with water lines as the ice thaws. Garbage collection has been running on schedule.

Jimmy Price, city manager at Roby, said last Tuesday that he had two major breaks in the main water line coming from Sweetwater to Roby due to the bad weather. One of the breaks was on New Year's Eve and city employees worked from 11:00 p.m. until 6:30 New Year's Day repairing the break. "We had a host of city turn-offs at homes in Roby because of broken pipes in homes", said Price.

Dick Edwards, manager of the Rotan Gin, said that he closed all ginning operations last weekend but when they started up last Monday morning everything was running smoothly. Edwards thought that a few days of pretty weather would get the Rotan Gin back on schedule. According to the manager, some farmers were talking of getting back into the fields to begin stripping operations the last of this week if weather doesn't get bad again.

Sheriff Mickey Counts reported that there haven't been any bad accidents in Roby because of the ice and snow and only knew of one catastrophe that could be attributed to the ice. His deputy, Ilene Hale, fell and broke her arm while walking on a sheet of ice between the courthouse and post office.

Fisher County based Highway Patrolmen Albert Hataway and Allan Arnwine only investigated one accident caused by the bad weather. According to Hataway, a car spun on the icy road and hit a culvert.

Texas Highway Department personnel have been working around the clock in shifts since the ice and snow hit Fisher County back on December 31. The 15 employees of the department have been working in two crews (one day and one night) operating maintainers.

## Season Wind Erosion Has Arrived

The season for wind erosion has arrived again. Strong northwest or southwest winds will tear loose and lift soil particles from

unprotected fields and make them airborne. The atmosphere can be turned to a reddish brown in a matter of minutes when

these strong winds blow across soils left bare after harvest or from grazing rangeland too closely.

During the first period of the "blow season" there were approximately 600 acres of land damaged in the Upper Clear Fork

Soil and Water Conservation District (Fisher County). The period covered the months of November and December. Almost all of the damage occurred on

cropland in areas where the soil is highly susceptible to wind erosion. Many more acres will be in condition to blow in the

next few weeks due to the lack of residue on the soil and tillage practices that leave the soil surface flat instead of in ridges.

Several conservation practices can be used to control wind erosion. By

leaving crop residues on the surface of the soil, strip cropping, applying cotton burs, and by using

other conservation practices that slow down surface winds, the effects of wind erosion can be lessened.

Soil Conservation Service personnel are available to assist landowners apply practices that will effectively control wind erosion and reduce its effect on the soil and on the human population.



# National Farm Bureau Convention Is Jan 14th

Some 125 Texans will attend the 60th annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation Jan. 14-18 in Miami Beach, according to Carrol Chaloupka, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

Chaloupka, Dalhart grain and cattle producer, will head the 16-member voting delegation. TFB has that number of voting delegates by virtue of its 1978 membership of 228,079, third largest state Farm Bureau in the nation. Policies to guide the three-million-member AFBF will be formulated at its Miami Beach conclave. Several recommendations from the Texas Farm Bureau were forwarded from the TFB's convention in late November in Dallas.

Main speakers at the AFBF meeting will be former California Governor Ronald Reagan; Ambassador Robert S. Strauss, President Carter's special representative for trade negotiations; and AFBF President Allan Grant of Visalia, Calif.

Texas will play a prominent part in the national convention. Chaloupka will be chairman of a conference on group purchasing. Ed Uvacek, Jr., Texas Agricultural Extension livestock marketing specialist, will address the livestock conference on the subject of "Livestock and the Meat Situation."

In addition, the TFB's 1978 Outstanding Young Farmer, Thomas Paben and his wife, Dianne, of Waller in Harris County, will represent Texas in the competition to select the nation's Outstanding Young Farmer/Rancher of the year. Paben's operation consists of peanuts, soybeans and beef cattle.

Other specific representatives from Texas will be winners of the state competition for Queen, Talent Find, and Discussion Meet.

The TFB convention delegates in late November approved a long list of recommendations for national policy. Included were resolutions dealing with farm programs, inflation, export markets, imports, government regulations, energy and water.

## Medicare Insurance Enrollment Began

January 1 marked the beginning of the 1979 general enrollment period for Medicare medical insurance, Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene said.

During the first 3 months of 1979, people who are otherwise eligible but who do not have medical insurance protection under Medicare can enroll for it. Medical insurance protection will start July 1, 1979, for those who enroll during the general enrollment period.

Those eligible include people who chose not to enroll during their initial period and those who once had this protection, but who dropped out.

People who enroll during a general enrollment period will pay a premium higher than the basic premium if there was a period of 12 months or more during which they could have had this protection but did not. The basic premium for the period ending June 1979 is \$8.20 a month. The new premium will be announced before the general enrollment period.

Any increase in the premium is limited to the percentage increase in cash social security benefits, which amounted to 6.5 percent effective last June. Even so, the protection is still a bargain since the Federal Government pays more than 70 percent of the premium cost out of general revenues.

Full information about the 1979 general enrollment period will be available at the Abilene social security office. The office is located at 142 S. Pioneer, and the telephone number is 698-1360.
