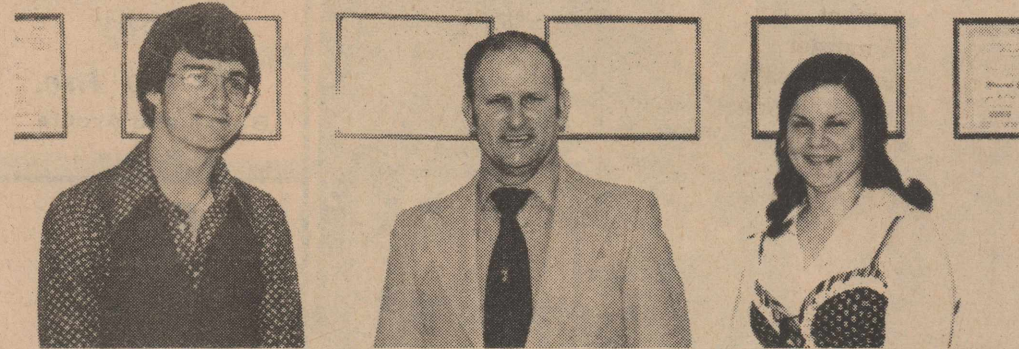
Midwest Gives D.C. Trips

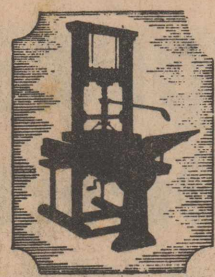

Parents Of School Children Issued Invitations To Visit

The four Fisher County School Superintendents, Tom Harkey in Rotan, Jimmie Laurie in Roby, Edd Farmer in McCaulley, and M.B. Maxwell in Hobbs, issued special invitations this week to parents and friends calling them to make a special effort to visit a public school during Texas public School Week.

March 4 through March 10, Texas Public Schools are celebrating their 125th anniversary with the observance of public School Week. It was in 1854 that the first law was passed establishing public schools in Texas.

Fisher County teachers, administrators, and support personnel are making it possible for county students to receive the type education that will prepare them for the challenges ahead.

Fisher County Schools are providing all children with a knowledge of the traditionally accepted "Fundamentals". The fundamentals were defined in the early elementary schools as reading, writing and arithmetic. As the pupil advances in school, these three R's should be accomplished by a study of such courses as higher mathematics, science, history and English. Upon graduation from high school a student should have had specific training to do something--to go to work and be successful on a job in the event he finds it impractical to continue his education.

Fisher County Schools are enabling each child to develop the power to think constructively and critically, and to solve problems.

Fisher County Schools are providing citizenship education opportunities that emphasize the American heritage and include knowledge and acceptance of the responsibilities and privileges of citizenship. More effective training for citizenship usually results where the school, home, church and community work cooperatively.

Fisher County Schools are assisting each youth in his efforts to make a place for himself in the community. Some students prepare themselves for higher education, others work upon leaving school, and still others prepare for homemaking. Programs of vocational education and of counseling and guidance are needed in achieving these goals.

Fisher County Schools are providing educational programs which take into account individual differences. Each child has the

right to experience which will assist in his optimum growth and development within his capacity. This includes programs of enrichment for the gifted as

well as opportunities for other exceptional children, including the mentally retarded.

Fisher County parents and friends should accept

the responsibility of participating in Texas Public School Week, March 4 through 10. Visitors will be welcome at Rotan, Roby, Hobbs and McCaulley.

Police Find Body Of Mexican National After Rotan Killing

A man was shot and killed early last Sunday morning at "Donnie's Place" on Wheeler Street, and his body found in the back floorboard of a vehicle parked in the vicinity of the 1000 block of North Cleveland Street, according to Rotan Police Chief Charles LaFever.

Celestina M. Sanchez, 20, who was reported to have been living in Snyder, was killed at approximately 12:30 a.m. Sunday, March 4.

His body was discovered by Officer John Moon who responded to a call from a resident on North Cleveland requesting police assistance.

According to Chief LaFever, witnesses to the shooting attempted to take Sanchez to the Fisher County Hospital but found the front door locked.

Larry Ray Daniel, 19, of Rotan was taken into custody by Rotan Police and after giving them a statement was charged with murder.

LaFever said that the shooting incident apparently occurred after an argument over a small amount of money. Witnesses told police officers that Sanchez and another man were arguing when the other man shot Sanchez with a .22 cal. pistol.

LaFever indicated that there appeared to be a gunshot wound in Sanchez's chest.

Justice of the Peace

Ernest Roberts, after pronouncing the Mexican National dead, turned the body over to Weathersbee Funeral Home. The body was taken to Abilene to an autopsy and was to be transported to Colima, Mexico for services.

Sanchez was born in Colima in 1958 and had lived in Snyder for 6 months where he was employed by Thompson Construction Company.

Roby School District Grants Exemption

The Roby Independent School District is granting \$5,000 homestead exemption for 1979, as provided by recently enacted legislation. The \$5,000 deduction will be made from the total appraised value of the qualifying property.

To qualify for this exemption, the person applying must have owned the property and it must have been that person's residential homestead on January 1, 1979. A residential homestead exemption can be claimed for the year on one property only.

"Please come by the Roby School Tax Office, one block west of the bank and sign the Residential Homestead Exemption Affidavit. These need to be signed before April 30, 1979", said Mrs. Harmon Holcomb, Roby School tax assessor-collector.

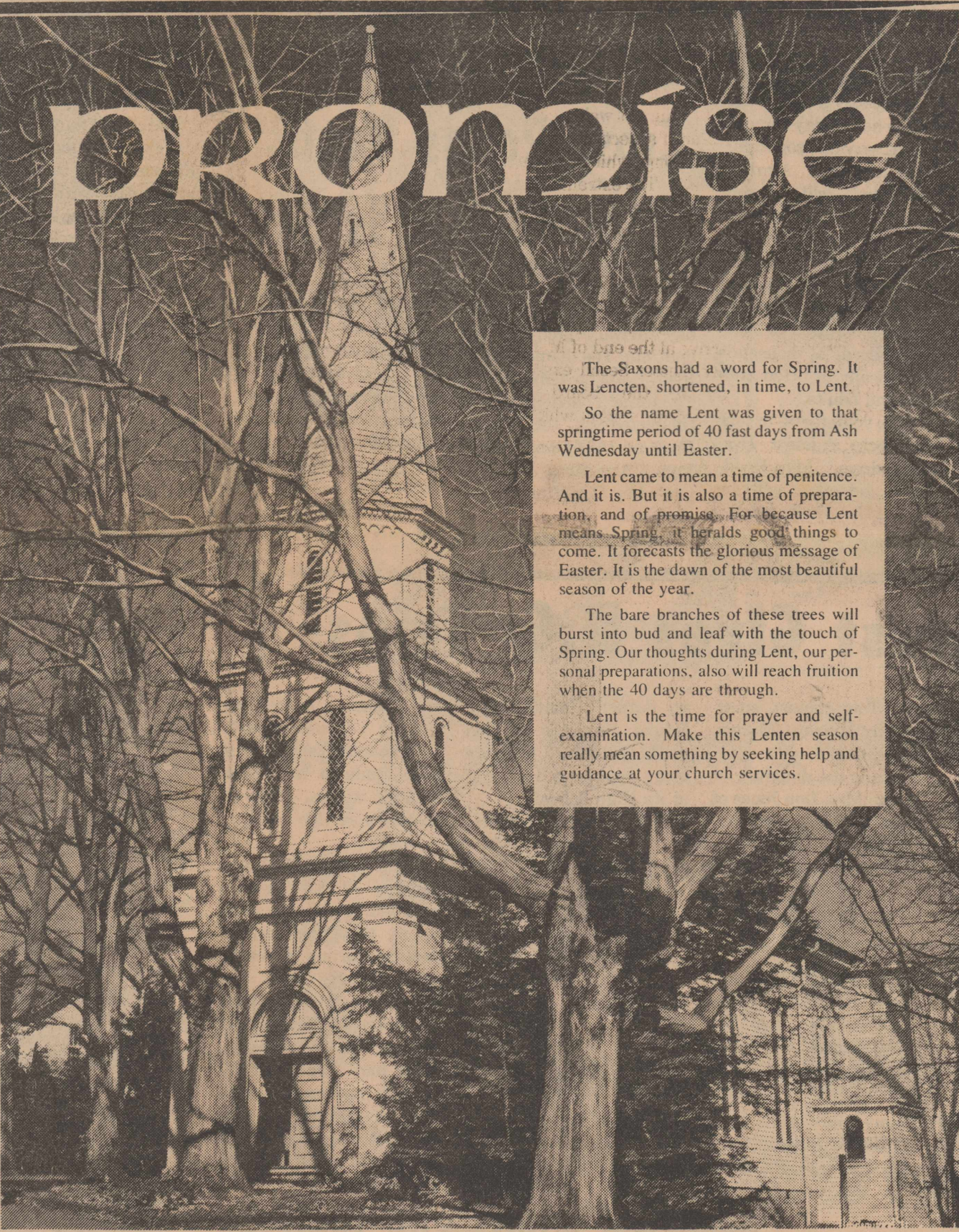

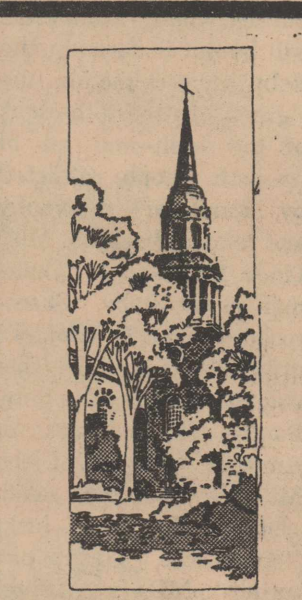
Lent is the time for prayer and self-examination. Make this Lenten season really mean something by seeking help and guidance at your church services.

HOME ECONOMICS

Court House Roby

Selecting quality fabric is the first step in creating a professional looking garment. With proper care, quality fabric will remain attractive and useable for the desired life of the garment. Even the simplest and fastest techniques are not worthwhile for damaged or inferior fabric. To help obtain a quality fabric, perform the following in-store tests before buying fabric.

Crust a corner of the fabric and hold tightly for several seconds, then release. Look for wrinkles. If the fabric wrinkles now, it will also wrinkle during wear and require extra care.

Measure a small amount of fabric against a ruler. Stretch firmly, then release. Compare to original measurement. Test both lengthwise and crosswise. Stretch recovery is important in keeping garment shape and preventing unpopular performance such as "Baggie knees".

Unroll the needed amount from the bolt. Examine fabric from both sides for evenness of color and design.

To check for evenness or flaws in weave or knit, unroll needed amount from bolt. Hold fabric up to light and examine.

Avoid buying fabrics with holes, light areas or heavy slubs not intended as part of a design.

To check the crocking (rubbing off), rub fabric against skin or light colored fabric. Look for and avoid buying fabrics that color rubs off of.

Rub fabric together briskly. Avoid buying those which sizing flakes off. Rub fabric together briskly. Avoid buying if small balls or pills form on right side of fabric.

Examine for durable and strong quilting threads and a durable backing fabric. Although chemical finishing odors usually are removed by the first laundering, it is wise to avoid fabrics with strong odors.

"How to prepare for a tornado" was the information presented in a recent program sponsored by the Fisher County Extension Agent's office.

Bill Benson, Area Resource Development Specialist of Vernon presented the program at the Courthouse Annex in Roby.

Using a film showing how one community was so well prepared for a tornado, that only three

lives were lost in a most destructive tornado, he emphasized the importance of the total community being prepared.

The film points out how schools, businesses, towns as well as individual families should know where to go and what to do in case of a tornado.

This film is available to schools, organizations or anyone desiring to use it. Contact the County Extension Office in the Courthouse in Roby, 776-2171 if you would like to use this film.

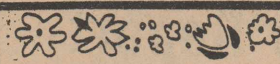
Extension Club

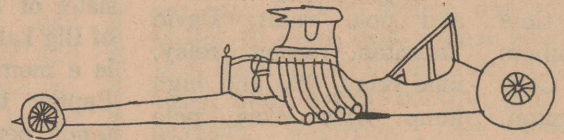

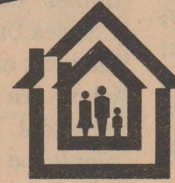

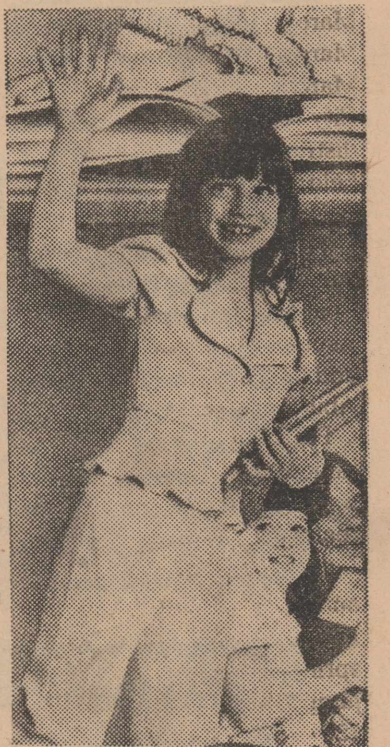
