Chamber Of Commerce Sets Veteran's Day Activities

The members of the Rotan Chamber of Commerce met last Tuesday morning and drafted a tentative schedule for the November 10th Veteran's Day celebration planned for Rotan, according to Chamber President Ben Read.

The activities of the day will begin at 9:30 a.m., with a flag raising ceremony at the Rotan Football Field; at 10:00 a.m., the parade will get underway and following the parade, at noon, the Jaycees of Rotan will begin serving a bar-b-que meal at the George Poe warehouse", said Read.

The Chamber of Commerce has contacted several bands and will have entertainment from noon

throughout the afternoon.

Chamber officials have also extended an invitation to all church, civic, ladies auxiliary groups, or any other group or organization to set up a booth (bazaar type) at the warehouse.

Floats entering the parade will be eligible for a first prize of \$50.00, second prize of \$35.00, and third prize of \$15.00. Jerry Dycus is in charge of securing float entries from throughout the county.

Perry Hunsaker is in charge of public relations outside Fisher County; Larry McClain was named to lead the flag sales and placement for the celebration; and board members

Max Carriker, County Demo. Chairman Dies

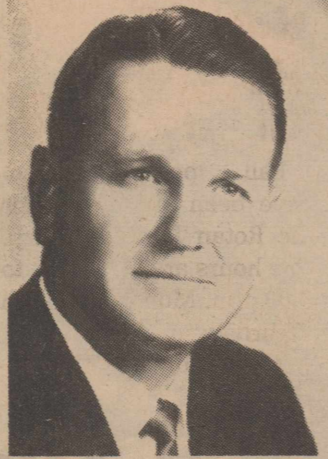

Editorial Comment

Solution Is Found

In last week's editorial this newspaper pointed out a potentially dangerous crosswalk problem at Roby and challenged the Roby School Board to come up with a solution for the safety of the children involved.

The problem as pointed out in last week's piece said "Two painted walk intersections along U.S. Highway 180 in the vicinity of Roy Parson's Exxon Station and another across from the Roby Church of Christ, both containing the proper highway identification markers warning of the 'crossing of school children' are being ignored by Roby motorists passing through Roby."

At the Roby School Board meeting last Monday night, the board members did come up with a solution. The board members instructed Superintendent Jimmy Laurie to apply for a "Hazardous Bus Route" for all students living north of U.S. Highway 180. The bus will travel down Second Street, picking up students, and transport them across U.S. 180 to the school.

Superintendent Laurie intended to submit the necessary paperwork to Austin last Tuesday and said, "We're 100 percent certain that the new bus route will be approved and the bus route should begin next week."

This publication offers its congratulations to Superintendent Jimmy Laurie for having the continued safety of the Roby students at heart. He and the members of the Roby School Board deserve a "pat on the back" for taking this action for the safety of the Roby School children.

We also offer our appreciation to the members of the Texas Highway Department for re-painting the "walk lines" that cross busy Highway 180. Crews were busy last Monday morning re-painting intersections to ensure the safety of children walking to school across U.S. 180.

Now that Roby is 100 percent assured of the approval of the new "Hazardous Bus Route" it seems like an opportune time to urge parents of children living north of Highway 180 to make full use of the route. It also seems that some personal "Thank You" expressions are due from parents of these children to Jimmy Laurie, the Roby School Board members and the members of the Texas Highway Department

2100 Attend Annual Midwest Meeting

The annual membership meeting of Midwest Electric Cooperative, was held at the Scurry County Coliseum in Snyder, Thursday night, September 6, and brought out over 2100 in attendance. A bar-b-que meal served by Vann's of Lubbock preceded the business meeting where Cooperative Manager Parker Wetsel stated the condition of the Coopera-

tive, and explained the financial reasoning for the application of a rate increase. If the application is approved by the Public Utility Commission, the proposed rate will effect an increase of \$251,538, or 5.56 percent in the operating revenues of the Cooperative.

Rotan Board Approves 1979-80 School Budget Of \$902,000

The Rotan School Board members expressed a unanimous opinion to administration officials last Monday night calling for them to "do a much better job of scheduling courses in the future", according to Superintendent Tom Harkey. Harkey said that "We realize that we're limited to begin with, as far as scheduling, but in the past we have placed a lot of limitations on scheduling that are needless". He said that plans are to pre-register students in May for courses next year and to have several schedules already developed for implementation in the Fall of 1980.

In other action the members of the board approved a preliminary school budget for the 1979-80 school year of \$902,000.00. The new budget is approximately \$54,000.00 higher than the 1978-79 budget of \$848,354.00. Superintendent Tom Harkey said that approximately 50 percent of the increase, or \$27,000, can be attributed to increases in teachers' salaries, 38 percent due to inflation with 12 percent due to increases in the overall budget.

Harkey said that he anticipated that \$387,000 would come from local tax monies and that \$515,000 would come from state and federal monies in order to make up the preliminary \$902,000.00 budget.

A budget hearing on the proposed budget will be held on Thursday, September 20, at 12:00 noon at the Rotan High School.

The announcement said an adequate budget need be established to operate the district. It also states the districts cannot operate on a shoestring. For me to recommend such a move, I would need some kind of a figure, instead of the phrase "adequate". Another reason is the state of confusion all the agencies are in. A new program such as this one will have many problems to be worked out. I would like to see some of the problems solved before the county is forced to join. The legality of this bill is

Library. The board discussed the annual meeting of the Texas Association of School Boards to be held in San Antonio on October 6, 7 and 8th. The board discussed the possibility of using spare busses to transport people to games out of town, but decided that it was not in the best interest of the school district to get into the transportation of people to games.

The board voted to grant a \$150.00 a month vehicle allowance to Vo-Ag instructor Olin Fryer for the use of his pick-up and adopted a Tri-County Cooperative 5 year plan for special education.

Board members approved the hiring of Sue Branch as a teacher in the reading lab in the elementary school. She was a teacher last year in the Jayton School system.

Coach Don Mullins reported to the board concerning the coaching assignments for the 1979-80 school year. According to Harkey, the assignments remain the same as last year with the exception that Coach Doyle Walker will be assisting Coach Blair with varsity and junior varsity girl's basketball.

It was brought to the attention of the board that some of the junior high football equipment is unsafe. Harkey indicated that an effort is going to be made to update and upgrade football helmets and other equipment for

junior high players. In final action the board members and administration expressed appreciation to the Rotan Jaycees for the tremendous job that they did in remodeling the fieldhouse, bleachers and press box facilities.

Courthouse Payments Are In The Bank Fisher County Auditor, Evelyn Carter, reported to the Commissioners last Monday morning that the money to make the final three payments on the Fisher County Courthouse had already been set aside and was in the bank.

In September 1972, Fisher County Commissioners voted \$357,000 in revenue bonds to construct the new Fisher County Courthouse. Payments on those bonds, in the approximate amounts of \$45,000 a year on principal and interest have been made since 1973.

After the 1980 payment is made in March of 1980, according to Mrs. Carter, there will be approximately \$117,000 in the courthouse interest and sinking fund.

"This amount will be sufficient, together with earned interest, to make the payments for 1981, 1982 and the final payment in 1983", said Mrs. Carter.

The payment that is to be made in March 1980 will come from \$15,483.00 in revenue sharing funds, \$19,517.00 from the interest and sinking fund and \$6,725.00 from interest earned on interest and sinking fund money.

Roby Board Approves New budget

The members of the Roby School Board met last Monday night and gave final approval to the 1979-80 budget in the amount of \$539,050.00, according to Superintendent Jimmy Laurie. Laurie indicated that the new budget is approximately \$30,000.00 higher than the 1978-79 budget due to the increase in teacher salaries.

In other action, the board voted to give Roby School Tax Assessor-Collector Billie Lou Holcomb a \$500.00 a year increase in salary. Her new salary, after the granted raise, amounts to \$8,220.00 a year.

The board members voted to hire Kathy Daniel as a teacher's aide.

In final action, the board voted to make application with the Texas Education Agency in Austin for a "Hazardous Bus Route". Superintendent Laurie said that the route will be approved and should be begun sometime next week.

"It's a good deal really", said Laurie, "it will eliminate the problem of

having children crossing that busy highway", he continued.

Commissioners Will Get More Revenue Sharing Funds In 80

Fisher County Commissioners met last Monday and discussed a report by Judge Marshal Bennett concerning a survey conducted by the Texas Aeronautics Commission listing some recommendations on improvements that needed to be made at the Fisher County Airport. In the report, TAC officials listed five areas that needed attention at the airport; (1) Runway area needs weed killer by all lights, (2) runway white lights need to be replaced with blue bulbs, (3) brush is obstructing runway on the north end, (4) lights need to be replaced on the windsock, and (5) stripes on runway are fading. Commissioners discussed an estimate by the Texas Highway Department concerning re-painting the runway stripes. Judge Bennett indicated that highway officials indicated that they would do the re-striping, use their equipment and material for just the cost of materials which was estimated at \$600.00. Commissioners are going to do some checking within the county to ascertain if the project can be completed at a cost of less than \$600.00.

In other action, the Commissioners appointed Dr. C.M. Callan as county health officer. Dr. Callan was hired on a "fee for services basis", according to Judge Bennett in lieu of

a budget retainer fee. Commissioner Jimmy Wright made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Jay Hendon, to grant Mobil Oil Company a one-half mile easement across county right-of-way located in the southwest portion of the county. Judge Bennett, after talking with Wilson Hunt of the evaluation firm of Pritchett & Abbott, indicated that the oil valuation report from Pritchett & Abbott should be higher than originally anticipated. The figure will not be official until the latter part of this week.

The Commissioners also heard a report from Fisher County Auditor Evelyn Carter, concerning the anticipated revenue sharing money to be received by the County in 1980. Mrs. Carter said that preliminary indications are that Fisher County should receive \$102,372.00 in 1980. The original estimate was \$89,000.00. A total of \$77,000.00 was received by the County in 1979.

Judge Bennett presented the insurance bill to the Commissioners last Monday for the annex building and court house and contents. The total bill amounted to \$10,588.00 for 3 years. Instead of paying an additional \$400 over three years by paying yearly installments on the policy, the Commissioners voted to pay the entire amount of the policy next month.

Commissioners discussed the possibility of lease-purchasing county equipment in the future, briefly discussed consolidation with Sheriff Counts and voted to set up two election boxes in the County for the up-coming

November constitutional amendment election. To save money, commissioners set up one box in Roby for residents in Boxes 1, 1a, 4, 4a, 18 and 22; one box in Rotan (Community Center) for residents of voting boxes 2, 6, 10, 12

and 13. Commissioners voted to accept the Pritchett & Abbott contract for 1980 for oil, gas and utility evaluation and discussed the date of a budget hearing with Fisher County Auditor Evelyn Carter. The date is expected to be announced in next week's paper.

In final action the Commissioners heard a report by Mrs. Carter concerning an inspection by Virginia Block of the Texas Comptroller's Office. According to the report, the inspector was impressed with the book-keeping system being used by the County, but suggested that the County use more budgetary controls.

Commissioners Vote Against Joining New Appraisal Dist.

Fisher County Commissioners voted against joining a Fisher County Appraisal District at their meeting last Monday morning primarily because they were unsure of the cost to Fisher County.

Fisher County Judge Marshal Bennett indicated that the hospital district, four county schools, Rotan and Roby cities and some water districts will be participating in the appraisal district which calls for all property to be valued at 100 percent of actual value for taxing purposes on January 1, 1980. The county is not yet required to participate by law.

Commissioner Jay Hendon said last Monday, "I am not in favor of wasting our tax payer's money". He was making reference to the vague wording of the cost of taking part in the appraisal district with reference to cost to Fisher County. Hendon said that he wanted to know exactly what it was going to cost before going into any type of program. Fisher County Tax Assessor-Collector Robert Buck told commissioners that he "couldn't see where it will be to our advantage unless someone can give us a cost figure."

The following letter was given to the members of

the Fisher County Commissioners Court by Judge Marshal Bennett explaining his position on the appraisal district.

"Many people are now aware of the new law for single appraisal district. All taxing entities will fall under this new law, except the county this year, with the county required to in \$981.

The hospital, schools, and cities have asked that the county vote to join the appraisal district, but as County Judge I have some reservation as to recommending it to Commissioner's Court.

The reasons for not joining are not concrete, but I do believe are warranted at this time. There are a number of unanswered questions as to cost, administration, and above all its legality. The announcement said an adequate budget need be established to operate the district.

It also states the districts cannot operate on a shoestring. For me to recommend such a move, I would need some kind of a figure, instead of the phrase "adequate".

Another reason is the state of confusion all the agencies are in. A new program such as this one will have many problems to be worked out. I would like to see some of the problems solved before the county is forced to join.

The legality of this bill is

also in question. The House has said it was unconstitutional and will have to be solved by a constitutional amendment, voted on by the people of Texas. I have heard that it will be worded so as to pass, but by past experience when it comes to taxes, the outcome of a vote can come in strange forms.

the state is pushing for this bill to pass and for a very good reason. By

property taxed on 100 percent valuation the state gains more revenue.

This letter, I hope, will vaguely explain why I will not recommend to the Commissioners Court to join with the schools, hospital, and cities in a single appraisal district.

Until I see what such a district will cost, some of the confusion lessened, and the legality established, I will continue to be against it.





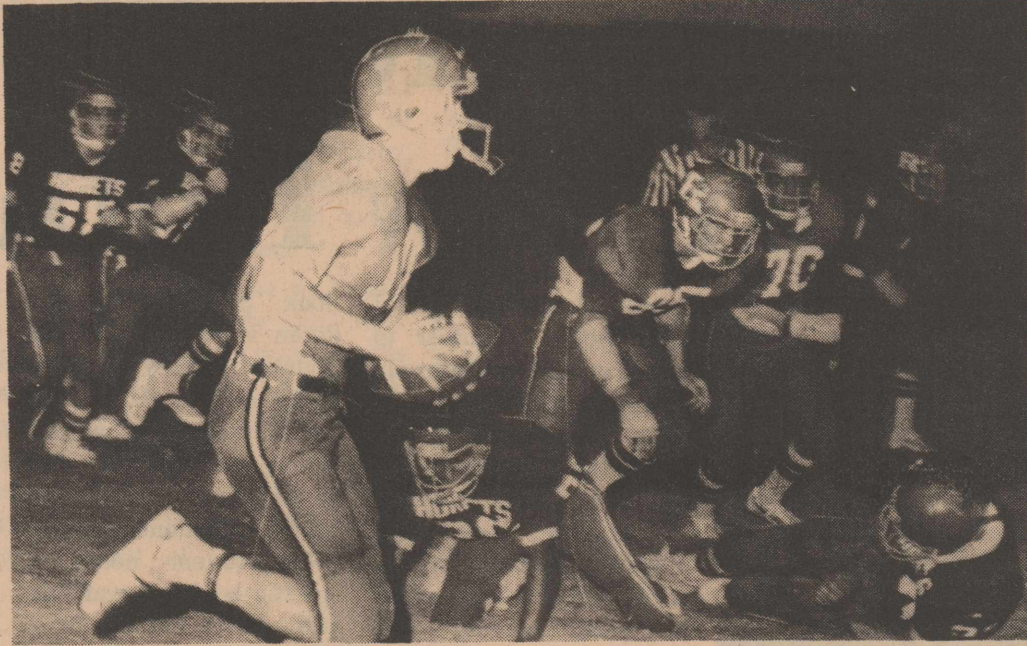

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

- Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
- Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

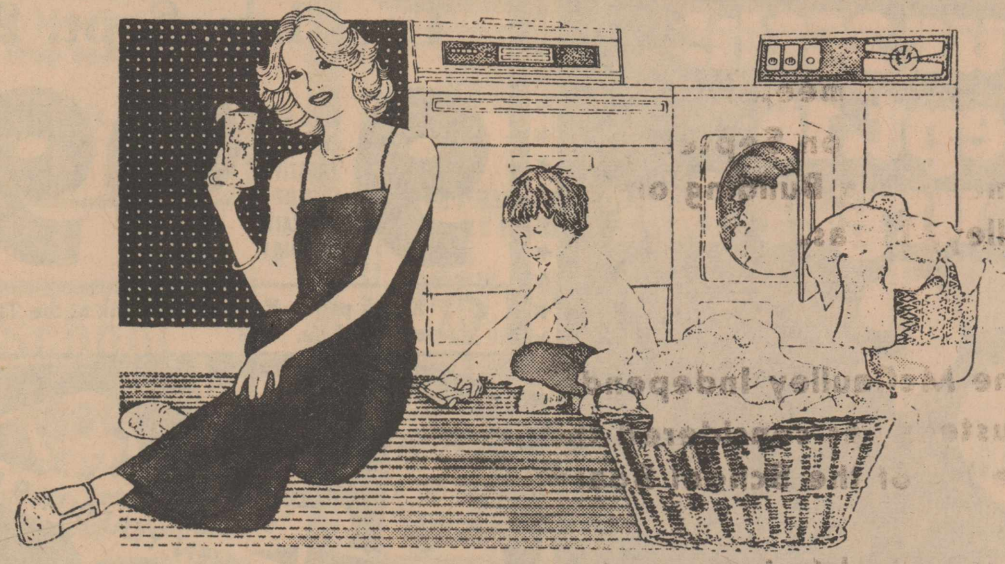
PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

More Of The Bill Helms Story

1950 were followed by severe drought in 1951-1954. After four years of farming in drought conditions, Bill's excitement over his first irrigation well, drilled in January 1955, was more than minimal. His excitement was so great the day the test pump was set that he forgot to kill his pick-up when he got out and accidentally left it running all day. Because his well was pumping sand, Bill stayed up all night that night to shovel sand and see that his will didn't "sand down". Bill went home the next day tired and sleepy, but oh, so proud, of his new six-inch well.

Bill added many improvements to his farm through the years and he always explained it by saying he just wanted to leave the land better than he found it.

If ever a man loved the job of plowing, it was Bill. He often had Annetta bring his lunch to the field so that he wouldn't have to stop for dinner. And no matter how late she and Joe Edd waited to come and pick him up each evening he always wanted to make "just one more round". Whenever a rain came Bill always got drenched, but because Annetta wasn't there in time to pick him up, but because he was sure he had time for "just one more round" before the rain hit.

One afternoon in the mid-fifties found him with no excuse to rescue him from the unpleasant job of helping his wife shell beans. That is, until he remembered that he needed to ride the colt he was breaking. So leaving the business of beans to his wife and his son he headed toward the lot.

Several hours later Bill came limping home. He'd been thrown and was bruised from head to toe but he finally had a good excuse for not shelling any more beans that day. And even the bruises and scratches couldn't hide the grin in his eyes that said he surely was glad about that.

Aside from his family and friends, probably the only thing that could compare to Bill's love for animals. He raised everything from chickens to horses on his farm and when his grandchildren were small and afraid of the animals he always told them, "They're more afraid of you than you are of them and they won't hurt you if you just treat 'em right." Bill practiced what he preached by taking good care of his animals. He had proven

that years earlier when he still pulled his plow with a horse instead of a tractor. At noon when he and his son, W.E. Jr., came in from plowing, Bill would unharness his horses and feed them before going inside to eat. After lunch he and W.E. would go back to the field and hoe awhile to let the horses rest before harnessing them again.

One of the things that Bill dreaded most was having to take a load of calves to market. He hated to get rid of them and always missed them afterward. Yet, while taking the calves to market was a necessary task, there were certain animals Bill would not part with for love nor money. Ol' Flax was just such an animal. He was Bill's favorite horse and he had him over twenty years.

Because of his great love for animals Bill could think of no finer gift than this to give to his friends. To newlyweds he gave the gift of a weaner pig. At this time wedding showers were given at night in someone's home and both men and women attended. At the shower given in Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Morrison's home in honor of Mr. and Mrs. E.D. Richmond, Bill took his pig along and sneaked it in a window during the shower. To celebrate the birth of his first set of twin calves, a bull and a heifer, he gave the new-born heifer to his daughter-in-law.

In the early sixties Bill joined the Silverton Riding Club and began raising paint horses. These were two of the things he enjoyed most in his later life. Never having been a shy man, Bill was thrilled at the thought of a parade, especially if he was riding in it. He loved having a saddle beneath him, riding with his friends, and having everyone see his beautiful, proud horse.

Bill and "Fish" Wilson—a longtime friend and neighbor since the early twenties and also a member of the riding club—always traveled together to the parades. One such parade was scheduled for a Labor Day weekend at Boys Ranch near Amarillo. Bill's horse was sick that week-end and he and Fish were unable to find another for Bill to ride. Disappointed that he would not be able to ride in the parade, but, nevertheless unwilling to miss a chance for some good visiting or saying his "howdys" to a new face, Bill went along. Following the parade the Silverton Riding Club was scheduled to present a saddle they had purchased for Boys Ranch, Bill, eagerly ac-

cepting the task, marched forward to make the presentation sporting a saddle on his shoulder and a grin as broad as the horizon. Bill returned home that evening thrilled to find his family had seen him present the saddle on television. Thus, the day that began as a disappointment for Bill had evolved into what he later counted as one of his most memorable experiences.

Another day equally implanted in Bill's memory was one in December of 1967, the day he bought his first tractor with a cab. The machine cost \$500 and he told Joe Edd concerning that: "Son, that's the most money I ever spent in my life for something I didn't need." But his attitude soon changed when he found that even the cold December winds didn't penetrate his warm cab and keep him out of the field.

Along with this other chore, Bill spent a part of each day breaking, riding and caring for his horses. He spent many happy hours in a saddle and a few not so happy ones coming out of a saddle. Though he was thrown many times he never suffered a broken horn or a broken spirit. He was always ready to climb back on and try again. At age seventy-nine he was thrown while breaking a pint colt. He had several scratches and bruises and he and Annetta had to hunt until after dark to find his glasses but the next morning Bill was back in the saddle and he soon had the spirited colt as gentle as a lamb.

Bill loved the life he led, living off the land and the grade of God. It always brought a smile to his face and left a good feeling in his heart when he saw young people choose to make their living in the same manner. He helped several young men make their start in farming by helping them to secure loans, renting them land, and furnishing moral support, advice, and a little good old-fashioned know how.

The facts and events related here describe, in part, the life Bill Helms led. But they cannot adequately portray the man. Perhaps that is best accomplished through this letter written to Bill by Jack Stroup in March of 1967.

"...I remembered what a fine, true, loyal friend you have been to both my parents, my sister, my brothers and myself. I remembered how sad all of the family was to see you move from our place... You were always good for a good time, could be depended on to

be fun to be with, could be trusted, and never made fun of a little boy. I remember how after you left and moved to your place it was always nice to see 'Bill.' 'Bill' was... the most wonderful man in the country because he raised those wonderful watermelons and he was always someone who never poked fun at me, never abused me in any manner. It was always good to see 'Bill' because I knew he was going to be good to talk to, make me feel better, even make me feel a little important by listening to whatever foolish things I uttered without telling me I had too much of an imagination; possibly even shared a belief in part of which I talked about.

"I remember 'Bill' as I grew older and more able to appreciate him for more than an audience—a good fellow to be with and to talk to, a good source of watermelons, a fellow who would let you ride in his buggy... I remember that as I continued seeing 'Bill,' he was always one who greeted me with a smile, sometimes hugged my shoulders to him and let me share some of the large amount of love he had for all people.

"I remember that when I saw 'Bill' I could think: Well, here is one fellow who is not going to spend the rest of the hour complaining about the fate of life, the price of cotton and the drought, both of which were pretty severe in the thirties. 'Bill' was smiling when he approached you and still smiling when he left you and always when he left he said, 'Come to see us.' 'Bill' was not only a fellow you didn't mind running into, knowing you would not be subjected to his troubles, even though everyone knew you were certainly having them along with the others, to the contrary, 'Bill' was a fellow you loved running into. He was a breath of fresh air, an inspiration, someone who left you feeling better, someone that you were glad you had seen, someone you were better for having seen."



Fisher County AGENT

The following article comes from Dr. Jerry Parsons, Area Vegetable Specialist from San Antonio which I thought would be of interest to you.

Americans are in the grip of a new and very serious disease which includes symptoms of fear, occasional anger, resentment, panic and emotional outbursts. Nearly everyone is being affected. The disease is generally transmitted by the sometimes misdirected efforts of so-called consumer advocates, unsettling books, articles and newspaper headlines and more recently by a series of television specials about ill health in America. The disease is termed cancer-phobia.

Many Americans have come to believe we are in the midst of a cancer epidemic surrounded by a

sea of carcinogens: namely overprocessed foods, pesticides, polluted air and water and hazardous work places. We continuously wrestle with the decision of how much carcinogen exposure is too much. Modern analytical equipment can detect quantities in parts per billion or even parts per trillion levels.

These are infinitesimal amounts. A part per billion for instance is the equivalent of one penny in \$10 million, one inch in 16,000 miles, one second in 32 years. A part per million measure is comparable to one inch in 16 miles, one minute in two years, or one cent in \$10,000. No one knows whether a single molecule of a given carcinogen can cause cancer whether some threshold level is involved.

It is interesting to examine some of the

restricted or banned chemicals which have been said to cause cancer, arsenic is one of the most dreaded, persistent chemicals which in the past was commonly used by plant producers. Yet arsenic is so omnipresent that it is in everything from shrimp to meteorites and at 0.2 to .03 parts per million constitutes the twelfth most abundant element in the human body.

Not only do we not all die of arsenic-induced cancer, but there is recent evidence that at very low levels, arsenic may be an essential element in nutrition. Wouldn't it be ironical if the federal government is "protecting" us to death?

Even the most competent medical authorities differ as to what is a carcinogen (causes cancer). Our government has

decided that any compound is ruled to be a human cancer hazard if it has ever been used to cause tumors of any kind when administered by ingestion, regardless of the amount of feeding used. This means if rats won't eat the chemical it is forced into their stomachs through tubes down their throats.

Young Farmer Week Set By The Governor

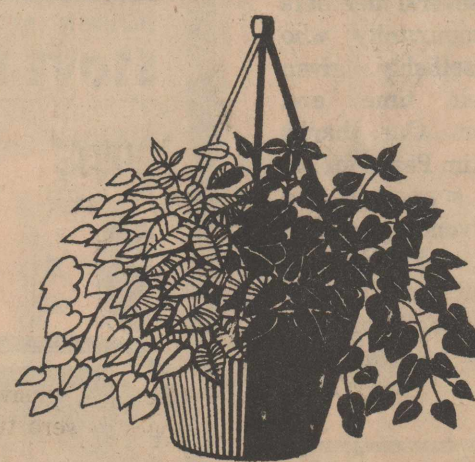
September 16-22 has been officially designated as Young Farmer Week in Texas by proclamation of Governor W.P. Clements Jr.
