PEACHY PORK PICANTE 2 lbs. boneless pork, cut into 3/4-inch cubes

2 T taco seasoning mix

1 to 2 T vegetable oil

1 jar (16 ozs.) chunky-style picante sauce

2/3 c peach preserves

Coat pork cubes with taco seasoning. Heat oil in a large non-stick skillet over medium-high heat; add pork and cook to brown, stirring occasionally. Add salsa and preserves to skillet; lower heat. Cover and simmer for 15 to 20 minutes. Serve with hot rice. Recipe can be reduced for a smaller family.



JACKSON SAYS WALKER CAMPAIGN IS ILLEGAL

Legislative candidate Kevin Jackson has accused his opponent Gary Walker with "illegally failing to report his largest campaign contributions as required by Texas Law." They will face each other in the November 8 general election to see who will replace Jim Rudd, longtime legislator for District 80.

"Since Gary Walker is paid two full time salaries by the tax payers of Yoakum County, he should have reported all the tax fund salaries he received while he, by his own admission, campaigned almost full time since May. Gary Walker has not reported the campaign contributions of these misused tax funds," Jackson explained.

Walker, a Republican, is manager of the Sandy Land Underground Water District and the Yoakum County Landfill. His salaries come from Yoakum County taxes. In the water district's January newsletter announcing his candidacy for the Legislature the following statement appeared on the front page:

"Should Walker be elected in November 1994, he would serve in Austin in 1995 from January through May. Some extra help would be utilized within the District to assure that the needs of the people are met during that time. Representatives spend very little time in the interim and therefore Walker would be working as usual the remainder of the time."

The same board of directors that authorized Walker's candidacy recently forced the resignation of Brad Palmer, district vice president, because according to the Texas Water Code, Palmer could not serve on the district board and also serve on the school board in Plains. But it appears that the district board decided that manager Gary Walker could serve in all three tax paid jobs if he were elected to the Legislature.


Walker's opponent, Kevin Jackson, strongly disagreed. "As a conservative Democrat, who grew up here, I do not feel the people of District 80 will tolerate this proposed triple-dipping into tax funds to compromise and complicate the operations of three separate government entities," Jackson declared.

In his private law practice in Andrews, Kevin Jackson and his wife, Katrina, also a lawyer, represent the City of Andrews in it's legal matters, along with other clients. "But I realize that if I get elected to the Legislature I would have to resign this position because it would not be advisable, legal or ethical for me to keep both jobs. And I certainly have not used any fees or time from clients for my campaign," Jackson added.

"I'm convinced that when people find out about my opponent's intention to violate the very intent of so many laws governing conflict of interest and campaign funds, the voters of the district will strongly disapprove, and Gary Walker will be defeated in November.

"I do not consider serving in the Legislature as a part time, incidental occupation. It is a position of honor and trust in which I will work full time, and overtime to serve all the people of the ten counties in this district," Jackson promised.
