Crop Scouting Principles To Be Taught at Workshop

Training of scouts who survey crops to assess pest population densities in integrated pest management (IMP) programs across the area will be held in Plainview June 2 at the Ollie Liner Agricultural Center on South U. S. Highway 87 (Business 87).

The workshop is open to summer scouts of private consultants and aerial applicators as well as farmers who scout their own fields. It is conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Training begins at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 4:30 p.m.

It has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture for five continuing education units (CEUs) toward recertification requirements for private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators.

This year's workshop will provide instruction on scouting cotton and grains, identification of plant disease and nutrient deficiency symptoms, use of herbicides and safe handling of pesticides, said Dr. W. Pat Morrison, Extension Service entomologist at Lubbock.

IPM is a coordinated approach to management decisions which are based on pest populations and economic thresholds to effectively control weeds, insects and diseases and maximize net profit while creating minimal harm to the crop or environment.

Scouts examine fields in a systematic pattern at regular intervals each week. Producer treatments for bests are based on economic threat to the crop, presence of beneficial insects which are enemies of the pests, and proper timing of pesticide use for maximum returns with the lowest chemical input.

Topics for the workshop, and the instructors, all of whom are Extension Service specialists or pest management agents, are: CEU training and

instructions, Morrison; Principles of IPM and sampling, Mark Brown, Crosby-Floyd pest management agent, Crosbyton; Cotton growth and development, Dr. James R. Supak, agronomist and cotton specialist, Lubbock.

Thrips, fleahoppers and aphids, Dr. James Leser, entomologist, Lubbock; Bollworms, loopers and armyworms, Kerry Siders, Castro-Lamb pest management agent, Dimmitt; Beneficials, Brant Baugh, Bailey-Farmer pest management agent, Farwell.

Major diseases and symptoms, Dr. Harold Kaufman, plant pathologist, Lubbock; Plant nutrient deficiency symptoms, Dr. Michael Hickey, soil chemist, Lubbock; Herbicide injury and common weeds, Dr. Paul Baumann, agronomist, Lubbock; Corn and sorghum growth and development, Dr. Brent Bean, agronomist, Amarillo.

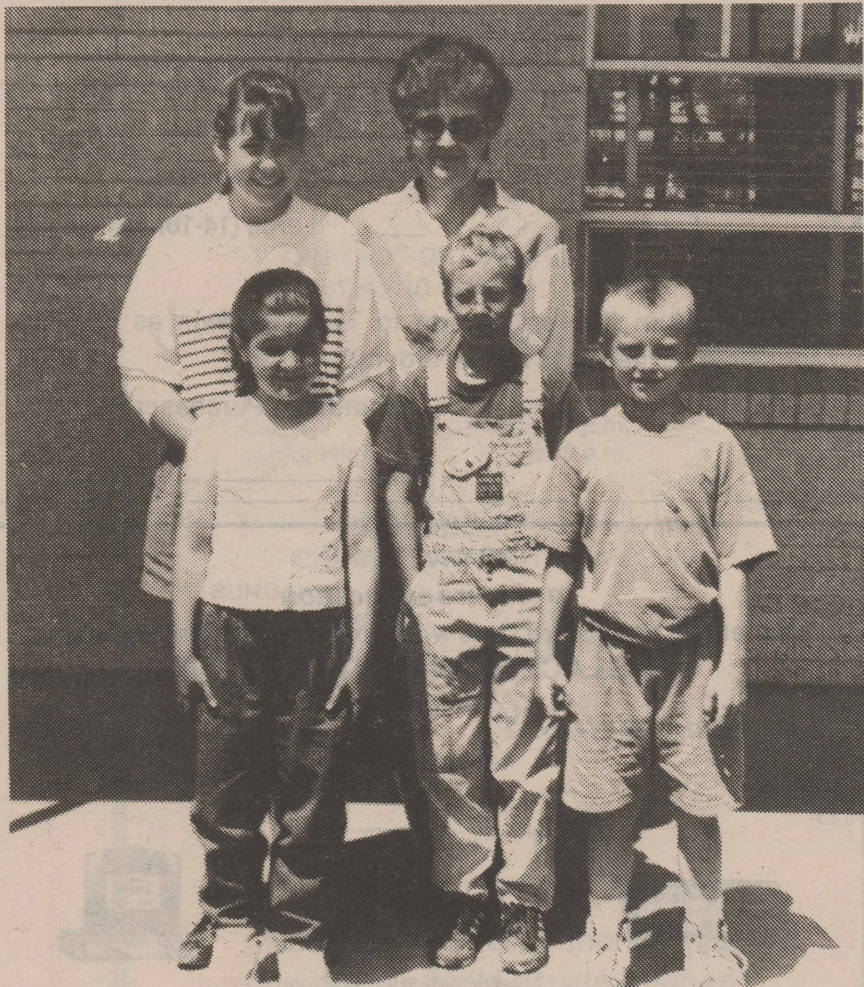

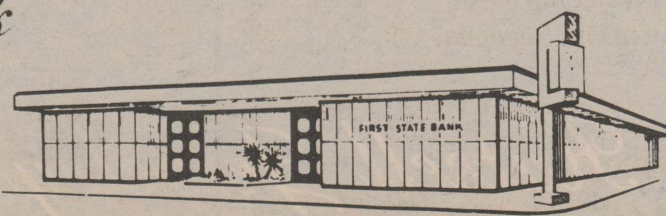

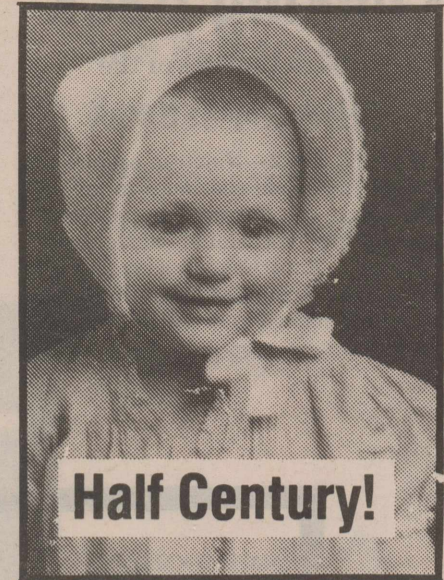

between elderly individuals who provide and receive help at the same time. Intergenerational programs can be very effective because of the exchange that occurs between the younger and older generation. Volunteer linking also has had a role in preventing isolation. In this program, the volunteer receives appropriate training and then maintains contact with the elderly through home visits and phone calls.

Personal and community interventions can help prevent elder isolation and self-neglect. Community efforts are important and need creative groups to take an active role in initiating ideas.

DO YOU DO YOUR PART?

May has been declared as "Elder and Disabled

Month," by Governor Ann Richards. In her proclamation, she states, "We can all benefit from the wisdom and knowledge acquired by the older generation of Texans."

Where would we be today without this older generation of Texans? They have definitely made a great impact on our lives. Too many times though, younger generations tend to separate themselves from the older generations. This can help to contribute to the isolation the older person may already be experiencing. In some circumstances, isolation may lead to self-neglect, which can be a form of elder abuse, when the conditions under which a person are living become life-threatening.

There are several intervention methods which have been used successfully with isolated elders. The first is to educate the elders about the changes they are experiencing and to assist them in strengthening their communication skills.

Enhancing ties within the community also can be an important intervention method used to keep the elderly involved. Mail carriers, utility meter

readers and clergy can be very helpful to the elderly by listening to them, assisting with errands and providing support.

Mutual help and self aid is another strategy that can be used to develop ties

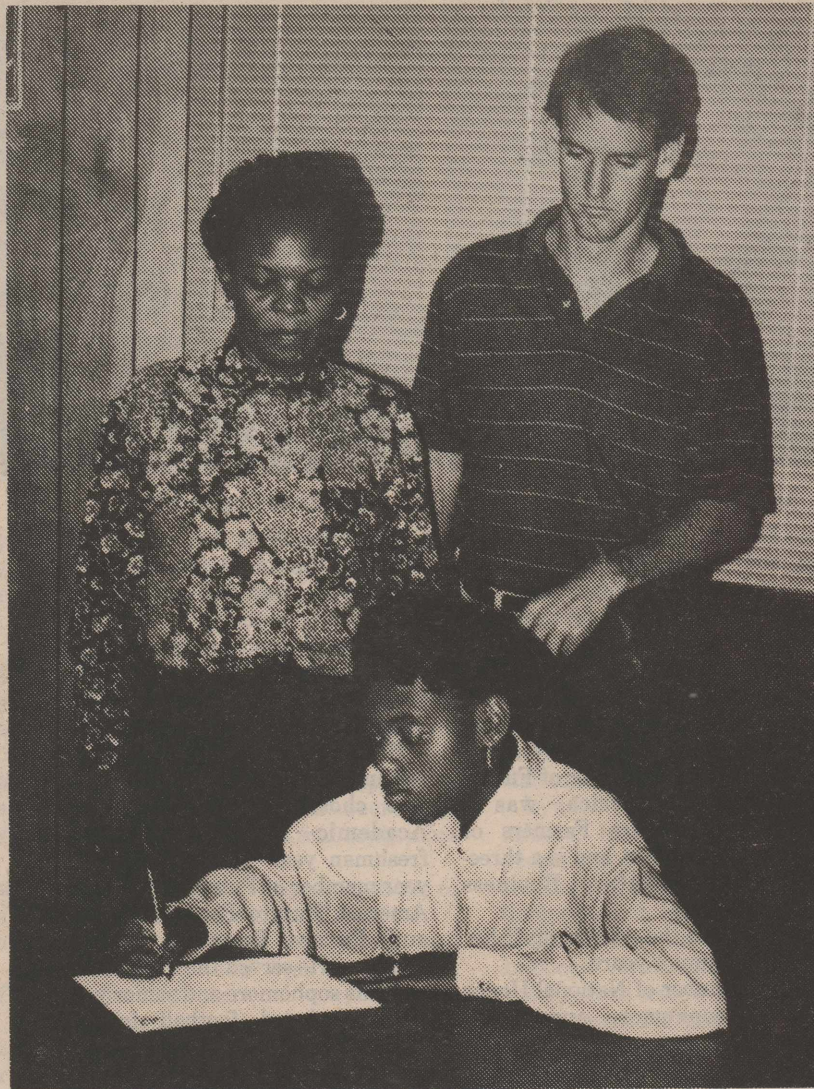
Soup Company Labels Provide Playground Balls

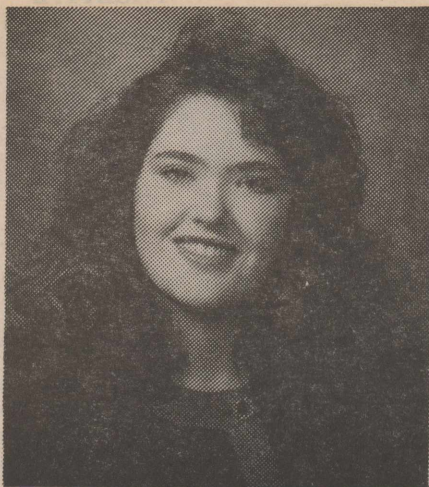

Amy worked on the Annual staff her sophomore and junior years.

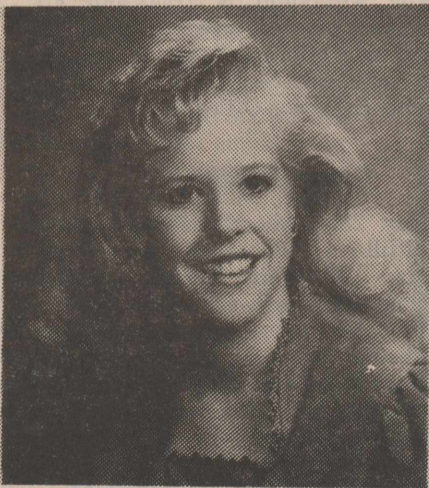
She was a member of National Honor Society her sophomore and junior years, was a two-year member of Pep Squad and served as the Pep Squad president.

The 1992-crop is off to a good start according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG). PCG officials estimate that as of today 70 percent of the High Plains crop will be planted. Planting of irrigated acreage is practically complete.

Producers in dryland areas are now either dry-planting their crop or waiting for a "planting" rain to come across their area. Scattered showers have fallen during the past few days and are expected to continue into the weekend.

"Underground moisture should be a big boost to the 1992 crop," says Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "With subsoil moisture well above normal the problem most dryland producers now encounter is a dry seedbed, ideally we need one to one and a half inches of rain to plant the rest of this crop. We've started crops on less but this would really get the crop started right."

According to Extension Cotton Specialist Dr. James Supak producer optimism is still high. "At this time producers who haven't planted their dryland acres aren't worried about running out of time," explains Supak. "As we get closer to May 20 most people waiting for a rain will probably dryplant and keep their fingers crossed."

PCG estimates that the High Plains will plant around 3.1 million acres of cotton in 1992. Planted acres in 1991 totaled 3.32 million. The estimated 220,000 acre reduction should closely mirror the additional five percent acreage set-aside for 1992.

Johnson notes that most of the acres not yet planted are in dryland

production and it is unlikely they will stay that way long. He explains that most producers in these areas have federal crop insurance and will plant prior to the planting deadline set for their county to qualify for insurance benefits should the crop not come up.

Dr. Supak says one of the biggest worries that area producers have is the relatively low supply of quality seed for replanting purposes. Seed quality from the 1991-crop was below normal and most producers have enough good seed to plant one time with little left over. Most are finding they don't have as much extra seed as they would like in case they need replanting. The varieties most likely to be in short supply are the shorter season varieties many producers like to use to increase their chances of maturing a late-planted crop.

Johnson adds that a big factor in the eventual size of the 1992 crop will be the ability of producers to take advantage of the subsoil moisture and get their stands established from one planting.

The last United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) estimate for the 1991 crop was released May 11. The estimate puts total production from districts 1-N and 1-S at 2.333 million bales. The counties included in these two districts make up the majority of the area commonly referred to as the High Plains.

Final USDA production numbers for 1991 will be released in June.

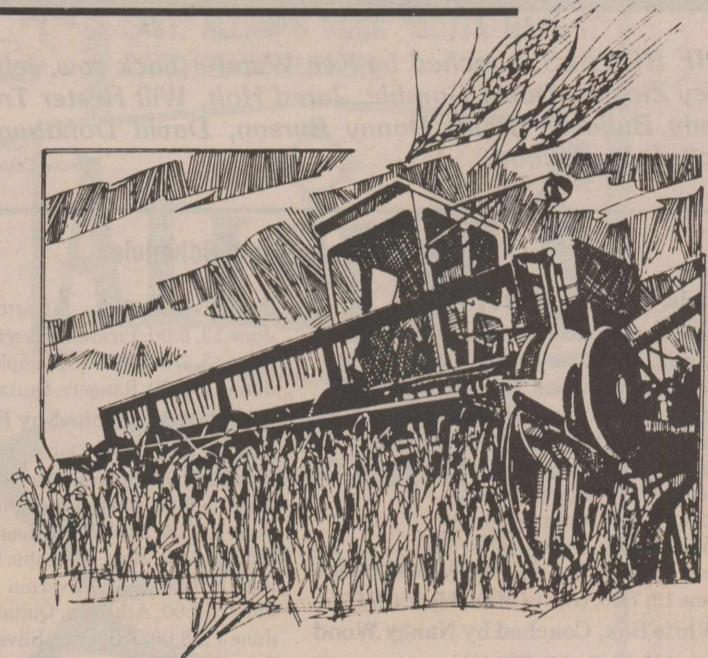

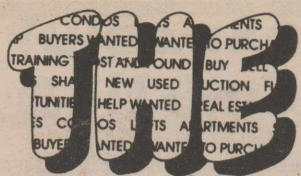


AFTER GRADUATION, LET'S ENROLL IN THE SCHOOL OF LIFE

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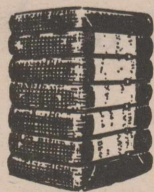
