RICHARD M. WILLIAMS

Funeral services for Richard M. Williams, 75, of College Station, Texas, were conducted at 10:00 a.m. May 25 at the A & M Church of Christ. Burial was in the Cartwright Cemetery, Montgomery, Texas. Mack Curry, assisted by O. C. Rampley, and Kenneth

Mr. Williams died at his home on Saturday morning, May 23, following a struggle with Parkinson's disease and finally cancer.

He was born in Ryan, Oklahoma, January 23, 1917, and had been married to his wife, Oulline, for 53 years. Before going into the ministry, he owned an oil well servicing company in Lefors.

Aggies will remember him as that friendly, good-looking cowboy at Mud Lot, where he worked until shortly before his death.

Others will remember him for his 35 years of Christian service as a minister of the gospel. Church of Christ congregations he served included Altus and Dill City in Oklahoma, and Silverton, Floydada, Snyder, Big Spring, Odessa and Chillicothe in Texas. His mission work included Sidney, Nebraska and Lincoln, Kansas.

He and his wife and their three children moved to Silverton in 1955 and remained until 1958. They ministered to the entire community after the 1957 tornado disaster. Silverton will remember him as the dynamic minister who was not afraid to preach the word "in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering . . ." II Tim. 4:2. He also convinced the Silverton congregation that it could erect a new Church of Christ building.

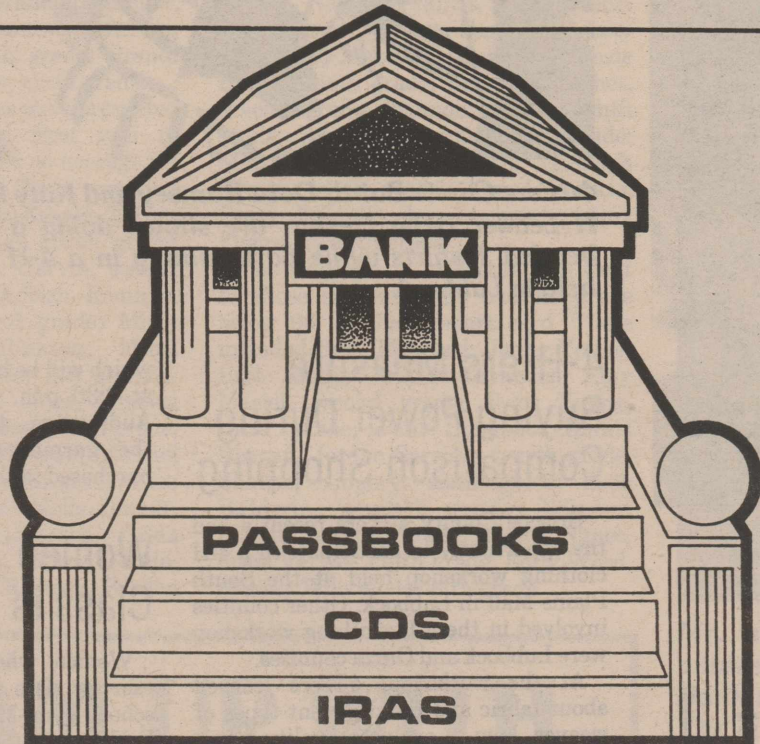

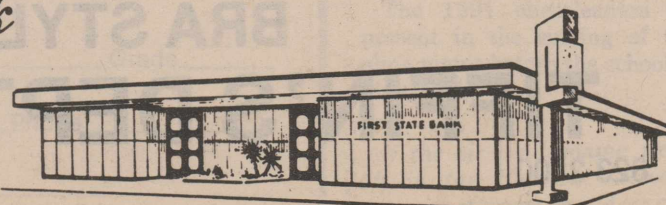

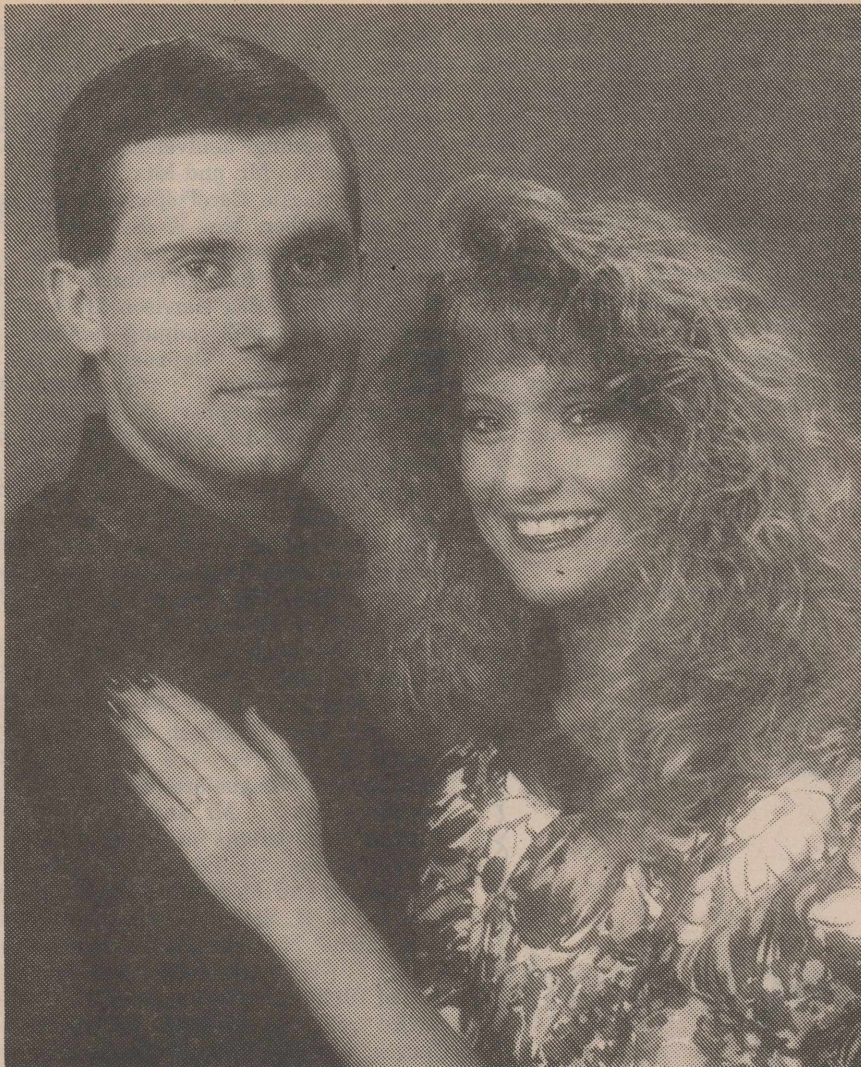

She is the granddaughter of Mary Dee Minyard, and is the niece of Emmett and Sandy Tomlin, all of Silverton.

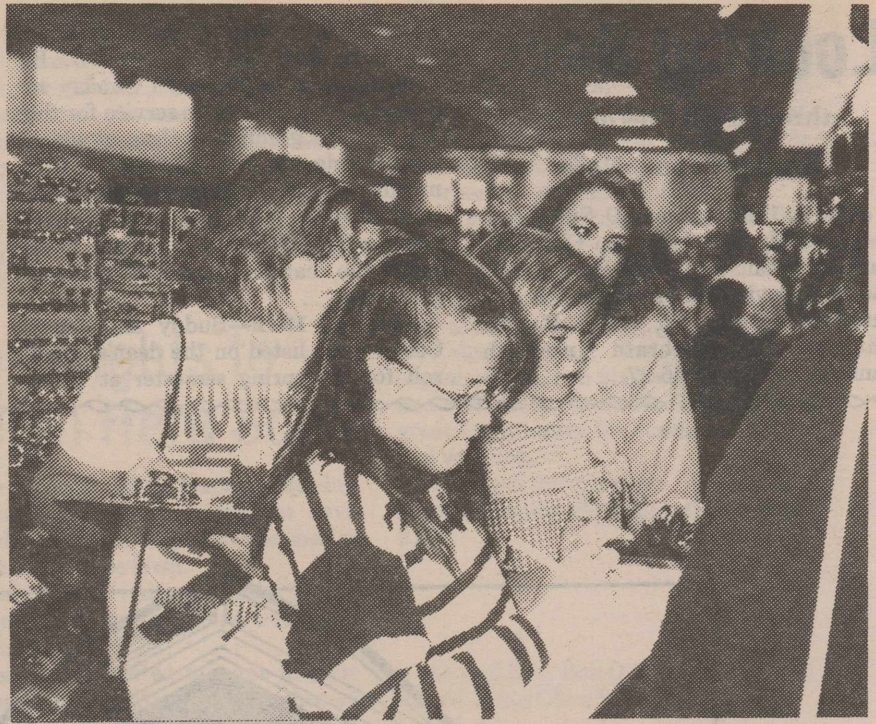
Ward Is Academy Award Designate

In addition to the drowning at the lake, another of the Palo Duro students who was at the lake that same day suffered two broken bones in her back and the last I heard was probably going to spend some time in a body cast. She

wasn't able to walk across the stage with her class to get her diploma.

After that incident, there was another in which the victim suffered a broken neck.

The water level is down a lot, and the jump from the cliff to the water is quite high now. Let's don't risk having any more serious accidents and tragedies involved with cliff jumping. Let's call a halt to it right now while we're ahead!

Sheriff Dick Roehr has brought to our attention that there recently have been a number of child abductions and attempted abductions in this area. They have taken place as near as Tulia and Bovina, and almost everyone is familiar with the Shawnlee Perry case at Earth.

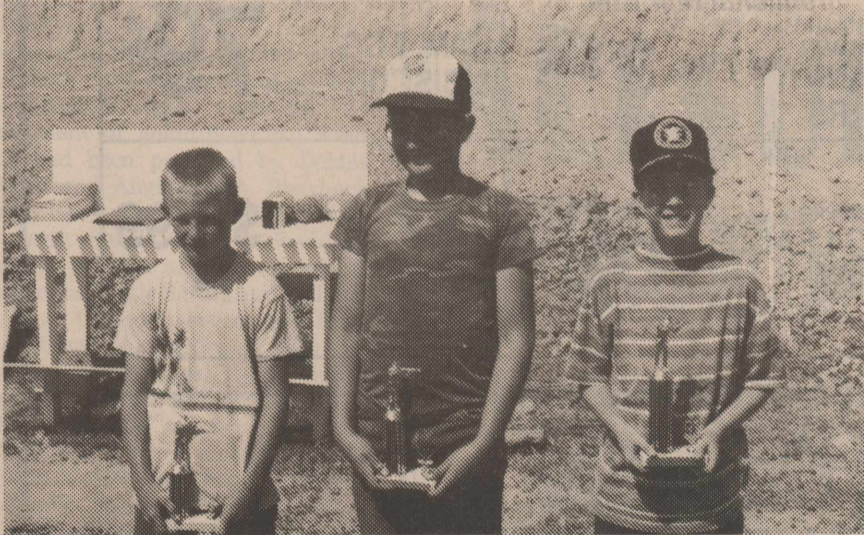

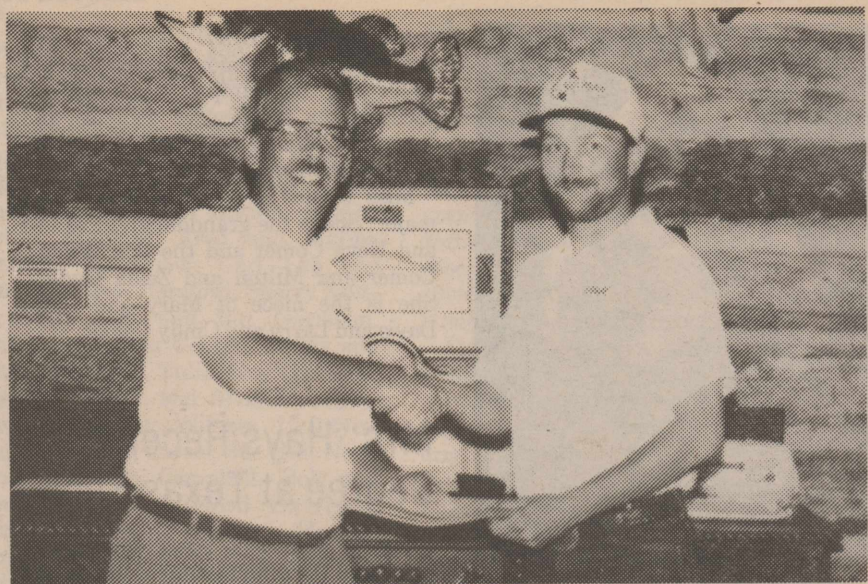

Weather Conditions Bad For Tiny Cotton Seedlings

The adverse weather and seedling diseases we have been having have been resulting in significant stand losses in cotton.

Injured stands which still have two to three healthy, evenly-spaced seedlings per foot of row are considered acceptable and capable of producing optimum yields. When damaged stands fall below this level or if the stand is skippy and some of the surviving plants are sickly, the best option is to replant if this occurs before cutoff date; however, we are past the cutoff date and this makes replant decisions much more difficult, if not impossible.

At this time, one to two evenly-spaced plants constitute an acceptable stand. Acceptable stands, and in most years even skippy stands, may produce higher yields and better quality lint than a perfect stand of late-planted cotton.

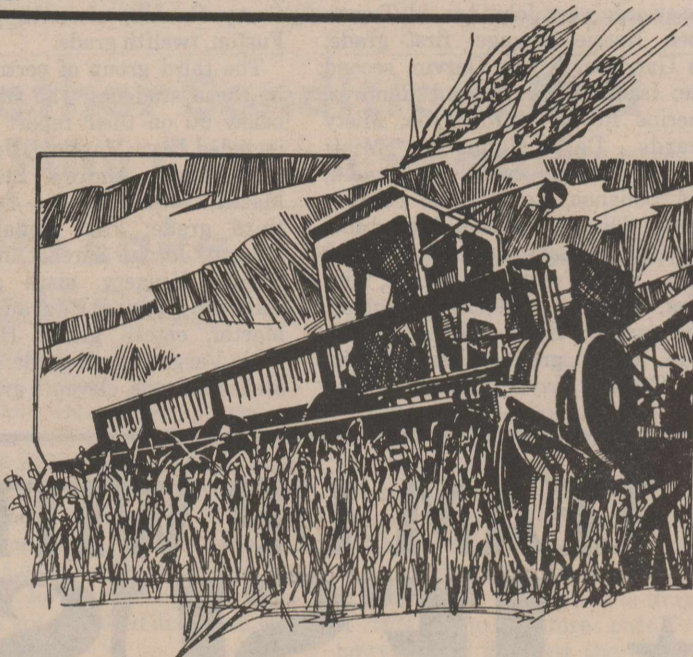
The gathering will begin about 7:00 p.m., and it will be over about 9:30 p.m. Bring a game to play if you wish.

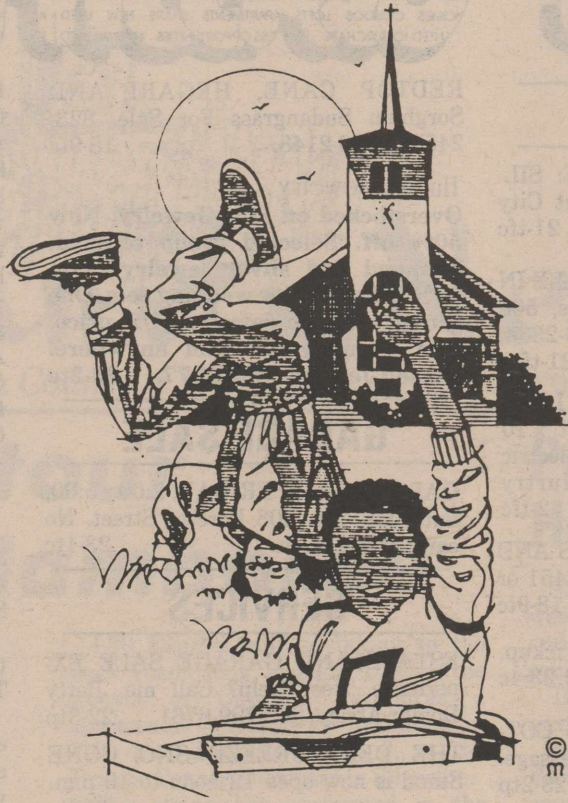

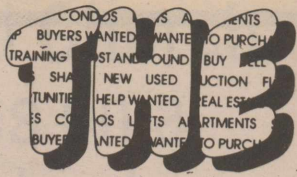


FAITH CONDUCTS A YEAR 'ROUND SCHOOL FOR CHILDREN

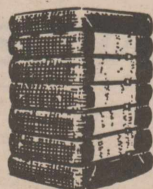

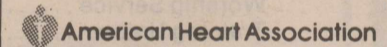
