Henry Lowrey White, 69, of Knox City died Wednesday, April 15, at his home in Knox City from complications resulting from a heart attack suffered on January 9, 1998.

Funeral services were held Friday, April 17, at 3:00 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church in Knox City with the Reverend Vergil Ichtertz officiating. Burial was in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. White was a third-generation Knox City resident. His grandfather, William White, opened White's General Store in 1906, when Knox City was founded. Henry's father, mother, sister and three children were all graduates of Knox City High

Henry was born on November 20, 1928, in Knox City to the late Henry and Myrtle White. He married his wife Anna on February 1, 1962, in Knox City. He graduated from Texas Tech University in

The rest of the varsity representatives were Nefro Gonzales, Michael Baez, Chris Garcia, and Kelly Estrada.


Results from the Junior Varsity Division were as follows:



Guilty pleas, indictments keep docket busy

Several pleas of guilty, including two for prison terms, as well as the presentation of eight new indictments kept the criminal docket moving in the 50th Judicial District Court over the past two weeks, according to District Attorney Bill Neal.

Luther Williams III, 18, of Seymour plead guilty to the State's Motion to Revoke his probation in the Baylor County District Court, and was sentenced to 10 years in prison with the provision that he be first sent to the prison's boot camp. Williams had previously plead guilty to conspiracy to commit burglary of a habitation and was placed on probation by Judge David Hajek on February 4, 1997. The State alleged that while on probation, he violated its terms by committing perjury while testifying in the jury trial of John Anthony Thomas, 23, of Seymour on January 14, 1998, who was convicted of conspiracy to commit burglary of a habitation and later sentenced by Judge Hajek to a 20-year prison sentence. Williams, while testifying on behalf of Thomas in that trial, denied his role in the attempted burglary and denied that Thomas had any part in it, thus contradicting earlier statements and testimony he had given. Williams was represented by Abilene attorney Kristen Fouts.

In the Knox County District Court, Kevin Dorsey, 20, of Knox City, plead guilty to the State's Motion to Revoke his probation, and was sentened to a two-year state jail sentence. He had previously been placed on probation when he plead guilty to a forgery indictment.

Charlie Juarez Jr., 42, of San Angelo, plead guilty in the Baylor County District Court to possession of less than a gram of cocaine and received a two-year state jail sentence, but probated for five years. However, he was ordered to pay a \$500.00 fine to the county, together with \$140.00 restitution to the Department of Public Safety laboratory for its drug test, plus court costs.

In King County, William Scott Nester, 29, of Austin plead guilty to a similar charge - possession of less than a gram of cocaine - and received a two-year state jail sentence but probated for two years. He also has to pay a \$500.00 fine, plus \$140.00 restitution to the Department of Public Safety laboratory and court costs. Nester was represented by Bill Wischkaemper, an attorney from Lubbock.

Grand Juries in Baylor, Knox and King Counties met and handed down eight indictments against seven individuals.

In King County, the Grand Jury indicted Hector Manuel Ruiz Marquez, 38, of Mexico for Failure to Stop and Render Aid. Marquez was driving a truck on the night of December 13, 1997 when he attempted to turn aound on the highway a few miles east of Guthrie. An automobile slammed into the truck bed, killing a passenger, Robert Quinteen Cole, 77, of Lorenzo. The automobile driver

and another passenger were also seriously injured. Marquez, who was not injured, fled the scene, but was arrested later that night near Aspermont.

A Baylor County Grand Jury re-indicted Julianne Dickson Decker, 33, of Munday on a three-count indictment for Endangering a Child.

In Knox County, the Grand Jury returned six indictments against five individuals, including Kelly Jane Garcia, 27, of Knox City, one indictment for Credit Card Abuse and one for Theft over \$1,500.00 but under \$20,000.00; Norma Jean Farias, 33, of Knox City for Theft over \$1,500.00 but under \$20,000.00; Alvin Adams Jr., 43, formerly of Munday, for Bail Jumping and failure to appear to answer a felony indictment; Christopher James Cotton, 26, of Wichita Falls, for Unauthorized Use of Motor Vehicle; and Jerry Carl Eaton, 41, of Knox City, an eight-count indictment for Aggravated Perjury. The latter indictment resulted from Eaton's sworn testimony during the 1997 jury trial of Payton Tankersley of Knox City for cattle theft. Tankersley was convicted by the jury of cattle theft and the jury assessed his punishment at a five-year prison sentence. Tankersleyis currently out on bond while his appeal from that conviction is pending.



TxDOT hosts public meeting in Benjamin

The Texas Department of Transportation hosted a public meeting on Monday, April 13, at 7:00 p.m. in the Benjamin City Hall to discuss the upcoming project for the rehabilitation of US 82 from Benjamin, east to FM 267 or approximately 7.1 miles.

The \$3.5 million project is set to let in March 1999 with construction efforts beginning June

1999. According to Gary Mizer, P.E., TxDOT Munday Area Engineer, the anticipated time line will be approximately 190 working days.

This project will be a Super 2 design. A Super 2 design consists of two lanes on one side of the centerline and one lane on the other side for approximately two miles and reversing the configu-

ration for the next two miles. This aids the traveling public in performing safe passing maneuvers and is less expersive to construct than a four lane undivided highway. Mizer stressed at this meeting that working with the public to minimize inconvenience and to ensure safety were his prime concerns in the completion of this project.


