Emergency Farm Loan Applications nowbeing accepted from Knox County farmers

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by drought temperature conditions which occurred from June 1, 1997 through July 8, 1998 and continuing, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Knox City, FSA Farm Loan Manager Bobby Cude said today.

Knox County is one of 252 counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Mr. Cude said farmers may be eligible for up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan

needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Cude said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance Program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until March 23, 1999, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create blockage in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season," Cude said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Knox City is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.







Dyess AFB schedules appreciation day

Big Country Appreciation Day, the annual Dyess' Air Show is Aug. 22. Gates open at 9 a.m. and flying activities will begin around 10 a.m., with aerobatics beginning at 11:30 a.m. The public is invited to Dyess for an up-close look at aircraft and to enjoy other activities ranging from a classic car show to live music.

Admission and parking are free, and food and beverages will be on



This year's featured aerial demonstrations this year include Dyess' own B-1Lancer bomber and C-130 Hercules airlifter. The B-1has thrilled crowds at the annual air show since 1985 when the first operational B-1, "The Spirit of Abilene," was delivered to Dyess. A low altitude, high speed pass will give spectators a close, although brief, look at the sleek, stealthy aircraft, whose silhouette is a familiar one around Abilene.

Two fighter demonstrations will highlight the military portion. of the program. There will be a special appearance by the Air Combat Command's F-15 Eagle fighter demonstration unit, along with a Navy FA-18 Hornet fighter. Static display highlights of current military aircraft will include


two F-16 Fighting Falcons and a C-5 Galaxy, America's largest cargo aircraft.

Appearing at Dyess for the first time will be the C-130J, the newest member of the Hercules family which features hundreds of improvements from previous models.

Returning to Dyess will be an eight-engine B-52 Stratofortress bomber and KC-135 tanker, which were for many years, a part of Dyess' combat team.

Additionally many historic aircraft will be on display, including a World War II era B-25 Mitchell bomber, made famous on the Doolittle raid on Tokyo, and the A-26 Invader which served from the 1940s to the 1970s.

Also set to attend are the classic training planes that taught a generation to fly. They'll include




the powerful Stearman biplane and Vultee BT-13, both common sights in Texas skies during the war years.

Two replica (made for the film "Tora, Tora, Tora") Japanese World War II aircraft, a "Zero" fighter and "Kate" bomber, will also be on display.

The Korean War-era will be represented by a Russian MiG-15 fighter and a TF-80 Shooting Star, America's first jet trainer.

Dave Dacy and Tony Kazian



will perform a daring wing-walking demonstration on their Super Stearman, and the Fina Pitts plane will perform a special aerobatics demonstration. There will also be a civilian general aviation fly-in. Private pilots are welcome to fly their planes to the base to take part in a aviation safety seminar at 9

For landing clearance or more information call Capt. Gary Howe at 696-5597. Ground displays include a classic car show and a military working dog demonstration by members of the 7th Security Forces Squadron. Also, "With Achovies," a popular Abilene band, which features several military members, will perform.

Visitors are encouraged to talk with air crew members at static display aircraft to get firsthand information about U.S. airpower and Dyess' role in the Air Force Global Power mission

North Texas Rehabilitation Center:

.....a place to give and receive


Five days a week, the doors open by 5:00 a.m. in preparation for the day ahead. By 7:00 a.m., clients begin to arrive and the stream of families remain steady until late afternoon. The children and adults who enter the doors of North Texas Rehabilitation Center do so because they are in the process of rebuilding their lives.

While some may be experiencing "minor" challenges (remembering that pain and distress are relative), many are facing major challenges - by anyone's standards. A stroke which leaves someone unable to speak or walk, an accident which leaves one in great pain and immobile, a serious illness or surgery which has sapped strength and endurance, or a birth defect which may or may not be overcome ... are the types of challenges which some 1500 children and adults face each year at the Center.

The emotions run deep. There is something in the human psyche which allows most of us a feeling of immunity - until "it" happens to us. Therefore, shock, fear, anger, and depression can develop quickly after a traumatic experience. But, other more powerful emotions often over-ride. When hope, faith and determination fill the head and heart, the recovery begins. Those strengths may need to endure for many months or even years, but they play a vital role in recovery.

In addition to the professional training which our licensed physical, occupational, speech language therapists and teachers receive, there appears to be an innate instinct in each to provide the emotional support and encouragement which their clients need. The emotional bond which develops between therapist and client is as apparent and necessary for healing as the practical and physical routines of therapy.

In addition to the clients who come to the Center for therapy,



there is a team of specialists who travel to ten counties, to the homes of babies whose ages range from birth to three. Developmental evaluations are provided any baby whose development has been questioned by a parent or physician. When needed, the specialized team, with the parents, develop a plan of therapy which will best accommodate the baby and the parents.

Many times, a developmental problem can be identified early and completely overcome within a matter of months. Other times, the prognosis is less than promising. But regardless of the prognosis, the team of professionals have some common goals. One is to help the parents understand the problem and learn how the family can best deal with the situation. The immediate goal is to provide the kinds of therapy that will best help the child.

As the traffic zooms past 1005 Midwestern Parkway and the car occupants glance at the large natural stone building which houses North Texas Rehabilitation Center, few realize the drama that unfolds each day behind those tall

sturdy walls. Routines in responsibilities, appointments, and therapy modalities are carried out each day - but the real stories lie in the lives of those persons who come to the Center for care.

It is here where they work toward their dreams of recovery. It is here where they find people who let them know that someone really cares about their circumstances, and will guide them back to their highest level of function-

In addition to the families who know the priceless value of the Center, there are hundreds of volunteers and thousands of donors who also ~understand. They respond to fund raisers throughout the year to help pay for the exceptional care which families receive. One such fund raiser is the Rehab Auction which will be held this month.

"The Auction," which represents some eleven cattle auctions, a TV auction, a silent auction and a large verbal auction, allows this entire Texoma community an opportunity to be a part of this very effective mission.

When I move my head from side to side I hear my neck "crack." It doesn't hurt but it is loud. Should I be worried by this?

The sound you are hearing is called "cavitation." This is caused by gasses in the fluid between joints being released by a sudden change in pressure on the fluid. This can occur naturally and be of no concern, as it does when you receive a chiropractic adjustment. However, excessive popping of joints can also be a sign of a problem which may need attention. help identify problems such as fractures (which can occur with even minor trauma), cancer, congenital problems, and spinal curvature. Chiropractors are careful to order only X-rays that relate to the cause of the patient's pain.

My chiropractor has recommended acupuncture for a muscle problem. Can chiropractors perform acupuncture?

Chiropractors have been performing acupuncture for over 25 years (long before it became widely used in the U.S.) In addition to college prerequisites and four years of chiropractic college, chiropractors using acupuncture undergo extensive

training in this area of specialization. A doctor of chiropractic will often suggest alternative therapies after determining the cause of a problem and whether a therapy will treat it. Ask your doctor to discuss their training in acupuncture with you and you will find a great body of knowledge to support the doctor's recommendation of acupunc-
