FSA launches hay network to aid distressed farmers

The

John Rector, County Executive Director of the Knox County Farm Service Agency, announced August 17 a new effort to match farmers and ranchers suffering from hay shortages with producers having hay surpluses.

"Some areas have surpluses, and some have severe shortages," Rector said. "This is a new way to get producers in both situations in touch with each other."

Hay Net is a national clearing-house for producers with shortages or surpluses of hay.

Farmers and ranchers are encouraged to sign up and register their hay situation at their local FSA office. FSA will use its nationwide computer network to share the information.

Producers in need of hay will be provided with lots of the closest producers with hay to spare, and vice versa, allowing them to contact each other and make arrangements.

"I'm pleased to be a part of this effort," Rector said. "It's a tool for getting badly needed hay to people who need it as quickly and efficiently as possible. The more people sign up, the better the system will work."

Hay Net will remain in operation for six months. Further information on Hay Net is available at the Knox County FSA Office, phone 940-658-3537.

First day enrollment figures for the Knox City-O'Brien CISD have been released and the total of 363 students is down slightly from last year's first day total of 370.


High school has 112 students enrolled with 35 freshmen, 36 sophomores, 22 juniors and 18 seniors.

Leon Ward honored at Thursday benefit dinner

Longtime Knox City resident Leon Ward was honored Thursday night of last week with an appreciation benefit dinner, sponsored by the Knox City Chamber of Commerce. A long time resident of Knox City, Mr. Ward moved here from Nacogdoches County and has lived here since 1946, totaling 52 years. He was saved in 1947 and started ministering about three

years later.

August, '98 Sales tax rebate for Knox City takes dramatic 20.72% drop from August, '97

While smaller communities all over the State of Texas are trying to find new ways to create economic development and promote economic growth, some received a drop in the much needed state sales tax rebate delivered each month and placed back into general funds for use by community governments.

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered \$255.8 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,094 Texas cities and 118 counties, including a check of \$17,144.26 to Knox City. The rebate to Knox City reflects a decrease of 20.72% from a rebate check of \$21,627.01 for the same period in 1997. Knox City collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax, with a full 1.000% of the tax directed towards EDC funding.

Texas cities received \$235.6 million, 12.7 percent higher than payments of \$209 million at this same time one year ago. Counties received a total of 20.2 million in rebates, 8.6 percent above the \$13.6 million in allocations for the same period in 1997.

The checks delivered this month are for sales taxes collected

in June and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in July.

For other Knox County cities, Benjamin received \$789.53, a 4.00% decrease from \$822.51 for the same period a year ago. Goree received \$707.66, up 6.18% from a payment of \$666.42 last year at the same time. Munday received \$11,942.63, up 26.53% from a payment of \$9,437.87 in 1997 at the same time. Munday collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax, with Benjamin and Goree collecting a 1.000% sales tax.

In Haskell County, Haskell received \$38,230.22, up 17.09% from a payment of \$32,648.92 in 1997. Haskell collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax. O'Brien received \$283.80 this period, down 24.07% from a payment of \$373.80 a year ago. Rochester received \$1,986.56, up 33.01% form a payment of \$1,493.54 during the same period last year.

In Jones County, Stamford received a payment of \$54,161.65, up 5.26% from a payment of \$51,452.60 in 1997. Anson received \$18,667.16, up 0.53% from a payment of \$18,567.62 last year. Hamlin received a check of \$22,456.02, down 1.55% from \$22,810.75 in 1997. Stamford, Anson and Hamlin all collect a 2% rate of sales tax.

In Baylor County, the city of Seymour received a payment of \$18,892.81,up 3.08% from a payment of \$18,328.05 in 1997. Seymour collects a 1.000 rate of sales tax.

In Foard County, Crowell received a payment of \$7,044.51, up 2.61% from a payment of \$6,864.97 in 1997. Crowell collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax.

In Dickens County, Dickens received \$2,913.85, up 47.56% from a payment of \$1,974.60 in 1997. Spur received a payment of \$4,991.47, up 11.94% from a 1997 payment of \$4,458.70. Dickens collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax, while Spur collects a 1% rate.

In Cottle County, Paducah received a payment of \$7,697.09, up 50.59% from a payment of \$5,111.03 in 1997. Paducah collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax.




