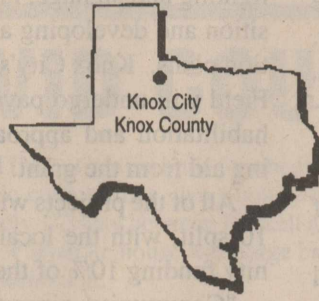

Greyhounds win home opener 28-0

The Knox City Greyhounds gave the home town crowd a lot to cheer about in their home opener last Friday night in Greyhound Stadium. Hosting the Bryson Cowboys, the Greyhounds drove the length of the field to score on both of their first two possessions, taking a 14-0 lead in the first quarter.

The defense took over early and managed to keep the Cowboys off balance all night. When Bryson did manage to threaten, the Knox City Greyhound defense stiffened to turn them away.

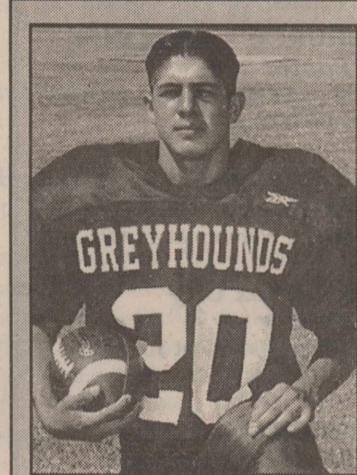
Bryson's strongest bid for the goal line did not come until late in the fourth quarter after they were down 28-0.

Michael Baez led all rushers with 153 yards and 3 touchdowns, while Brandon Gutierrez rushed for 98 yards and 1 touchdown.

Collectively, the Knox City Greyhounds rushed for over 300 yards.

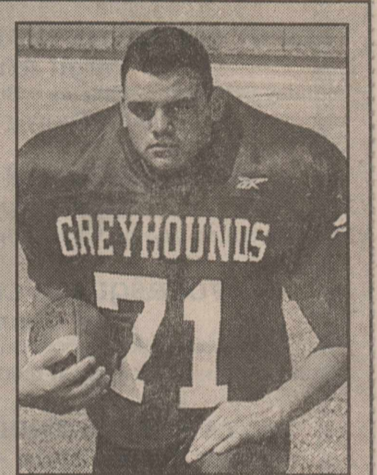
Defensively, Brandon Gutierrez had a big night with 3 interceptions and 1 knocked down pass, while Michael Baez added 1 more interception.

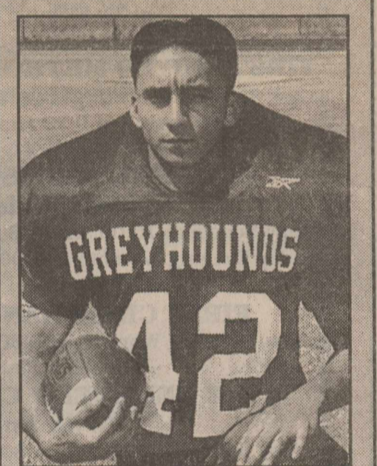

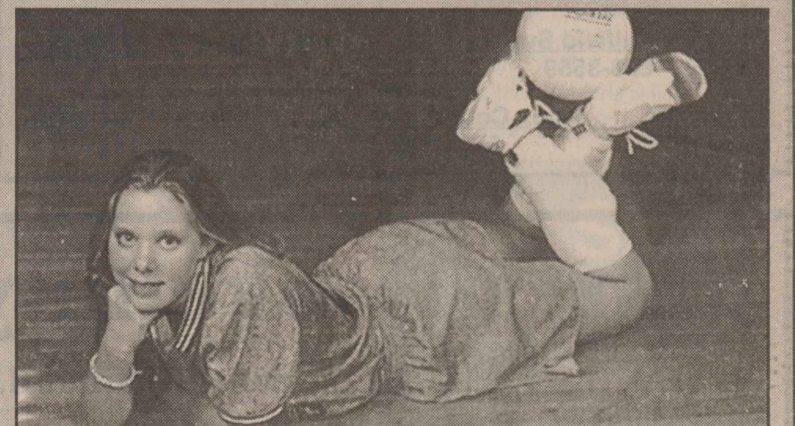

State approves grant for Harrison Field improvements

Over \$6 million in funding for local airport improvements across the state was approved last week by the Texas Transportation Commission, including work totalling

\$150,000.00 to Harrison Field, Knox City's airport.

The commission approved the disbursement of \$6.2 million from the Aviation Facilities Grant Pro-

gram to be divided among 40 community airports across the state.

Attention local golf cart owners:

The Texas Department of Public Safety has asked The Knox County News to publish the following information with regards to golf carts being driven on city streets:

Under Texas law, Transportation Code #502.284, (a) an owner of a golf cart driven to and from a golf course is not required to register the cart if: (1) the operation of the golf cart occurs in the daytime, as defined by Sec. 541.401; and (2) the operation (a) does not exceed a distance of two miles from the point of origin to the destination (golf course); or

(b) occurs entirely within a master planned community with a uniform set of restrictive covenants that has had a plat approved by a county or a municipality.

In plain english, the above law means that the operation of a golf course on city streets in Knox City is illegal for any reason other than going to and from a golf course during daylight hours. The

operation of golf carts to go to and from other locations within the community is not legal. Broken down in terms that everyone should be able to understand, this means that those persons operating a golf cart in any way other than to and from the golf course, are violating Texas state law. That includes those who run back and forth to the store, and those who allow children to use golf carts as a means of transportation or recreation, and also families who drive their golf carts around town while loaded down with children.

DPS Troopers are wanting this information to be published because they are becoming increasingly concerned about the number of golf carts being operated on the streets illegally and the possibility of accidents with serious injuries if a golf cart should collide with a motor vehicle. The troopers are asking for your voluntary compliance with the laws regarding the operation of golf carts on city streets.

use the funding to cover the cost of expansion for new facilities. Other project funding will go toward adding runway/taxiway lighting and signage, land acquisition and developing airport action plans. Knox City's Harrison Field will undergo pavement rehabilitation and approach lighting aid from the grant.

All of the projects will be a 90/10 split, with the local community funding 10% of the cost.

"Community airports play a crucial role by providing air transportation access to all areas of our state. The local airport serves as the front door to a community," said David Fulton, Aviation Director for the Texas Department of Transportation. He also goes on to say "It is extremely important to continue to improve and maintain these airports as they are a vital element of the state's overall transportation system, and to each community's economic development efforts."

Services for Mondell Mills, 72, of Crosbyton were held Sunday afternoon, September 13, at three o'clock in the First United Methodist Church in Crosbyton. The Rev. Beth Harrington of Farwell officiated and burial was in the Crosbyton Cemetery.

Mr. Mills died Thursday, September 10, at St. Mary Hospital in Lubbock.

Born September 18, 1925, in Knox County, he married Mary Logan on November 2, 1943, in Anson. She preceded him in death on December 1, 1994.

He was a member of the Crosbyton First United Methodist Church. He was a former gin manager and feed yard manager

at Lockney and Littlefield and was the manager of the American Cotton Growers Gin in Crosbyton until retiring. Mr. Mills was a member of Crosbyton Masonic Lodge and he served in the United States Army during World War II. He moved to Crosbyton from Littlefield in 1978.

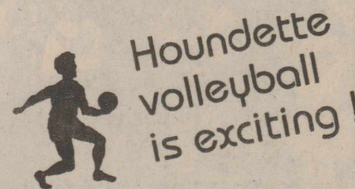
The American Heart Association met in regular session September 8 at the Knox County Aging Services.

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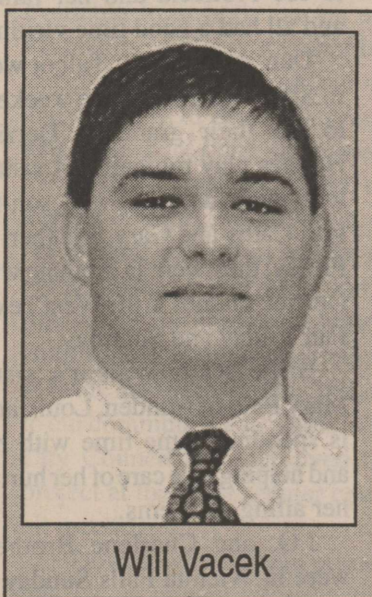

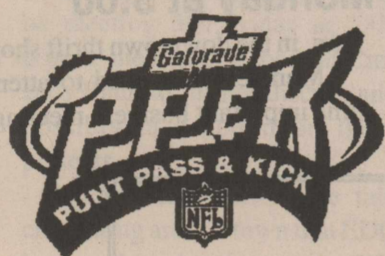

The Knox City Greyhounds played well defensively.

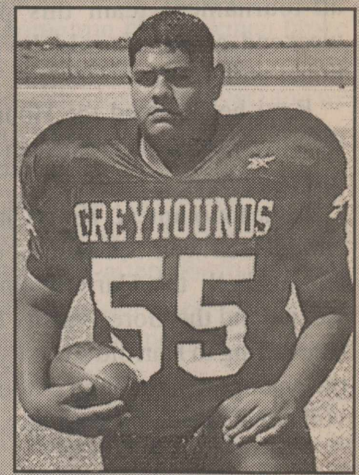

The 4-A board of Knox City's Economic Development Corporation has been very busy the last several months as various ongoing projects seem to be coming together at the same time.

Your right to know

This week, it was suggested that EDC projects be made public record. In response to that suggestion, EDC wants each and every resident of Knox City to know that all EDC records are open to the public and a copy of all EDC meeting minutes are on file at City Hall for anyone to look at. Nothing that EDC does is considered "secret" as the board works hard to represent the best interest of the community. All meetings are posted in advance as required by law, and the meetings are also open to the public. EDC operates under the same guidelines as the City Council as far as open meetings and records, then it is up to the City Council to give final approval on all EDC projects.

Ongoing projects

• Yes, EDC has been working hard to bring a new variety store to our community. Talks are currently underway with a national chain, and things look very good for a store to be open in the old Perry's building sometime after the first of the year. There is not much more information available on that project right now because we are in the process of completing several steps that are required by the company before final approval is given. You can be assured that as soon as we have the "green light" from the company to release all the information, we will do so. This could very well be the most important project that

EDC has undertaken to date. The project will require an expenditure of EDC funds for property renovation. All funds needed are available from both the 4A and 4B boards. Coming together in a rare joint meeting, both the 4A and the 4B EDC Boards have met and agreed to fund the project. Since EDC currently owns the Perry's building, funds spent on the renovation project will be recouped over a specified period of time when the property is leased. Both boards are in full agreement as to the importance of this project to our community as a whole. The City Council also approved the project at their last regular council meeting.

• Downtown business properties are an ongoing project with EDC. A major goal of the board is to promote new business while supporting existing business in Knox City. We currently have three interested business prospects wanting to move into the downtown area, or relocate an existing business to the downtown area. These projects will require renovation of buildings currently owned by EDC. The board will be meeting this Friday at 1:00 p.m. in the meeting room at Citizens Bank to further discuss and possibly take action on these projects.

• There has been some talk circulating around town that EDC has purchased and owns the J.C.

Eaton property on the Northeast corner of Main and Central in the downtown area. There is no truth to those rumors. On behalf of the 4A board, Project Coordinator Dave Thompson has had repeated discussions with Mr. Eaton about the property, but no action has been taken.

• EDC is not in the business of just buying up older property. Any properties that are purchased by EDC are done so in hopes of getting the property back on the tax roles as viable, productive businesses. If an old, unused or abandoned property can be turned back into a productive business that pays taxes and contributes to the community, then the end result goal of EDC has been satisfied. By taking on these projects now, EDC is trying to improve the business climate of Knox City as we look towards the future.

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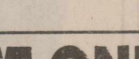
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Benjamin news

Texas quail numbers suffer due to drought

COLLEGE STATION - While folks complain about the heat, cost of watering a yard or expected crop losses likely from this year's drought, another impact is being felt by perhaps less noticeable victims - Texas quail.

Dry conditions translate into no hatch, no shelter and no food for the popular Texas bird, according to wildlife specialists at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Lack of moisture causes three detriments to quail - a lack of protective nesting sites, not enough moisture in the air for incubating eggs, and a lack of food to raise the babies.

Dr. Don Steinbach, Extension Service wildlife specialist in College Station, said the animals are hurting, but the reduced numbers will not likely cause a drop in hunting fees because hunters tend to continue leasing places on a continual basis.

'Jiminy' -- crickets hop in force across state

COLLEGE STATION - Crickets have invaded Texas due to the unrelenting hot and dry weather.

"They're great for fish bait and food for birds, but that's about it," said Dr. Cliff Hoelscher, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Crickets can damage ornamental and garden plants. Inside homes and other buildings, they not only keep you awake with their chirruping, but can feed on fabrics, especially clothing stained with perspiration or food.

Hoelscher suggested cleaning yard and garden areas to reduce cricket feeding and breeding sites.

Turning off outside lights at night also helps keep crickets away from buildings. Make sure all screens and doors fit tightly to keep the pests out of the home.

Sevin is the cheapest and best insecticide to use on crickets if they become a nuisance, Hoelscher said.

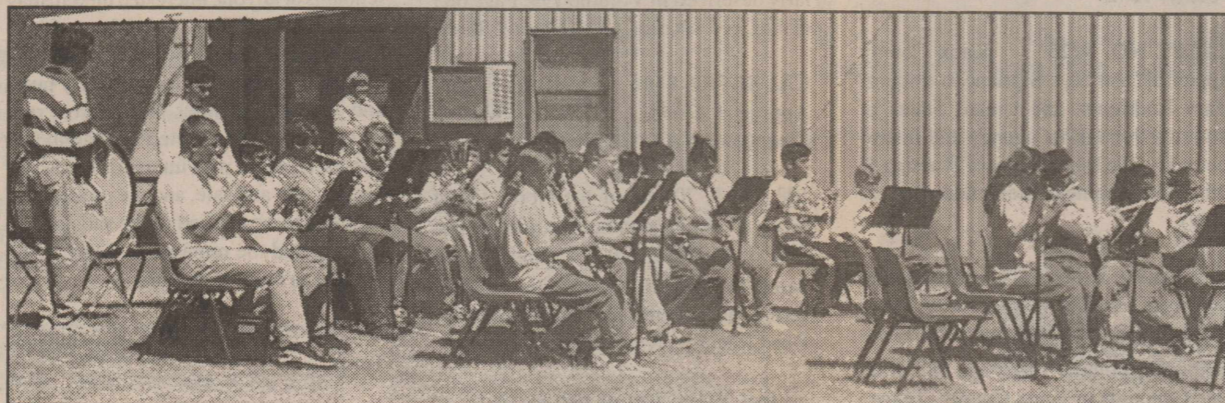
