Greyhounds disappointed by Roby

The Greyhounds had a disappointing night against the Roby Lions. Knox City played well the first quarter and most of the second quarter. In fact, their first possession began with a good kickoff return, followed by a drive which stalled inside the 30 yard line. However, the wind plagued them heavily in the first quarter, allowing Roby to regain field position via wind aided punts.

Roby managed to get a big play to set up a touchdown. Following a Greyhound punt, the Lions scored another touchdown to go to half time up 14-0 on the

Knox City's first two possessions of the third quarter ended with wind blown punts that gave the Lions good field position, and Roby took advantage of it to advance the score 25-0.

The Greyhounds then took charge for a while and mounted a nice drive that ended in a touchdown pass from Nefro Gonzales to Aaron Large, followed by a pass from Gonzales to Myles Richardson for the point after to make the score 25-8.

With things looking like the Greyhounds were on track to make a comeback, Knox City tried an

on side kick that the Lions returned for a touchdown on a play that was rather a fluke. Then came a couple of interceptions which set up Roby scores and things just seemed to snowball for the Knox City Greyhounds.

Although the game was not as the Greyhounds would have hoped for, the team did play well at times and the final score of 52-15 is not an indication of the effort put forth by our Knox City team. The Greyhounds are prepared to rebound against the Petrolia Pirates this Friday night as Knox City holds Homecoming this week. The kickoff is set for 8:00 p.m.

Shaver sets 15th McMurry record

Faye Shaver's grandson is university's all-time leader in passing yardage

McMurry quarterback Braxton Shaver added his name to the school's record book one more time when the Indians got a convincing non-conference win Sat-

Shaver became McMurry's alltime leader in passing yardage as the Tribe romped to a 55-26 victory over Oklahoma Panhandle State University at Indian Stadium.

Shaver, a junior from Haltom City, passed for 160 yards - - 128 before halftime - - and now has a career total of 4,441 yards. The old mark was 4,281 yards by Kurt Ashmore, who played for the Indians from 1984-87.

It marks the 15th school record Shaver has set in his career at McMurry.


"I guess it's good to have because it reflects on how the whole offense moves the ball," Shaver said. He completed 15 of 25 passes with no interceptions. "It's hard to get linemen noted for some of that stuff, but you can't break records without those guys up front."

Shaver connected with seven different receivers, with none having more than four catches.

In Saturday's game the Indians scored the first time they had the ball, including five times in the first half. McMurry got three touchdowns in the opening quarter and led 28-0 almost midway through the second quarter on the way to its second straight win.

September, '98 Sales tax rebate for Knox City up 6.22% from September, '97 State Comptroller John Sharp for the same period a year ago.

delivered \$180.5 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,092 Texas cities and 118 counties, including a check of \$12,051.65 to Knox City. The rebate to Knox City reflects an increase of 6.22% from a rebate check of \$11,345.73 for the same period in 1997. Knox City collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax, with a full 1.000% of the tax directed towards Economic Development (EDC) funding.

Texas cities received \$164.7 million, 4.5 percent higher than payments of \$157.6 million at this same time one year ago. Counties received a total of 15.8 million in rebates, 4.6 percent above the \$15.1 million in allocations for the same period in 1997.

The checks delivered this month are for sales taxes collected in July and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in August.

For other Knox County cities, Benjamin received \$195.40, a 480.85% increase from \$33.64 Goree received \$348.60, down 13.02% from a payment of \$400.79 last year at the same time. Munday received \$5,501.79, down 18.95% from a payment of \$6,788.59 in 1997 at the same time. Munday collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax, with Benjamin and Goree collecting a 1.000% sales tax.

In Haskell County, Haskell received \$23,952.91, up 1.28% from a payment of \$23,648.19 in 1997. Haskell collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax. O'Brien received \$70.32 this period, down 30.76% from a payment of \$101.57 a year ago. Rochester received \$640.67, up 41.18% form a payment of \$453.78 during the same period last year.

In Jones County, Stamford received a payment of \$38,111.46, down 9.97% from a payment of \$42,334.81 in 1997. Anson received \$9,525.82, down 9.11% from a payment of \$10,481.41 last year. Hamlin received a check of \$11,747.37, down 21.35% from \$14,936.38 in 1997. Stamford, Anson and Hamlin all collect a 2% rate of sales tax.

In Baylor County, the city of Seymour received a payment of \$11,759.97, down 18.35% from a payment of \$14,403.81 in 1997; Seymour collects a 1.000 rate of

In Foard County, Crowell received a payment of \$3,483.64, up 20.15% from a payment of \$2,899.19 in 1997. Crowell collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax.

In Dickens County, Dickens received \$1,945.49, down 23.06% from a payment of \$2,528.83 in 1997. Spur received a payment of \$3,098.93, down 9.80% from a 1997 payment of \$3,435.65. Dickens collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax, while Spur collects a 1% rate.

In Cottle County, Paducah received a payment of \$4,115.07, up 31.56% from a payment of \$3,127.71 in 1997. Paducah collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax.

The goats will be ear tagged and the tag number and exhibitor's name will be recorded. The market lambs will be ear tagged, have a tattoo placed in their ear and will have a nose print taken for the

Cost for validation will be three dollars for the sheep and the goats will not be charged a fee. The ear tags to be used on the goats have been donated by Hi-Pro. The ear tags to be used on the sheep were specifically designed for a state wide sheep validation. The cost of these tags, plus the cost of the tattoo ink and nose printing supplies were used to determine the three dollar charge.






The Lady Stangs beat such schools as Haskell, Archer City, Throckmorton and Crowell.
