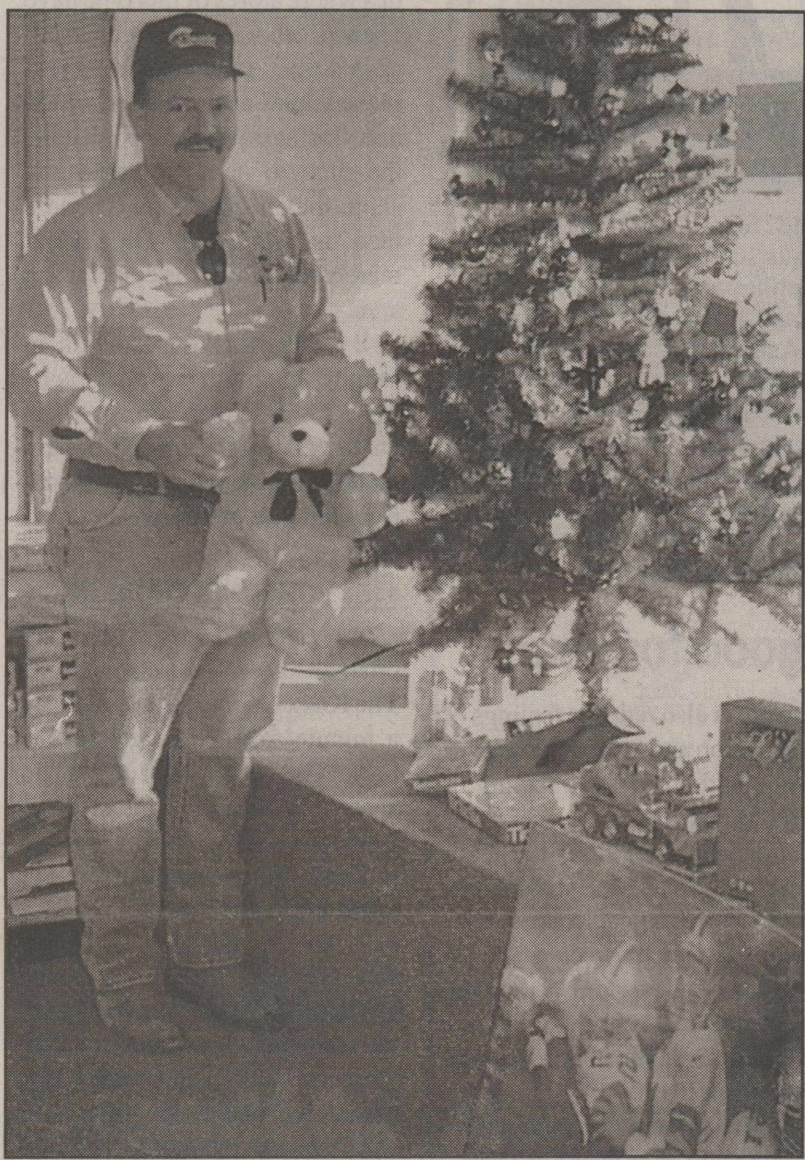

'Magic of Christmas' set for December 12 in Knoxville

Chamber's annual Christmas Parade will begin at 2:00 p.m.

Everyone in Knoxville and the surrounding area is encouraged to bring new, unwrapped toys by and place them under the tree between now and the Christmas parade on December 12.

Saturday, December 12 is the date, and the 'Magic of Christmas' is the theme for Knoxville's annual Christmas Parade. Sponsored and organized by the Knoxville Chamber of Commerce, the parade is set to begin at 2:00 p.m. and travel the same route as in previous years.

All parade entrants are requested to line up around 1:00 p.m. in the parking lot on the South side of Knoxville High School and Elementary School. From there, the parade will travel West to North Central, then turn South to Main Street, back East on Main, before ending up back at the school parking lot.

Categories of parade entries will be floats, decorated vehicles, and walkers - bicycles, etc. In the

float division, 1st place will win a \$50 gift certificate, 2nd place will win a \$25 gift certificate, and 3rd place will win a \$15 gift certificate. For decorated vehicles, 1st place will win a \$25 gift certificate, 2nd place will win a \$20 gift certificate, and 3rd place will be awarded a \$15 gift certificate. In the category of walkers - Bicycles, etc., 1st place will win a \$15 gift certificate, 2nd place will win a \$10 gift certificate, and 3rd place will win a \$3 gift certificate.

The Chamber of Commerce asks all parade entrants to observe a few rules to help insure a fun, and safe parade:

1.) No Santas on any parade entries - The Chamber has already arranged for Santa Clause to make a special entry into Knoxville

City for the event.

2.) Remember safety at all times. All entrants are urged to stay in the parade route and to be observant of children along the parade route.

3.) Line up at 1:00 p.m. on the High School parking lot.

4.) The entry fee for every entry is either a brand new, unwrapped toy, or a \$5 donation to the Knoxville Child Welfare Board.

The Knoxville Chamber of Commerce has invited other chamber officials from neighboring towns to serve as judges for the parade. Virgel Ichtzert, Pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Knoxville, will once again serve as Master of Ceremonies and announce the parade.

This year he will be able to utilize the new outdoor sound system recently purchased by the Chamber.



The Chamber of Commerce has mailed parade entry forms to all local businesses, and chamber officials urge every church, club, organization or group throughout Knoxville and the surrounding area to put together a float and come have fun in the parade.

Entry forms for the 1998 Knoxville Christmas Parade with the theme: 'The Magic of Christmas' are available at the Chamber of Commerce office, and should be returned to Chamber Manager Doris Crownover.

The true meaning of the Thanksgiving and Christmas season

Editor's Note: As most of us are recovering from eating too much at Thanksgiving and looking ahead to Christmas, we know that we are in that special time of the year that everyone enjoys so much. While many recalled just how much they had to be thankful for at Thanksgiving, I am sure that there are others who just enjoyed the day just because it was a holiday. The same goes for Christmas. Some truly celebrate the birth of Christ, but so many others just get caught up in the commercialism of the season and what they expect to receive in the way of presents.

In the middle of all this are the few among us who have experienced a miracle in their lives, thank God on a daily basis for that miracle and celebrate the true meaning of just how precious life really is. Carol and Zo Felts of Knoxville are two such people. Having been hospitalized in Dallas for the past three months, Carol recently received a heart transplant that was badly needed in order to sustain life itself. His wife Zo has been by his side throughout the ordeal of his sickness and the miracle of his heart transplant. This local couple has been on an emotional roller coaster ride like most of us will never experience, yet their faith keeps them strong and thanking God for each day that passes and each added miracle that marks Carol's improvement.

Zo sent us a letter that arrived here at the News office early Tuesday morning. After reading the letter, we wanted to share it with each of our readers as an inspirational real life testimony that defines the true meaning of both Thanksgiving and Christmas. We ask that during your holiday season, you take time to remember what you've read here and think about Carol and Zo.

Dear Billye Bess,

As Carol and I sit here in ICU this morning, we are thinking of all of you and want to talk to everyone.... which is impossible. Thank you for offering to be our source of contact.

We are praying right now that the Lord will allow the feeding tube to be placed in the proper place to provide nutrition to Carol's body. This is the 5th attempt to place it.

As you all know most any time you take medication, there are negative side effects. Thinking of that, you can try to imagine the damage to Carol's body from a bad heart, five surgeries and lots of medication. Not to think of what the infections have done. His throat and stomach aren't functioning yet, so protecting the lungs and getting the body nourished are the big projects right now. After this, the reconstructive surgery can be done.

The good news is the new heart is working great and Carol still has a strong will to get well. The huge wound is growing tissue and improving daily.

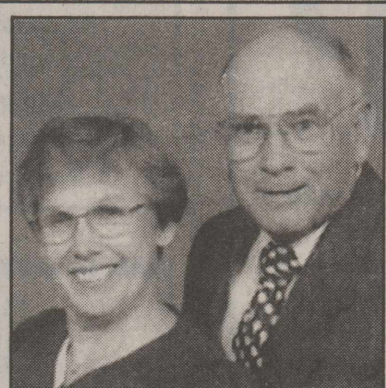
We just can't understand why the Lord is allowing this, but we are always reminded that we want to praise the Lord in all things.

Thanks to all of you for prayers and every small and large deed. Wish I could write to each of you. We love you and hope to be home by Christmas.

Accompanying her letter, Zo sent us a copy of an article that Carol wrote and we published here in The Knoxville News back on Thursday, December 22, 1983. We are reprinting it here with an update by Zo that reflects the couple's life and feelings today.

Christmas makes me cry, by Carol Felts

Christmas makes me cry. Sure, I enjoy Christmas with its decorations and beautiful music. I enjoy the smiles and friendly greetings. I even enjoy the Christmas cards. Then why do I cry? Because last week a friend asked me how things were going and handed me a fifty dollar bill. Last week I opened a Christmas card and found a check

for one hundred dollars from one of my neighbors. Because this morning I received a letter from a twelve year old nephew in Korea telling me his family was returning the money I had sent. Money I had sent to buy gifts for my family. They were sending the gifts anyway. But why does this make me cry? Because last week I said again, "It's starting again Lord, why does this happen?"

In 1968 I was diagnosed as having terminal cancer. The doctors told me to prepare my family, which consisted of my wife and four small boys. A plan of attack using cobalt therapy was planned. The treatments made me very ill and weak. I was not able to work for months. Just before Thanksgiving and Christmas, while we were gone to Abilene for the treatments, people would sneak into our house and leave sacks of groceries. Not just a turkey mind you, but the best turkey! A brand I would have considered beyond my means if I had been well. Not just a sack of groceries, but sacks of groceries. Something would happen to my gasoline bill between the service station and my house. I haven't received some of these bills yet. One day a young lady knocked on our door. "The Lord told me to give you this," she said handing my wife Zo seventy five dollars. When Zo tried to refuse she said, "Please don't take my blessing away." Money came from close friends and casual acquaintances, and friends I will never meet. Pledges of prayer came from all over the nation and even one foreign country.

Needless to say, I recovered. Now it's 1983, fifteen years later and it's starting again. This June I suffered a massive heart attack which left me unable to work. Prayers, letters of encouragement, gifts, favors, blessings beyond counting.

My dear old grandmother, living on Social Security, ninety one years old, slipped a wadded up Kleenex in my hand the other day and said, "Don't open this till I've gone home." Inside was a five dollar bill folded the size of a quarter.

Tears slide down my cheeks and cloud my vision even now as I think of the love shared by these special people. "Lord, help me to know what to do. Help me to use these blessings wisely and in Your will. Lord, give each of these children of Yours a special blessing. And Lord, it's all right that Christmas makes me cry. Just make the givers smile, make them merry at Christmas time. After all Lord, You and I know these are tears of joy and this is a lump of gratitude in my throat."

Today Zo writes: By this Christmas, 1998, Carol will have a great addendum to this story. This is the 88th day of a stay in ICU at Medical City of Dallas. Much of it he will not recall due to being under sedation so much of this time. Carol isn't seeing or hearing all of God's love being poured on all of his family.

I know once this battle is won, he will want to add to his story. In the meantime, I want to praise the Lord by sharing his story now. Even though life is traumatic for us, we've experienced love abundantly from you friends. We want everyone to know the greatest gift is the Saviour God sent us. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16.

Carol received a new heart on Monday, November 9, 1998 and is fighting hard to overcome the poor condition the old damaged heart left his body in. Through you friends and loved ones, I am being cared about in the same way his story tells about. I cannot count the number of people that are praying, I can't even count the number of churches.

God's word says: "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all ways acknowledge Him and He will direct thy paths." Proverbs 3: 5-6.

'Get into action', it's good for heart

You've heard that being physically active is good for your health. But here are two more reasons from the American Heart Association to get off the couch and into the action: You'll feel better and have a more positive outlook on life.

"We are encouraging everyone - young and old, fit and not so fit - to include physical activity in their daily routines," Peggy Guinn, president of the American Heart Association's Knox County Division, says. "Everyone can benefit from being active."

Physical inactivity is a major risk for heart disease. And when combined with overeating, physical inactivity can lead to obesity and high blood pressure - two more risks for heart disease.

Physical activity builds healthy bones, muscles and joints and reduces the risk of diabetes and color

cancer. It also reduces feelings of depression and anxiety, improves mood and promotes a feeling of well-being.

For health benefits to the heart, lungs and circulation, perform any vigorous activity at least 30 minutes a day each week at 50-75 percent of maximum heart rate. Moderate physical activities for 30 minutes on most days provide some benefits.

"Physical activity need not be strenuous to bring health benefits," Mrs. Guinn says. "What is important is to include activity as part of a regular routine."

Activities that are especially beneficial when performed regularly include brisk walking, hiking, stair-climbing, aerobic exercise, jogging, running, bicycling, rowing and swimming and activities such as soccer and basketball that include continuous running.

For people not able to exercise vigorously or who are sedentary, even moderate and low-intensity activities, when performed daily, have some long-term health benefits. These include wading for pleasure, gardening and yard work, house work, dancing and prescribed home exercise, recreational activities such as tennis, racquetball, soccer, basketball and touch football.

In general, those beginning any program should talk to their physician before beginning an exercise program.

EDC News from Knox City's Economic Development Corporation

The 4-A board of Knox City's Economic Development Corporation is extremely pleased that renovation work on the former Perry's building has started, and that the final contract with Duckwall-Alco has been signed. Our quest to bring another variety store to Knox City has been a long one, ever since Perry's closed and moved out of town two years ago. Having a large variety store in our downtown area is like placing a magnet in a box of metal shavings, it is sure to attract a lot. In our case, it means a lot of people - and shopping dollars - into our community. In other communities where stores of this type have opened, other local merchants reported that their business also picked up as a ripple effect of the new business. When people take the time to come to town and shop, they'll usually make more than one stop and visit several merchants while they are in the area.

Pat yourself on the back

As you read this article and other articles in future editions of *The Knox County News*, take just a minute to pat yourself on the back. That's right, a lot of you had a hand in bringing this store to town, even if you did not realize it. Back just over three years ago when an overwhelming majority of Knox City residents voted in a full 1% sales tax for economic development, that was what first set the wheels in motion for this project. That same sales tax money has been collecting very slowly month by month, and now there is enough on hand for this project. Because the new variety store will also be adding to the sales tax we get back into EDC funds in the future, we will be able to replace this project's funds faster than we originally accumulated them because we have been receiving sales tax rebates without the benefit of a variety store income for the past two years. With Duckwalls adding to the rebate, the next several years should bring a sharp rise in the money of sales tax rebates back into EDC for use on future projects.

Our next 4A board meeting will be at 1:00 p.m. this Friday, December 4, at 1:00 p.m. in the board room of Citizens Bank here in Knox City. EDC meetings are open to the public and we encourage your attendance if you would like to attend. We are required by law to follow an agenda type of format, meaning we can take action only on pre-posted agenda items, but public comment is always welcome.

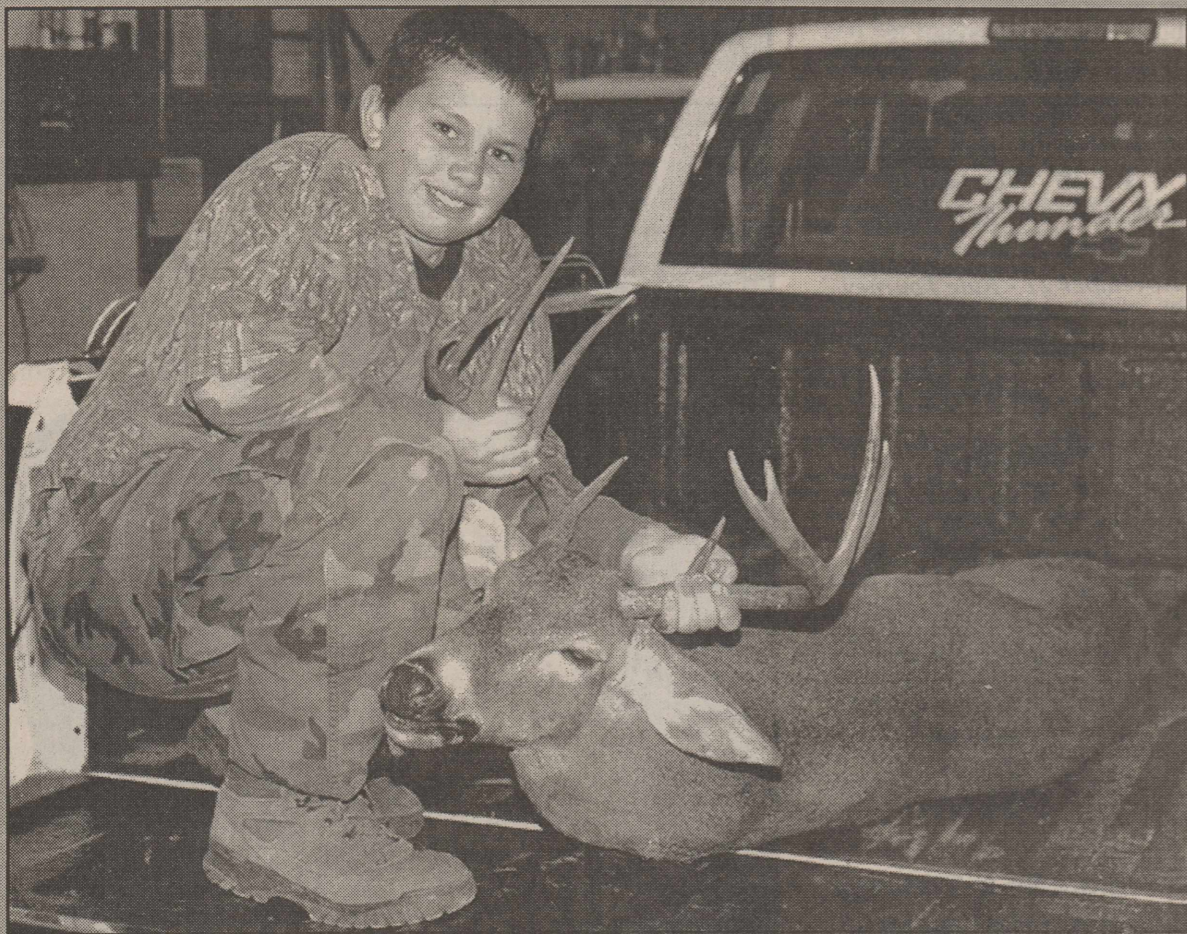

Immunization clinic set in Munday December 10

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the Perry Patton Community Center in Munday on Thursday, December 10, from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all

school immunizations. The Hepatitis B immunization is required for kindergarten entry in the fall of 1998. This immunization series consists of three injections taking a minimum of six months to complete.

The Hepatitis B immunization is also available for any child at risk or any child whose parents wish them to have for protection

or prevention.

The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine has arrived and is now being given to 12 month old through 15 year olds. If interested in more information on the varicella, call the Texas Department of Health office.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social security numbers.
