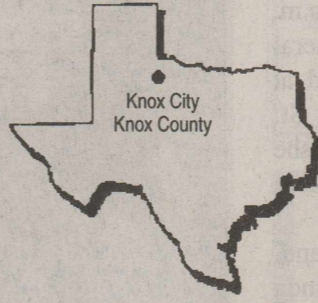

Monday night fire claims lives of mother and daughter

Fire officials surmise that one of victims saved grandmother, then perished trying to rescue the other victim

Knox City was saddened this week as a Monday night fire claimed the lives of a 50 year old mother and her eight year old daughter. The third occupant of the house, located in the 600 block of South Second, was transferred to an Abilene hospital.

Pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Imoegan Young was Debra (Dodie) Brown. Her daughter, Asia Selena Brown-Hendrix, was taken to the Knox County Hospital where she was later pronounced dead. Selena was a third grade student of LaNell Kight at Knox City Elementary.

Debra's mother, Calenetha Mae Flye, was transferred to the Abilene hospital for further observation. According to fire chief Domingo Garcia, a call to 911 was made at approximately 10:16 p.m. by neighbors seeing fire coming from the house.

The local fire department responded at 10:17 p.m. Fire Chief Garcia said that upon arrival, Mrs. Flye was out of the dwelling and it was not known whether her daughter or granddaughter brought her to safety. Whomever of the two it was, they returned to help the other occupant left in the house. Neither of them returned to safety.

Funeral services for the mother and daughter are pending with Smith Funeral Home in Knox City. Bodies were sent to Dallas for autopsies and no report on the cause of fire has been released, pending the outcome of the State Fire Marshal.

Fire Chief Garcia praised the efforts of the firemen and EMT personnel for their quick response and action in this tragedy.

A fund has been started at Citizens Bank, designated as the 'Memorial Fund for the expense of the deaths of Debra Brown and daughter Selena Asia Brown-Hendrix.'

Family friend Pat Young stated that Mrs. Flye was in need of size 12 clothing and also shoes, sizes 8 to 8 1/2.

THE TRAGEDY OF MONDAY NIGHT took place at this house on South Second Street in Knox City. Blocked off by yellow police 'Do Not Cross' tape, the house was the scene of an investigation on Tuesday by the Knox City Fire Department, the Texas State Fire Marshal's office, and the Knox County Sheriff's Department. Investigators were trying to determine what caused the fire.

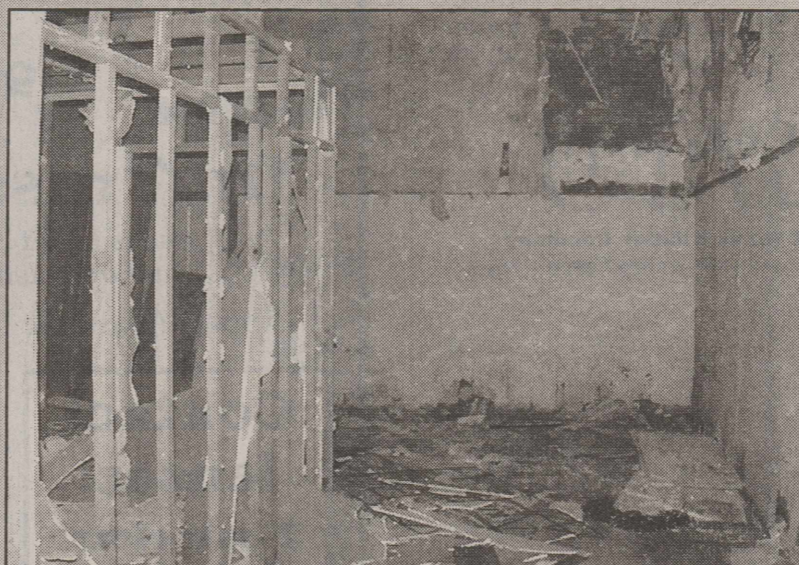
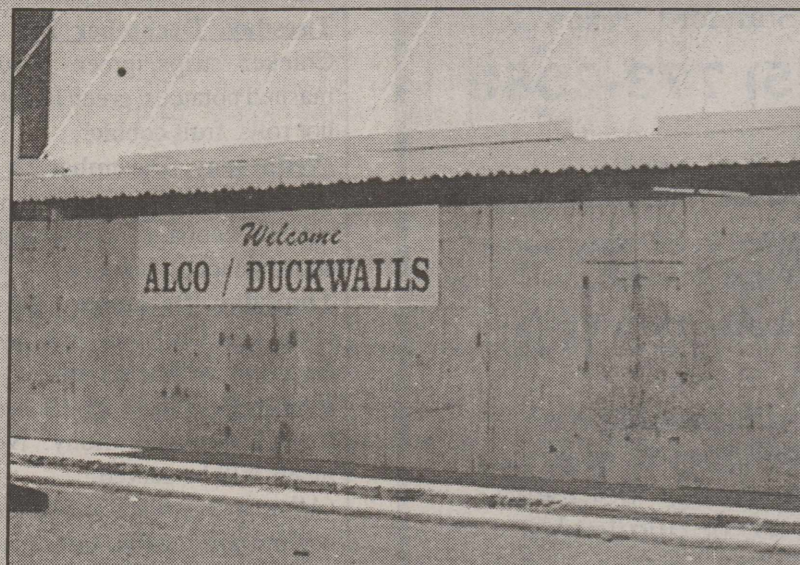

Perry reminds pesticide applicators to obtain CEUs before deadline

AUSTIN - Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry reminds pesticide applicators to check to see if they have the necessary continuing education units (CEUs) to renew their license. Many private applicators, as well as all commercial and noncommercial applicators, face a February 28, 1999, renewal date.

"Applicators should check their CEUs while there's still plenty of time to get the credits," Perry said. "Education is vital for proper and safe pesticide use. It's important to stay informed of changing regulations as well as new products and new application methods."

Private applicators must renew

their license every five years and obtain CEUs during that period. Two credits must be integrated pest management and two in laws and regulations. Applicators must self-certify their credits by listing them on the renewal form that they should receive by early December.

Private applicators also may earn the required credits by passing a comprehensive recertification exam. This test costs \$50 for each attempt.

After passing, an applicator will receive a certificate of completion for 15 CEUs.

Commercial and noncommercial applicators renew each year

and must earn five CEUs annually, including one CEU in each of two of the following categories: laws and regulations, integrated pest management and drift minimization.

Perry advises pesticide applicators to check with their county Texas Agricultural Extension Service office for courses offered or call the Texas Department of Agriculture at 1-800-TELL-TDA or (512) 463-7548 for a list of approved courses.

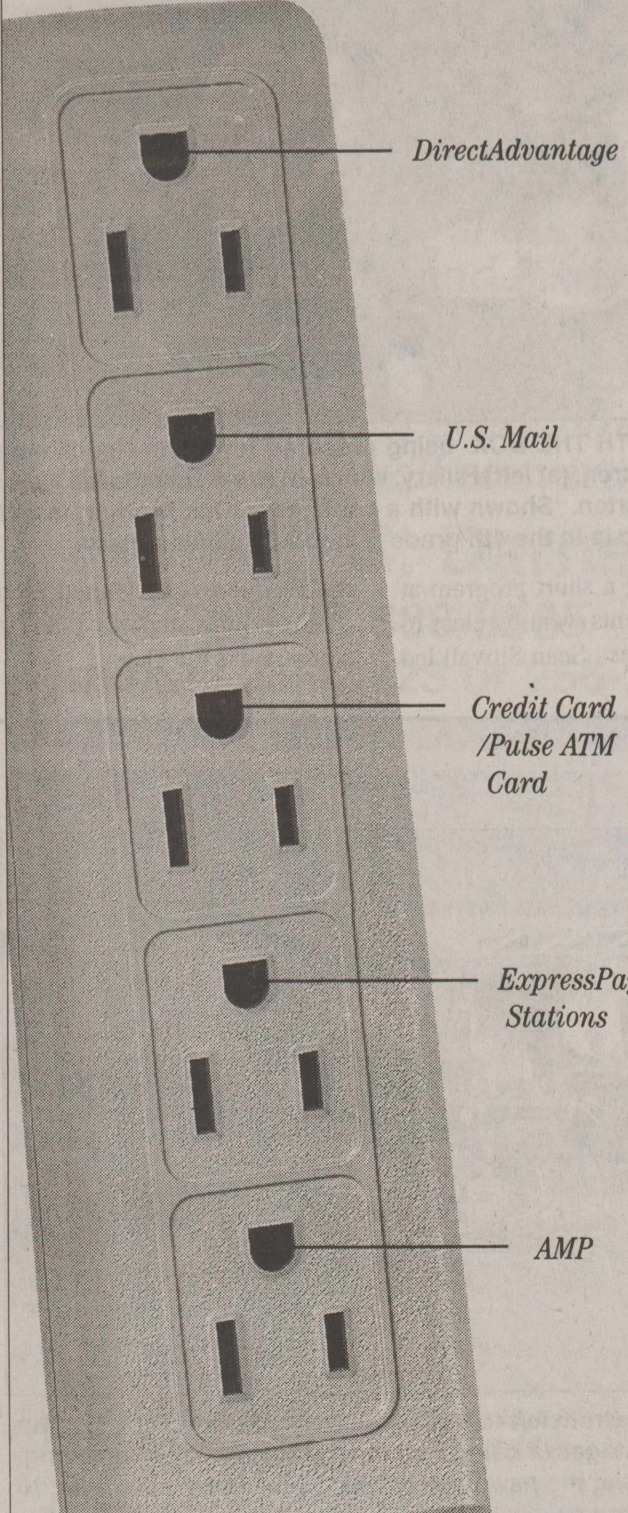

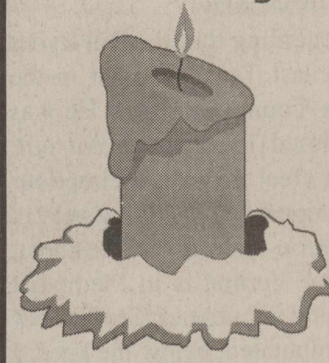
Mrs. Hill, 73, died Saturday, December 12, at her residence where she had been under Hospice care.
