

Speaker appoints Counts to committees

Natural resources, redistricting, state affairs

AUSTIN-House Speaker Pete Laney has announced that he has appointed Representative David Counts, D-Knox City, to serve as Chair of the House Committee on Natural Resources.

He also will serve as a member of the House Committee on Redistricting and the Committee on State Affairs.

"Most of the work in the legislature is done in committees where members spend many long hours hearing testimony and studying bills," Speaker Laney said. "Ilook forward to working with Representative Counts as committees in the House begin to consider all the issues we will debate this session."

The committee process allows House members to closely study legislation before sending it to the full House for a vote. The committee system also encourages citizen participation in the legislative process through testimony

on bills and direct contact with lawmakers as decisions are made that affect the future of our state.

The nine-member Committee on Natural Resources has jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the conservation of the natural resources of Texas.

It has oversight authority over several state agencies, including the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission as it relates to regulation of water re-

The 11-member Committee on Redistricting has jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to legislative and congressional redistricting.

The 15-member Committee on State Affairs has jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to questions of state policy and administration of state government. Its oversight authority covers numerous state agencies, including the Public Utility Commission and the General Services Commission.

Representative Counts represents House District 70, which includes Borden, Fisher, Garza, Howard, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lynn, Nolan, Scurry and Stonewall counties. He has been a House member since 1988.

EDC - Duckwall's Store - project update





PROGRESS is being measured in leaps and bounds on a daily basis at the construction site for the new Duckwall's Hometown Variety Store in downtown Knox City. The former Perry's store is being completely transformed as a project of Knox City's Economic Development Corporation.


Project Contractor Sid Richardson of Knox City is pleased with the pace and expects the project to come in on schedule. Current plans are to turn the store over to ALCO/ Duckwall before the first of April, then the company will take 30 days to stock the store and hire local employees.

In the photo at top left, workers unload sheetrock and insulation materials as they get ready to redo all the interior walls.

In the photo at bottom left, the interior walls have been framed with metal studs in preparation for sheetrock, and new electrical wiring is going in above the suspended ceiling.

In the photos at right, the new addition to the rear has been completed (above photo) and the metal studs forming walls for the ADA compatible restroom, the employee break room, office and storeroom are finished, with the application of sheetrock as the next step (bottom photo).

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For those following the progress on the New Duckwall's Hometown Variety Store, here is an update on the work scheduled for this week:

• The building added on to the rear has been finished. Work has moved inside to finishing out the offices, break room, restroom, storeroom and showroom in the new addition.

• Metal framing has been placed for wall resurfacing, the sheetrocking is underway now.

• Electrical work is underway as everything inside the former Perry's store is being rewired.

· New ceiling lights will be added this week and next, and phone lines are being installed.

· Work on the heating and cooling systems will begin in the next week or so.

• The roof of the existing building is scheduled to be reroofed at the end of this week.

· Work on the new doors and glass in the storefront has been

completed. Romain Stubbs wanted to know if the new Duckwall's Hometown Variety Store would have a restroom for public use. Apparently when Perry's used the building before, there was no public use restroom and Romain would have to let customers use the restroom in her adjoining business. Mrs. Stubbs has been assured that there will be a public use restroom for the customers of Duckwalls that is also fully compliant with ADA regulations.

Mrs. Stubbs also complained to EDC Project Coordinator Dave Thompson about her business phone being out for a while earlier this week. She stated that she had lost \$2000.00 worth of Beanie Baby business the morning her phone was out and wanted to know what EDC would do about it. After GTE repairmen looked into the problem, it was determined the problem was inside her store, and not something associated with the new construction taking place next door at Duckwalls.

For those who have asked several questions about the new store, we are happy to provide answers.

To the question about tax abatements: no, Duckwalls has not been given any tax abatement incentives whatsoever. The store will be paying inventory tax and sales tax, just like any other retail business. They will not be paying property tax because the building is city owned property and not taxed under those standards. Duckwalls will be paying rent on their lease with EDC, and will also be paying their own utility bills. EDC will be responsible for repair type maintenance on the

building during the lease.

The Economic Development Corporation is an entity of the government of the City of Knox City. Any actions taken or decisions made by EDC are in strict accordance with legal guidelines established at both the state and local levels of government. A requirement that EDC sales tax revenues be used to promote economic development is first and foremost in the mind of everyone associated with EDC. Since the new Duckwall's Hometown Variety Store will be greatly enhancing the local economy, hiring local employees, and paying into state sales tax, this project meets and exceeds all legal guidelines that EDC operates under. The expenditure of EDC sales tax funds for this project are a very wise investment on the part of EDC's Board of Directors. EDC's current funds have been generated by the 1% sales tax increase that local voters approved over three years ago. When Duckwalls opens and begins to contribute to state sales tax, our rebate percentage will go up overall and EDC funds will be replenished at a faster rate than they were originally collected without a store of this type open for business. These replenished funds will be earmarked for future EDC projects to benefit Knox City. In short, we are helping our economy and our entire community by making such a wonderful new store available to local shoppers. In other communities where Duckwalls has opened a store, they have proven to be exceptional neighbors and community minded. Entire business district areas in small towns have benefited from these stores as the influx of additional Duckwall's customers into towns like Knox City has always meant more customers for existing businesses. In short, everyone wins!






FCE club hears Jane Rowan at January meeting


