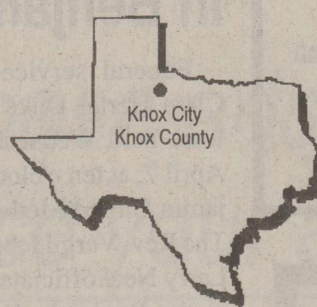

Sheriff's report

Alcohol and our youth, that seems to be a concern aired by several individuals in our county. It may seem that it is not a real personal problem until there is an accident involving your kids or possibly your kid(s) get busted for either Minor in Possession, Minor Consumption of Alcohol, or Driving While Intoxicated. Then it sounds like everyone concerned with the offense wants to minimize the actions of the minor and make the officers involved appear to be picking on the minor(s). Well, actually, it is extremely unlikely that if the minor is actually busted, that this is the first time the said minor actually drank alcohol or drove while intoxicated. Even if the minor had been stopped or warned previously for an alcohol related offense, this would be the first time that the minor had to appear in court or answer to a Justice of Peace, County Judge or District Judge. It is a matter of fact that if the kids are left unattended, they will do what the others in the group are doing. If that happens to be drinking and several others around are drinking, chances are that most if not all others present will be drinking also. It's not to say that all minors will drink enough to be intoxicated or will drive while intoxicated, but just drinking by a minor or juvenile in most circumstances is illegal. Many parents or legal guardians will say that they allow their kids to drink while their kids are with them, which is legal, however, how many kids will not drink once their parents or legal guardians are not around. Now don't get me wrong, this department is not out to bust the kids for everything that can be found. We care about the kids of this county and are concerned about their safety. If it takes a citation and a trip to the judge to make the kids and their parents more aware of the problems brought about by alcohol abuse,

then that is the route we will take.

Included with this very short article is a general list of the possible consequences of a minor drinking or having alcohol in their possession. Also, in the next few days, many of the residents of the county will probably receive an invitation to join the Sheriff's Association of Texas. School cafeteria manager earns certification

Carolina Rios has earned certification as a Texas School Food Service Association Manager from TSFSA in Austin.

Two USAF Airmen killed in Knox County wreck

On Saturday, April 10, 18 year old Brandy Bird of Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene and 18 year old William Joseph Mohr III of Barksdale Air Force Base in Shreveport, Louisiana, were killed in a two vehicle accident between Munday and Goree on highway 227 in Knox County. The pair were both enlisted personnel in the United States Air Force, and were traveling to Shepard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls to visit a friend when the 1999 Chevrolet Cavalier they were in was struck by a 1998 Chevrolet pickup truck.

Occupants of the pickup truck were from Chihuahua, Mexico, and included a man and wife, and two children. The woman driver was identified as 27 year old Adriana Limones, and her passengers were her husband, 30 year old Othon Saenz, her 7 year old daughter, and her 4 year old son. Limones and her son were transported to the Knox County Hospital, then transported to University Medical Center in Lubbock and hospitalized after the accident, her husband and daughter were treated and released from Knox County Hospital.

Although the accident scene was one of almost total devastation, investigating law enforcement officers were able to determine that the accident happened when the Limones pickup truck was traveling west and attempted to pass another vehicle going in the same direction, then collided nearly head-on with

Brandy Bird's vehicle as it traveled to the east. The accident happened on a straight roadway with no apparent visual obstructions. Both vehicles attempted to evade the accident, but swerved in the same direction just prior to impact.

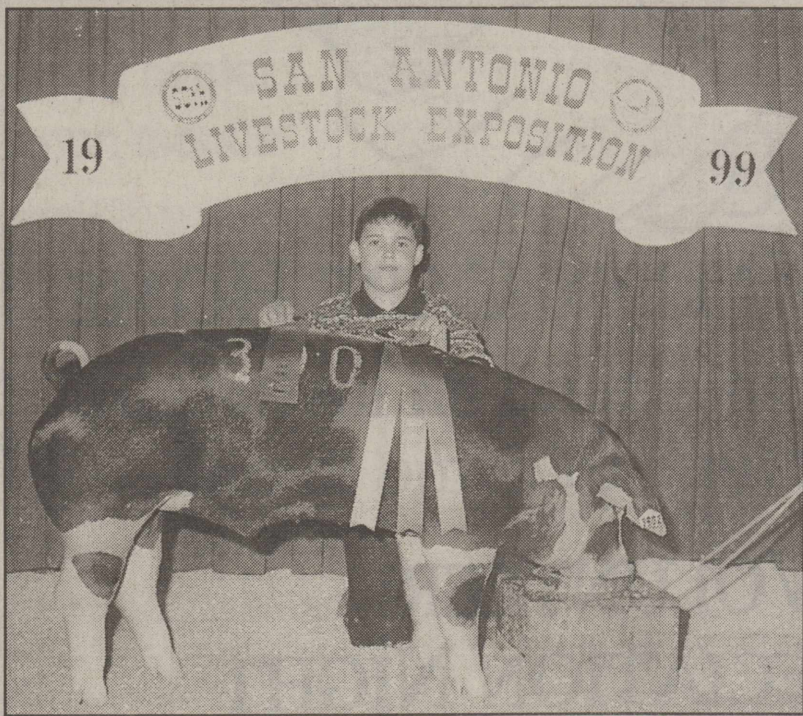

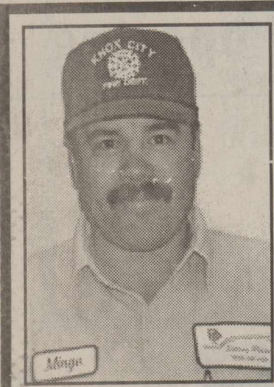
Tickets are available in advance from any student council member or by calling the high school office at 658-3565. Tickets will also be available at the door.

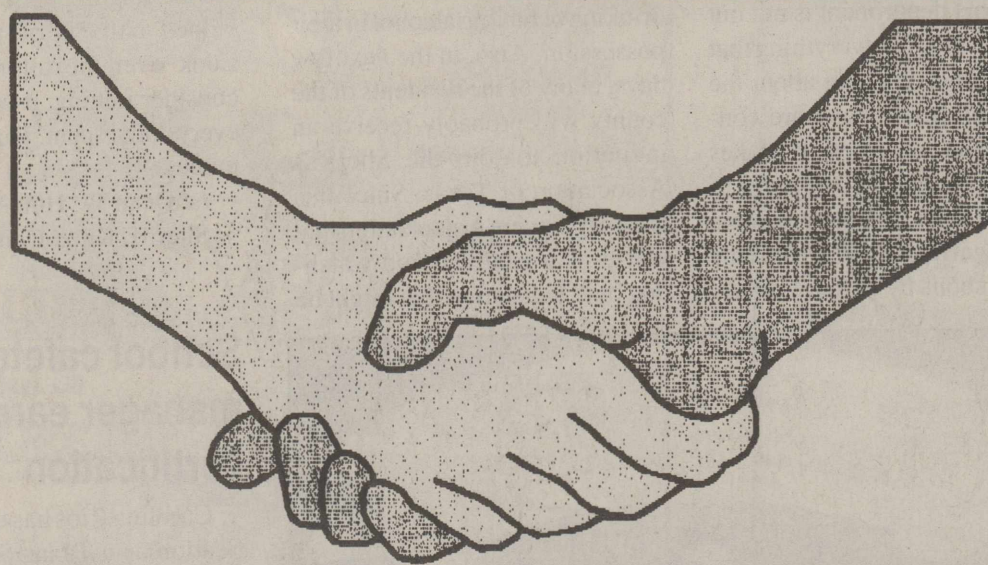

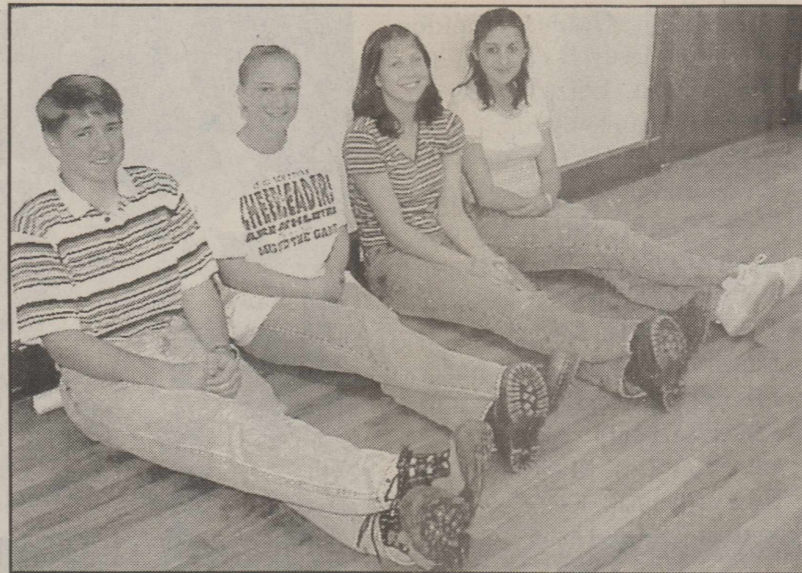

Lila Jo Rector of Knox City, a senior general studies major, is a new member.

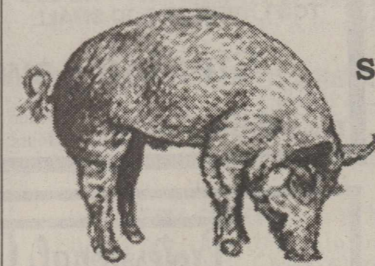
She is the daughter of Barbara and John Rector.

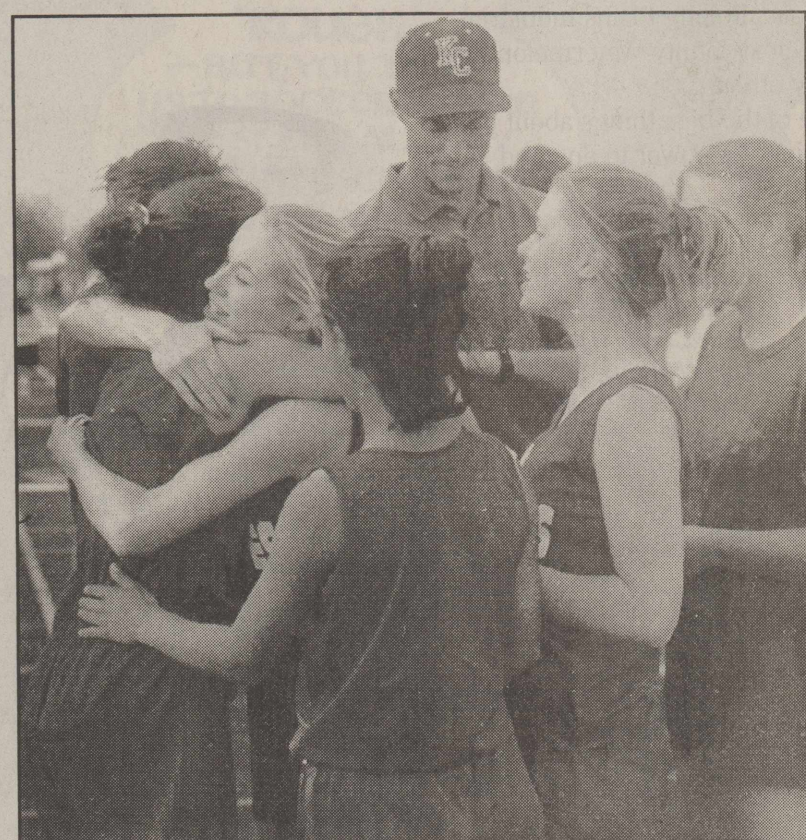
