It's not to say that all minors will drink enough to be intoxicated or will drive while intoxicated, but just drinking by a minor or juvenile in most circumstances is illegal. Many parents or legal guardians will say that thy allow their kids to drink while their kids are with them, which is legal, however, how many kids will not drink once their parents or legal guardians are not around. Now don't get me wrong, this department is not out to bust the kids for everything that can be found. We care about the kids of this county and are concerned about their safety. If it takes a citation and a trip to the judge to make the kids and their parents more award of the problems brought about by alcohol abuse,

Two USAF Airmen killed in Knox County wreck

On Saturday, April 10, 18 year old Brandy Bird of Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene and 18 year old William Joseph Mohr III of Barksdale Air Force Base in Shreveport, Louisiana, were killed in a two vehicle accident between Munday and Goree on highway 227 in Knox County. The pair were both enlisted personnel in the United States Air Force, and were traveling to Shepard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls to visit a friend when the 1999 Chevrolet Cavalier they were in was struck by a 1998 Chevrolet pickup truck.

Occupants of the pickup truck were from Chihuahua, Mexico, and included a man and wife, and two children. The woman driver was identified as 27 year old Adriana Limones, and her passengers were her husband, 30 year old Othon Saenz, her 7 year old daughter, and her 4 year old son. Limones and her son were transported to the Knox County Hospital, then transported to University Medical Center in Lubbock and hospitalized after the accident, her husband and daughter were treated and released from Knox County Hospital.

Although the accident scene was one of almost total devestation investigating law enforcement officers were able to determine that the accident happened when the Limones pickup truck was traveling west and attempted to pass another vehicle going in the same direction, then collided nearly head-on with



Brandy Bird's vehicle as it traveled to the east. The accident happened on a straight roadway with no apparent visual obstructions. Both vehicles attempted to evade the accident, but swerved in the same direction just prior to impact.

DPS Law enforcement officers investigating the accident included Troopers Danny

Wainscott and Brian Williams, and they were assisited by Sgt. Farber and Cpl. Josselet from the DPS office in Haskell. Other law enforcement officers assisting were from the Munday Police Department, Knox City Police Department, and the Knox County Sheriff's Office. Ambulance units from both Munday and Knox City responded to the accident scene.


