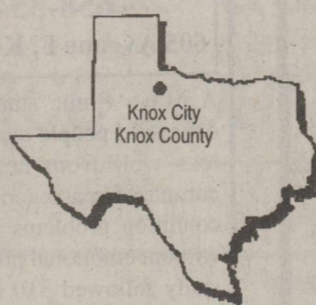

Raised at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch just outside Amarillo, Aaron quickly learned the importance of a positive attitude. His

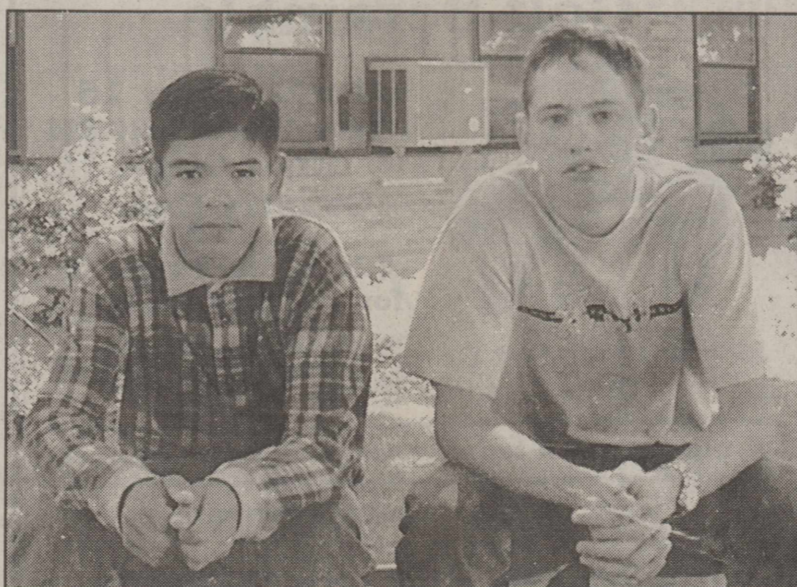
life is a reflection of his philosophy that a positive attitude can create positive results.

David Chapman, Domingo Garcia elected to City Council of Knox City

In the city elections held last Saturday, May 1, voters in Knox City selected David Chapman and Domingo Garcia to fill the expiring terms of Council Members Kathy Williams and Jerry Curd.

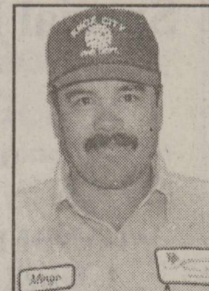
Chapman, who is employed at Hunt Oil Company, received 130 votes, and Garcia, who is employed at Rolling Plains Well Service, received 70 votes. Also running in the election were Ron Bruce, who received 66 votes, and Sammie Offield, who received 50 votes.

After being administered the oath of office to the city council at a scheduled meeting this Thursday night at City Hall, David Chapman and Domingo Garcia will join Councilmen Charles Lankford, Tommy Mangis, Jeff Stanfield, and Mayor Bud Reynolds in deciding issues affecting the day to day operations and the future of Knox City.

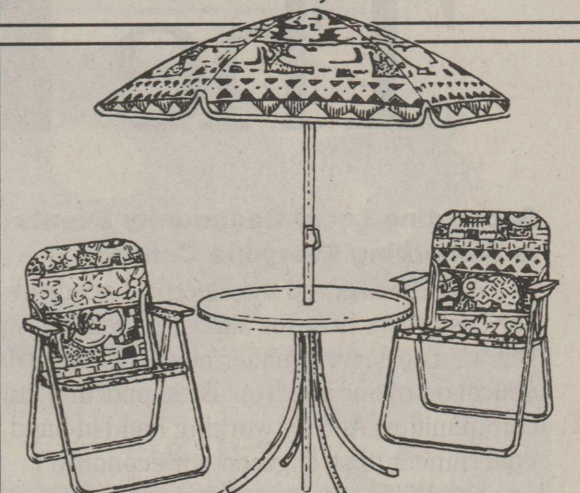

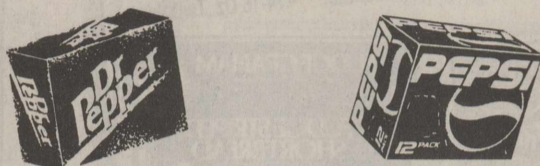

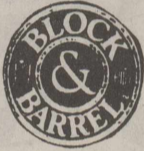

The Dutch Doll quilt top was

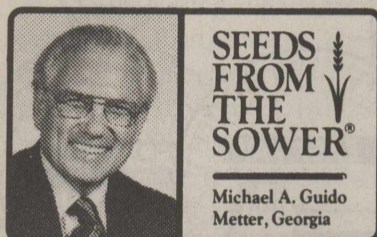
pieced by Margie Allen from the Goree site.
