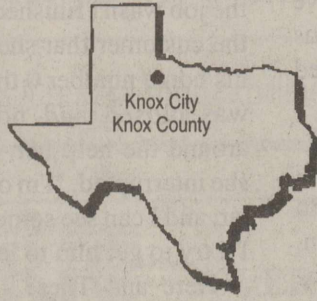

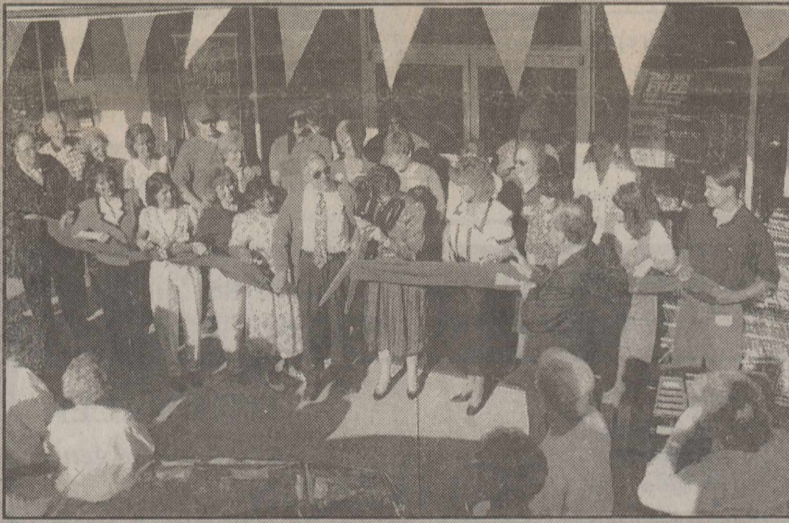
Mr. Herfkens was among a group of executives from the Duckwall/Alco Corporation, including President Glen Shank, who flew into KC for the grand opening.

City Council has busy meeting

With two new members present, last Thursday's meeting of the City Council of Knox City lasted until just about 10:00 p.m. as many items on the agenda were discussed at length.

After reading and approving minutes of the previous council meeting, EDC President Judy Perdue explained to the council how EDC works and suggested that council members attend a course designed and provided by WTU on the functions of EDC. Following the presentation by Perdue, the board voted unanimous approval of previous EDC meeting minutes.

Council members then canvassed the votes from the May 1 city election. After all members voted their approval, Mayor Bud Reynolds was administered the oath of office for another elected term of office. Mayor Reynolds then presented plaques of appreciation to outgoing council members Cathye Williams and Jerry Curd for their service to the community. Following that presentation, Mayor Reynolds administered the oath of office to incoming council members Domingo Garcia and David Chapman. The pair immediately took their place at the council table to begin work.

The City's previous garbage contractor presented a bill to the council for unpaid franchise fees that had not been paid during the

Cancer drive is successful

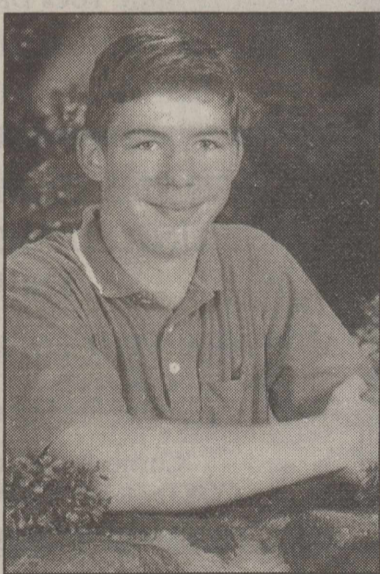
The Knox County Unit of the American Cancer Society has completed a very successful crusade drive for 1999, according to Knox County Crusade Chairperson Valera Hertel.

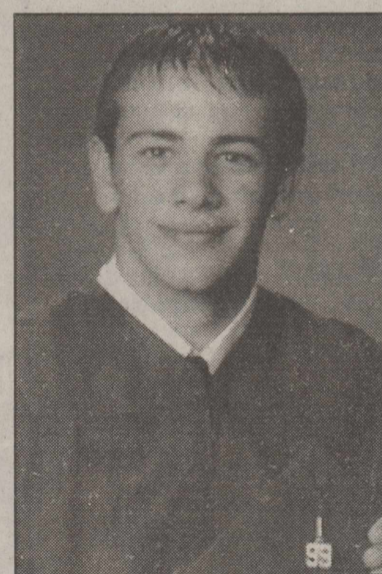

time his company had the city contract. After a very lengthy discussion and some serious questioning of the issue by council members Jeff Stanfield, Tommy Mangis and Charles Lankford, the matter was tabled for further study to determine the actual amount that is in question.

The council then voted all in favor of a motion to reappoint Leon Burkhart to the Board of Directors of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority.

The next item of business was the appointing of Councilman David Chapman to replace Bruce Campbell to the Airport Zoning Commission. The vote was unanimous.

After reviewing applications for the position of Swimming pool manager, all voted in favor of letting City Manager Danny Parker make the selection.

Police Chief Harry Steen gave his monthly report and presented information on the purchase of a new radar unit to replace one that is out of service and not repairable. The council gave their approval as long as the funds were available for the purchase. Councilman Charles Lankford then brought up a complaint about police cars being seen outside the city limits of Knox City. Several instances were discussed and Chief Steen explained why the cars are seen out of town and how the response to other agencies works. Councilman Tommy Mangis stated "my opinion is that city police cars should not be out of the city limits except when requested." There was no formal action taken on the matter.

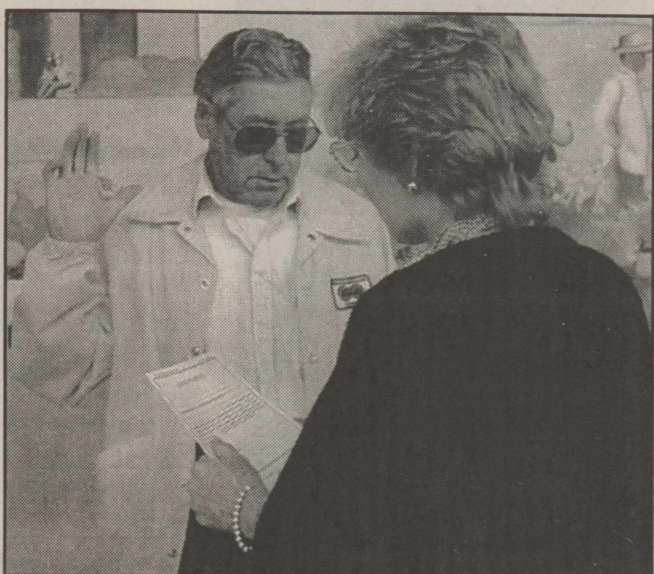
During the monthly water report, Councilman Domingo Garcia wanted to know if all the water meters were being read. Mayor Bud Reynolds, City Manager Danny Parker and City Secretary Brenda Correll all assured him that they were. Parker then informed the council on how all complaints are handled.

Councilman Lankford expressed concern about an open water well in the NE part of town being a safety hazard, all agreed that the matter will be looked into as soon as possible.

As Fire Chief, Councilman Garcia gave a report on fire department activities. The department has had a slow month in terms of fire calls, but the members have remained busy with weather watches and the installation of smoke detectors in residences around Knox City.

Councilman Lankford expressed concern of a repair that needed to be made at the city park. No formal action was taken and city personnel will look into the matter.

During the financial report, Councilman Mangis asked if expenditures were in line with the budget for this time of the year, he was assured that they were by City Manager Parker.

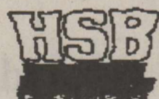

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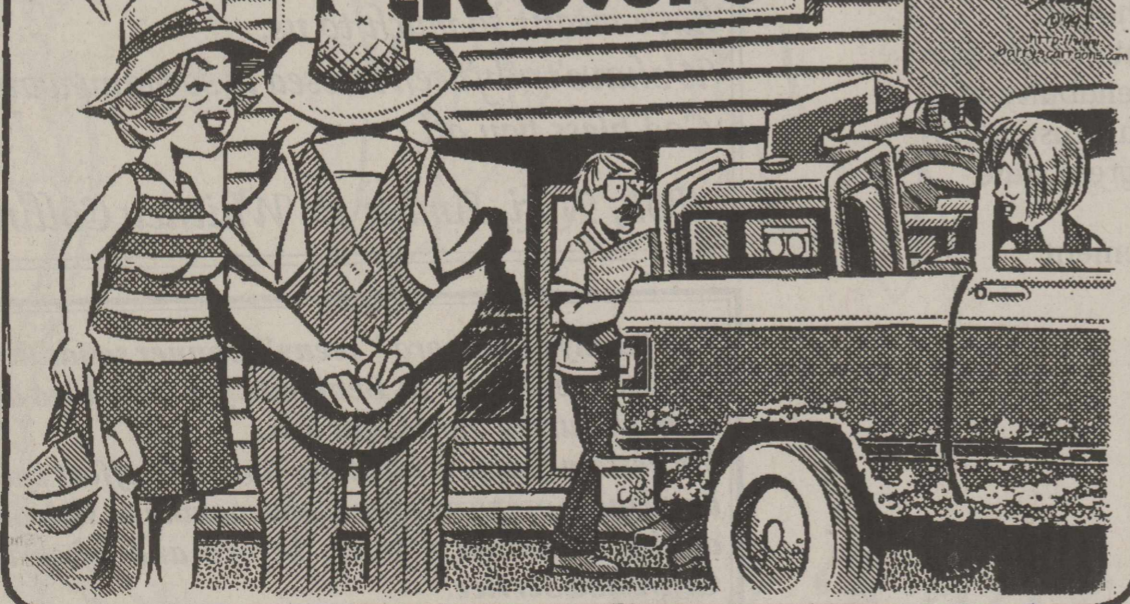

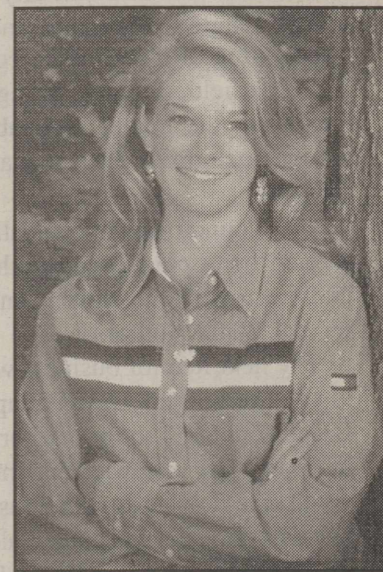

a site other than their home district, and TEAMS examinees must register.

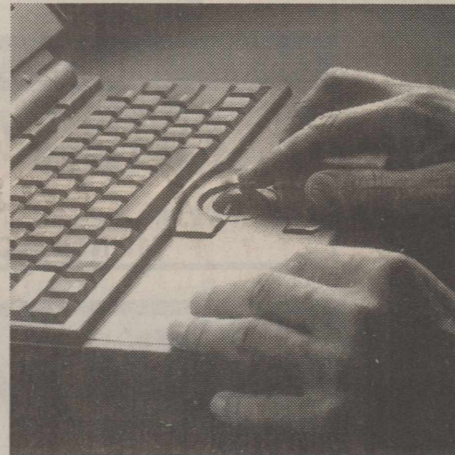
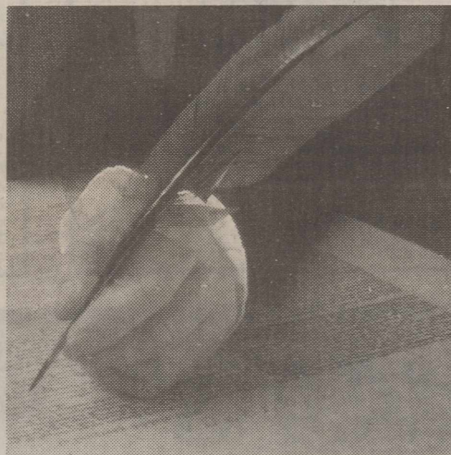

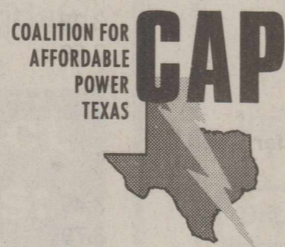

District court cases heard

On Monday, April 26, 1999, in the Baylor County District Court, Jonathan George Holub, 31, of Seymour, plead guilty to the felony offense of causing serious bodily injury while resisting arrest, according to District Attorney Bill Neal.

Following the State's plea bargain recommendation, District Judge David Hajek granted Holub a five-year probated sentence but made it a condition that he be placed in the prison system's felony substance abuse program for a year as a part of his probation. He as also assessed a \$500.00 fine.

Holub seriously injured Baylor County Deputy Sheriff Johnny Andrade on Friday, April 23, 1999, in an attempt to resist being arrested by local officers. Andrade suffered a broken back in the melee and was released from the hospital on April 26, 1999.

A jury trial in Paducah began last Tuesday, April 27, 1999 in the Cottle County District Court but ended abruptly in a mistrial on the second day of the trial when it came to the Court's attention that one of the 12 jurors sitting on the case was unable to read or write the English language, an automatic disqualification for a juror.

A jury had been selected last Tuesday and testimony began in a cocaine possession case against Guy Edward Ledbetter, 39, of Floydada. Bill Neal represented the State & Mike Brown, an attorney from Lubbock, represented the defendant. Judge Hajek indicated the case would be reset on the trial docket as soon as possible.

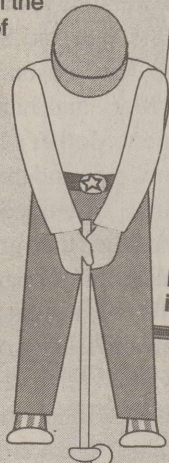
