Knox County Historical commission to host Wyman Meinzer's program on 1841 Texan Santa Fe Expedition

In celebration of Texas Archaeology Awareness Month, the Knox County Historical Commission will sponsor its third annual archaeology program Thursday, October 14, at 7:00 p.m. at the Benjamin Ex-Students Building in Benjamin, one block south of the Knox County Courthouse.

Wyman Meinzer, celebrated photographer, author, and long-time student of North Texas history will present a two part program with his own slides to illustrate beginning with the route of the 1841 Texan Santa Fe Expedition and concluding with stories and slides abut archaeology collected while working on his yet to be released next book, *Texas Rivers*

Meinzer began as a wildlife photographer and has sold to dozens of magazines over the years, though many Texans know him bet for his photos and stories in Texas Highways and Texas Parks and Wildlife Magazine. His first two books were *The Roadrunner* and *The Coyote* in the mid-1990's. Since then he has produced or

provided photos for more than a bok a year including the beautiful *Texas Lost*.


The Knox County native has long had a special interest in the 1841 expedition because it crossed his own county.

Then, through the years, as his photographic assignments grew, he has worked in and photographed much of the country the expedition crossed 158 years ago, when almost no one inhabited the area except Indians. In fact, much or the route is still grassland, with only fences and airplanes to mark the passage of time.

Mirabeau B. Lamar instigated the project after failing in attempts to persuade Mexico to drop its threatening attitude toward Teas, recognize the Republic of Texas as a nation, and agree to Texas-Mexico boundaries.

Lamar, and other Texans dreamed of extending the jurisdiction of Texas over New Mexico and other Mexican territories, all the way to the Pacific.

When an agent returned from an attempt to meet with Mexican officials about boundaries in June

1841, Lamar began to work to carry out a first step in his dream. The Texas congress refused to sanction Lamar's proposed expedition to take over Santa Fe and benefit from the lucrative Santa Fe Trail trade, despite reports Lamar had that a union with Texas was desired by the people.

Lamar convinced a number of merchants to join the expedition and to send goods to trade. On June 24, 1941, the merchants left with a military escort of 270 men, and three commissioners from the

Texas government.

They went north until reaching the site of today's Wichita Falls, and made the error there of accepting a guide's word that the Wichita River was the Red River.

By that time it was well into summer in North Texas.

Without any sources for water except what nature may provide on the North Texas Rolling Plains in summer.

Meinzer will lead his audience across these plains with words and pictures that depict day after day of trials and troubles in what could only be described as "a stumble across Texas"

Weather, terrain, Indians and finally Mexican soldiers destroyed the expanionist dreams with which the expedition began.

The whole terrible, death dealing trip was a failure in the eyes of that time, yet there are historians today who say it helped change the history of the Rolling and South Plains of Texas, of the state of Texas, and even of the United States.

Survivors increased Anglo-Texans knowledge of the plains; Texas after it became a state, received firm boundaries with Mexico and New Mexico, because the expedition was one factor in the War with Mexico, which led to the acquisition of land that now makes up the states of New Mexico, Arizona and California by the United States.

Lamar did help some in expanding a North American republic to the Pacific, it was just a different one from his 1841 dram.

Meinzers books will be available to the public for sale after the conclusion of the program for those who would like to purchase the books and have them autographed by Wyman.

Longtime reader asks for input on KC depot's future

(Editor's Note: The following note was received Monday at the News from longtime News subscriber and friend Gretchen Howell Colehour. Gretchen who just celebrated her 99th birthday amazes me with her perfectly handwritten letter and her absolute genuine interest in Knox City! It is with great delight to share with each of you Gretchen's letter ... Stacy)

October 7, 1999

Stacy,

It may be that you have heard (that you have heard - tell) an old resident of Knox City and of San Angelo, now owns the Knox City Depot. She remembers this dear little building from its birth around 1908 (date unknown as yet).

She would ride on its Kansas City, Mexico and Orient train to visit her grandfather, George Thomas Howell and his sons who lived on the League land. Her father had bought one half section in 1905. He was a master mechanic for this rail line, first in Sweetwater and, when the rails had been laid, in San Angelo. As a "railroad kid" she rode on a pass and gloried on the scenery along the way. She could at the time

name every ton from San Angelo to Kansas City.

Well, there are many tales that I could tell about the experiences, for I was the railroad kid from the Texas Midland days in Terrell, Texas, where my father, John William Howell learned to be a master mechanic to today nearly 100 years later when I bought the Depot in July 1999.

Now, what are we going to do with it? I am receiving many suggestions. You will be surprised at some of them. Tell your readrs to send them to you or to me. This can make an interesting story.

I am writing a family history for my family. They insist on it! Sincerely,




Lady Bulldogs Volleyball






