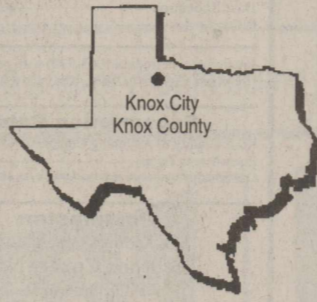

It's time to 'fall backward' !

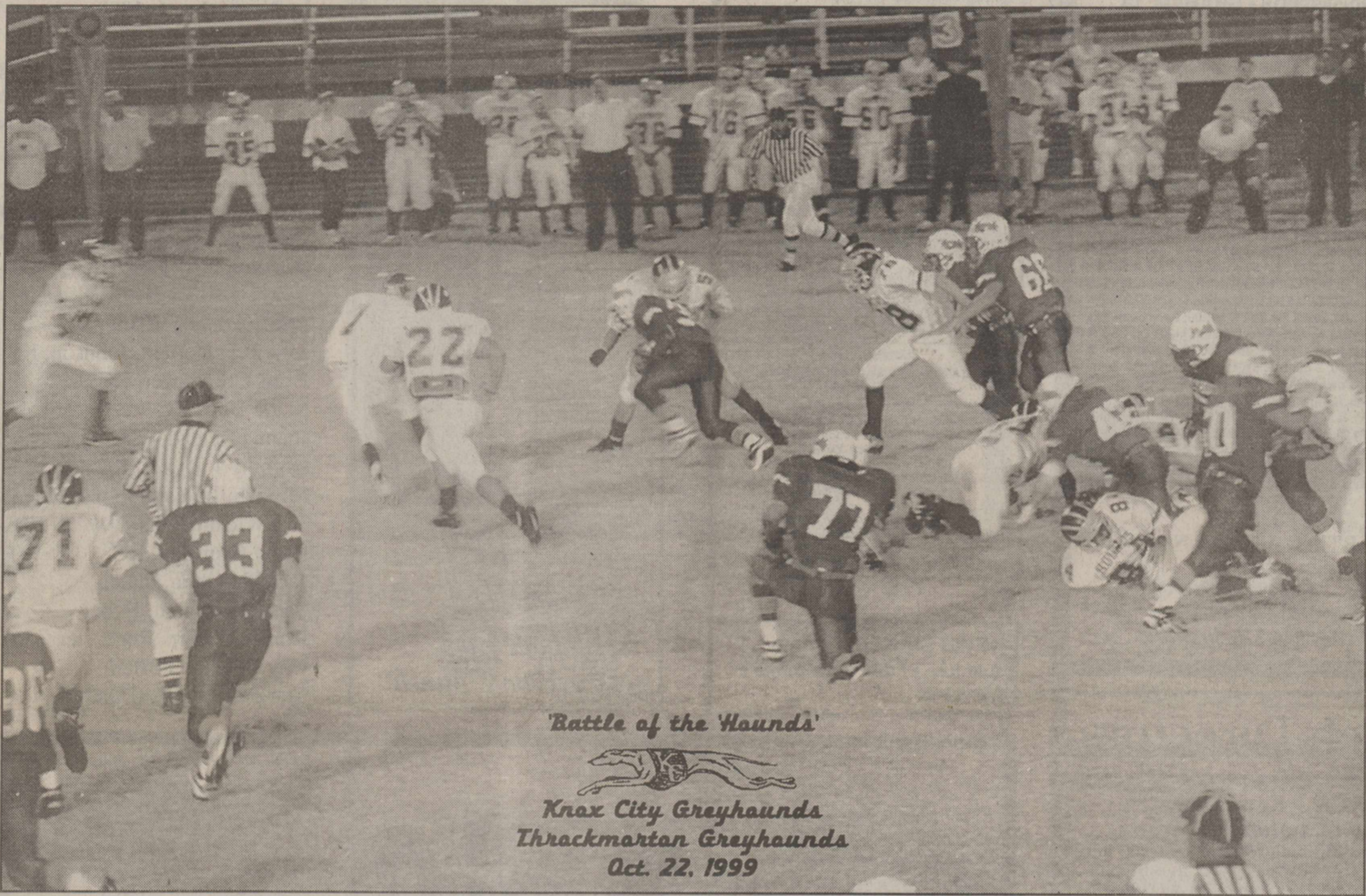
It's that time of year . . . to 'fall backward' that is!

KC's Greyhounds are 'top dogs' after 54-29 win over Throckmorton

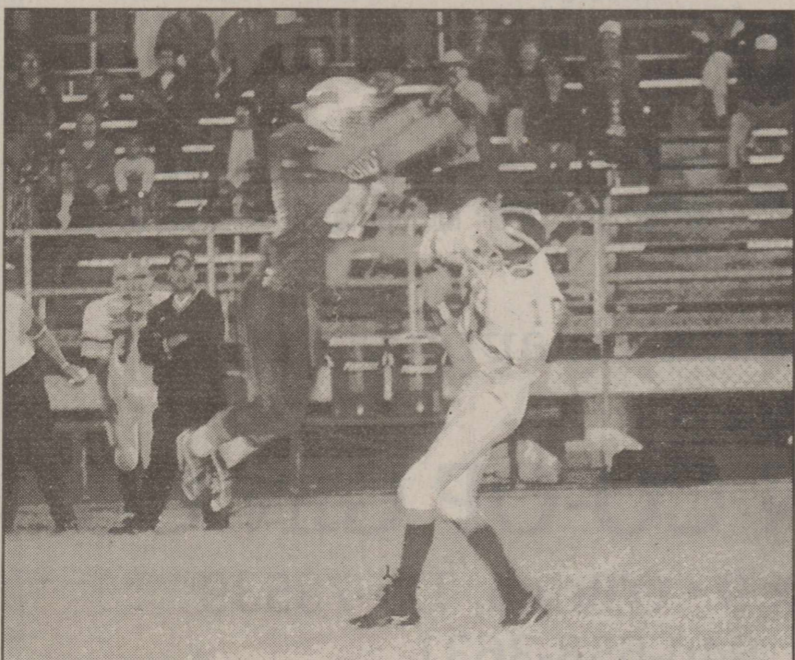

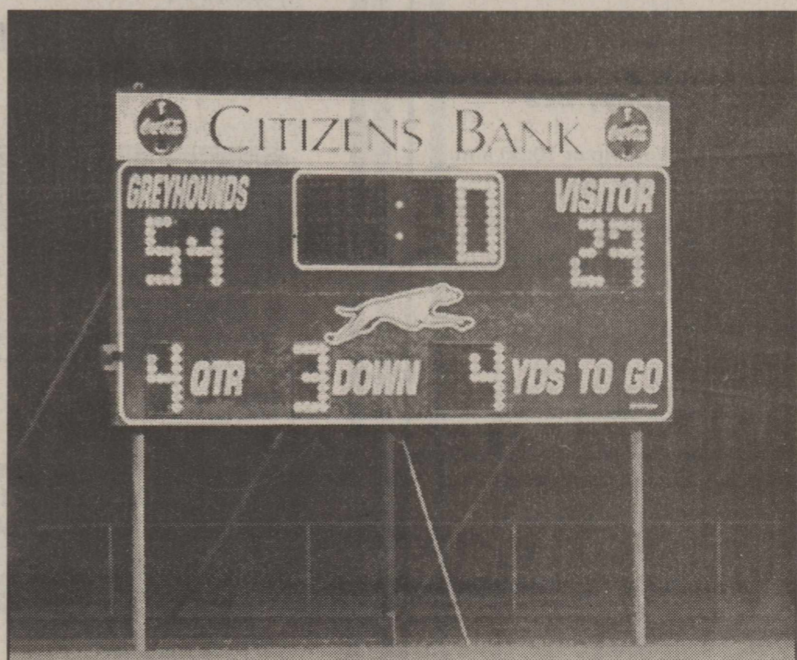

Knox County farmers eligible for \$3.2 million

In market loss assistance

WASHINGTON, D.C. - United States Representative Mac Thornberry (TX-13) is advising area farmers and ranchers that the 13th Congressional District is eligible for over \$112 million in Market Loss Assistance payments as a result of the FY 2000 Agriculture Appropriations bill that has been enacted.

Knox County farmers and ranchers are eligible for approximately \$3.2 million, Rep. Thornberry's office said.

The Market Loss Assistance Payments will be equivalent to the FY 1999 Agricultural Market Transition Act (AMTA) payments that producers received earlier this year. These are annual payments made to producers who have entered into a Production Flexibility Contract with the Commodity Credit Corporation for crop years 1996-2002.

Area counties and approximate amounts are Baylor, \$1.9 million; Cottle, \$1.4 million; Foard, \$1.3 million; King, \$420,000; and Dickens, \$1.2 million.

Two prison sentences assessed in Knox County District Court last week

Two prison sentences were assessed in the Knox County District Court last week, according to District Attorney Bill Neal.

Uvaldo Garza Fernandez, 46, of Rochester, Texas, was sentenced to a 15-year prison term for escape from felony imprisonment by District Judge David Hajek. Fernandez appeared Tuesday morning with his attorney, Andrew Ottaway of Haskell, and plead guilty to an indictment charging him with the offense.

A Knox County jury had been called to hear the case, but Fernandez changed his plea from "not guilty" to "guilty" and so the jury was excused by Judge Hajek.

According to District Attorney Neal, the State was prepared to show that the defendant was given a short furlough from the Knox County jail where he was being held after a felony DWI conviction, but failed to return when the furlough expired. He was subsequently recaptured in Rochester.

Fernandez has prior convictions for felony DWI, felony escape and robbery.

Donnie Edward Ryder, 57, of Benjamin was sentenced to a five-year prison term Tuesday in the Knox County District Court after pleading guilty to hindering a secured creditor.

The State had alleged that

Ryder had an existing loan from the First National Bank of Munday which had a mortgage on all of Ryder's agricultural assets plus proceeds from the sale of all agricultural products and animals, but that over a period of time from 1996 through 1998, Ryder had diverted more than \$200,000.00 in agricultural proceeds to other sources and institutions in violation of his loan agreement with the bank.

Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association Inspector, Scott Williamson of Haskell, was in charge of the investigation.

Ryder was represented by Marshall Capps of Crowell.

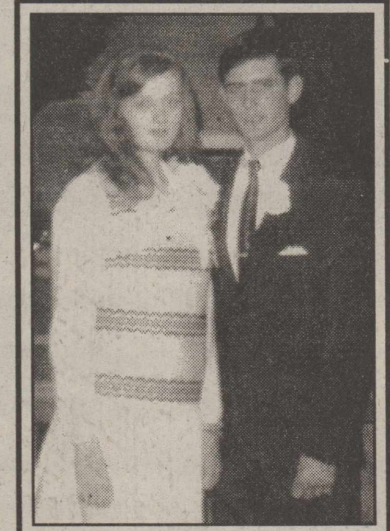

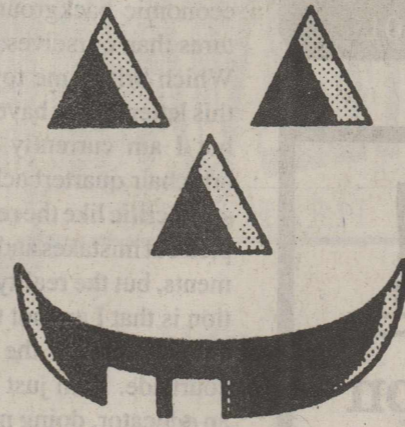

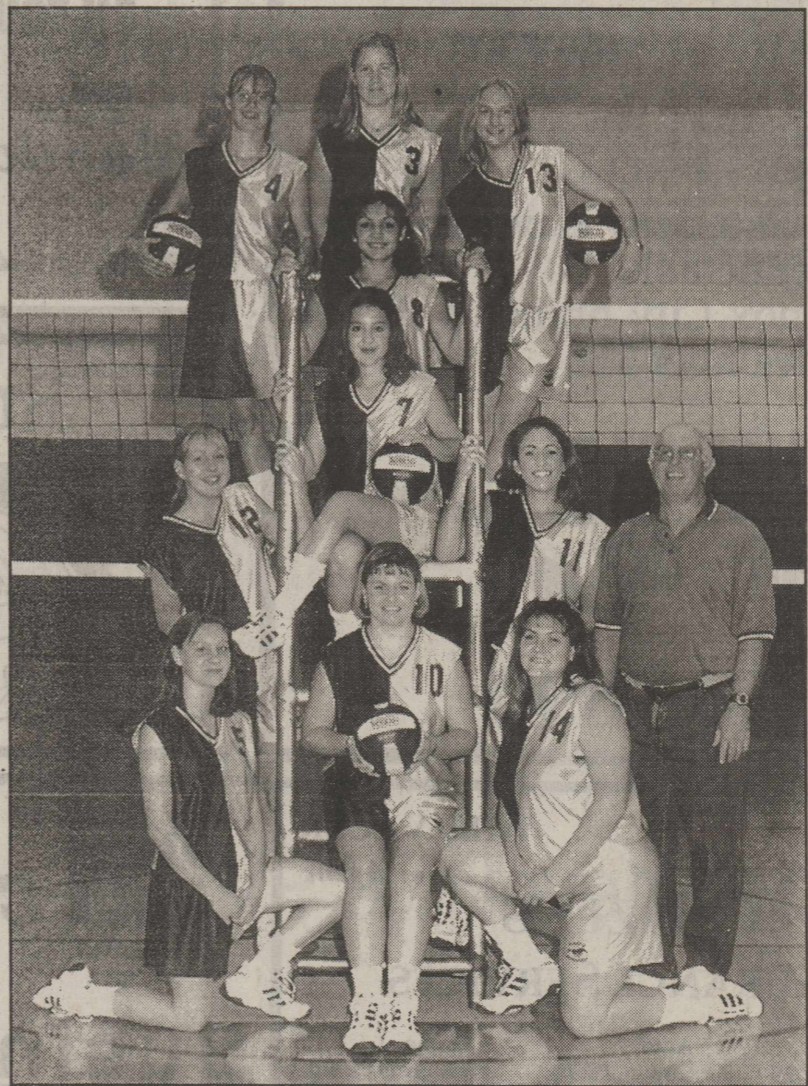

In fact, I always considered myself an encourager; one who could possibly see the student for what they could be, and not so much what I wanted them to be. In the process, the teams I coached had some good times, but winning was not always the end result. We grew not only as athletes, but as human beings as well. We learned sportsmanship, competition and values with other athletes from far different socio-economic backgrounds and cultures than ourselves.

Which brings me to the point of this letter. I may have experience, but I am currently just another armchair quarterback and grandstand critic like the rest of us. I can pick out mistakes and make judgments, but the reality of the situation is that I am not the one making the call on the sidelines or courtside. I am just a parent and an educator, doing my best to see these kids get the same opportuni-

ties that President Lincoln discussed during his famous Cooper Institute Address:

"Neither let us be slandered from our duty by false accusations against us, nor frightened from it by menaces of destruction to the Government nor of dungeons to ourselves. Let us have faith that right makes might, and in that faith, let us, to the end, dare to do our duty as we understand it."

The real question is, what as parents have we done to help, encourage and volunteer to create the "winning" in sports and life that should come along with higher education? Are we merely critics of our system, or have we truly attempted to view the situation from the kids, teachers, and coaches perspective? Have we done our duty to our community, in order to be able to someday look back at our own lives and say "I made a difference"?

I love these kids, and I truly believe in them and what they stand for. I hope and pray for my own benefit that they can see me in that perspective, and not as a harbinger of destruction or continuous criticism in their lives.
