
KTAB Player of the Week

O'Brien Middle School honored by TEA

O'Brien Middle School has been recognized by the Texas Education Agency (TEA) for successfully educating its migrant students.

TEA's Division of Migrant Education ha selected the O'Brien Middle School as a winner of the 1999 Acknowledged Campus Award given to school campuses and school districts that had high TAAS passing rates among their migrant students. Statewide, 102 school districts and 319 campuses are receiving this recognition.

The purpose of the award is to recognize school districts and campuses that strive to meet the unique needs of migrant children and their families and that help migrant students to meet high academic standards. There are approximately 116,000 migrant children in Texas.

Recipients will be listed in the program at the 1999 Texas Migrant Education Conference and will also be honored during a luncheon, both of which take place at the Hyatt Regency Hotel on the Riverwalk in San Antonio on November 21-23, 1999.

In order to receive the district award, school districts had to have at least 80 percent of their migrant student population passing each subject area and / or all tests taken of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test and have at least a 94% migrant student attendance rate.

The 102 district winners were

divided into four categories based on numbers of migrant students enrolled.

Campus winners also were awarded in the four categories of exceptional, excelling, promising and acknowledged based upon migrant student attendance and performance on the TAAS test. Statewide, some 54 campuses were distinguished as exceptional, 95 campuses as excelling, 89 campuses as promising and 81 campuses as acknowledged.

Each year the Migrant State Conference Planning Committee discusses and selects the criteria for district and campus awards. The committee includes state, regional and district migrant educa-


Father Leo Schloemer begins work at Rhineland Catholic Church and Santa Rosa in Knox City

The Knox City Police Department had another very busy month during September 1999, receiving a total of 508 calls and tasks which required attention. This total included 11 actual criminal offenses, of which 10 were cleared or otherwise handled. Seven charges were filed in regard to the above offenses, with four of the offenses involving juveniles as offender.

Traffic Charges Filed - 9, Warnings Issued - 11. Accidents - 3.

Other items reported to the Knox City Police Department during September are classified as incidents. These incidents were not able to be considered as a criminal offense, however, they must be handled in a responsible

and proper manner.

Incidents reported include: Prowler - 6, Suspicious Vehicle -3, Welfare concern - 3, Motorist Assist - 7, Open Door - 4, Dog Bite - 1, Domestic Disturbance -1, Suspicious Person - 2, Funeral Escort - 2, Civil Stand-by - 2, Alarm - 2, Fire Calls - 2.





Immunization clinic to be in Knox City this Friday, Nov. 5

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the new Community Center / Housing Authority Building in Knox City on Friday. November 5 from 10:00-11:30 and 1:00-3:00. Participants are asked to take note of the new date for this month only!!

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations. The Td immunization is available for all adults not having one in 10 years.

The Hepatitis series was required for Kindergarten entry this year. The Hepatitis B series (three immunizations) takes a minimum of 6 months to complete. Parents need to check their child's immunization record for this series if they will be starting school in the next couple of years. Even though it is not a school requirement, the Hepatitis B series is available for all school age children through the age of 19 if they or their parents want it for prevention or the child is at risk. For more information on the immunization or the disease, call the Texas Department of Health or talk to a health care provider.

The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine is available to anyone age 1 through age 15 that has not had the chickenpox. If a child is in need of this immunization, call the office to reserve a dose as the clinic only brings the amount that is reserved.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social security numbers. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor.

All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay.

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

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
