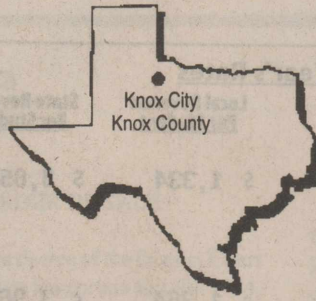

DPS reminds: Watch out for those kiddos!

AUSTIN - As the new school year starts, the Department of Public Safety reminds motorists to slow down around schools and to watch for children who may be exiting school buses. Drivers also should be aware that children may cross streets without watching where they're going.

"The first few days of school, it's easy to be distracted," Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the DPS, said. "Make sure you're alert and paying attention when you're driving especially in and around school zones or near school buses. You don't want to become part of a tragedy."

The most common time for accidents is when school buses are loading or unloading students. According to the National School Bus Loading and Unloading Survey, most children injured or killed while getting on or off buses are under the age of 10. All students should be taught to follow safety rules and to watch for traffic before crossing streets.

Texas law forbids vehicles from passing a school bus while its alternately flashing red warning lights are activated. Motorists can be fined up to \$1,000 for passing a school bus while the warning lights are activated. Subsequent violations can lead to suspension of a driver license for up to six months.

"Stopping for school buses is the law. We have zero tolerance for vehicles that pass stopped school buses; if you pass a stopped school bus, you will receive a ticket from DPS," Davis said.

This meeting is open to the general public and anyone is welcome.

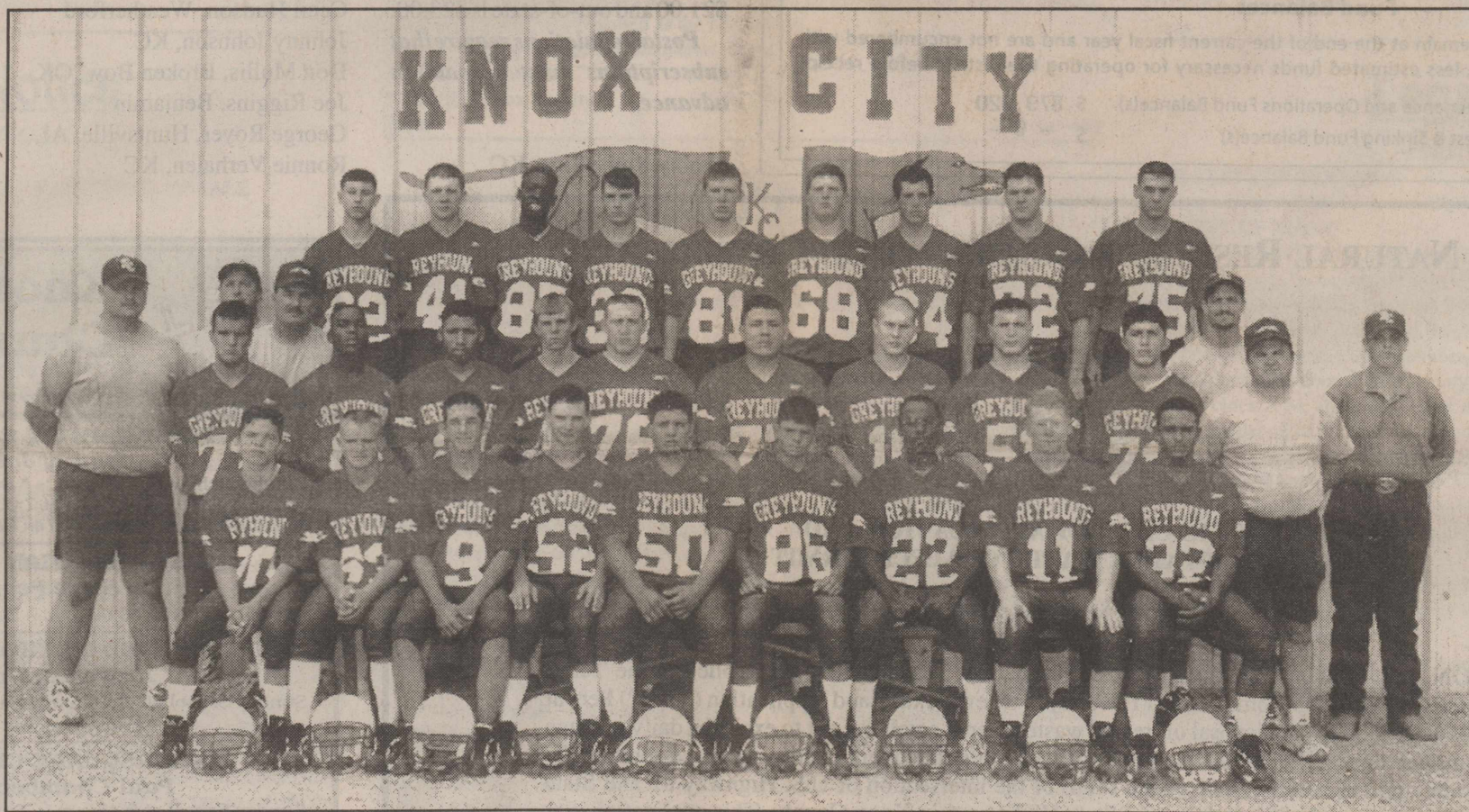

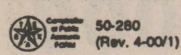
Diana Grimsley is recipient of ASU degree

NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING TO DISCUSS BUDGET AND PROPOSED TAX RATE

The BENJAMIN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT will hold a public meeting at 7:00 P.M., August 28, 2000 in Benjamin School

The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the school district's budget that will determine the tax rate that will be adopted. Public participation in the discussion is invited.

The tax rate that is ultimately adopted at this meeting or at a separate meeting at a later date may not exceed the proposed rate shown below unless the district publishes a revised notice containing the same information and comparisons set out below and holds another public meeting to discuss the revised notice.

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Notice of Rollback Rate: The highest tax rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election is 1.4548. This election will be automatically held if the district adopts a rate in excess of the rollback rate of 1.4548.

VRJC semester registrations set at two locations

Students may register for the fall 2000 semester at Vernon Regional Junior College at two locations.

Registration is Thursday, August 17, at Century City Center for the three Wichita Falls centers. Registration on the Vernon campus will be held Monday, August 21, at the Osborne Administration Building.

At Century City Center, students may register from (J-R) 9:30 a.m. to 11:15 a.m., (S-Z) 11:15 a.m. to 1 p.m., (A-C) 2:30 to 4:15 p.m., and (D-I) 4:15 to 5:30 p.m. For the convenience of the students, registration is done by alphabetical order. Students register at their time indicated or any time after their letter has been passed. The 11-week semester starts Wednesday, August 23.

At the Vernon campus, registration is scheduled from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 4 - 5:30 p.m. Students may register at any time during these hours. The 16-week semester starts Wednesday, August 23.

For students who cannot attend classes on campus, 30 classes are available online and six by video tape. For internet and video tape classes, students are required to attend an orientation. The schedule for orientation can be found in the class schedule.

First-time students should fill out an application, have high school or college transcripts sent to the registrar's office, have TASP scores, and have their trial schedule signed by a VRJC advisor.

NOTICE OF RECEIPT OF APPLICATION AND INTENT TO OBTAIN A WATER QUALITY PERMIT

PERMIT NO. 11162-001

APPLICATION. City of Benjamin, P.O. Box 286, Benjamin, Texas 79505, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) to renew Texas Land Application (TLAP) Permit No. 11162-0001 to authorize the disposal of treated wastewater at a volume not to exceed a daily average of 42,500 gallons per day via irrigation. The domestic wastewater treatment facility is located south of the City of Benjamin, approximately 3/4 of a mile south of the intersection of U.S. Highway 82 and State Highway 6 and approximately 800 feet west of State Highway 6 in Knox County. This application was submitted to the TNRCC on June 23, 2000. The permit application is available for viewing and copying at City Hall, 101 West Cedar, Benjamin, Texas.

The TNRCC executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. After completion of the technical review, the TNRCC will issue a Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision.

MAILING LISTS. You may ask to be placed on a mailing list to obtain additional information on this application by sending a request to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address below. You may also ask to be on a county-wide mailing list to receive public notices for TNRCC permits in the county.

PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about his application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. The TNRCC will hold a public meeting if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

Written public comments or requests for public meeting must be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TNRCC, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, TX 78711-3087.

ADDITIONAL NOTICE. After technical review of the application is complete, the executive director may prepare a draft permit and will issue a preliminary decision on the application. Notice of the Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the county-wide mailing list or the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the final deadline for submitting public comments.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. The response to comments, along with the executive director's decision for the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who requested to be on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting reconsideration of the executive director's decision and for requesting a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn. The TNRCC may act on an application to renew a permit for discharge of wastewater without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

Brush control study results to be discussed

An important meeting to discuss the results of the brush control study for the Wichita River Watershed will be held Thursday, August 24, at 7:00 p.m. in the Benjamin Community Center.

The preliminary results of the feasibility study to determine the effectiveness of brush control for enhanced water yield in the Wichita River Watershed will be presented.

Presenters will discuss the water yield increases that are expected as a result of brush control, the estimated costs of brush control, the benefits of brush control to ranchers, the cost-share rate that will be recommended, and the cost to the state for the additional water. This study was sponsored by the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board will present the results of this study to the Texas Legislature during its next session. Interested persons are asked to attend to judge for themselves the value of this project.

'The Greatest Generation' to be commemorated by the Knox County Veterans Memorial monument

Historian J.M. Roberts in his history *The Twentieth Century* (pg. 432) states, "The numbers of WWII casualties may never be exactly known: it seems that more than 50 million people must have perished around the world in war related deaths."

Tom Brokaw states in "The Greatest Generation" surviving young American soldiers just out of high school from 1941-1945 were shipping just ahead of or just behind annihilation from battle to battle.

All the more than 2250 youth to be commemorate by the Knox County Veterans Memorial were at risk for the above. One nature loving Knox County youth, William Victor Lowry, was one of these. His granddaughter, Ember Josselet, narrated his war journey for her school assignment in 1995.

From 1942 to November of 1945, as an airforce technical sergeant, in the 4-31 Division, following the gallant 41st Infantry Division, assembling plane parts, young Victor dodged the bullets for almost three years through 16 moves and battle zones counting training, war zones, and hospital stays battling malaria. During most of this time, he feared most losing a limb, worse than death, because of his passion for hunting

and fishing and his need to be viable for that kind of life.

Among those several battle moves in the South Pacific at Herlandea Dutch New Guinea right behind the 41st Infantry, his division experienced something beside bullets and better to eat than K rations. The routed Japs had left behind large vegetable gardens of sweet potatoes and eggplant. The whole division feasted.

At this location, his commanding officer, Major McGuire brought Charles Lindberg to their tent to introduce him to their squadron. Lindberg, a civilian, was called Colonel to escape being shot if captured. His major mission was to train the teams to get more fuel mileage out of their P38 planes.

The natives, Victor and Lindberg, enjoyed fishing together by dropping grenades into the water which caused a large catch to surface.

They were in the Gulf of the Philippines when the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima in August 1945. The boat from Manila to Olympia, Washington, took two weeks. There he remained hospitalized with malaria.

On his long train ride home from Washington to discharge in

San Antonio, the train stopped in his home town, Quanah. He "de-trained" there for a two week reunion with his family before continuing to the last of those 16 stops, San Antonio where he received his honorable discharge as a tech sergeant, November 1945.

Zigzagging as a target throughout the South Pacific for nearly three years at a time with U.S. military casualties mounted to 291,557, Victor Lowry survived to return to nature as a game warden in several Texas areas, last among the Knox County.

On Labor Day, the final list of over 2250 Knox County veterans' available names will begin being engraved in granite at the sight of Willis Monument of Granite, Oklahoma. Every effort has been made to locate the available named of every eligible Knox County veteran. Some are bound to have been missed, despite the committee's and the county's best efforts. The monument committee's earnest hope is that as many names as possible have been accounted for and spelled correctly on that submitted list. Monument dedication will honor these names on November 11 thanks to a county citizenship that sensed the historic reality of The Greatest Generation.
