

Greyhounds advance to Bi-District playoff game

The Knox City Greyhounds will be traveling to Childress this Friday night to take on the Petersburg Buffalos in the Bi-District Playoff game despite a 23-20 loss last Friday night to the Paducah Dragons.

Finishing the regular season as the District Runners-Up with a 4-1 District record, Coach Lynn Lierly's Greyhounds are recovering from injuries this week as they prepare for the Friday trip to Childress. With several key players injured in the game against Paducah, the 'Hounds will be counting on quick recoveries and back-up team members.

While the scoreboard lights showed a final score of 23 to 20 in favor of the home team last Friday night, the visiting Greyhounds had no reason to hang their heads. Taking on the state ranked Dragons was a task that some thought impossible, but the 'Hounds jumped out to a quick lead and maintained that lead until the final minutes of the third quarter. The first three offensive drives by Knox City were stalled by a strong Paducah defense, but the 'Hounds kept on driving down the field until Sophomore Gemile Roberson scored on a 1 yard run into the end zone with 43 seconds left in the first quarter. The extra point kick by Junior Shawn Speck went wide, leaving the Greyhounds first on the scoreboard with 6 points. The Dragons second offensive series of the second quarter was stopped when Sophomore Scooter Thompson intercepted a Paducah pass on the 7 yard line with 8 minutes left before the half. Taking over on offense, Sophomore Sedrick Roberson fumbled the ball on first down with Paducah recovering.

That fumble led to a Paducah touchdown on 4th down when Patrick Hemphill scored from the 3 yard line. The extra point kick was good, putting the Dragons up

On the very next offensive series by Knox City, Greyhound quarterback Sedrick Roberson threw a perfect pass to his brother, Gemile Roberson, who carried the ball down to the Dragon 5 yard line before being brought down. With the visiting Greyhound fans cheering wildly, Roberson delivered again by throwing a pass into the end zone with Shawn Speck receiving for the 2 point conversion. With Knox City ahead by a score of 14-7, the defensive units from both teams played their best, holding firm until Knox City Senior Justin Vasquez recovered a Dragon fumble on the Knox City 30 yard line, stopping what might have been a Paducah scoring drive.

After the halftime ceremonies


and performances by both bands, the Dragons and Greyhounds squared off once again in a strong defensive battle that held until Paducah scored on a 50 yard run by Patrick Hemphill with 8:57 left in the third quarter. The extra point attempt failed, leaving the Greyhounds ahead by one point, 14, 13

Paducah was next to score again as their quarterback ran for 23 yards into the end zone with 1:56 left in the third quarter. The 2 point conversion was good, putting the Dragons out front for the first time in the game, 21-14.

With 9:40 left in the fourth and final quarter, Senior Aaron Sanchez recovered a Paducah fumble on the 7 yard line. That fumble recovery was instrumental in setting up the Greyhound's next touchdown. The extra point attempt by Shawn Speck failed, leaving the score at 21-20 in favor of the Dragons.

With 1:44 left in the game, Paducah fumbled on the 1 yard line. Knox City recovered and tried to mount an offensive drive from there but all hopes for any further scoring ended when back-up quarterback Carlos Ruiz was tackled behind the goal line for a safety and a 23-20 final score in favor of the Paducah Dragons.

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
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
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
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Knox City's Winter Wonderland


Local girl to compete in youth program





Hundreds attend dedication

The population of Benjamin, Texas increased by about 500 people this past Saturday as visitors filled the small West Texas community to attend the dedication of Knox County's Veterans Memorial:

Located at the crossroads of U.S. Highway 82 and Texas Highway 6 in Benjamin, the memorial salutes veterans from Knox County who have served in the armed forces of the United States of America during periods of wars and conflicts. Honoring those veterans who gave their lives during wartime service, those who have died since their service, and the many veterans still living today, the marble pillars stand as silent testimony to the sacrifice made by so many who have and still call Knox County their home.

A project of the Knox County Historical Commission, funds for design and construction of the memorial came from private donations from residents all over the county and many former residents who live all over the United States.

The Saturday morning ceremony was also a tribute to the many veterans in attendance with many on the trailer that served as a stage being veterans themselves. WWII veteran Charles Baker of Munday was the Emcee and Master of Ceremonies. Knox County Judge David N. Perdue gave the welcome, and the Reverend John Gillispie, who is also a WWII veteran and the Knox County Veterans Service Officer, gave the invocation. Donnie Roberts of O'Brien sang "God Bless the USA." Elementary Students from Benjamin Elementary School led the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag, and a United States Army Color Guard from Fort Sill, Oklahoma presided over the flag raising of both the United States flag and the Texas State flag. The color guard also fired

a 21 gun salute with M-16 rifles and a soldier performed the haunting sound of 'Taps' on a bugle. Weathered Veterans from World War II, Korea, Viet Nam, and Desert Storm were seen wiping away the tears during 'Taps' as they remembered those who gave the ultimate sacrifice in service to their country.

A poem was read by Korean veteran and author Fred Crenshaw, and the featured speaker for the ceremony was Major Keith Wells, United States Marine Corps Retired. As a lieutenant in the Marines during WWII, Wells was a highly decorated platoon leader, commanding the men who raised the U.S. Flag on Iwo Jima. That action is commemorated at the U.S. Marine Corp Memorial in Washington, D.C.

The dedication was announced by Knox County resident Alice Partridge, Chairman of the Knox County Historical Commission, followed by a quartet from Munday singing the National Anthem.

Following the dedication ceremony, hundreds of those present had an opportunity to look at names inscribed on the memorial. Many found the names of family members, relatives or friends, and it seemed that just being able to touch the engraved letters and names of those no longer alive brought a feeling of peace to family members present for the dedication ceremony. Many of those veterans still living could be seen wiping away tears as they found their own names, as well as those of friends no longer alive to see the memorial for themselves.



Knox City's Will Burkham gaining national recognition as bull rider

Will Burkham competed in the NJBRA (National Junior Bull Riders Association) 2000 National Finals in Muskogee, OK Nov. 3-5. At the National Finals, Will placed 11th in the Pee Wee Bull division competing against 30 cowboys out of 6 Regions from 4 states (Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico & California). He competed in the first 2 sections of the finals covering both bulls drawn for a total of 144 points. He was 9 points out of 1st place and 1 point out of 10th place with only the top 10 qualifying for the short go of the National Finals. He rode for a score of 74 points to win 2nd place on his bull in the second round of the 2000 National Fi-

The Pee Wee Bull division was very tough all season. These bulls ranged in weight from 650 to 800 pounds. Will's accomplishments for the 2000 NJBRA season include 7 - 1st place, 4 - 2nd place and 3 no scores. He received the "High Point Ride" award at the year end awards ceremony for his score of 78 points while riding "Freeze" at Brock's Arena in Golden, OK. He placed 4th in the Region 2 finals and 11th overall at the 2000 National Finals.

On April 2, 2000, he broke his knee while competing at a buckout in Antlers, OK. He was out of the

bull riding circuit for 8 weeks in a full leg cast. Will never lost his heart for bull riding as he missed attending only 1 of the events while he was injured. After his 8 weeks were up and the doctor released him, he had 2 weeks to regain the strength needed to stay on top of the 800 pound bull that he would draw at his first bull riding event. To accomplish this, he faithfully did the exercises to regain the range of motion in his knee, wore ankle weights, and bucked his bucking barrel for at least 1-2 hours each day. Will had only ridden in 3 bull riding events when he was injured. When he returned to the bull riding circuit in July, he was 5th in the region standings. He was determined to try for 1st in the standings knowing that he most likely didn't have enough NJBRA events left in the season to accomplish this goal. His second NJBRA competition after his injury was held at Frost Arena (Lane Frost's parents -. Clyde and Elsie Frost) in Lane. OK. This was the turning point in his season as he competed against 9 bull riders. Will was 1st with a 70 point ride. Out of the 10 bull riding events he attended after his injury he had 7 1 st place, 1second place and 2 no scores. It was through his determination to come back strong and try for the

1st place standing in the Region 2 finals that he was able to finish the 2000 NJBRA season with pride. His standing of 4th place in Region 2 with a point total of 247 was awesome because he was 48 points out of 1st and only 8 points out of 3rd.

If you have been around the Rodeo circuit at all you can appreciate the hard work that has gone into this young man's season. If you haven't been around it, you don't have any idea the '~adrenaline high" that comes with an 8 second ride. Ask Will - he will tell you all about it.





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
