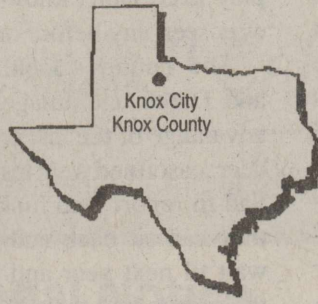


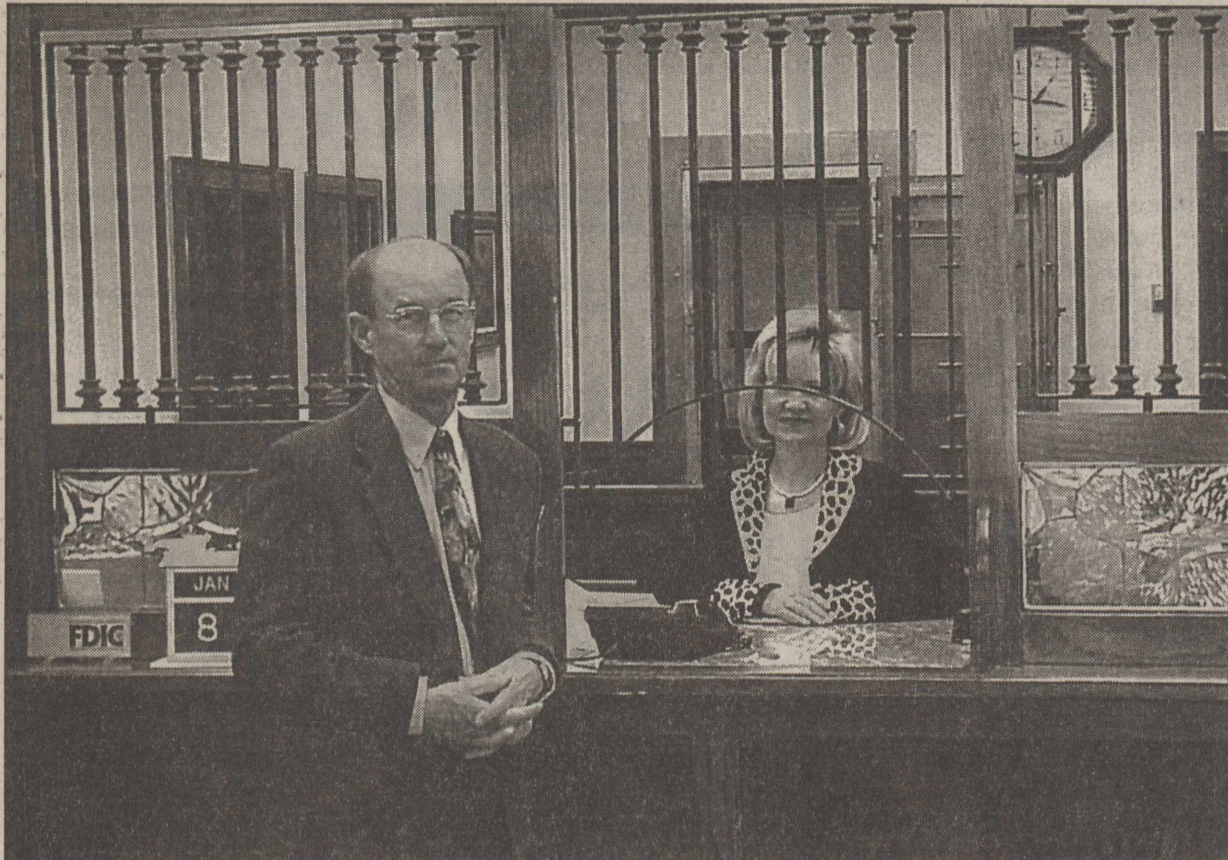

First National Bank of Munday completes acquisition of Rochester's Home State Bank

Bob McWhorter, President of The First National Bank in Munday, has announced that the bank has bought Home State Bank in Rochester. Both the Rochester and Stamford locations are now a part of First National Bank in Munday.

With the acquisition, The First National Bank in Munday has assets of \$50 million. The combined assets of the parent company, First Baird Bancshares, Inc, and affiliates are \$310 million. The affiliates include First National Bank of Baird with branches in Clyde

and Abilene, First National Bank of Weatherford, Western American National Bank in Bedford, and First Security Bank of Beaver, Oklahoma.

Joe E. Sharp, Chairman, stated that he is pleased to expand the bank's territory to include Rochester and Stamford. Several of the affiliate banks are in rural areas, and the agricultural expertise is extensive among the management team.

Haskell-Knox Underground Water Conservation District opens office

The Haskell-Knox Underground Water Conservation District has opened an office at 135 North Munday Avenue in the offices of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority in Munday.

The district was formed after an enabling election in January 1999 in Haskell and Knox counties. Baylor County was annexed into the district after an annexation election in August 2000. The enabling legislation provided for the Board of Directors to be elected from Haskell and Knox counties. Legislation is being drafted for introduction into the 77th Legislature to provide for a name change to Rolling Plains Groundwater Conservation District. The legislation will also allow for a change in the length of terms for the Directors and the number of Directors. This will allow equal representation of the member counties on the Board of Directors.

The District has employed Mike McGuire as interim office manager. Kim Brockett will serve

as secretary for the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority and the Haskell-Knox Underground Water Conservation District.

The current Board of Directors is Sammy B. White - Chairman, Louis Lee Baty - Secretary, Greg Clonts, James Dunlap, Bill Thomas, Dolan Moore, Joe Tidwell, Larry Short, Russell Beakley and Ed Murphy.

The District is formulating rules and regulations for the operation of the District. A public hearing will be held on Thursday, January 18, 2001, at 7:00 p.m. at the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, 135 North Munday Avenue, Munday, Texas, in conjunction with the regular monthly Board of Directors meeting.

Copies of the proposed rules and regulations may be obtained from the Haskell-Knox UWCD office at 135 North Munday Avenue, Munday, Texas or the County Extension Offices in Baylor, Haskell or Knox counties.

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News subscription prices increase

U.S. Postal Service raises rates for newspaper mailings

With the recent raise in mailing fees recently announced by the U.S. Postal Service, we are forced to raise our subscription rates for The Knox County news. This is not a move we want to make, but one that is necessary in order to pay for the increased mailing rates and printing cost of the newspaper.

The raise as detailed in the chart to the right is effective immediately as the increase in postal mailing costs went into effect this week.

It has been many years since we raised subscription rates, trying to keep the cost down for readers who choose to receive their newspaper by mail. Other newspapers in our area have raised rates since our last increase, but we held off as long as possible.

What makes this latest postal increase rather hard to swallow is the exceptionally poor overall service that we receive from the U.S. Postal Service. I am not referring to our local post office, our local Postmaster and postal workers are as good to us as they can possibly be, the problems happen once our papers leave the Knox City Post Office. The sorting center in Abilene seems to operate marginally at best and papers are always being sent to the wrong areas or otherwise delayed in shipment.

We label, bundle and bag our out of town papers according to post office regulations, we deliver them to the loading dock, and then hold our breath and cross our fingers while we hope they reach our subscribers. Many times one customer will receive a bundle for a whole town in their mailbox and other times papers are one, two, or three weeks in getting to their destinations. Just one example is how long it takes for our newspapers to reach Munday, our neighbors just 13 miles to the East. We mail them on Wednesday afternoon and they are not delivered until Friday, Saturday, or at times, Monday. We could hand deliver them to the Munday Post Office every week to save time, but are not able to because we have been told that would be against postal regulations. So, by our conforming to postal regulations, Munday

subscribers have to wait while their newspapers travel from Knox City to Abilene, to Dallas, to Wichita Falls and then to Munday. Simply by looking at a Texas map, there must be someone in the postal service who could figure out a better way for the papers to travel just 13 miles!!!

Over the years, we have lost more subscribers due to poor and untimely postal delivery service than any other reason. We hope that we will not lose any more due to this rate increase, but we are forced to make the change in order to keep this newspaper alive in what has been a very tough economic time for small newspapers in rural areas.

Again, we apologize to our subscribers for the immediate rate increase, and we assure you that we do appreciate each of our subscribers and readers.

CELL TALK

Introduction

While appearing in a column format, this article is a paid advertisement that will appear periodically to discuss topics that pertain to cell phone use and to pass on new information about service, products and accessories.

Service

When referring to service, there are a few terms that a cell phone user must be familiar with in order to make using a cell phone cost effective. The many different cell phone rate plans and contracts offer various minutes of air time for free, extra minutes for a by-the-minute-fee, and certain areas where use is either free of paid for. A 'Home Area' is the designated geographical area where the cell phone company offers its customers the use of their cell phones without any extra fees, just those agreed upon and outlined in the contract that every customer signs. Once a customer leaves that designated area, their cell phone will still provide service, but they will pay what is known as a 'Roaming Fee'. This fee is charged by cell phone companies outside the customer's service area that allow use of a cell phone by another company's customers within their service area. The fee charged varies by company, but traditionally ranges from 25¢ to 49¢ a minute of airtime use. That fee varies from company to company and area to area. To help the user, most cell phones will let you know when you are roaming, so it is always a good idea to keep those conversations shorter when the phone is in a roaming mode.... or pay much higher bills!

What Works Where

The types of cell phone service are probably what is the most confusing to customers. Basically, there are currently three types of cell phone service offered in the United States. Those are identified as 'Analog' or 'Digital'. Analog service is the older form of transmission that we currently use in this area. Digital is the newer form of transmission that most companies are switching over to. The difference in layman's terms might be compared to the difference between AM and FM radio, or regular cable television reception and satellite television reception.

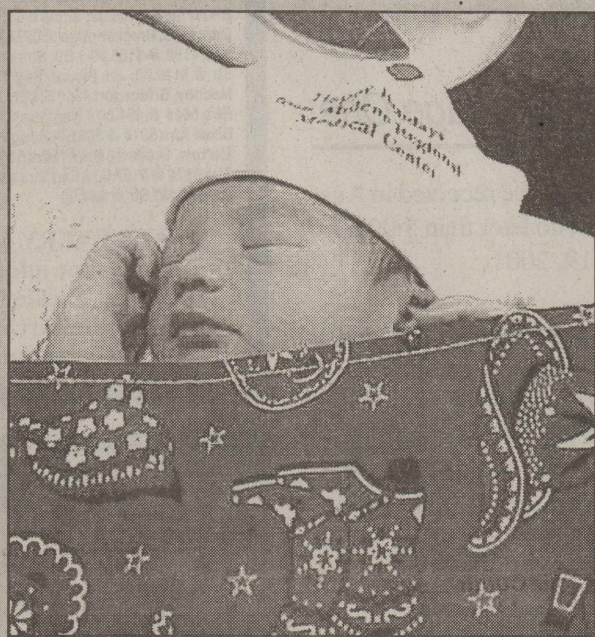
If you have a cell phone that is strictly an Analog service model, it will not work in an area that offers just Digital service, and vice-versa, if you have a cell phone that is strictly Digital, it will not work in an area that offers Analog only service. So, don't let anyone tell you that your phone will work anywhere because it may not! This is why buying old used cell phones at garage sales or flea market type sales is so risky, you might just be throwing your money away. Many manufacturers now offer 'Dual-Mode' phones, those that will work in either Digital or Analog service. This might be something to keep in mind if you travel a lot and need to use your phone on the road.

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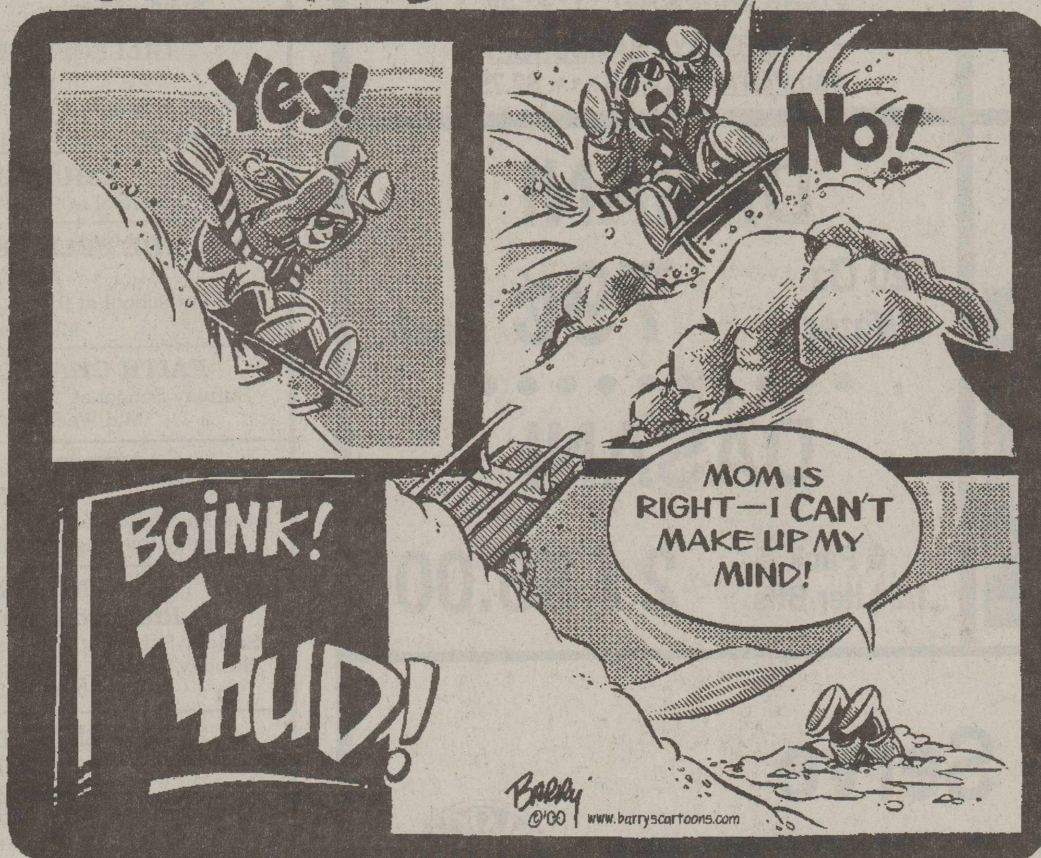
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Foster/adoptive families needed

Child abuse and neglect - we all like to think it happens in other people's towns and in other communities, not our own. But child abuse can and does happen in Texas and in our community.

When child abuse occurs and it is serious enough to remove the child, the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services (TDPRS) must have safe and loving families to call upon for these children to stay temporarily while the agency works with the family to reunite them. These families are foster families.

When the family and the child/children cannot be reunited and parental rights are terminated, then an adoptive family is needed for that child or children.

TDPRS is currently in need of more foster and adoptive families in our 30 county region to care for these children. We are in need of families that will care for older children, sibling groups and medically fragile children.

Orientation classes will be held in Haskell on January 16 from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church located at 201 North Avenue F, in Sweetwater on January 22 at Tri-County Advocacy Center, 317 Oak Street, from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m.; and in Brownwood on January 11 at the TDPRS office, 301 Main Street, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m.

Activities of proactive citizens for the benefit of everyone

The new year is here with the excitement of the challenges and opportunities before us. Work seems to be continuous on numerous areas of the community's water and sewer services. Regrettably we have older service lines throughout the city that tend to cause problems, but with the direction of the city council we are working to perform repairs of a more permanent nature. My personal thanks and admiration go out to the men who are continuing to dedicate themselves to keeping our city services functioning in this weather that is definitely less than desirable to be working in.

Meetings with Santa Rosa Telephone Cooperative representatives have begun with the intent of having another telephone service provider in our town. Their plans are to be able to provide a completely up to date service throughout the community and rural areas with an almost completely underground service of fiber optic lines. They are also looking at building a service facility in the downtown area that would serve to aid in

revitalizing the main street area of town. Once that all of the details are worked out I hope to be able to provide you with more details of what benefits we can expect.

The survey of the cemetery is beginning at this time to give us the actual boundaries of the property. Once this is complete we are prepared to begin the work on the concrete footing for the new fence that will eventually encompass the entire facility. Careful planning is going into this effort so that none of the existing property will be adversely affected.

We are developing plans to incorporate the current pillars into the new layout and restoring the flag pole to use the way it was intended.

This project is one of the most ambitious undertakings by anyone in the area for a number of years and will take some time to complete, but with the financial help of donors and the assistance of city workers we believe that Knox City will soon have a cemetery that will serve as a credit to our community and the respect that we fell for those who have

gone before us.

Tree trimming and street cleaning have fallen to the wayside during this past time of inclement weather and water leaks, but we have not forgotten our pledge to the citizens. As soon as we can get a break from working on the daily emergencies caused by water leaks and sewer clogs we will return to the cleanup project begun this fall. As much as we want to accomplish everything needed in town, we are restricted by time and manpower constraints. Each of our projects have been prioritized and remain a part of our daily plan.

More projects are in various stages of planning for the upcoming year and we are excited about the possibilities and effects that are hoped for with each acquired objective. We continue to accept community ideas, input and designs for the use of the vacant lot across from City Hall. We want this to be a project of your choosing and design because we want this to be something that will be utilized by every segment of the community. Bring us your ideas and designs so that we can begin this project by early spring.

gible to take any section of the exit level test that they have not yet mastered. In addition, individuals who are out of school may test at the spring administration.

Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and who wish to register to retake the TAAS test and all individuals who wish to take the TEAMS test, may pick up a registration packet at the high school principal's office in the Benjamin or Knox City High School. The test registration form must be completed and returned in the pre-addressed envelope

and must be received in Austin, Texas, no later than 5:00 p.m. January 19, 2001.

The Texas Education Agency and NCS Pearson will not be responsible for registration forms that are delayed or lost in the mail. To ensure that individuals are registered, forms should be sent by either registered mail or certified mail. 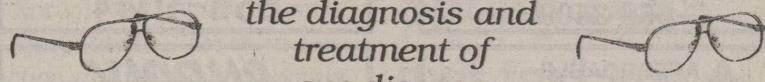

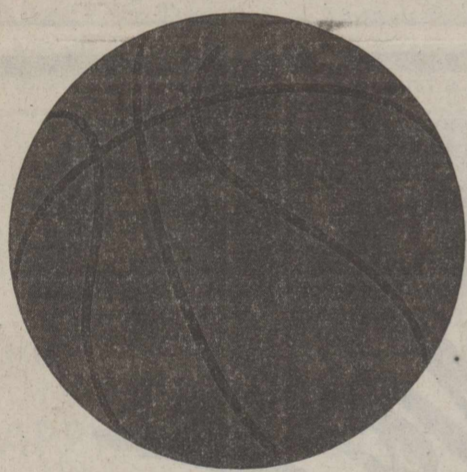
