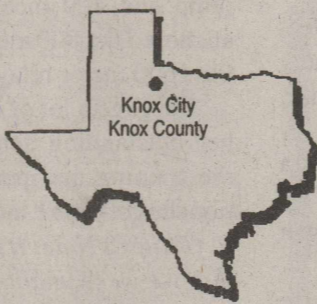

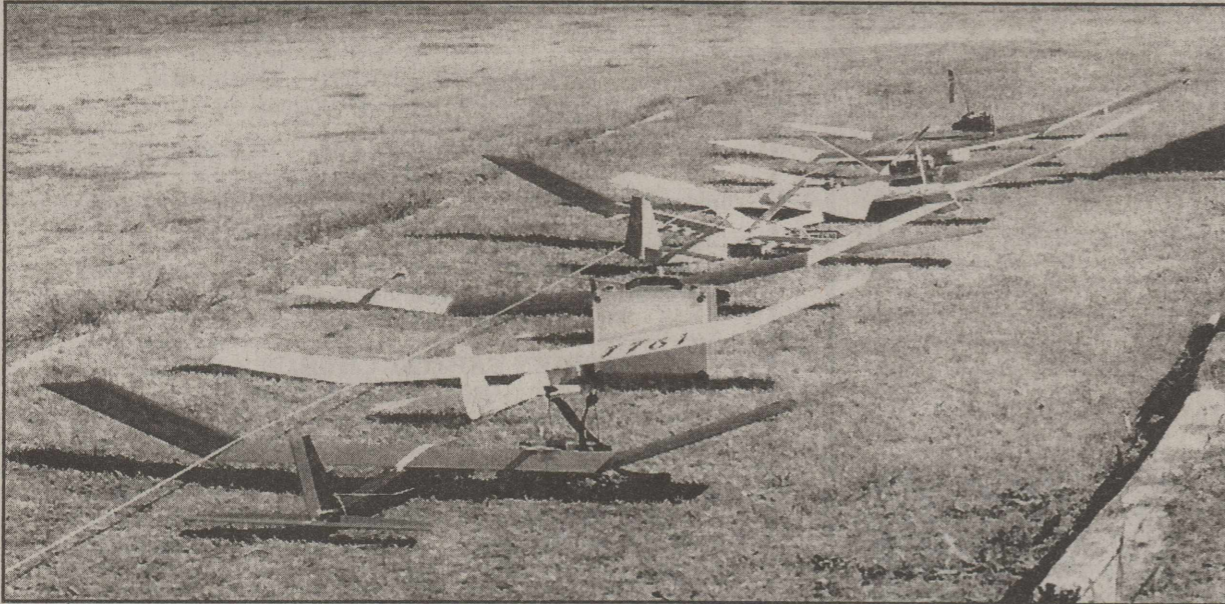

KVRP marks twenty years on the air, to celebrate Thursday

At first, it was just an idea that few thought could work. Put a 100,000-watt FM radio station in Haskell? Combine country music with local and regional sports and first-rate weather coverage? Carry farm news and commodity reports during the week, and Christian music on Sunday mornings? No, said the experts, this isn't how you do radio.

Twenty years' worth of broadcasting have proven the "experts" wrong, and KVRP is still going strong. Station owners, Ken and Nelda Lane, and their staff invite their friends and listeners to an "Open House" at the station going on all day, Thursday, April 5, with free hot dogs and drinks served from 11 until 1. The studios are at 1401 North First Street in Haskell.

KVRP's first test signal aired on April 3, 1981, and commercial broadcasting began on April 8. Much has changed for the station in the two decades since.

In 1986, Lane bought AM station KDWT in Stamford, renaming it KVRP-AM. In August 2000, the station changed its frequency from its original 95.5 to 97.1, because of an expansion of frequencies in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

The last 20 years have also seen many technological changes at the station. The turntables where announcers once played records are long gone, replaced by CD machines that can hold a hundred

disks each. Commercials are recorded digitally now and fed directly into computer, instead of being put on tape. Automation systems allow totally "hands-free" operations during overnight hours.

Lane says that while much has changed since the station first signed on, his basic philosophy has not changed. "We're in the communication business," he says. "That means we have to identify a need that is not being served, then fill that need. Good radio is about serving the needs of a community, or in our case, several communities."

KVRP's programming features country music. The station carried Texas Rangers baseball and Dallas Cowboys football games, as well as Texas Tech football, and men's and women's Tech basketball. The station also broadcasts area high school football, basketball and baseball games.

Lane says he is particularly proud of the job the station does providing weather coverage for this area. To supplement weather data and forecasts from the National Weather Service, KVRP has its own in-house color weather radar - the only one of its kind between Abilene and Wichita Falls.

One of the newest services offered by KVRP is "streaming" audio, allowing Internet users to listen from anywhere in the world. The address is www.kvrp.com.

Inn the top of the 6th inning, catcher Scooter Thompson, made a great play by backing up an overthrow by the shortstop Nefro Gonzales to the first baseman Jay Sandusky to make the first out of the inning by tagging out the runner as he turned toward second base on his comeback to first base. This type of heads up baseball has contributed to the success of the Greyhound team so far.

If you are a baseball fan, I urge you to come out and support your Greyhound team. They still have 8 games left on the schedule before the playoffs.

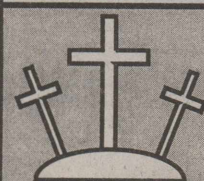

The Knox City Athletic Booster Club meeting will introduce the new athletic director Wayne E. Hutchinson at their Thursday meeting.

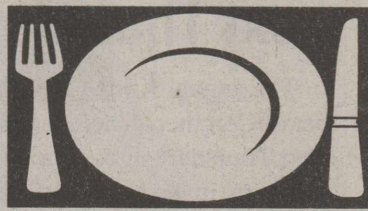
The meeting will begin at approximately 8:00 p.m. following the one act play presentation in the high school library.

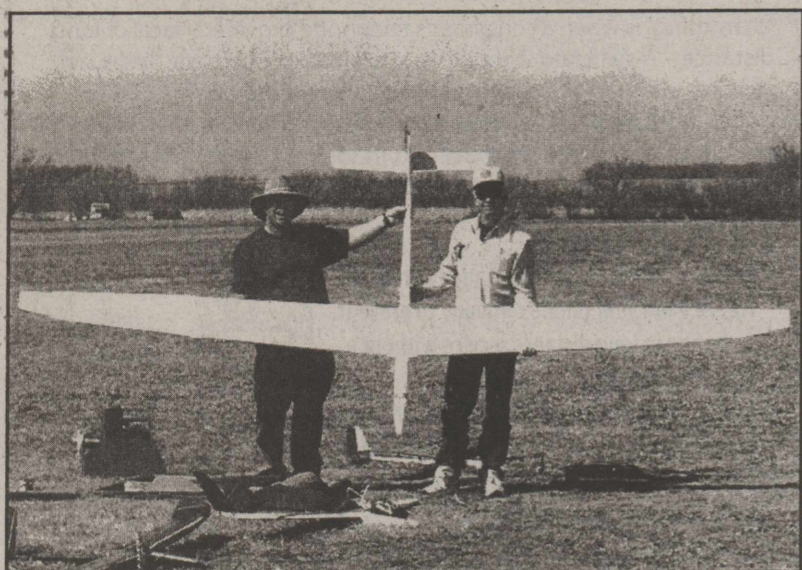

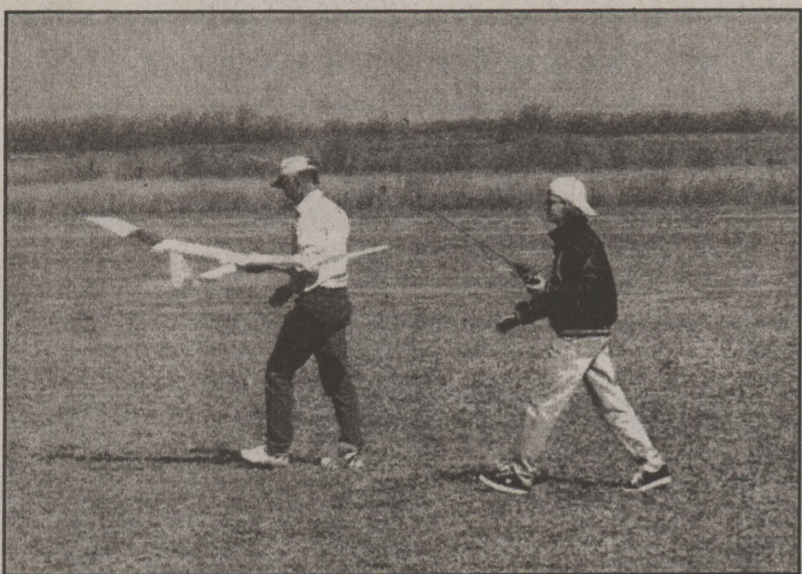
In spite of windy conditions, the sailplane contest held this past weekend just north of Knox City was considered to be a great success by Steve Pepper, organizer for the event.

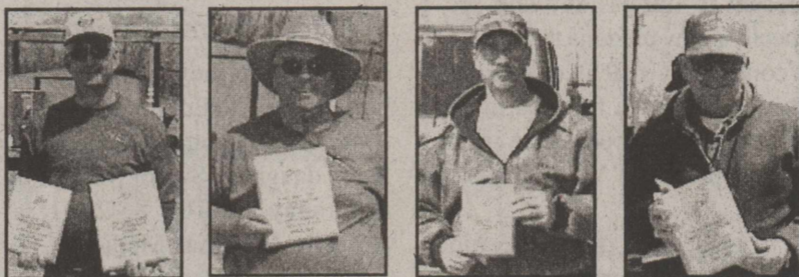
Sunday presented a set of problems that were hard to overcome as high winds called competition short after just four rounds.

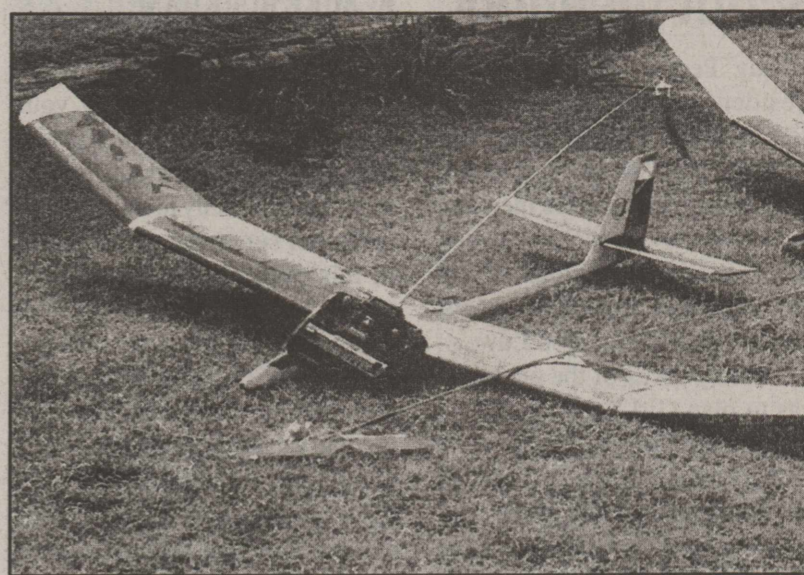

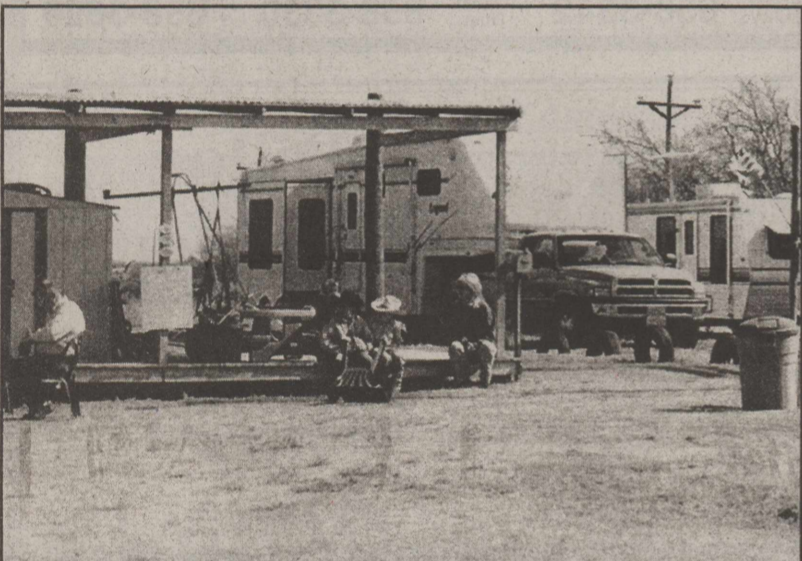

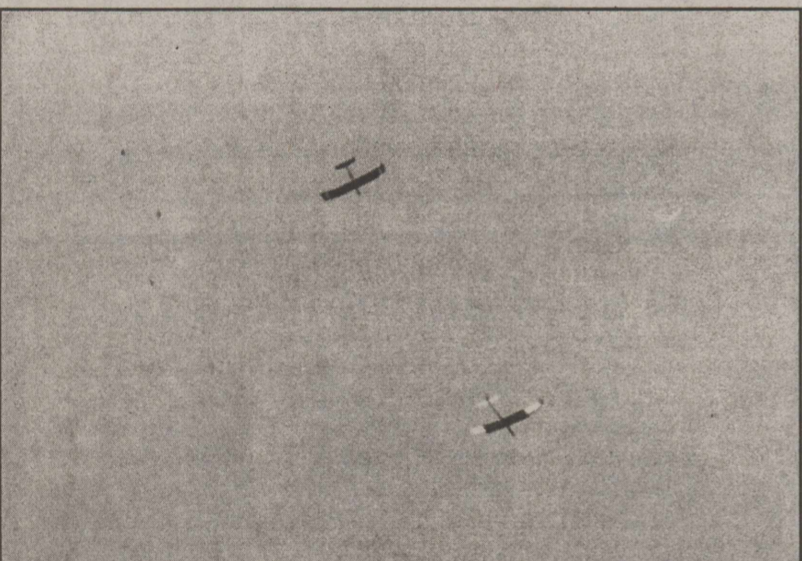

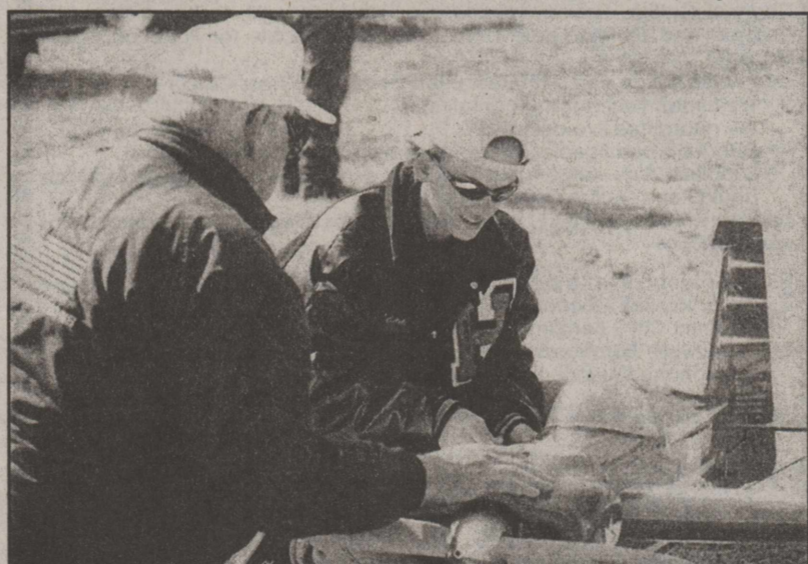

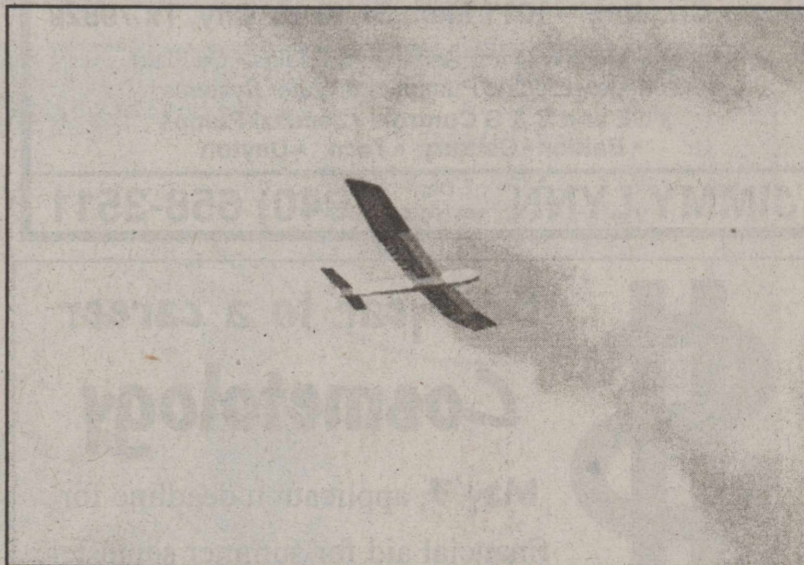

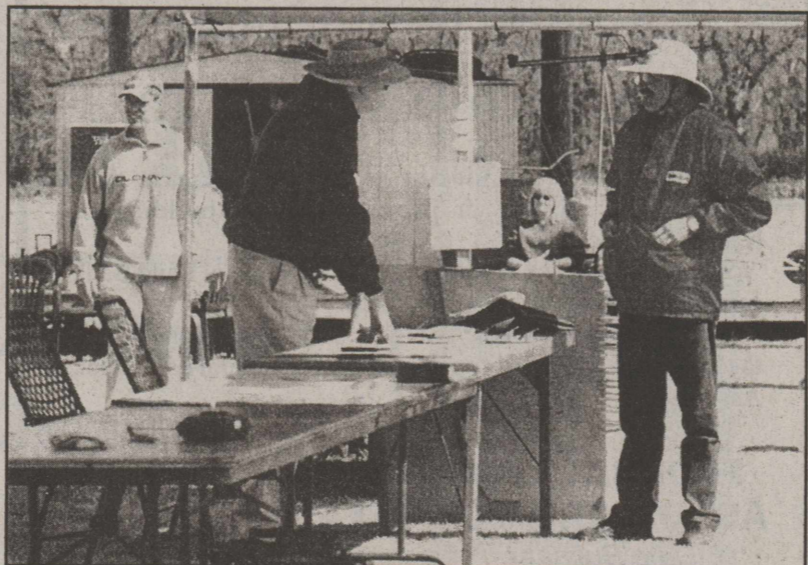

Slamming solutions

"Slamming" is when a consumer's telephone provider - local or long distance - is switched without his knowledge or consent. Texas law requires companies engaging in such practices to pay the cost of switching customers back to their original provider, provide billing records to the original provider and, in some cases, pay fines of up to \$5,000 a day for each slamming violation.

Tips for prevention:

- Request a Primary Interexchange Carrier (PIC) freeze from your phone company to prevent a change in long distance service without a written request.
- Inspect your phone bill each month and report unfamiliar charges to your phone company.
- Contact your phone company to confirm your preferred long distance carrier.
