
Child passenger transported to Abilene

The most seriously injured appeared to be the child who was a passenger in the pickup truck. He was transported to Abilene by ambulance for medical treatment.

District Attorney Neal filed a motion to revoke his probation alleging that he had used drugs during his probationary term. Stone plead guilty and was assessed a one-year sentence in county jail. \$3,000.00. Chapman Lee Swindell, 40, of Seymour, plead guilty to motion to revoke his probation and the State agreed to extend his probation for an additional year.

Michelle Lore Spradling, 29, of Seymour, Barbara Sue Richardson, 36, of Seymour and Johnny Hernandez Jr., 19, of Seymour, who were all charged with the illegal manufacture of methamphetamine, all pled guilty and each received 10 years probation, plus each was assessed a \$1,000.00 fine.

Judge Hajek also imposed sentence on Debbi Lynn Lovelace for misdemeanor DWI and ordered her to serve 180 days in he Baylor County Jail. She had previously been found guilty of driving while intoxicated by a Knox County jury on a change of venue from Baylor County. The case was prosecuted by special prosecutor, Cyndi Schenk of Wichita Falls.

Last Wednesday, in the Knox County District Court in Benjamin, District Attorney Neal filed a motion to revoke the Probation of Corey Wayne Roberts, 21, of Knox City. Roberts had previously been placed on probation for Theft of a Firearm and Forgery. After evidence was presented of his probation violations, his probation was revoked and Roberts was sentenced to serve one year on each of the two cases to be served in the prison system's state jail facility.

new trial. Castillo, 44, of Austin, had previously been tried and convicted in the Knox County District Court and had been sentenced to 15 years in prison for distribution of cocaine.

Kimberly Rene Smith, 22, of Abilene, who has been indicted for Intoxicated Manslaughter, was called before the Knox County District Court for arraignment. She appeared with attorney Andrew Ottaway and entered a plea of not guilty. Case will be set for pretrial next month. Likewise, Robert Lee Thomas, 63, of Munday, who has been indicted for Sexual Assault of a Child, was arraigned and plead not guilty. His pretrial will also be set for next month.

On Thursday morning in the Cottle County District Court, Robert Thomas, 39, of Paducah, was brought before the court on a motion to revoke his probation. He plead not guilty. District Attorney Neal called witnesses to prove that Thomas had violated his probation in seven respects, including hitting his stepdaughter on the head with a whiskey bottle, and District Judge David Hajek ordered his probation revoked and sentenced him to five years in prison. Thomas was represented by Andrew Ottaway. Thursday afternoon in the King County District Court in Guthrie, Joshua Seth Bortnick, 25 of Tuscon, Arizona, was arraigned before the King County District Court for possession of of approximately 150 pounds of marijuana. Bortnick was arrested earlier this month when he made an emergency landing at the 6666 Ranch airstrip in Guthrie. A subsequent search of the plane revealed marijuana. His attorney, George Gilkerson, also requested reduction of the \$100,000.00 bond under which Bortnick is being held. Judge Hajek denied bond reduction.



Four students advance to regional track


Four Knox City High School students will advance to the regional track meet to be held April 27 and 28 at South Plains College in Levelland.
