The excitement will kickoff Wednesday at 4:00 p.m. when United States Congressman and longtime friend of the Texas Cowboy Reunion, Charles Stenholm, will lead the grand parade into the downtown streets of Stamford. A Stamford native, Stenholm is excited about returning to his hometown as parade marshall for the most exciting event of the year.

### Immunization clinic to visit Knox City Thursday, July 5

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the Community Center / Housing Authority Bldg. in Knox City on Thursday, July 5, from 10:00-11:30 and 1:30-3:00. Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all

school immunizations. The Td immunization is available for all adults not having one in 10 years.

The Hepatitis series was required for Kindergarten entry this year and was required for 12 years old on August 1, 2000. Parents are asked to check their child's immunization record for this series.

The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine is available to anyone age 1 thru adulthood that has not had the chickenpox. For those children in need of this immunization, parents are asked to call to reserve a dose as only the proper amount will be reserved.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social security numbers. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor.

All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay.

## Counts says legislators develop new ways to fight for seniors

#### Against the rising cost of prescription drugs

AUSTIN - Rep. David Counts (D-Knox City) has announced that during the 77th Session of the Texas Legislature, Texas legislators developed new and innovative ways to ensure access to prescription drugs for seniors in need and to fight the rising cost of prescription drugs.

According to Rep. Counts, after careful consideration of all the factors affecting the issue, Texas lawmakers enacted several new laws addressing prescription drugs this session. The new laws on the books include providing qualifying Medicare recipients with prescription drug coverage, establishing the Interagency Council on Pharmaceuticals Bulk Purchasing to develop a program to negotiate lower drug prices for state agencies, evaluating drug purchasing cooperatives for consumers, improving access to information about private patient assistance programs, and donating unused prescription medications to charitable medical clinics.

Rep. Counts said that the state's prescription drug program provides prescription drug benefits to Medicare recipients who are Medicaid eligible, starting with those individuals earning about \$9,000 per year with assets valued under \$4,000. Lawmakers prioritized those with the greatest need in helping families take care of Texas' seniors, Rep. Counts said.

The Interagency Council on Pharmaceuticals Bulk Purchasing will help Texas utilize its purchasing power as a major buyer of pharmaceuticals, Rep. Counts said. By pooling the state's pharmaceutical purchases, the council will be able to negotiate volume discounts, and the lower prices will save taxpayer dollars, he said.

Rep. Counts said that as part of their multifaceted approach, legislators also enacted three cost efficient programs that use limited taxpayer funds. Investigating the effectiveness of existing consumer drug purchasing cooperatives or "price clubs" will help Texans understand their purchasing options when buying medications, Rep. Counts said.


Many pharmaceutical companies operate patient assistance programs, he continued. Having the Department of Health establish a toll-free information line will assist patients with finding and applying for such programs without significantly increasing costs to the state, he explained. Donation of unused prescription medications to charitable medical



## **Vernon College** releases GED testing dates



### Wild Mare Race

The number of contestants or teams will be limited to four in each show. Each contestant will be allowed two helpers. Each contestant will be assigned one wild mare which will be haltered in the chute with a restraining rope before the wild mare is turned out.

At a given signal, the four wild mares will be turned out of the chutes and each contestant, along with his helpers, must saddle his wild mare between the chutes and the line marked across the arena nearest the chute. If no mares are saddled within a six minute time limit, all the contestants will be disqualified. After saddling his wild mare, the contestant must mount and ride across a line marked at the far end of the arena and return to the starting point, crossing the line at the end of the arena nearest the chutes. The contestant who first completes this ride will be declared the winner if in the opinion of the judge he has qualified in all respects. No hazing of mares other than members of the rider's team will be allowed.

Co-sponsored by Swenson Land and Cattle Company, Steagall is excited to play the dance which will begin at 9:30 p.m.

Spanning 30 years, Steagall's entertainment career includes over 200 compositions recorded both by himself and other artists.

Known mostly for his Texas Swing dance music and such songs as "Here We Go Again," Party Dolls and Wine," Freckles Brown and "Lone Star Beer and Bob Wills Music," Steagall is beloved by Texas cowboys for the quiet times they have spent with him around the chuckwagon campfires.

In their opinion, Steagall's best music has never been heard by the public. And, if you ask him where his favorite place to play music was, he would probably answer, "on a lonesome cow camp in West Texas."

As a native Texan, Steagall enjoyed a career in Agricultural Chemistry after graduating from West Texas State University in Canyon, with a degree in Animal Science and Agronomy.

He then spent eight years as a music industry executive in Hollywood, California and has spent the last thirty years as a recording artist, songwriter and television and motion picture personality.

He currently offices outside of Fort

Worth, where in addition to his entertainment activities, he is currently involved in the production of motion pictures and television shows.

He has over 200 of his compositions recorded by himself or by other artists.

He has recorded 26 consecutive records on the national charts and released a total of 19 albums.

As an actor, he had a major role in the motion picture, *Benji, the Hunted*, which was released in the summer of 1987. He also had a role in the motion picture, *Dark Before Dawn* and *Abilene*.

He produced the motion picture *Big Bad John* and has been a regular on the NBC series "Music Country USA." He has hosted the National Finals Rodeo four times and has done numerous television and radio commercials (including the Texas Cowboy Reunion).

In April of 1991, the Texas Legislature named Steagall, the Official Cowboy Poet of Texas.

Perhaps many in the area have listened to Steagall on his one hour syndicated radio show, "Cowboy Corner," on 140 stations in 43 states and two provinces of Canada. Cowboy Corner celebrates the life-style of the American west through the poems, songs and life stories of the American Cowboy. He has featured many guest artists including Charlie Daniels, Michael Martin Murphy, Waddie Mitchell, Buck Ramsey and Stamford's own Gary Mathis, president of the Swenson Land and Cattle Company and the Texas Cowboy Reunion.

Steagall was also the 1998 Texas Cowboy Reunion Parade Marshal.



Second, the rider mounts the horse and rides to the center of the arena to complete a designated figure pattern following pre-set guidelines.


Following the pattern, the rider will


ride the horse to a set of pens and open the gate on horseback. With the gate open, the rider will then drive a yearling calf into the pen.


The rider is then supposed to rope the calf in only two loops.


Finally, a drag or log, with a rope attached will be placed in the arena. The rider will have to attach the log to the saddle and drag the log around the arena to demonstrate the horses pulling ability. Failure to complete the course in eight minutes will disqualify the cowboy.



# The Texas Cowboy Reunion by: Linda Dalliston

On the rolling plains of Texas Cowboys and ladies gather each year To celebrate their western heritage With a rodeo and reunion filled with cheer.

The first Cowboy Reunion fell in July of '30 When cowboys chose to gather in a red hill draw. The place was located west of Stamford on SMS ranch land There nature provided the arena with hardly a flaw.

Cowboys, ranchers, wives and children hitched up the wagons Saddled their horses and rode to Stamford without delay. They set up on camp on the grounds for days, cooked over campfires, Watched wranglers show their ridin' skills in cowboy play.

Each year the number of cowboys and visitors grew. Back in the '50's, over 70,000 came to see the cowhand show. There was double mugging (first in the land) While cowgirls rode horses in a cloverleaf pattern competing for the fastest time in two go's.

Folks from way up north heard about the prairie gathering and Wanted to attending a working cowboy rodeo. One well known humorist sneaked in the stands unnoticed in '35 Until someone yelled "That's Will Rogers or my name's not Joe."

One of the cowboys loaned Rogers a horse For he insisted on helping work the arena stock. Just days later before his plane crashed over Alaska He told others how he had liked taking part.

Only one reunion has been missed since it began It was the year cowboys rallied to fight a world war. The next year families and cowboys- turned- woldiers returned to see and compete in What came to be billed as the World's Largest Amateur Rodeo, by far.

Now there's Cowboy Poetry, a chuckwagon cook-off, and a ranch horse show. There's dances at the pavilion each night, an old time fiddler's contest... And a memorial service at the Bunkhouse to remember all those who have heaven as their final site.

When the first week of July rolls around next year You can plan on a party on the prairie Where folks will come to shake hands with old friends Watch a wild mare race and a bullride with only eight seconds to tarry.

Town folks, chairman and directors of the organization hustle While the stock producer tends to his herd Until the work is all done and a final sigh is uttered On the last night as the last word.

Three score and eleven years ago the rodeo date was set We continue to strive to meet it yet. It may be hot or muddy; that won't matter, you can bet They'll all be back next year to make memories they can't forget.

## **Working Ranch Cowboy Awards**

The Texas Cowboy Reunion, Inc. was organized in 1930 for the purpose of preserving the traditions of the early-day ranch country and to honor ranch cowboys that served as the foundation of the development of the cattle industry in Texas.

With the coming of this 71" event or "gathering", the Texas Cowboy Reunion, Inc. has officially initiated a means of recognizing and honoring these individuals who pursued a lifetime career as working ranch cowboys. A career more challenging than most, because their daily work requires a thorough knowledge of the actions of cattle, horses, and the elements of nature.

Two awards will be presented each year; one posthumously and one to an individual still actively engaged in the profession. The Texas Cowboy Reunion, Inc. takes great pleasure in honoring these men of distinction.

#### George Self

was born in 1937 in Breckenridge, Texas and, until his recent retirement, lived the entire time on the R.A. Brown Ranch in Throckmorton County.

George was taught his cowboy skills by his father, Truett Self, who raised his family on the Brown Ranch. In addition to learning the techniques required of a working ranch cowboy, George acquired a true cowboy philosophy of having pride in your work, being happy in what you do, and taking care of the ranch as if it were your own.

With this attitude and dedication,

George later became foreman of the Brown Ranch and commanded this position for more than 30 years. Throughout most of this period, George was responsible for maintaining an intensive A.I. and embryo transfer program which required many hours of his time in addition to the general duties of running a ranch.

During his career, George also found time to break and train horses that were raised on the ranch, and he gained a reputation in this field by winning several major events of competition.

Although George Self has retired from full time duties, he continues to "day work" and ride good horses.



"Scandalous" John Selmon was born in 1884 in San Saba County. He began breaking horses at the young age of 13, and obtained the title of "Scandalous" when he was thrown from an outlaw horse, which he described as a scandalous bucking son-of-a-gun.

"Scandalous" John rode horseback from San Saba County in 1900 to begin cowboying for the Espuela Land & Cattle Co. located near Spur, Texas. He was inherited by the Swenson Brothers when they purchased the Spur Ranch in 1906.

Selmon worked for the SMS for over 55 years, working his way up to become foreman of the SMS Flat Top, near Stamford, Texas, in 1919. He served in this capacity until his retirement in 1968.


During his career, Selmon experienced all phases of a working

ranch cowboy from trail driving, to working cattle on the open range, to sorting and branding in enclosed pens. He was noted for his keen interest and ability in breeding and developing good horses.

"Scandalous" John was instrumental in the organization of the Texas Cowboy Reunion in 1930 and served as arena director for 35 years, never missing a performance. At the 1932 show he was selected by his peers as the most typical cowboy.

## Wild Cow Milking


The contest consists of a roper and two muggers. Only the roper will be mounted.

Cows will be given deadline start, and when said cow crosses deadline, she is roper's cow. Tensecond fine for roper's mount breaking barrier. Only one loop will be permitted. All catches must be by the head. No healing or intentional tripping. Optional dally or tie, but rope must be removed from saddle horn before milking commences.

JERK DOWN RULE– Jerking animal over backwards will result in a ten-second penalty.

The roper must do the milking in a 12 ounce bottle. Cow must be up when milked and rope must be removed from cow before milker runs to the judge. If the milk will not pour, the team is disqualified. The team with the fastest time wins.

A two-minute time limit will be in effect for this contest.





# Western Art featured in **John Selmon Gallery**






