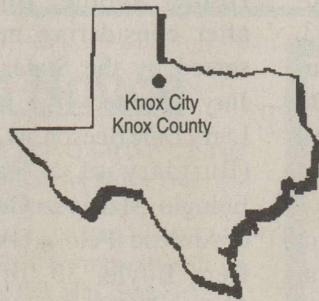

TxDOT hosts pre-construction meeting to discuss bridge replacement in Knox County

Also in Cottle and Hardeman counties

The Texas Department of Transportation hosted a pre-construction meeting on Wednesday, August 15, at 1:00 p.m. at the Munday area office in Munday.

Purpose of this meeting was to discuss the upcoming project for the replacement of the existing bridge facilities at Deadman Creek in County Road 3600 in Knox County, Draw Creek on County Road 109 in Cottle County and

Draw Creek on County Road 128 in Hardeman County. This project will begin with replacing Deadman Creek Bridge in Knox County with a bridge class culvert.

This \$489,000.00 project should take approximately seven (7) months to complete. "We will have two (2) bridge crews working," Meadows said. "We'll start with the bridge in Knox County first and then send crew to Cottle

and Hardeman Counties to start drilling shafts for the new bridges there. With two crews working, we will be able to get these jobs going quickly. With weather permitting, the project should be complete by the end of March 2002."

"Each roadway will be closed to all but local traffic throughout the length of the project," Gary Mizer, Munday Area Engineer, said.

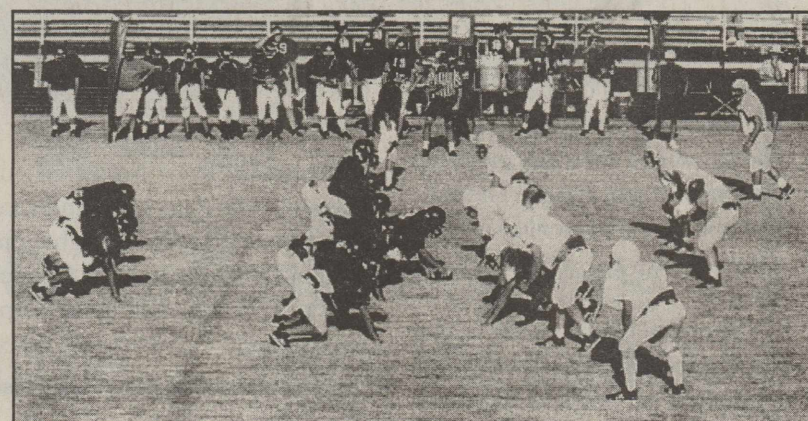

50th Judicial District holds busy week on criminal docket action

Last week was a busy one on the criminal docket of the 50th Judicial District with action in all four counties -- Baylor, Knox, Cottle and King counties, according to District Attorney Bill Neal.

In the Baylor County District Court last Tuesday, Robert Brian Bolts, 46, of Abilene drew a five-year prison sentence from visiting District Judge Leslie Thomas when he plead guilty to a felony DWI indictment. He had two previous felony convictions. It was a part of a plea bargain agreement between the state, the defendant and his counsel Michael Curtis of Wichita Falls.

Another plea bargain agreement between Bill Neal, representing the state, and Michael Curtis, representing Charles Murry Machen, 43, of Seymour, resulted in a two-year prison sentence. Machen had been indicted on two drug offenses including Possession of Anhydrous Ammonia in an unapproved container.

Teresa Diane Brasher Sturgeon, 30, of Seymour plead guilty to Burglary of a Habitation, and received a 10-year probation. However, as a part of the probation she will be required to go through the prison system's nine-month felony substance abuse program and if she completes that successfully then go to the state's restitution center where she will be put to work to earn sufficient funds to make restitution to reimburse victims of her offenses. (Sturgeon had also been indicted for three other felony offenses -- including theft and DWI).

Another defendant who was ordered to the state prison's felony substance abuse program was Michelle Lore Spradling, 30, of Seymour. Spradling had previously been placed on probation out of the Baylor County District Court when she plead guilty to Manufacture of a Controlled Substance. If she successfully completes the nine-month program she will be returned to Seymour to continue her probation supervision.

Ella Mae Holland, 35, of Seymour plead guilty to Aggravated Assault in connection with a knife attack upon her daughter. She received a five-year probated sentence from Judge Thomas. Holland was represented by Andrew Ottaway, formerly of Haskell.

Other defendants called before the Baylor District Court for arraignment or pre-trial proceedings included Guy David Smith, 43, of Jermyn (felony DWI); John Julius McKinney, 50, of Seymour (felony DWI); Gary Shawn Dixon, 29, of Seymour (Felon in Possession of a Firearm and Deadly Conduct with a Firearm); Dennis Mac Kinnibrough, 50, of Seymour (Burglary of a Habitation, aggravated Assault and Retaliation); Carrie Leah Raye Flores, 28, of Seymour (Aggravated Assault); Bryan Eugene Parks, 17, of Seagoville (Possession of Anhy-

drous Ammonia in Unapproved Container); Bruce Lee Etheridge, 23, of Farmers Branch (Possession of Anhydrous Ammonia in Unapproved Container); Vicki Lynn Doherty, 42, of Electra (Possession of a Controlled Substance); Henry Thomas Bruhn, 53, of Olney (Possession of a Controlled Substance with Intent to Deliver); and Jane Lyman McKerlie, 20, of Seymour (Sexual Assault).

In the Knox County District Court last Wednesday, Renita Ann Raynes, 32, of Knox City plead guilty to an indictment charging her with theft of more than \$1,500.00 but less than \$20,000.00 by a public servant. Evidence offered by District Attorney Bill Neal showed that Raynes, while serving as executive director of the Knox City Housing Authority had misappropriated \$11,148.54 in government funds from that facility. Pursuant to a plea bargain with the State, she plead guilty for a five-year probated sentence, but with a condition of the probation being that she would make full restitution to the housing authority during the probation. Raynes was represented by Gary Connally of Abilene.

Others called before the Knox County District Court for arraignment or pre-trial proceedings included Robert Lee Thomas, 62, of Munday (Aggravated Sexual Assault/Indecency with a Child); Raymond Eugene Moore, 41, of Munday, Debra Diane Moore, 38, of Munday, Jamie Carnell Walley, 26, of Azle and Larry Lee Pursley, 21, of Benbrook, (all these being jointly indicted for Manufacture of a Controlled Substance -- Methamphetamine); Reginald Swearingen, 40, of Knox City (Aggravated Assault); Eddy De-Los-Santos, 32, of Knox City (Assault with Bodily Injury); Linda Lee Jenkins, 43, of Seymour (Felony Theft); Rosalio Galva Villareal, 53, of Knox City (Possession of a Controlled Substance - Cocaine); Lucy Villanueva Snider, 44, of Knox City (Possession of a Controlled Substance - Cocaine) and Neona Faye Johnson, 37, of Knox City (Felony DWI).

Kimberly Rene Smith, 22, of Merkel, who had been indicted for Intoxicated Manslaughter in Knox County, was called for pre-trial proceedings but failed to appear. A bond forfeiture was taken

by District Attorney Bill Neal, and a warrant issued for her rearrest.

Thursday morning in Cottle County, the Cottle County Grand Jury was called into session by District Attorney Bill Neal and after considering matters presented by the State, the Grand Jury returned five indictments: Larry Dale Beeson, 41, of Paducah (Burglary of a Habitation); Eulogio Martinez Guerrero, 39, of Abilene (Felony DWI); Jeffery Kent Boyle, 39, of Childress (Felony DWI); Steven Ray Houston, 47, of Borger (Possession of a Controlled Substance - Methamphetamine); and Richard Nathan Kindle, 23, of Paducah (Aggravated Assault).

On Thursday afternoon in the King County District Court, the case of Joshua Seth Bortnick, 30, of Tucson, Arizona, who had been indicted for possession of approximately 140 pounds of marijuana was called for pretrial. The pre-trial proceedings, however, were continued by the Court until September 5, 2001. The State has also filed a lawsuit against Bortnick to forfeit the airplane he allegedly used to transport marijuana.

Ben Richey Boys Ranch selects Albany

The Board of Directors for the Ben Richey Boys Ranch, after much deliberation, have opted to locate their first satellite facility in Albany.

In February 2001, Ben Richey Boys Ranch began a series of events that led to this decision by the board. The administrative team of the Ranch held 29 community meetings throughout the Big Country area to assess the type of programs needed to serve the children of the Big Country.

In June, 11 communities submitted proposals to Ben Richey Boys Ranch stating their interest in joining with the Ranch to meet the needs of boys.

After due consideration, the number of communities was narrowed to Albany, Anson, Hamlin and Haskell.

The final decision was based on which community represented the greatest opportunity to help the boys at this time.

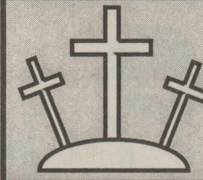

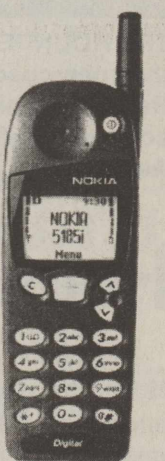
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O'Brien happenings

This course focuses on rescue techniques for one man CPR and one man choking. (American Red Cross)

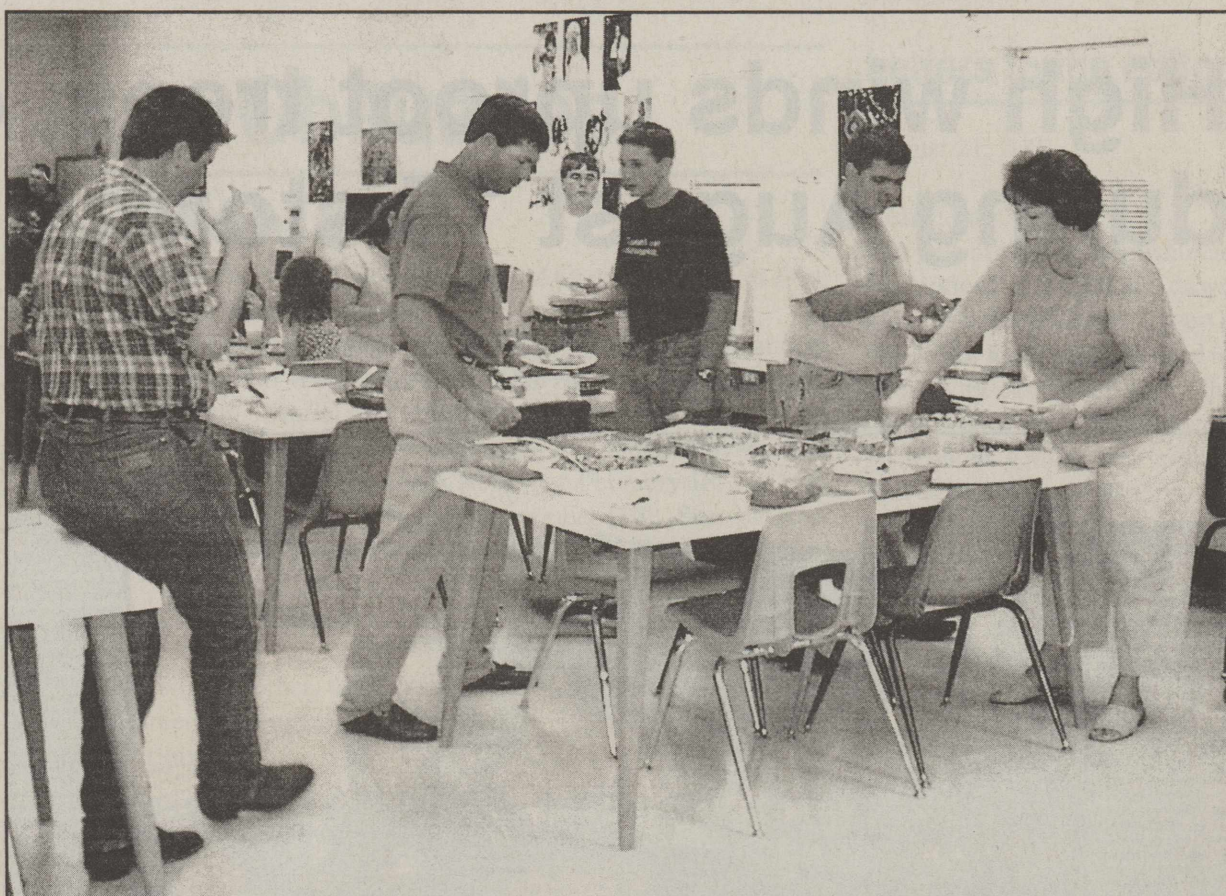
This one-day class will meet on Saturday, September 15, from 8 a.m. to 12 noon. The fee will be \$30.00.

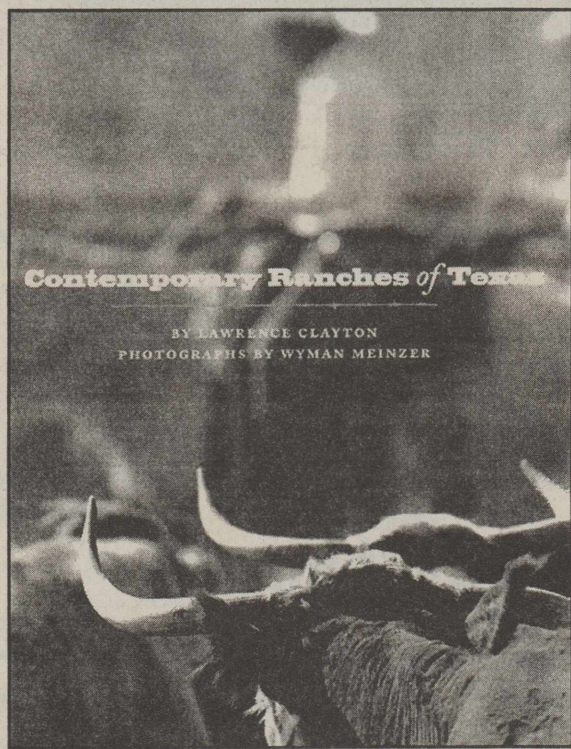

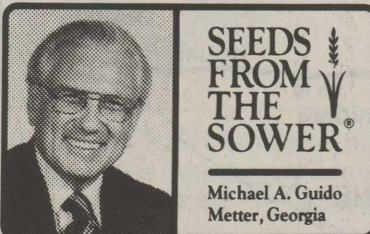
Mildred Maxine Nelson

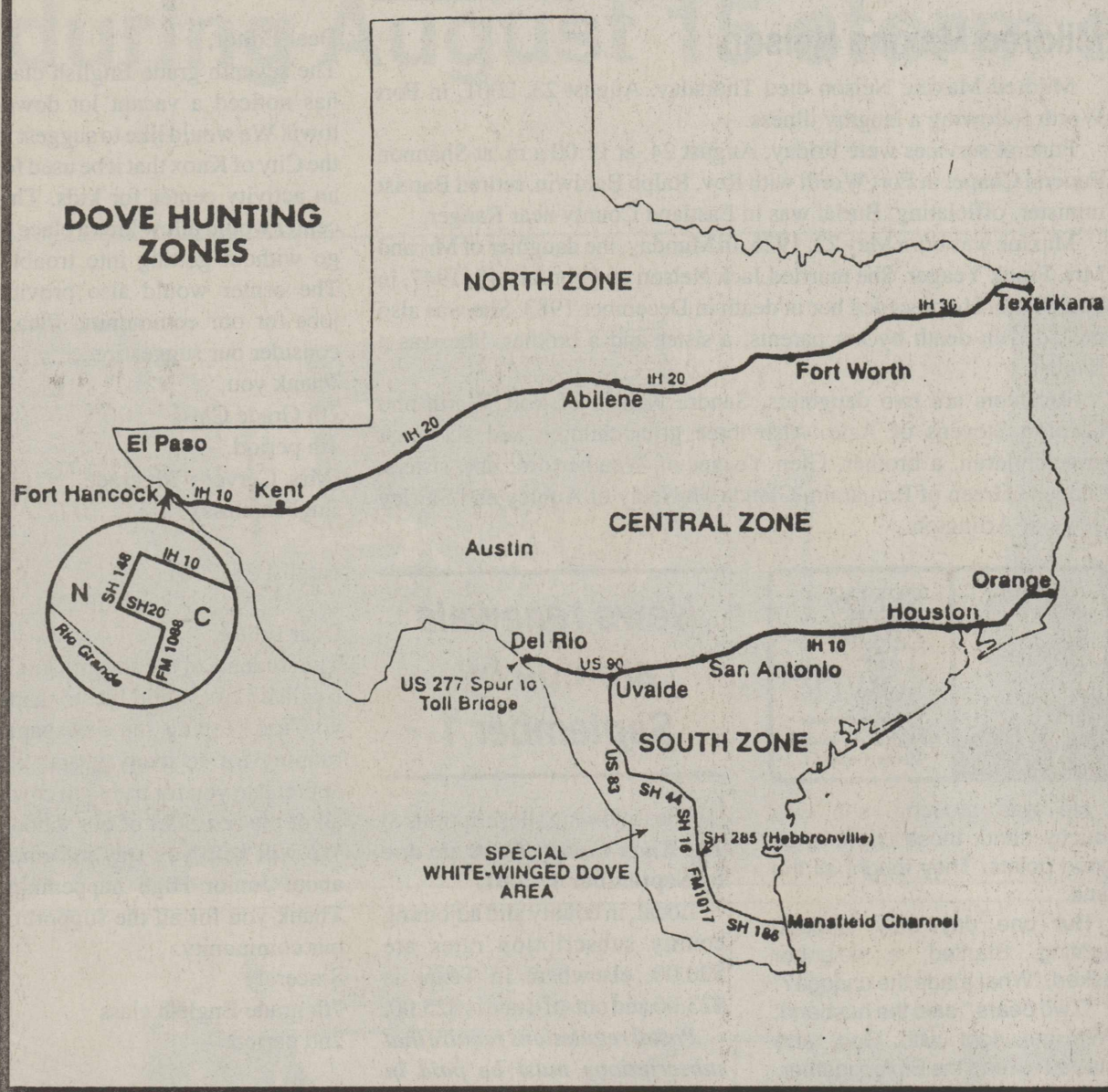

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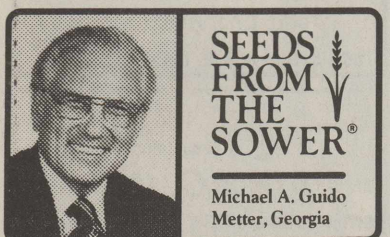

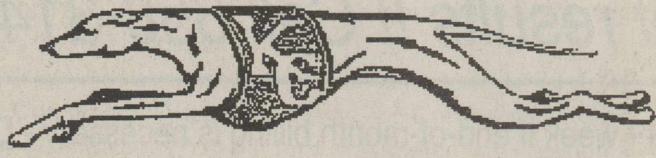
