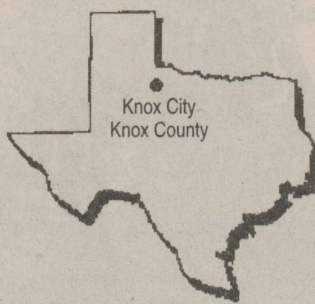

Memorial services to be held Saturday at KC Church of Christ for Mrs. Cash

Memorial services for Sudia Hutton Cash, 98, will be Saturday, March 9, 2002, at 2:00 p.m. in the Knox City Church of Christ.

Leon Burkham and family members will officiate. Private burial will be in the Truscott Cemetery.

Johnson Funeral Home of Lake Charles, Louisiana, is in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Cash, as she was lovingly known to her many students, died Tuesday, February 20, 2002, at 5:45 p.m. in Lake Charles, Louisiana. Born on a ranch in Throckmorton County, near Woodson, in 1903, she taught school 47 years, 46 in Knox County. Mrs. Cash and her late husband, Otis Cash moved to Knox City 75 years ago.

An article published in *The Knox County News*, May 18, 1972, provides the best account of her life and work in Knox County:

"Her teaching career began at Truscott in 1923 and at the end of the first year as the school had to drop one teacher, Mrs. Cash suggested that the board let her go as she was the last teacher hired. The salary at that time was \$85.00 per month for eighth months. Mrs. Cash told the Truscott banker, Mr. Chesser, that she was not going to teach anymore. However, he insisted that since her dad had educated her to teach that she must continue. She was then hired at Gilliland where she was paid \$100 per month for nine months and after two years at Gilliland, she

married and moved to Crowell in the fall of 1926.

Mrs. Cash's father had moved to Knox City and insisted that she and Otis move here, so from 1927 until 1936 she taught in Knox City.

In 1936, the new Sunset Consolidated School elected her (without application) for less work and more pay. She taught at Sunset until May 1939; and as their son, Joe was born in December 1939, Mrs. Cash did not resume her teaching until the 1941-42 school term when she accepted a position at Union Grove, where she taught until the fall of 1946 when Union Grove moved in. From that time, she was with the Knox City Schools.

Mrs. Cash taught all grades from one through twelve, including English, American History,

and Algebra in High School as well as serving as grade school principal and high school principal in Knox City. Additionally, she coached all athletics both boys and girls, except football.

She taught one year here during the depression for script with not one penny in money received for the entire year. She explained that the school board members did their best by the teachers in making out the script in any denominations convenient for them. She said she traded her script for what she had to have, never discounting it one cent, and got rid of every bit of it with the help of good friends such as the banker, T.E. Robbins, who helped her in trading it off.

During the years at Knox City, Mrs. Cash served as Pep Club sponsor, and was responsible for organizing the Future Teachers of American chapter here. Mrs. Artie Mae Burkett of Haskell came to Knox City and organized the chapter and Mrs. Cash said that this organization was especially close to her heart.

By the end of her life, she had taught many successful ranchers and farmers of the area, the president of her bank, her attorney, at least three Knox County judges, the postmaster, the editors, publishers, and owners of the local paper, scores of teachers and university professors, a few physicians, and several citizens associated with local and state government. Voters to decide bond election for campus improvements

To be held with Saturday, May 4, election

The Knox City-O'Brien CISD Board of Trustees have called a bond election in the amount of one million dollars to be held on May 4, 2002, to fund building improvements. If the voters approve the bond election the District will apply for a State Facilities Allotment that will pay for approximately 71% of the project. However, in order to receive the state assistance the bond election must be approved by the votes. Should the district not qualify for the state assistance the bond election will be void and no bonds will be sold.

These funds will be used to improve the heating/air-conditioning system, lighting and handicap accessibility at the three campuses. Currently the campuses are

using energy inefficient window type electrical heating and cooling units. These units will be replaced with energy efficient roof top air-conditioning units according to current codes on indoor air quality. Additionally, the builds currently use energy inefficient fluorescent light fixtures. These fixtures will be replaced with new energy efficient fluorescent fixtures reducing the electrical usage in lighting by approximately 30%. The District will also address several areas of handicap accessibility.

Louis Baty, School Superintendent, stated, "The State Facilities Allotment provides the opportunity for the district to make the much needed improvements and have the State pay for a ma-

majority of the costs. While the State Facilities Allotment is a competitive program, based upon the Districts current wealth per student, it appears the District will receive the state assistance."

The bond will be issued for 15 years and will require approximately a 7-cent tax rate (7 cents per 100 dollars of property values) for the life of the bond. However, the school tax on the residence of individuals 65 years old or over is frozen and those individuals will not see an increase in the amount of school taxes on their residence.

Gov. Perry declares March 4 - 8 educational diagnosticians' week

Texas Governor Rick Perry has declared the week of March 4 through 8 Educational Diagnosticians' Week.

"Educating children is the most important thing we will ever do in Texas and our education professionals, including education diagnosticians, are the key to our success," Perry said. Educational diagnosticians work closely with exceptional children, their parents and school districts.

Educational diagnosticians, in addition to having a master's degree, a valid Texas teaching certificate and three years of classroom experience, must also complete a 33-semester hour special program before they can be certified.

These professionals identify and address potential learning problems early by testing children for language ability, perceptual-motor skills, intelligence, adaptive behavior and academic achievement. They determine eligibility for special education services and recommend appropriate

programs. Diagnosticians also consult with professionals in other fields when children exhibit speech, physical, medical or emotional difficulties.

Haskell-Knox Diagnosticians are Sue Medford, who serves Rochester ISD, Munday ISD, Goree ISD and Knox City-O'Brien CISD. Sue received her master of education from Abilene Christian University in May 2000. Jennifer Mathis serves as diagnostician for Haskell ISD and Rule ISD. She received her master of education in August 2001 from Abilene Christian University. Wendy Mathis serves Benjamin ISD, Paint Creek ISD, Munday ISD and Knox City-O'Brien CISD. Wendy received her master of education from Abilene Christian University in December 2001.

Saluting Our Heroes... the Knox City volunteer firefighters

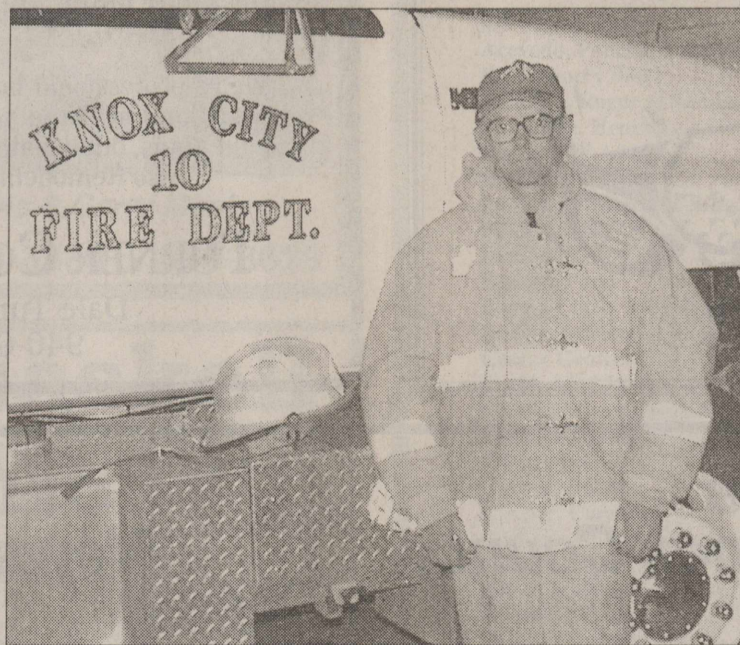


Profile of a firefighter: Michael Plume

The father of two boys, ages 7 and 13, Michael has always wanted to be a firefighter.



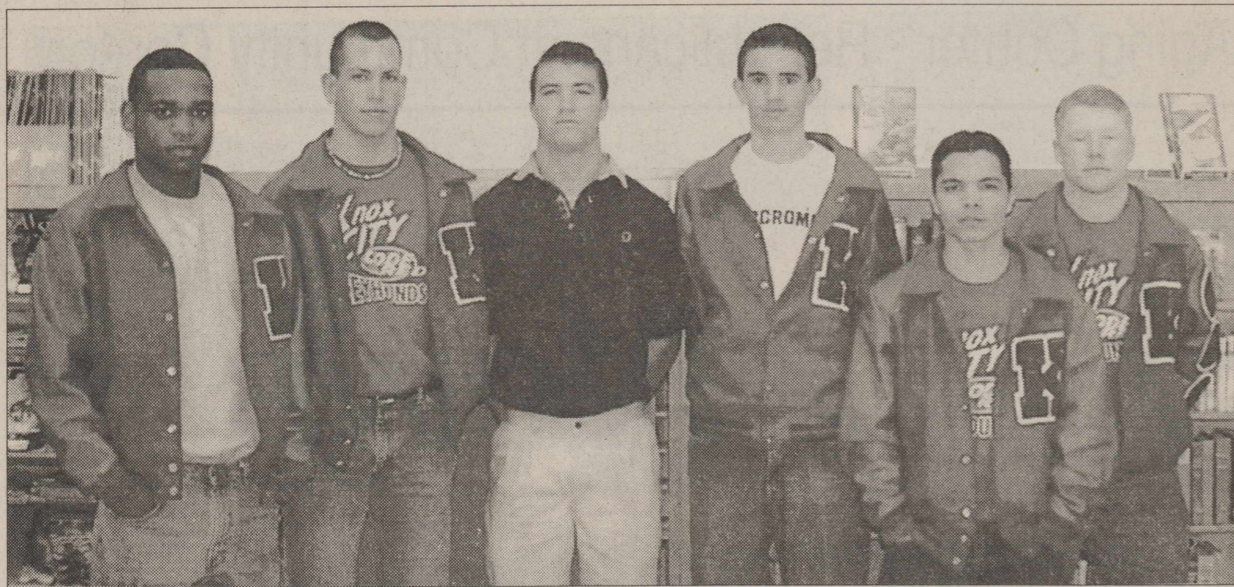
Profile of a firefighter: Wayne Clark

Wayne joined the department back in 1994 because he "needed something to do" and he has worked a lot of fires since then.

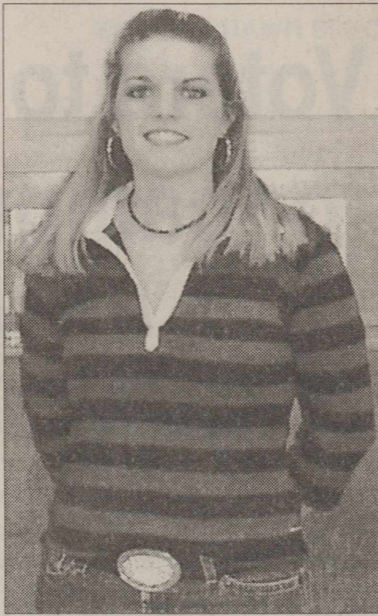

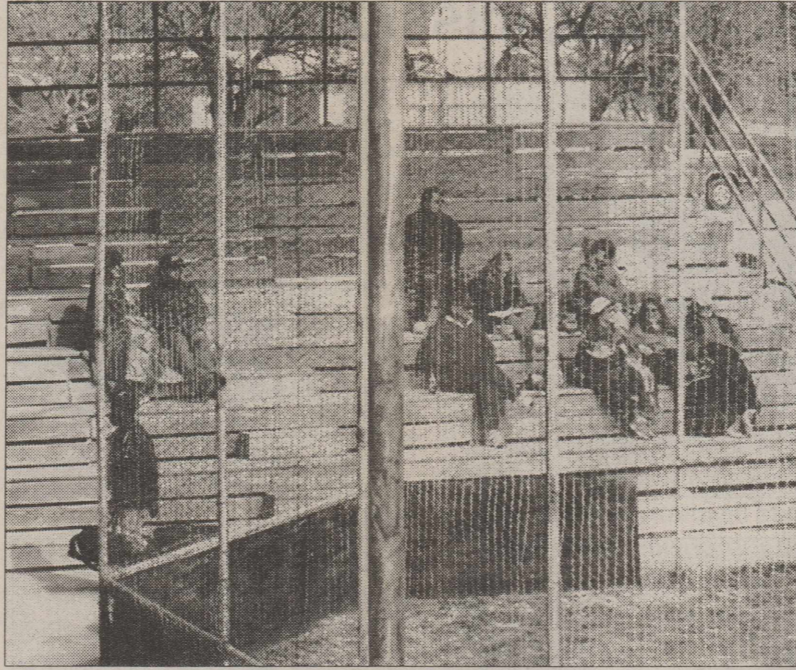

ment. Two former students, the town's mayor and the newspaper founder, married in the Cash home 60 years ago.

Additionally, she taught her sister, a teacher for 40 years, her son now in his 40th year of teaching, her daughter-in-law now in her 37th year of teaching, and a nephew. At her retirement, she was replaced by her own former English student. She lived almost a century, and took great joy in the success of every student she ever taught.

During the war years, there were no school bus tires, she and her husband carried part of the six-man football team on their car's running boards - three on a side - hanging on for out-of-town games. These trips were usually to Munday or Benjamin or somewhere closeby.

Mrs. Cash was a member of Beta Chi (Texas) and Beta Eta (Louisiana) Chapters of Delta Kappa Gamma. In 1992, she was honored as a 50-year member in New Orleans, and remained a member for a total of 60 years at her death. She had served as president of the Beta Chi Chapter. She was a life member and former president of the Knox City Study Club and a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors include a son, Joe Cash of Lake Charles, Louisiana; two grandchildren, Josef Cash of Lake Charles and Sarah Cash Sanders of Conroe, Texas; and a niece, Mildred Cook of Knox City.

Couple answering God's call to Vermont church as interim pastor, mission workers

Dr. H.B. Graves and his wife, Jo Ann Maddox Graves, have answered the call to do mission work in Vermont.

Dr. Graves will serve as interim pastor for the East Randolph Baptist Church near the center of the state. March 24 will be the first Sunday on the field.

The church building is 199 years old. It is the only church of any kind in a valley where 500 people live, Mrs. Graves said.

East Randolph consists of a general store, with one gas pump, a fire station, the post office, a tractor sales and service, the church and a community center.

There are dairy farms in the narrow valley and there are maple trees that produce sap for syrup.

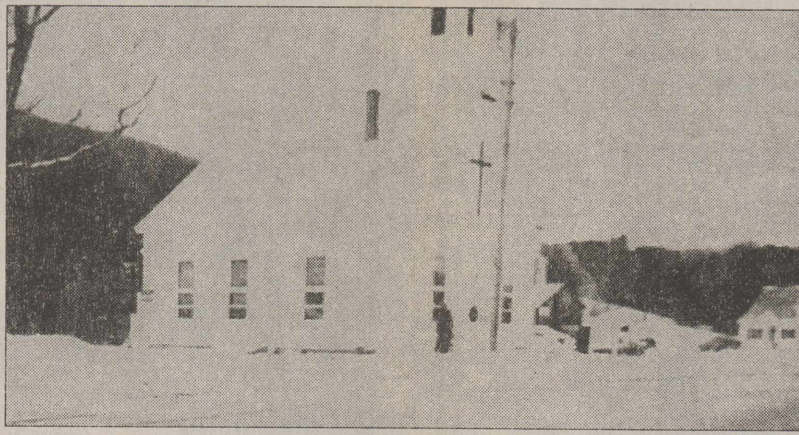
The Graves will live in a six bedroom Victorian house next door to the church.

This work is under Partnership Missions of the Baptist General Convention of Texas through the state of Vermont.

The four objectives for the seven year project are:

1. Double the number of churches in Vermont to 40.
2. Triple the number of collegist ministries, (the Graves will minister with the Baptist Student Ministries and its director, to start a group in Vermont Technical College in Randolph Center, 4 miles from their home.)
3. Increase the number of healthy churches by 10% annually.
4. Increase ministry training by 10%.

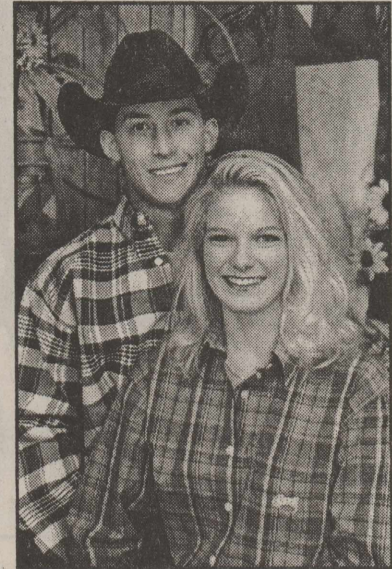

Services at the Department of Health are offered on a sliding fee scale, but no one will be denied services.

For information regarding immunizations, call 940-552-8770.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations.

The Hepatitis B immunization was required for Kindergarten entry this year and was required for 12 years old on August 1, 2000.

Parental notification of the chickenpox disease or proof of the varicella immunization will also be required as of August 1, 2000 for all 12 year olds, kindergartners, or any child over the age of 12 months in preschool, daycare or registered homes. Parents are asked to check their child's records and take appropriate action. For those children in need of this immunization, parents are asked to call to reserve a dose as only the proper amount will be reserved.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social security numbers. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor.

All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay.

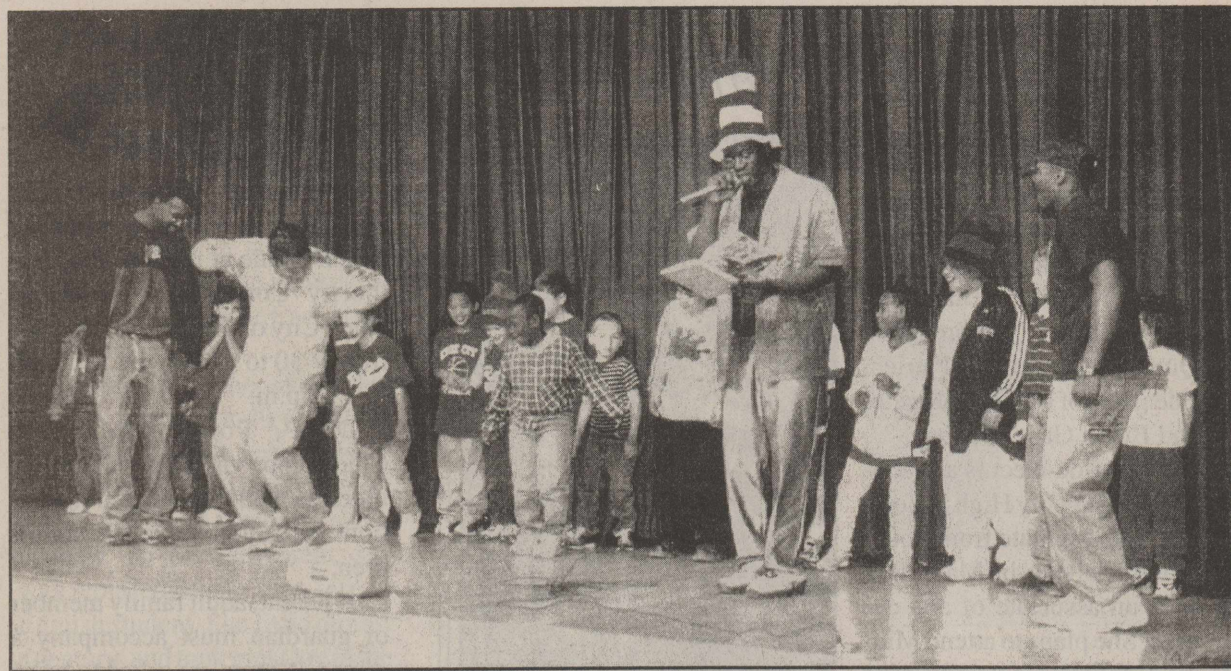

Secretary links agriculture to homeland security

Dallas - Rounding out a whirlwind multi-state tour this month, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman stopped off in Dallas to address the 2002 National Cotton Council delegation and appoint members and alternates to the National Cotton Board.

Veneman thanked American farmers and ranchers for supplying the nation with safe, abundant food and fiber, emphasizing agriculture's importance to homeland security.

Veneman stated, "we need to do everything we can to protest our food and agricultural sector not only from unintentional threats, but now also from intentional threats to our food supply, and we've been working very hard on this at USDA."

In her message to the 700 delegates representing a cross-section of the nation's cotton industry, Secretary Veneman emphasized the Administration's and U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) support for policies and a farm bill that ensure American agricultural producers are afforded every opportunity to maximize production and compete in the growing global market.

"The Administration supports farm policies that would strengthen the farm economy over the long term... programs that are market oriented and encourage independence but don't hurt producers. The President also wants a farm bill that supports international trade," said Secretary Veneman.

These are welcome words of encouragement to the cotton industry considering the volatile nature of the agriculture economy. Cotton communities in Texas alone lost an estimated \$433 million for the 2001 crop year.

Secretary Veneman expressed her desire to have farm policy passed that is "generous but affordable" and able to jump-start the agriculture economy through export expansion, increased support for research and technology, conservation, elimination of unfair trade practices, and risk man-

agement.

"A good farm bill must provide a safety net for farmers without encouraging over-production which thereby depresses prices. If we set loan rates too high, it could reverse their intended impact and make an already difficult situation even worse," Veneman said. According to Veneman, passing new farm legislation is just one hurdle facing the Administration, USDA then faces the daunting task of implementing the associated farm program changes. USDA must be ready to quickly deliver the programs once the President signs the farm bill.

Farm Service Agency (FSA), under the USDA umbrella, will be responsible for timely, efficient program delivery which will include distributing payments to producers.

John T. Fuston, State Executive Director for the Texas Farm Agency, spoke candidly with the Secretary during her Texas visit. Fuston assured the Secretary that Texas FSA is poised and ready to implement the legislative changes as soon as the state receives regulations and software for program delivery.

Veneman agreed with Fuston that timing and availability of technological tools were essential to effective farm program delivery. She reiterated her commitment to improved information technology within the Department. Veneman acknowledged the need for a streamlined program delivery process and envisions USDA coming into the 21st century with technology mirroring that of the private sector.

Before leaving Dallas, Veneman appointed 17 members and 18 alternate members to the National Cotton Board responsible for competitively positioning cotton in the marketplace. For more information regarding the appointments, see the Secretary's remarks on the USDA official website at www.usda.gov.

She was also preceded in death by her four children, Billy Joe Harrison, Robert L. Harrison Jr., Juanelle Reeve and Mary Beth Mays.



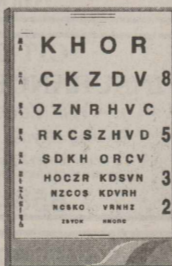
