

Weekend burglary at Mesa Oil Tools in Knox City nets \$22,500 worth of down hole packer tools

Dave Styles, owner and operator of Mesa Oil Tools in Knox City, received a shock when he arrived for work on Monday morning of this week and found that his business had been burglarized over the weekend.

Located at 300 North Main in Knox City, Mesa Oil Tools is an oilfield service company that furnishes down hole packer tools to the oilfield industry. The highly specialized pieces of equipment are highly valued, and Styles estimates the weekend loss at approximately \$22,500.

The burglary occurred sometime between last Thursday evening when Styles left his business and early Monday morning when he returned. It appears that the weekend thieves entered Mesa Oil Tools through a back door located on the west side if the

building. When Styles arrived early Monday morning, he found the door open and the lock damaged. After going inside his business, Styles discovered that he was missing a lot of his equipment from inside the building.

Local law enforcement agencies were contacted and immediately arrived to begin an investigation. Fingerprints were obtained from several areas and photographs of fresh tire tracks behind the building were taken. Both the Knox City Police Department and the Knox County Sheriff's Department are helping with the investigation.

Dave Styles is an independent business owner and the loss of \$22,500 worth of the down hole packer tools has crippled his small operation.

Furious that someone stole from

him, Styles has offered a large cash reward for information that leads to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for this burglary and theft. An advertisement for the reward appears inside this edition of The Knox County News. If anyone knows, hears, or sees anything about this burglary that could be helpful to law enforcement authorities, they are strongly urged to contact Knox City Police Chief Harry Steen at (940) 658-3313 or Knox County Sheriff Dean Homstad at (940) 454-2211.

This burglary is believed to be specifically related to the oil field industry because of the unique nature of the packer tools that were stolen. Only someone familiar with this kind of equipment would know the value of the items that were stolen.

Rick Wupperman graduates from UT Southwestern Medical Center



Cholecystitis

Did you know that more than 25 million people in the United states have gallstones?

Even though 25 million people have gallstones, less than half will ever show symptoms. These systems include substernal, which is under the sternum or breast bone, abdominal pain which runs around the right side of the body toward the right shoulder blade. Usually, the pain is most intense during the first 15 minutes of an attack, then subsides between 30 minutes and five hours afterward. Occasionally, nausea and vomiting, heart burn, and chest pain accompany the attack

The best way to diagnosis gallstones is through ultrasound. Your physician may also run blood tests to determine if any infection is present or if there could also be liver damage. Treatment includes antibiotics, IV tluids, and possibly surgery to remove the gallbladder

If you are experiencing upper right abdominal pain, especially after eating greasy foods, consult your family physician.
