

Greyhounds win season opener, stun Seymour's Panthers, 31-7

Despite a delay of game for one hour and ten minutes that was caused by a power failure, the Knox City Greyhounds entertained the home crowd at their season opener last Friday night by defeating the class 2A

Showing an awesome defense and an offense full of weapons, the 2002 edition of the Knox City's 'Hounds proved to be a formidable foe on the field. Preseason worries about an inexperienced line were put to rest, along with any concern of how upcoming underclassmen would perform. The defense was totally devastating, causing Seymour's offense to flicker, at best. Gang tackling and caused fumbles were the theme of the evening for the Greyhound defense as they caused 7 fumbles, recovering 3. The unit was also responsible for 19 solo tackles, 59 assisted tackles, 3 quarterback sacks, 6 hurried passes, 1 interception and 1 touchdown when defensive lineman Caleb Carver picked up a up a Panther fumble and ran it back for 6 points.

Defensive leaders were Sedrick Roberson with 6 solo tackles, 6 assisted tackles, 1 hurried pass and 1 caused fumble with recovery; Scooter Thompson with 2 solo tackles, 9 assisted tackles, 2 hurried passed and

2 caused fumbles; Dominique Collier with 1 solo tackle, 8 assisted tackles, 1 sack, and 2 hurried passes; Gemile Roberson with 2 solo tackles, 5 assisted tackles, 1 hurried pass and 1 caused fumble; and Caleb Carver with 1 solo tackle, 5 assisted tackles, 1 fumble recovery and 1 touchdown. Kendrick Green had the lone interception of the game.

Knox City's scoring was led by Dominique Collier with one 5 yard touchdown run, one kicked field goal and 4 kicked extra points. Other scoring was by Riley Spells with a 2 yard run, Kendrick Green with a 75 vard kickoff return. Gemile Roberson led the rushing with 56 yards on 8 carries, Dominique Collier had 34 vards on 3 carries, Riley Spells had 23 yards on 4 carries, Sedrick Roberson had 18 yards on 7 carries, Scooter Thompson had 7 yards on 2 carries, Quinten Spells had 5 yards on 2 carries, and Carlos Ruiz had 4 yards on 1 carry. Sedrick Roberson also completed 3 of 9 passes for 53 yards.

Knox City travels to Anson this Friday night to take on the class 2A Anson Tigers. Since this is a preseason game, the kickoff is scheduled for 8:00 p.m. There will be a pep rally in the KC high school gym at 3:10.







Joe Winford King

Former Knox City resident Joe Winford King, 79, of Canyon died Thursday, August 8, 2002, in Amarillo.

Services were held at 11:00 a.m. Monday, August 12, 2002, in Holley Funeral Home Chapel. Burial was at 3:00 p.m. in the Petersburg Cemetery in Petersburg.

Born June 21, 1923, in Rochester to John Wesley King and Ida Perry King, he had only just begun college at Weatherford Junior College when the United States was drawn into World War II.

Joe was a 1941 graduate of Knox City High School and was a standout football and basketball player for the Knox City Greyhounds. Resolutely determined to fight for his country, Joe entered the Navy and served on the USS Tangier, a seaplane tender, in the Pacific Theatre for the duration of the war, receiving four campaign ribbons.

Following his service in the Navy, Joe completed college at McMurry and began his career and an educator. In his 40-year career, he was at different times a history teacher and coach in Petersburg, Anton, Lorenzo and Lubbock high schools.

He was a teacher and coach at Sul Ross College and McCamey High School. He was a principal at Lockney and Tulia high schools and a superintendent and athletic director at Nazareth.

In 1973, along with his daughter, he was inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame, the only father and daughter so honored. He also coached tennis at West Texas A&M University in Canyon.

His WT team won the Lone Star Championship and he was named Coach of the Year in 1991. He was a part president of the Lions Club of Tulia, was a founder of the Lions Club of Nazareth and was an active member of the Canyon Lions Club as well

In his retirement, and until his declining health intervened, Joe traveled when he could, to be with his children and to watch his grandchildren play high school and college sports. Every spring and summer, he carefully nurtured and tended his garden. Even in his 70s, he was still competing in local tennis tournament. And from his each chair, he "followed" just about every college and professional sport that newspapers would report and that television would broadcast.

He was preceded in death by his parents, John Wesley King and Ida Perry King; and a sister, Pauline (King) Hewitt.

Survivors include his wife, Ola Joyce; a son, Johnny Wayne King and wife, Diane (Moore), of Kaufman; two daughters, Judy Elaine and husband, Gary Daniel White of Salina, Kansas, and Kimla Gayle and husband, John Leon Crossno of Raleigh, NC; a brother, Oliver King of Plainview; two sisters, Lou (King) DuFour of San Clemente, California, and Fanny (King) Carlisle of Kress; and four grandchildren, Heath J. Hefley of Tulsa, Oklahoma, Angie White of Shawnee, Kansas, and Jana Leann King and Kyle Joseph King, both of Kaufman.


