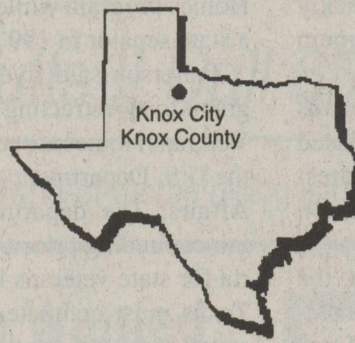

## Knox City benefitting from community network program, courses are planned

Town hall meeting planned for January 16

Knox City, as well as Knox County, is reaping the benefits of a Community Network Program made possible by TIF (Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund). A grant in excess of \$250,000.00 was received and public access to 35 computers are now available.

According to project director Rob Harrison, 12 of these computers are at the renamed Knox County Senior Citizens Center and Library. The remaining 23 computers are at Knox City Elementary.

Each of these units are functional and ready to go with the

assistance of Matt Harrington, who coordinated with hardware companies for the project.

Board members who helped see this project through were Supt. of Schools Louis Baty, Knox City Mayor Charles Lankford, EDC board members W.R. Baker and Rob Harrison, Knox County Hospital administrator Stephen Kuehler and Susan Cockrell, Knox County Senior Citizens program coordinator.

Harrison continued by saying that a community website is on the horizon and local and county residents who will have the availability of web presence for a nomi-

nal yearly fee.

Two separate courses are also planned. Intro to Windows is set for January 14, 15 and 16 at two different times, 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. and 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. at the Aging Center. On January 21, 22 and 23, Intro to Internet and email will also be taught at the same times as listed above. For reservations, call Susan Cockrell at 657-3618.

Thursday, January 16, a town hall meeting is planned at 7:00 p.m. in the W.R. Baker Auditorium. Colt West of itinc. Inc. will be on hand to explain web presence and knowledgeable functions.

## 2003 federal income tax filing season begins with new features on IRS.gov

WASHINGTON - Americans will find new Web site features, expanded free e-filing options and more helpful services as the Internal Revenue Service opens the 2003 tax filing season. Taxpayers also will see reduced tax rates mor deductions and fewer forms lo file.

This week, more than 3 million tax packages and 25 million electronic-filing brochures will begin arriving in people's mailboxes. The IRS estimates about 132 million individual returns will be filed this year. The mailing of the packages has traditionally kicked off the filing season, but millions of taxpayers each year abandon paper returns in favor of going electronic.

Taxpayers will be provided with more options than ever with expanded online assistance on the IRS Web site. Key changes being introduced for the 2003 filing season include:

- Taxpayers can check on the status of their refund by visiting Where's My Refund?

- For the first time, more than 60 percent of all taxpayers will be able to prepare and electronically file tax returns for free on the Internet. The Free File program, offered through IRS private-sector partners, will be available beginning in mid-January through IRS.gov.

"The IRS makes history this year with new electronic services for taxpayers. We want to make it easier than ever for taxpayers to get help, and IRS.gov does just that," said IRS Acting Commissioner Bob Wenzel. "People can use the Web site to answer many of their tax questions. They can use IRS.gov to find options for free e-filing programs. And taxpayers can use the Web site to determine whether their refunds are on the way."

IRS.gov is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The 2002 instructions for Form 1040, which many Americans will receive in the mail this week, contains a partial listing of helpful publications that can be viewed on-line or ordered by calling 1-800-TAX-FORM. IRS.gov also contains plain-language explanations for many tax issues. Publication 17, Your Federal Income Tax, also is a plain-language guide for indi-

viduals and can be viewed on-line.

"The IRS.gov Web site already is one of the busiest in the world. We urge taxpayers to give it a try this year. They will find it helpful and easy to use," Wenzel said. "We're trying to provide taxpayers with as many options as possible to get help when they need it. IRS.gov is at the ready with a click of a mouse."

Another new IRS.gov feature is "Where's My Refund?" will be highlighted on the home page. Taxpayers can easily check the status of their refunds by using a little information found on their tax return

Taxpayer's name on a joint return, the first listed)

- Social Security Number (on a joint return, the first listed);

- Filing status (single, head of household, married filing jointly, married filing separately, or qualifying widower) with dependent child);

- Refund amount claimed.

With just a little information, taxpayers can use IRS.gov to track their refund status. "Where's My Refund?" also can tell taxpayers if the IRS has received their tax return. It can let them know if there is a problem, and how to resolve the problem. For those who do not use direct deposit the "Where's My Refund?" feature also can tell taxpayers if the IRS was unable to deliver their refund through the mail.

"Taxpayers instantly can answer the question that most concerns them: 'Where's my refund?'" Wenzel said. "The feature will tell taxpayers if the check is on its way. It will tell them when the refund was deposited or mailed. And it will tell them if a mistake is being corrected."

In addition to "Where's My Refund," there is a toll-free refund hotline at 1-800-829-154. Taxpayers will need the same information as for the Web site to find out the status of their refund.

In another landmark step, an agreement between the IRS and a consortium of participating tax software companies means more than 60 percent of Americans will be eligible for free tax preparation and electronic filing. More information on who will qualify for Free File will be announced later

this month. The program, which will be featured on the front page of IRS.gov, promises new avenues to easy electronic filing for millions of Americans.

IRS e-files already receives raves. The American Customer Satisfaction Index survey of electronic filers found a satisfaction score of 78 out of 100. That's a better score than many private companies receive and one of the highest in the federal government.

Last year, a record 47 million tax returns were filed through IRS e-file. E-filed returns, when combined with direct deposit may mean refunds within 10 days. Refunds from paper-filed returns can take up to six weeks.

We started IRS e-file in 1986, but in recent years there's been a phenomenal growth in electronic filing. Millions of people recognize its convenience and security," Wenzel said.

Other 2002 tax year highlights for taxpayers include:

- Reduced tax rates. Most tax rates have decreased by 12 percent and a new 10 percent tax rate applies to all filers.

- Schedule B. Most taxpayers won't have to file a separate Schedule B unless either their interest or dividend income exceeds \$1,500. The change means 15 million taxpayers will have one less form to fill out. Previously, taxpayers had to complete a Schedule B if they earned no more than \$400 in either taxable interest or dividends.

- Tax deduction for teachers. Educators may deduct up to \$250 in out-of-pocket expenses they paid for classroom supplies.

- More working families may qualify for the Earned Income Tax Credit as a new law excludes non-taxable income such as supplemental military pay for housing or combat from the credit computation.

- Deduction for tuition and fees. Taxpayers may be able to deduct up to \$3,000 of qualified tuition and fees paid in 2002 for higher education for themselves, their spouses or dependents.

- Retirement Savings Credit. Taxpayers who meet certain income guidelines may be able to take a credit of up to \$1,000 for qualified retirement savings contributions.

## Jerry Patterson sworn in last Friday as the 24th Land Commissioner of Texas

AUSTIN - Sworn in as the 24th Land Commissioner of Texas on Friday, former state senator Jerry Patterson promised to be the greatest commissioner of the General Land Office since David Dewhurst, his predecessor.

More than 500 supporters filled the Senate Chamber of the State Capitol to witness the event, which was punctuated by Aggie whoops and the hollers of former U.S. Marines in attendance.

Patterson's swearing in caps five years of effort to win the office that oversees the state's 21 million acres of public land and veterans' programs. He ran unsuccessfully for Land Commissioner in 1998.

Numerous elected officials, including Lieutenant Gov.-elect Dewhurst and state Rep. Tom Craddick attended the event.

At a reception following the

ceremony, Patterson stood with Dewhurst and former land commissioners Bob Armstrong and Garry Mauro for photos in front of the historic General Land Office building on the Capitol grounds.

Texas Supreme Court Justice Wallace B. Jefferson administered the oath of office on a small pocket bible that Patterson carried while serving in Vietnam and his father had carried during World War II. Following that, Patterson administered the oath of office of Chief Clerk of the Texas General Land Office to Larry Laine, his former senate chief of staff.

Despite the levity of the event, Patterson acknowledged the seriousness of his new responsibility. He asked those gathered to take note of the Texas heroes whose images adorn the Capitol.

"When you win an election, it's

easy to think you're somebody," Patterson said. "But looking at the photos and paintings in this building, you're quickly reminded that we are just passing through. I will do the best job I can."

A graduate of Texas A&M, a Vietnam veteran and Marine aviator, Patterson retired from the Marine Corps Reserve as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1991. Patterson served six years as a state senator and authored major legislation such as the Texas Concealed Handgun Law, the Texas Coastal Management Plan and the law creating the Texas State Veterans Homes.

His parents, Bob and Georgia Auderer, his wife, Jennifer and Emily, his daughter, joined him for the ceremony. His son, Travis, is a Marine helicopter pilot in training in California and was unable to attend.

## USDA to hold briefing on available USDA programs

2002 Farm Bill Will be highlighted by USDA Officials at Victoria, Texas.

TEMPLE, TEXAS, December 23, 2002 -- The U.S. Department of Agriculture will hold an informational briefing January 15, 2003, in Victoria, Texas, to acquaint farmers, ranchers and other constituents with a wide array of agency services and to highlight changes and new provisions in the 2002 Farm Bill.

"This session is an important part of our ongoing implementation of the 2002 Farm Bill and commitment to reach as many people as possible about USDA programs," said Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman. "Stakeholders will have the opportunity to hear from USDA experts on the many programs available to them."

The briefing will be held January 15th at the Holiday Inn in Victoria, Texas from 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The session, organized by USDA Rural Development and the USDA Office of Outreach, will feature presentations on a broad array of topics including conservation programs, insurance and drought relief programs, food and nutrition programs and rural utilities, rural business and rural housing programs. Other meetings are being considered and will be announced when details are available.

"We are committed to reaching out to the full spectrum of USDA customers, including under-served customers, minorities and women, to ensure they benefit from USDA programs and services," said Assistant Secretary for Administration Lou Gallegos.

### Patterson announces sites selected for new Texas State Veterans Homes

AUSTIN - The Texas Veterans Land Board today selected El Paso and McAllen as the sites for two new Texas State Veterans Homes, Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson announced. Amarillo also received conditional approval for a future site.

"These homes are designed for Texas veterans, their spouses and Gold Star parents who need long-term, skilled nursing care," said Patterson, a retired U.S. Marine Corps Lieutenant Colonel and Vietnam veteran. "They provide dignified care for those who served our nation among the camaraderie of fellow veterans."

The Texas Veterans Land Board approved the El Paso and McAllen sites in a public meeting in Austin January 4. The Texas Veterans Land Board members are Patterson, who serves as chairman, Col. Ladd Pattillo, USAR (Ret.), and Mr. Mike Ussery, who served in Korea for the U.S. Army.

Each community selected for a Texas State Veterans Home may see more than 120 jobs and a \$3 million annual payroll from each fully operational home. Construction on the two new homes should begin in late 2003. Each home is self-sustaining, costing state and local taxpayers nothing.

The sites were selected from 40 applications. The selection process sought to ensure the new homes were located in areas where

they were most likely to quickly achieve and sustain maximum occupancy.

"The overriding concern was that the new homes be placed where they have the greatest chance for success," Patterson said.

In making their decision, the most important criteria considered by the Texas Veterans Land Board were:

- The number of veterans over 65 in the service area for the proposed home.

- The distance of the proposed home from an existing Texas State Veterans Home.

- The proximity of the proposed home to required U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs medical facilities and services or the equivalent.

"We received many fine proposals, but we have only been awarded enough federal funding for two homes this year," Patterson said. "We will continue applying for federal grants to construct additional veterans homes, because Texas has a demonstrated need for these facilities."

Patterson said Texas needs additional Texas State Veterans Homes to serve the approximately 500,000 Texas veterans who are 65 or older.

Patterson authored Senate Bill 1060, the legislation that established the Texas State Veterans

Homes program while serving as a state senator in 1997.

Patterson said five additional grants for constructing Texas State Veterans Homes are pending with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. The department determines funding priority and criteria for state veterans homes, and Texas must compete with other states each year for this funding.

He said the two new homes would complement the first four state veterans homes in Temple, Floresville, Big Spring and Bonham. Each facility has a similar layout to save on design costs, and houses up to 160 veterans in spacious private and semi-private rooms.

Each home offers a broad spectrum of health care services, a comprehensive rehabilitation program, special diets, recreational activities, social services, a library and a specialty Alzheimer's care unit with its own secure yard.

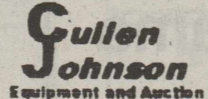

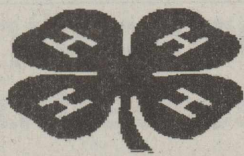

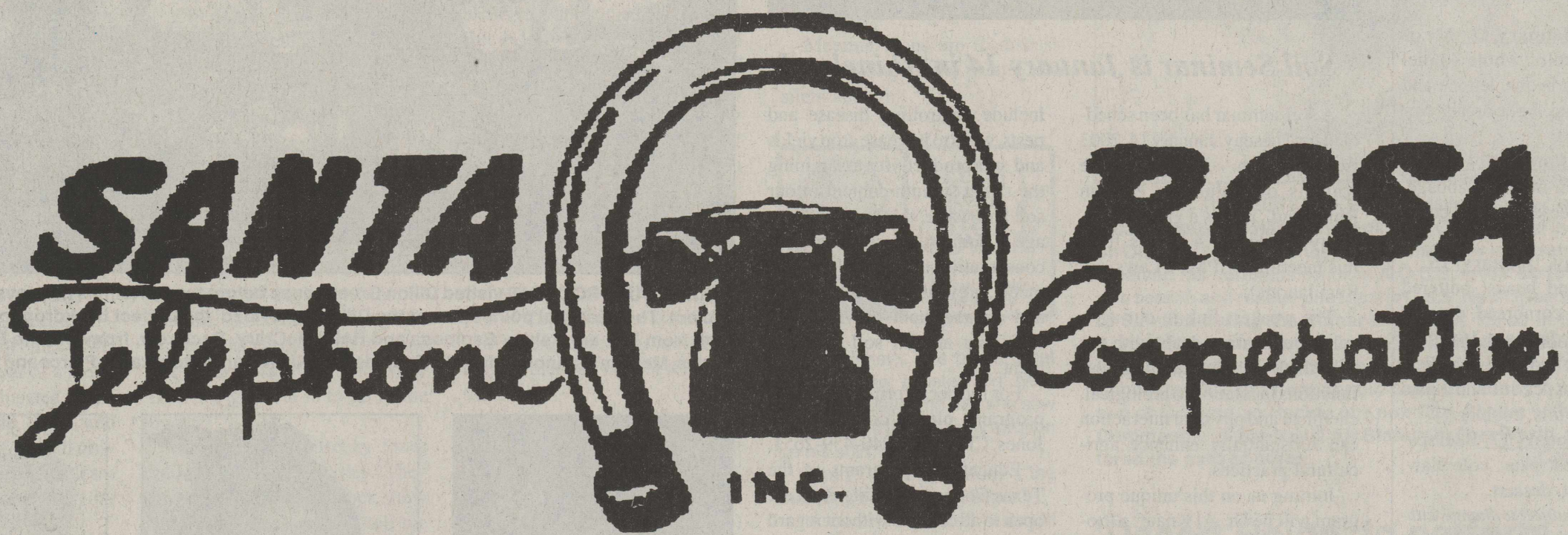

In addition, the personal exemption increases to \$3,000. For those taxpayers who don't itemize, the standard deduction increases to \$4,700 for single, \$6,900 for head of household and \$7,850 for married filing jointly. Also, the maximum Individual Retirement Arrangement contribution increased to \$3,000 for the 2002 tax year (\$3,500 for taxpayers 50 and over in 2002).

The IRS.gov Web site also is a good source to explore what tax changes are in effect for the 2002 tax year. The Newsroom section contains many news releases and fact sheets on recent changes. Publication 553, Highlights of 2002 Tax Changes, will provide detail on tax law changes of interest to individuals and businesses.

The IRS also is introducing some new toll-free telephone num-

bers this year to expand customer services to individuals and businesses. Small businesses, corporations, partnerships and trusts that need help or information related to business returns can call 1-800-829-4933. Individuals needing tax help can call 1-800-829-1040 to speak to a customer service representative or arrange a visit at a Taxpayer Assistance Center. Individuals can call 1-800-829-4477 to hear pre-recorded tax information. Individuals, businesses and tax professionals can call 1-800-329-3676 to order forms, instructions and publications. The full battery of tests costs \$40 with a first time fee of \$6. Cash, checks or money orders made payable to Vernon College are acceptable. Prices are subject to change.

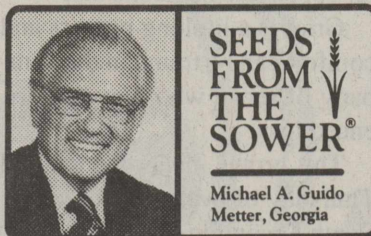
Kim Moore and girls of Spur spent New Year's with family here.

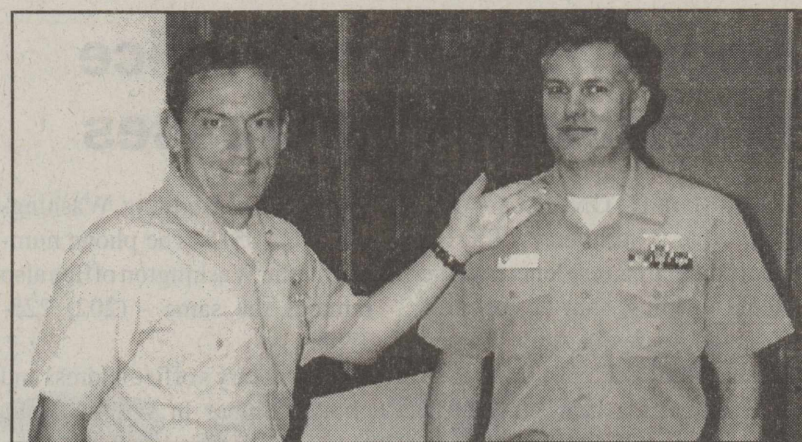

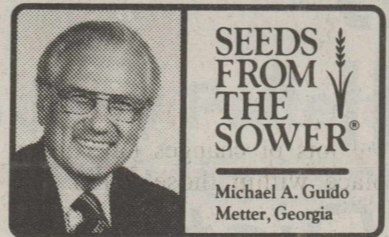

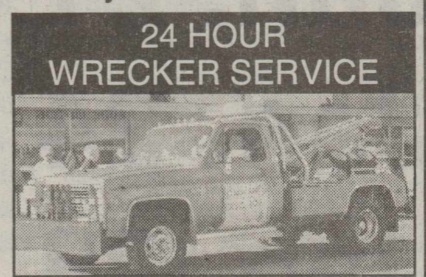
