Clarendon welcomes Panhandle press

Clarendon will welcome more than 70 registered attendees during the Panhandle Press Association's 106th annual convention this week, Thursday-Saturday, April 14-16.

PPA President Ashlee Estlack and the staff of The Clarendon Enterprise are hosting the event, which has been designed to showcase Donley County and leave a positive lasting impression on the members of the regional group of community newspapers.

"We've worked to put together a program that is informative to our members while giving Clarendon

a chance to shine," Estlack said. "Local support for this convention has been terrific, and we believe it will have a positive impact on our community."

The convention will bring in newspapers from an area encompassing the Texas Panhandle and South Plains as well as bordering counties in New Mexico and Oklahoma. Twenty-one individual newspapers and associate members are sending representatives.

The convention begins Thursday afternoon with registration and a PPA directors' meeting at the Best

Western Red River Inn. Thursday evening the convention will gather at the Saints' Roost Museum, which is the home of the Panhandle Press Hall of Fame. There the crowd will enjoy the Chuckwagon cooking of Kevin Romines and the Honey-Do Spoiler wagon while listening to the music of local singer-songwriter Phil Flowers and the cowboy poetry of Jo Shaller.

Friday morning the convention gets underway at the Bairfield Activity Center where morning and afternoon work sessions will be led by Kevin Slimp, a favorite speaker and

trainer in the publishing world who has worked with newspapers and press associations all across North America. Slimp's courses will cover everything from customer service to ad and page design tips to Photoshop techniques.

Most of the afternoon Friday will be free for convention attendees to explore Clarendon on their own.

The convention resumes Friday evening at the Bairfield Activity Center with a banquet catered by the Bar H Dude Ranch focusing on the 2016 inductees to the PPA Hall of Fame, which includes longtime

Groom publisher Phillip Miller and a former publisher of The Clarendon News, the late E.E. Carhart, who brought the first printing press to the Texas Panhandle in 1881.

Activities on Saturday morning will include a roundtable discussion on social media and web trends featuring Texas Tech University professor Randy Reddick and former Enterprise and Texas Tech Toreador reporter Ashlyn Tubbs, who is now a reporter for KCBD in Lubbock.

Fansler, Grahn win Jones 5K

Clarendon's Bryce Grahn and Pampa's Hannah Fansler were the top men's and women's finishers of the fourth annual Chance Mark Jones Roar 'N Run 5K last Saturday, April 9, at Clarendon College.

The race sponsored by the Clarendon Lions Club in conjunction with National Child Abuse Awareness Month, drew 127 registrations and had 107 actual runners and walkers the day of the event as well as dozens of spectators, supporters, and workers.

The annual 5K is held to raise awareness of child abuse and to honor the life of four-year-old Chance Mark Jones.

Grahn, finishing with a time of 19:37, had the best overall time, the best men's time, and best time for those ages 11 to 19. He also finished 1:25 earlier than last year's best runner. Fansler ran the race in 25 minutes and 20 seconds, coming in first among all women and second in the 11-19 age group. Grahn is 17, and Fansler is 11.

Clarendon's sales tax revenue dips again for April

After moving up slightly last month, sales tax figures for the City of Clarendon slipped again when Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar made his April allocations last week.

Clarendon's sales tax revenue dipped 5.46 percent to \$24,697.69, and the city's calendar year-to-date total slid 5.53 percent down to \$115,860.84.

These allocations are based on sales made in February by businesses that report tax monthly.

Clarendon's figure has now dropped 11 of the last 15 months.

Hedley's figure dropped 19.56 percent to \$327.39 for the month but was still showing positive signs for the year, up 24.52 percent at \$2,497.54.

Howardwick plummeted 39.90 percent to \$640.65, but was still up 1.87 percent for the year-to-date at \$4,444.40.

Across the state, Hegar reported that local

sales tax allocations were up 2.6 percent at \$591.4 million compared to the same period one year ago.

"The cities of Dallas, Austin, Sugar Land and Fort Worth saw substantial increases in sales tax allocations that helped stop a four-month streak of declining sales tax allocations for the state overall," Hegar said. "Energy-centric cities such as Houston and Midland continue to see decreases in sales tax allocations."

City moving ahead with project after Town Hall

Clarendon Aldermen are set to move forward this week with a \$3.9 million project to improve the city's water distribution system following a recent Town Hall meeting.

"I think it was a positive response," City Administrator David Dockery said of the Town Hall. "We'll have something dealing with this project on every agenda for the foreseeable future."

The City Council will consider two items on its agenda this Thursday that will set the project in motion, the administrator said. The first is a "notice to proceed," and the second will be action to engage bond counsel.

Dockery says he expects the city will complete surveying and design work within six months, project bidding will be done in seven or eight months, and construction will begin within a year. Once construction begins, the project will take 18 months to three years to complete.

The main focus of the project will be to address discolored water found in some parts of town that is caused by miles of cast iron distribution pipes and poor flow through the system. The city is also out of compliance with state regulations for elevated storage due to problems with the standpipe (or water tower) on the east side of town. Clarendon could face state fines in the near future if those issues are not addressed.

The city additionally will replace all water meters with auto read meters. City officials say the aging meters currently in use are inaccurate by as much as 20 percent, and automated meters would significantly reduce the man-hours needed each month to read more than 700 meters.

Through the USDA Rural Development Program, Clarendon will pay for the project with a grant of \$1.387 million and a loan in the amount of \$2.522 million. The loan will take 40 years to pay off at 2.5 percent interest and with an annual payment of about \$100,500.

The loan payment would require additional revenue for the city equal to \$10 per month per water connection. Dockery says the rate increase is about nine months in the future at this point.

More than 50 people attended the Town Hall meeting on the night of March 29 at the Bairfield Activity Center, where Dockery, along with Mayor Larry Hicks and city engineer Clayton Scales, fielded questions from the public following an explanatory overview of the project. A sample of the questions and answers follows:

Question: Why can't the east standpipe be raised to create more elevated storage? Have we asked for a variance from the state?

Answer: The engineers aren't sure the foundation or the base shell of the standpipe could handle the weight of additional capacity. And we can't get a variance.

Question: Why can't we just replace the oldest water meters instead of all the meters?

Answer: Most of the meters are old and therefore measuring water inaccurately. The city is being charged for all the water it receives from Greenbelt but is not able to collect for all the water used by consumers. Better accountability will produce more revenue.

Question: What percentage of the funding is grant funds?

Answer: 35 percent.

Question: Clarendon is in decline, and won't this cost be borne by fewer and fewer people?

Answer: The city believes improved water and improved services makes Clarendon more attractive for people to live here.

Comment: Our rates are higher than other cities already.

Response: If you look at other

cities who purchase their water from Greenbelt, we are comparable. Childress' and Crowell's rates are higher than Clarendon and will still be higher after we go up \$10.

Comment by Judy Thomas: I don't like the idea of paying \$10 per month more, but I like replacing my clothes less (due to stains from dirty water).

Comment by Rose Lemley: I greatly admire our mayor, council, and city administrator for dealing with something that nobody else wanted to deal with.

Question: How will this waterline replacement impact paved streets and driveways?

Answer: Lines will be placed in the right of way outside of the paving where possible. Driveways that are cut will be put back with the same material that was there.

Question: What about the

brick streets?

Answer: Brick streets are important to the community and city is aware of that.

Comment from Will Thompson: Many express fear of spending or taxes going up. I fear not doing something like Flint, Michigan. Doing nothing will put pressure on another generation.

Comment from Bob Watson: We're doing a disservice to those with poor water if we don't fix this water for everybody.

Question: How does this impact the city's ability to borrow money for future projects?

Answer: The current street bonds will be paid for in three years, and at that time the city could take on another project.

Email hacks, identity theft and the Contact Lens Rule

Hi, gang! I have three good articles for your consideration. Enjoy and watch out! The scammers will scam us if they can. My computer and new printer going back to Best Buy in Amarillo. Best Buy has been very helpful in trying to get the new printer to work.

“Official-sounding Calls About An Email Hack,” by Andrew Johnson Division of Consumer and Business Education, FTC.

There’s a new twist on tech-support scams you know, the one where crooks try to get access to your computer or sensitive information by offering to “fix” a computer problem that doesn’t actually exist. Lately, we’ve heard reports that people are getting calls from someone claiming to be from the Global Privacy Enforcement Network. Their claim? That your email account has been hacked and is sending fraudulent messages. They say they’ll have to take legal action against you, unless you let them fix the problem right away.

If you raise questions, the

scammers turn up the pressure, but they’ve also given out phone numbers of actual Federal Trade Commission staff (who have been surprised to get calls). The scammers also have sent people to the actual website for the Global Privacy Enforcement Network. (It’s a real thing: it’s an organization that helps governments work together on cross-border privacy cooperation.)

Here are few things to remember if you get any kind of tech-support call, no matter who they say they are:

Don’t give control of your computer to anyone who calls you offering to “fix” your computer. Never give out or confirm your financial or sensitive information to anyone who contacts you. Getting pressure to act immediately? That’s a sure sign of a scam. Hang up. If you have concerns, contact your security software company directly. Use contact information you know is right, not what the caller gives you. If you spot a scam, tell the FTC.

“Identity Theft Target Turns

the Tables,” by Bridget Smalley, Consumer Education Specialist, FTC

I admit it; when my email inbox is full, my eyes may drift past some messages. But my co-worker’s story has motivated me to pay better attention. She noticed an odd email her husband got and looked into it. It turned out that someone had stolen his personal information and used it to buy things.

Now her husband is using IdentityTheft.gov to fix problems, and she’s reminding people to watch their inboxes. The story started with an email from a company the family knew. It said ‘We received your order.’ That seemed ok; they had recently placed an order. A second email said ‘Your new mobile phone is on its way’ and listed a delivery address that wasn’t theirs. ‘That’s

wrong!’ my co-worker thought, and she called the company.

The company confirmed that someone using her husband’s account had ordered a mobile phone, and was having it sent to a nearby hotel. She told the company it was a scam, closed the account and filed an identity theft report. She also contacted local law enforcement. When the scammer (complete with fake ID) came to pick up the package, local law enforcement arrested him.

There are many ways to discover that someone is using your information. You might get bills that aren’t yours, see strange withdrawals from your bank account or get an unexpected notice from the IRS. If you see a warning sign, act quickly. IdentityTheft.gov will guide you through the steps that help you limit the damage.

“Timing Is Everything” from the FTC.

The doctor must give you your contact lens prescription when your fitting is complete. A fitting may require more than one appointment.

If the doctor is ready to sell you contacts, the fitting is complete. The doctor can’t require you to pay an extra fee, buy eyeglasses or contact lenses, or sign a waiver or form in exchange for your prescription.

If you suspect an eye doctor is violating the Contact Lens Rule, you can report that online at ftc.gov/complaint. FTC attorneys and investigators – and hundreds of other law enforcement agencies – use consumer complaints to bring cases against companies and people that violate the law. In fact, the FTC recently sent letters warning contact lens prescribers and sellers about potential violations of the Contact Lens Rule. Violations of the Rule could result in legal action and financial penalties.

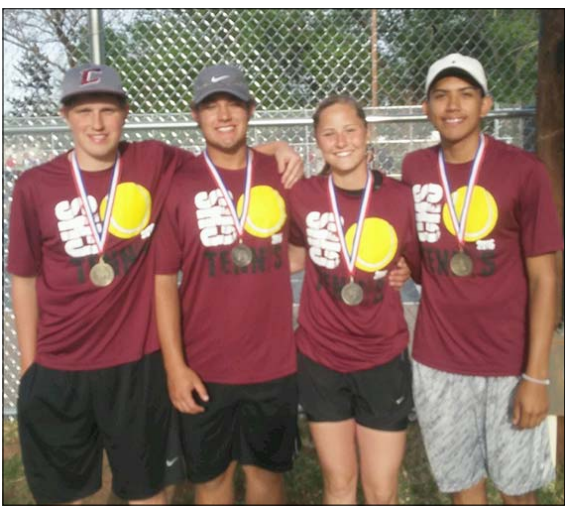

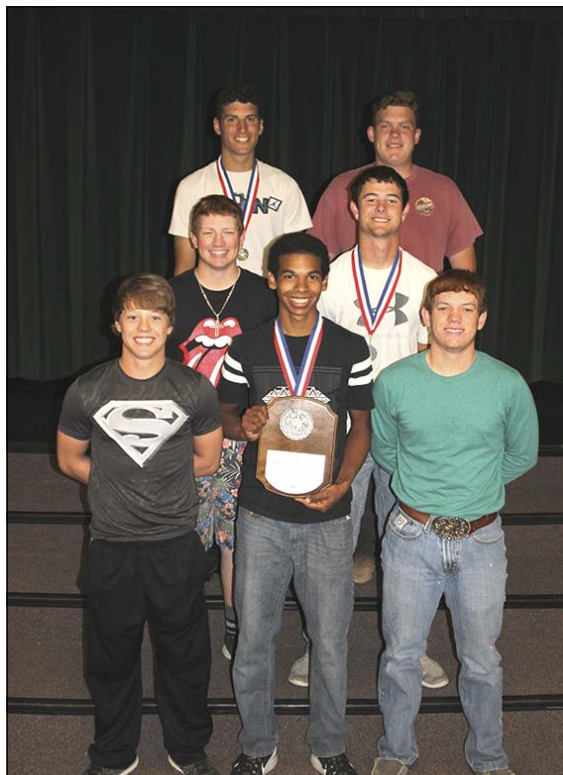

Clarendon girls earn big 22-4 win

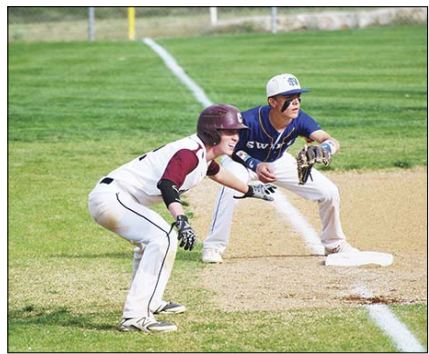

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CC students learn new skills at Mesalands

TUCUMCARI, NM – Mesalands Community College is pleased to announce that 17 students from Clarendon College recently completed two courses in Artistic Silversmithing and Farrier Science at Mesalands. This partnership between both institutions gives students the opportunity to gain hands-on experience, learn from other students, and exposes them to new programs.

“The week went very well and all of the students are happy. We had our (Mesalands) students mentor the Clarendon students. We had one of our students with two of theirs, therefore, all of the students could benefit from this opportunity,” said Eddy Mardis, Artistic Silversmithing Faculty at Mesalands. “It’s better for Clarendon to come over to our campus because we have the facilities and equipment here. designing. “It really is a better deal for us. Eddy and Gary are already equipped with the machinery here on campus. Before they would have to haul the

machinery and equipment to us and it’s easier for us just bring the students here,” said Laban Tubbs, Ranch and Feedlot Operations Instructor at Clarendon College. “Eddy and Gary are talented craftsmen and are good instructors. All of our students have learned a lot and done very well.”

Tubbs said in the Farrier Science course students were required to properly shoe the front leg and hind leg of a horse. In Artistic Silversmithing, they had to build a pair of spurs and engrave them. He said many of the students had some extra time and built a belt buckle as well.

Combination Diabetes Drug Granted an NDA

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has accepted the New Drug Application (NDA) for an experimental combination of insulin glargine and lixisenatide for adults with type 2 diabetes. A NDA is required by the FDA from a pharmaceutical company in order to bring the medication to market. In Type 2 diabetes a hormone called insulin is not released normally. Insulin is released from the pancreas after a meal to utilize sugars from food into energy the body can use. High levels of sugar in the blood can lead to serious damage in the kidneys, heart, and nerves.

Insulin glargine (Lantus) is a long-acting insulin that is only administered once daily to help keep blood sugars low all day. Lixisenatide is not approved by the FDA at this time, but it is an injectable medication that helps increase the release of insulin from the pancreas.

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO or Company) publishes this notice that on March 16, 2016, it filed its Statement of Intent and Application for Authority to Amend Transmission Cost Recovery Factor (TCRF) with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT or Commission) in Docket No. 45691. The filing was made in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA) § 36.209 and the Tex. Admin. Code (TAC) § 25.239. The TCRF will recover SWEPCO’s reasonable and necessary costs for transmission infrastructure improvements as well as changes in wholesale transmission charges under a tariff approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to the extent that the costs or charges have not otherwise been recovered. In this application, SWEPCO seeks to recover its transmission capital investments through December 31, 2015. SWEPCO also seeks to recover through the TCRF approved transmission charges that are not otherwise being recovered through current rates.

This notice is being published in accordance with PURA § 36.103 and 16 TAC § 22.51(a)(1).

STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

SWEPCO requests that the Commission approve a TCRF that would result in an increase in SWEPCO’s Texas retail revenue requirement of \$4,922,815 per annum above the amount approved in SWEPCO’s previous TCRF case (PUCT Docket No. 44496). This amounts to a 1.55 percent increase in SWEPCO’s overall annualized current Texas retail revenue requirement. SWEPCO proposes that its requested rate change become effective 35 days after the filing of the Statement of Intent and Application. The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the Commission.

All customers in SWEPCO’s Texas retail rate classes will be affected by this change. The impact of the rate change on various customer classes will vary from the overall impact described in this notice.

REQUEST FOR TEMPORARY RATES

SWEPCO requests that the Commission or assigned administrative law judge issue an order establishing SWEPCO’s existing TCRF as a temporary rate effective 120 days after the filing of the Statement of Intent and Application subject to refund or surcharge to the extent the TCRF established pursuant to the Statement of Intent and Application differs from the existing TCRF.
