CISD Trustees okay \$5.6 million FY 2017 budget

The Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees approved a \$5.6 million budget for fiscal year 2017 during a called meeting last Monday, August 22.

The new budget will be about \$130,000 higher than the current budget, and Superintendent Mike Norrell says the increase is mainly due to step raises for teachers and a 2.25 percent increase for at-will

employees of the district.

Norrell said the budget is based on an average daily attendance of 440 students, just as last year's budget was. Clarendon ISD's enrollment Tuesday morning was sitting at 471.

The superintendent also said the district is not planning in major upgrades or renovations in the physical plant, but part of a \$140,584 line

item will be used to make upgrades to the school's computer network servers. That expense will be partially covered by some federal funds the district will receive.

The \$5.6 million budget includes \$244,558 for food services.

Clarendon ISD will maintain its current tax rate of \$1.17 per \$100 valuation as approved by voters three years ago. Due to higher prop-

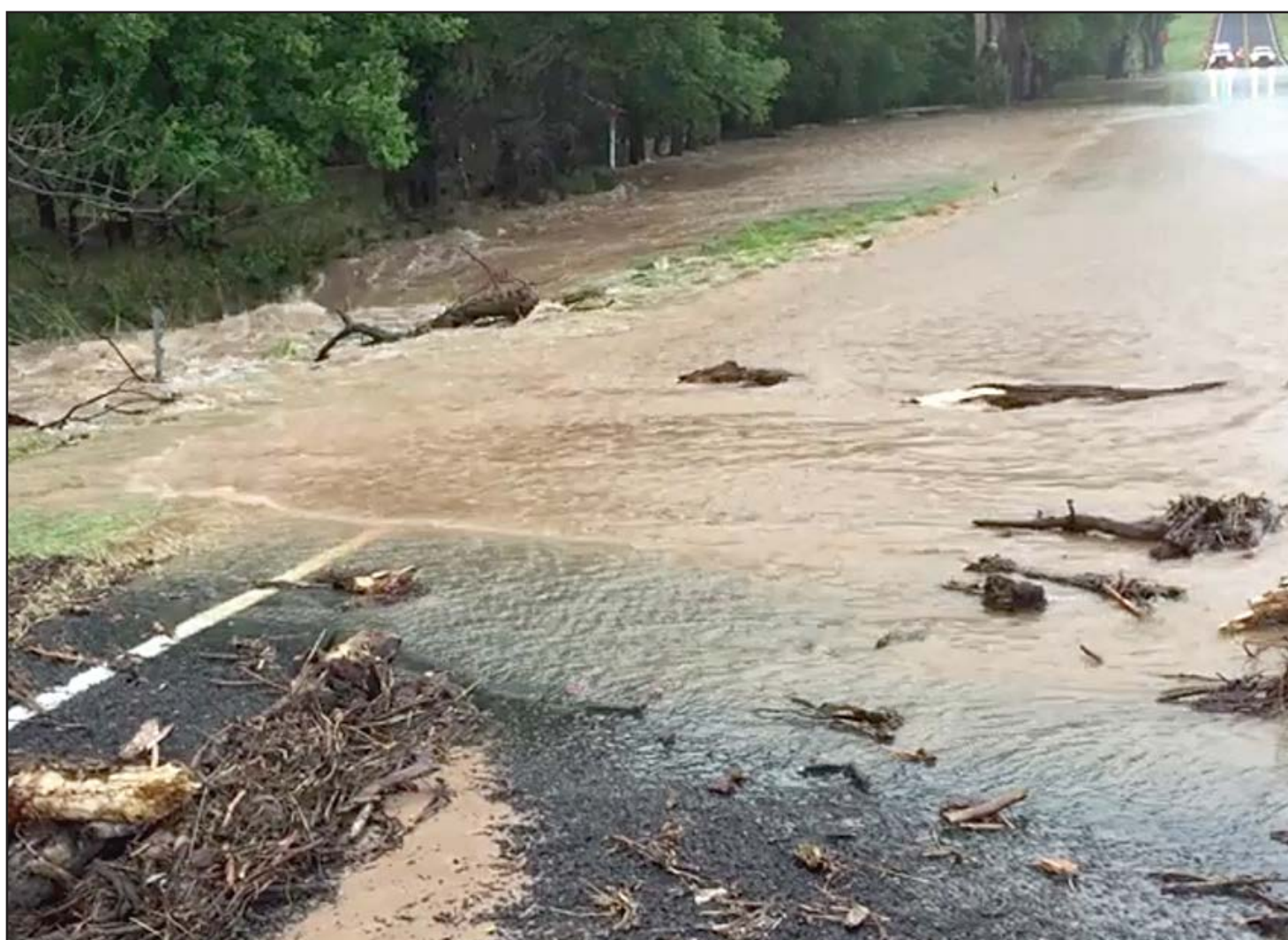
erty values, that tax rate will generate about \$1.6 million in revenue, an increase of about \$200,000 from last year.

Norrell said the school does receive some payments in lieu of taxes from the Salt Fork Wind Project, which generated about \$45,000 last year and is expected to bring in a similar amount this year. The remaining funds to support the

fiscal year 2017 budget will come from state appropriations and other sources.

The fiscal year for Clarendon ISD begins on October 1.

In other business last week, trustees accepted a bid on tax delinquent property in Howardwick, and approved a Legal Services Agreement with Eichelbaum Wardell as presented.



Turn around, don't drown

Rains benefit Greenbelt Lake Rising level pulls reservoir out of Stage 3 drought

Heavy rains the last two weeks have pulled Greenbelt Lake out of its Stage 3 Drought condition.

The lake level was sitting at 52.9 feet Tuesday afternoon, gaining about 1,600 acre-feet of water in just ten days, according to Greenbelt Water Authority General Manager Bobbie Kidd.

The reservoir's Stage 3 Drought contingency is triggered at a depth of 51 feet.

"We actually just crossed back

into Stage 2 on August 25," Kidd said, noting that the rising lake level would reach its Stage 1 level when it gets back to 54 feet.

As of Tuesday, Greenbelt had come up about three feet in the last ten days and was now at 28.4 percent capacity. The reservoir is at its fullest point since November 30, 2010.

If the lake climbs to 57 feet, it will be at Stage Zero or completely out of drought contingency.

The lake was still rising Tuesday afternoon after more than three inches of rain was recorded at the filter plant Monday and Monday night.

"We've received 7.69 inches in August," Kidd said. "Kelly Creek is where we have seen the biggest gain recently."

Kidd said heavy water flow on Kelly has now washed the lake's low water crossing on that creek twice since May.

"Our culvert is currently about 200 yards down from the crossing, and we've got to go pull that out," Kidd said.

The forecast is calling for more rain this week. Measured precipitation varied over the county recently, but Lori Howard, Cooperative Observer for the National Weather Service, reported that her gauge west of Clarendon registered 9.54 inches for the ten-day period before Tuesday.

Representative calls for STAAR suspension

A state representative who has passed legislation aimed at reeling in Texas' standardized testing regime is calling on the state to ditch required STAAR exams while it "tries to iron out STAAR's many kinks."

State Rep. Jason Isaac's proposal comes the week after the Texas Education Agency announced it was penalizing the New Jersey-based company that develops and administers the controversial exams more than \$20 million over problems that surfaced during spring-time testing — including computer glitches that caused students to lose answers. It is the first year Educa-

tional Testing Services has overseen STAAR administration after the state scrapped the bulk of its long-time contract with London-based Pearson Education.

"Flawed testing practices threaten the State of Texas' ability to fulfill our education system's goals — and our children's futures," Isaac, R-Dripping Springs, said in a statement Monday. "The litany of errors being uncovered about STAAR is simply a disservice to our students, hard-working teachers, and families."

While the state works with ETS to resolve the issues, Isaac suggested "schools be given the freedom to choose from a variety

of nationally normed standardized tests."

"School districts should not be hampered by an inefficient and ineffective system," Isaac said. "Adding a dose of free-market philosophy to education by allowing a variety of standardized test options can only drive down costs and improve quality."

Isaac told The Texas Tribune he will file legislation next year that would allow school districts to use something like the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills instead of STAAR. He filed a similar bill in 2013.

Last year, Isaac co-authored a bill that passed overwhelmingly requiring that 85 percent of elemen-

tary and middle school students be able to complete STAAR exams within two or three hours (two hours for third through fifth grade; three hours for sixth through eighth grade.) House Bill 743 took effect last June.

A group of parents is suing the education agency, alleging it did not comply with the law this year.

"I hope my colleagues will join me when the 85th Legislative Session convenes in seeking transformational changes that will ensure that testing is a benefit, not a burden, to Texas' students, teachers, and families," Isaac said.

The legislative session begins in January.

The Barnhills would later purchase the Mulkey Theatre and operate it in tandem with the drive-in.

The family operated the theatres continuously until 1984. The Sandell then sat vacant for 18 years before John Morrow and his family reopened it in 2002. At the peak, Texas had 532 drive-ins. After the Sandell re-opened, there were 16 still operating.

The Mulkey Theatre was purchased in 2008 by the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation and renovations have been made to help install new heating and air-conditioning in the Mulkey. Project supporters have until December 31 to raise matching funds to help with that phase of the renovations.

Morrow is looking for a big crowd this weekend at the Sandell, and he hopes everyone will come enjoy the movies and help raise funds for the Mulkey Theatre project.

The gates will open at 6:00 p.m. and Elvis impersonator Smokey Binion, Jr., from Stinnett will be on hand to set the mood and entertain the crowd.

Mini agriculture conference set for Sept. 12

CANADIAN – A Mini Ag Conference, hosted by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, is set for Sept. 12 at the Hemphill County Exhibition Center, 10865 Exhibition Center Road in Canadian.

"This program is designed to provide beef producers as well as land and mineral owners important and critical information that is affecting our region and area in a big way," said Andy Holloway, AgriLife Extension agriculture and natural resources agent for Hemphill County.

"Hemphill and surrounding counties have been severely impacted by the decline of the oil and gas markets, therefore this is having a big impact on beef production and the use of our rangeland."

He said many surface owners who have wells but no minerals need to know their rights based on the law, and mineral owners need to understand the implications of shut-in royalty payments to their leases.

Also, Holloway said the Veterinary Feed Directive is one of the biggest changes affecting livestock health that has come down the pike

in decades, and all livestock producers need to know of these changes in regulations. The cost will be \$25 per person and includes lunch. Those planning to attend should RSVP to the AgriLife Extension Hemphill County office at 806-323-9114 or andy.holloway@ag.tamu.edu by Sept. 9. Space is limited to the first 100 participants.

Two Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units will be offered in the rules and regulations category.

The morning program will begin at 9 a.m. and feature attorneys Joe Lovell and Brian Farabough with Lovell, Lovell, Isern and Farabough in Amarillo.

They will discuss shut-in royalties for oil and gas mineral owners and the implications of those payments; surface owners' rights concerning shut-in wells, damages and the responsibilities of both the oil and gas company and surface owner; groundwater issues and new legal considerations regarding recent rulings by the Texas Supreme Court; and surface damages pertaining to pipelines and wind turbines.

Lunch will be catered by The Cattle Exchange of Canadian and sponsored by Plains Land Bank and the Hemphill County Underground Water Conservation District.

The afternoon program will include Dr. Ted McCollum, AgriLife Extension beef cattle specialist in Amarillo, who will present "The Veterinary Feed Directive and Related Information for Livestock Producers."

He will be followed by Mike Gittinger, National Weather Service warning coordination meteorologist in Amarillo, who will discuss upcoming weather patterns for the Texas Panhandle, El Niño and La Niña weather patterns and the expected short- and long-term climate conditions for this region.

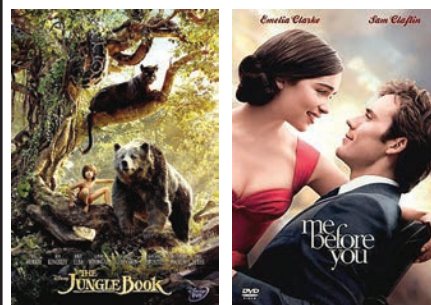

Research before donating to flood victims Treehouse additions

Hi, gang! Well, we finally got rain, now back to mowing the grass. School is back in session and it is time for all of us "old" folks to head for the mountains. Well not this year for us maybe next. Have a good week.

"Helping Victims of the Flooding in Louisiana, Make Sure Your Donations Count" by Colleen Tressler, Consumer Education Specialist, FTC

It's heartbreaking to see people lose their lives, homes, and businesses to the ongoing flooding in Louisiana. But it's despicable when scammers exploit such tragedies to appeal to your sense of generosity. If you're looking for a way to give, the FTC urges you to be cautious of potential charity scams. Do some research to ensure that your donation will go to a reputable organization that will use the money as promised.

Consider these tips when asked to give: Donate to charities you know and trust with a proven track record with dealing with disasters. Be alert for charities that seem to have sprung up overnight in connection with current events. Check out the charity with the Better Business Bureau's (BBB) Wise Giving Alliance, Char-

ity Navigator, CharityWatch, or GuideStar. Designate the disaster so you can ensure your funds are going to disaster relief, rather than a general fund.

Never click on links or open attachments in e-mails unless you know who sent it. You could unknowingly install malware on your computer. Don't assume that charity messages posted on social media are legitimate. Research the organization yourself. When texting to donate, confirm the number with the source before you donate. The charge will show up on your mobile phone bill, but donations are not immediate. It can take as long as 90 days for the charity to receive the funds. Find out if the charity or fundraiser must be registered in your state by contacting the National Association of State Charity Officials. If they should be registered, but they're not, consider donating through another charity.

"Shopping for a car? Be alert for flood damage" by Colleen Tressler, Consumer Education Specialist, FTC

It seems to happen after every major flood... damaged cars are cleaned up and taken out of state for sale. In fact, some experts estimate that, typically, half of all vehicles damaged by flooding eventually return to market.

You might not know a vehicle is damaged until you take a closer look or have a mechanic check it out. Here's what to do: Look for water stains, mildew, sand or silt under the carpet, floor mats, and dashboard, and in the wheel well where the spare is stored. Look for fogging inside the headlights and taillights. Do a smell test? A heavy aroma of cleaners and disinfectants is a sign that someone's trying to mask a mold or odor problem. Get a vehicle history report. Check a trusted database service. There are reliable services

that charge a small fee. The National Insurance Crime Bureau's (NICB) free database lists flood damage and other information.

Understand the difference between a "salvage title" and a "flood title." A "salvage title" means the car was declared a total loss by an insurance company because of a serious accident or some other problems. A "flood title" means the car has damage from sitting in water deep enough to fill the engine compartment. The title status is part of a vehicle history report. Either way, every used car needs an inspection and records before you buy, but with salvage- and flood-titled cars, you need to be extra careful. Have your mechanic inspect the car's mechanical and electrical components, and systems that contain fluids, for water contamination.

Report fraud. If you suspect a dealer is knowingly selling a storm-damaged car or a salvaged vehicle as a good-condition used car, contact your auto insurance company, local law enforcement agency, or the NICB at (800) TEL-NICB (835-6422). You'll help someone else avoid a rip-off.

Stay safe out there!

Cotton, peanut trials to be featured at the Collingsworth County Crops Tour

WELLINGTON – The annual Collingsworth County Crops Tour, hosted by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, will be September 2 at the Micah Carter Farm, located a mile south of Farm-to-Market Road 338 on County Road 240.

The program begins at 9 a.m. There is a \$10 registration fee, and the program will offer three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units – two integrated pest management and one laws and regulations.

Topics and speakers on the tour will include irrigated Replicated

Agronomic Cotton Evaluation, or RACE, trials; dryland RACE trials; and peanut trials, with Dr. Jason Woodward, AgriLife Extension plant pathologist, and Dr. Wayne Keeling, Texas A&M AgriLife Research weed scientist, both from Lubbock.

“We will tour and wind up at the Quail Community Building for lunch, where we will hear presentations about irrigation management decisions and marketing decisions for the cotton crop,” said Katy White, AgriLife Extension agriculture and natural resources agent for

Collingsworth County.

Speakers at lunch will be Dr. Charles Hillyer, AgriLife Extension irrigation engineering specialist in Amarillo, and Will Keeling, AgriLife Extension risk management specialist in Lubbock, as well as seed company representatives.

White will present a laws and regulations update. After lunch, those attending will have the opportunity to tour seed company trials throughout the area.

Thornberry warns residents about new scams

WASHINGTON – Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) is warning 13th District residents against new waves of scams trying to take people's money.

Criminals are using several different schemes to extort money from innocent people. The scams include:

- Letters that threaten to turn the recipient over to a collection company or report them to a credit agency unless they immediately pay for some item they have purchased, often medical equipment;

- Emails that demand immediate payment of tax debts; and

- Calls or emails that use personal information taken from social media, such as the names of family members, to invent stories of medical emergencies or arrests that require immediate payment.

“People from our area have come to me with all of these types of scams just within the last week. While many of them seek to take advantage of older citizens, everyone should be alert for these and other creative attempts by criminals to obtain money,” Thornberry said.

In one of the most common IRS scams, criminals call or send emails to the victims and identify themselves as Department of the Treas-

ury or IRS officials. They claim that the victim owes money to the IRS and that they must pay the balance immediately using a credit card, pre-paid debit card, or wire transfer. They threaten punishment, including arrest or suspension of a business or driver's license if the debt is not paid immediately. The scammers may also use fake badge numbers and use phone numbers with a 202 Washington area code.

“People should be aware of this scheme before they become victims themselves. We also want them to know how important it is to report instances like this so these criminals can be found and prosecuted,” Thornberry added.

The IRS generally first contacts people by mail – not by phone – about unpaid taxes and will not ask for payment using a pre-paid debit card, a money order, or a wire transfer. The IRS also will not ask for a credit card number or your bank information over the phone. If you get a call from someone claiming to be with the IRS asking for a payment or your credit card or bank account information, report it by going to treasury.gov/tigta. There is an online form you can fill out or you can call their scam hotline at 800-366-4484.

“If someone unexpectedly calls claiming to be from the IRS or in a new twist, the Treasury Department, and uses the threat of legal action if you do not pay immediately, that is a sign that it is not the IRS calling, and your cue to hang up,” Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration J. Russell George said. “Again, do not engage with these callers. If they call you, hang up the telephone.”

The IRS will also never request personal or financial information by e-mail, text, or any social media. You should forward scam e-mails to phishing@irs.gov. Do not open any attachments or click on any links in those e-mails.

Reporting these incidents helps in the following ways according to the Department of the Treasury:

- Providing the call-back number can lead to arrests.
- It builds an evidentiary trail.
- Telephone numbers are shut down.
- Scam attempts are catalogued.

TxDOT plans improvements in Donley County

AUSTIN – The Texas Transportation Commission has approved the 2017 Unified Transportation Program (UTP) with \$70 billion worth of projects to help TxDOT meet the state's growing transportation demands and includes improvements valued at \$830,018 in Donley County. The plan is the largest of its kind in the agency's history that addresses capacity, maintenance and safety needs around state.

The 10-year plan, developed with extensive public input, targets congestion in the state's most-populated areas and includes projects to better connect the major interstates in rural areas with local roads and highways. Also outside urban areas, the program calls for enhancing and completing interstate highways, and addressing the continuing needs within the energy sector and along hurricane evacuation routes.

Work scheduled in Donley County for 2017 includes a rehabilitation project on US 287 from

Hwy. 70 South to the Clarendon east city limit, a project expected to cost \$714,750, and centerline texturing on Hwy. 70 from County Road B to the north Clarendon city limit, which is expected to cost \$115,268.

“These actions by the Texas Transportation Commission represent a historic investment in our state's infrastructure,” said Governor Abbott. “Texans have sent a loud and clear message that they are tired of sitting in traffic, and this funding plan will significantly address safety, maintenance, connectivity and congestion on our crowded highways. The plan presented by the commission will allow Texas roads to keep pace with our population growth, provide much-needed congestion relief for working Texans and put the Lone Star State well on its way towards having a first-in-class highway system for decades to come.”

“The Unified Transportation Program reflects TxDOT's commitment to planning for and meeting the

mobility needs of our fast-growing state,” said Transportation Commission Chairman Tryon Lewis.

With more than \$70 billion in total funding, the 2017 UTP represents a significant increase from last year's 10-year plan, which included more than \$33 billion worth of projects. The bulk of the additional funding will come from legislative- and voter-approved initiatives to allocate portions of oil and gas taxes, sales taxes and other taxes to the state highway fund. Ending the practice of appropriating state highway funds to agencies other than TxDOT and the passage of long-term federal transportation legislation also contributed to the additional funding.

The new funding in the 2017 UTP is largely allocated into program areas that address safety, maintenance, congestion and rural connectivity needs. It includes funding for all 25 TxDOT districts and 25 metropolitan planning areas throughout the state.

Dry Eye Disease: New Treatment Approval

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved a new prescription therapy for dry eye called Xiidra (lifitegrast). This medication is the first of its kind approved in over ten years indicated for dry eye. Over one thousand people were treated with the new drug in four clinical trials. According to the manufacturer, a significant reduction in dry eye signs and symptoms was seen with Xiidra compared to a placebo eye drop. Common side effects reported were eye irritation, blurred vision, and taste disturbance.

Dry eye occurs when there are not enough tears being made to moisturize and protect the eye from irritation. Tears also help wash away debris in the eye and reduce the risk of eye infection. If severe and left untreated, dry eye can lead to visual changes and pain. This condition is more common in women and the elderly.

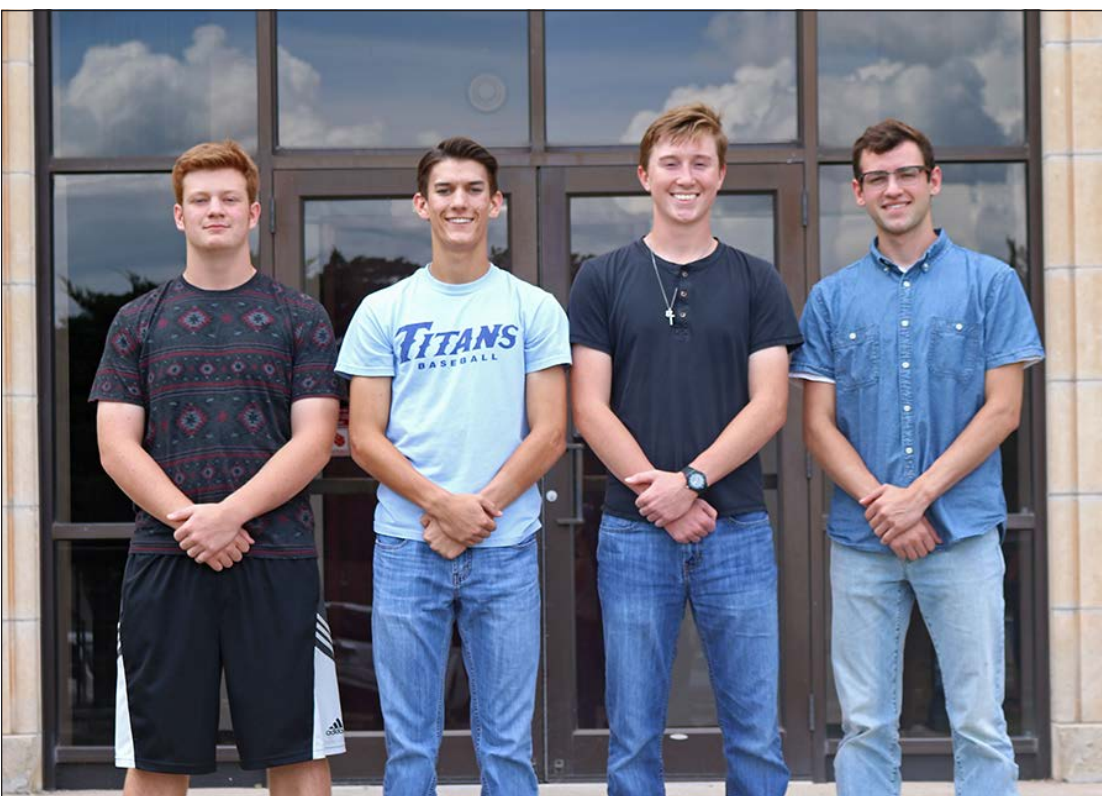

Copper Breaks to host StarWalk

QUANAH – StarWalk, the nationally acclaimed public astronomy program at Copper Breaks State Park, continues its popular naked-eye presentations on Saturday, September 3, 2016, with Sky Guide Terry Paridon who will lead participants in an exploration of the night sky beginning at sunset, around 9:30 p.m., in Big Pond Campground.

In addition to the after-dark program, Sky Guide volunteer Earl Foster will offer Sun Fun, beginning at 5 p.m. Sun Fun offers the public rare views of our own star, the Sun, through telescopes fitted with filters for safe viewing.

Through the afternoon, visitors will be able to view "Journey to the

Stars" in the park headquarters. Narrated by Whoopi Goldberg, Journey to the Stars is a story of life and death of stars and their formation, including our own sun.

Nighttime observing begins after sunset. Paridon begins the program with a tour of the darkening sky- the original StarWalk. Blending science with history, legends, and lore, Paridon takes the public on a trip through major constellations, and introduces the "star-hopping" technique to find stars and other interesting objects.

After the StarWalk, the public is invited to view various dark-sky objects through the park's binoculars and telescopes with the help

of knowledgeable SkyGuides. The 2016 slate of StarWalks will conclude with the Saturday presentation on October 1, weather permitting.

Upon entering the park, StarWalk signs will direct visitors to Big Pond Campground and parking. The quarter-mile walk into the observing area is on lighted asphalt, and extra assistance for the handicapped is available from park personnel.

StarWalk and Sun Fun are continuing Campsite Programs offered by Copper Breaks State Park. For more information on park facilities or other programs, call (940) 839-4331. Copper Breaks is located 13 miles south of Quanah on State Highway 6.
