### **TPWD** hearing to be held in Gray County

AUSTIN - The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is seeking public comment on proposed changes to the state's hunting and fishing regulations for 2017-18 and will hold a public hearing in Pampa this week.

The meeting will be held in the Gray County Courthouse, 205 N. Russell, at 7 p.m.

The hearings will focus on proposed changes to hunting regulations especially proposed changes to the pronghorn buck experimental permit system.

Public comment on proposed changes will also be taken during the March 24 meeting of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission at TPWD headquarters in Austin prior to rulemaking.

### Seliger files bill to cut severance tax

AUSTIN - State Sen. Kel Seliger (R-Amarillo) last week filed Senate Joint Resolution 41, to reduce the rate of the oil and gas production tax.

The Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF) was created in November 1998 by the passage of a constitutional amendment. Crude oil and natural gas production taxes contribute more than 85 percent of its revenue, and the ESF's balance today is due primarily to extraordinary growth in oil and gas tax collections during

the recent boom. SJR 41 would reduce the rate of severance taxes and suspend transfers into the ESF when the balance exceeds \$5 billion.

### **Texas likely** to see more cotton acres

COLLEGE STATION - Cotton acres in Texas will likely increase as producers seek an alternative to grains this season, said a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert.

Dr. Mark Welch, AgriLife Extension grains marketing economist, College Station, said Texas farmers will likely shift from corn to alternatives, most likely cotton, due to better market conditions and lower production costs, Welch said.

"Cotton performed really well in Texas last year," he said. "Conditions were perfect for most producers and with good yields and prices holding, it makes cotton a viable alternative to grains."

Water availability could also be a consideration for corn producers who might view cotton as the "biggest bang per gallon" when it comes to irrigation, he said.

"I think we'll see fewer grain acres planted and see those acres go to cotton," he said.

# Make health insurance legal again

Last month, Congress approved a budget that set in motion the plan to repeal the Affordable Care Act. Using an arcane Senate legislative rule called "budget reconciliation," this allows repeal of enough of the ACA to bring it to its knees. But until and unless additional legislation is passed, the ACA's regulations of health insurance will remain in place, and people will continue to suffer.

With the implementation of the Affordable Care Act in 2014 an effective ban on many forms of health insurance policies went into effect. Until then people were able to purchase any type of insurance policy that an insurance company was willing to sell them. Insurance companies were free to innovate and create new products.

For example, a new invention, "health status insurance," was already sprouting up in the marketplace. This allowed people to insure themselves against the costs of developing a medical condition that would render them otherwise "uninsurable." The ACA banned it.

This kind of ban stalled innovation that has been present in the insurance market since it first started. Insurance was developed in London in the 17th century, offering a way to spread the risks of unforeseen, unpredictable, highly costly events from an individual or business to the larger community. Insurers were able to design and actuarially calculate the price – based upon statistical risks – of an insurance policy to suit virtually any imaginable occurrence. The advent of the ACA, took many of these specialized policies off the table.

Let people shop for insurance that suits their individual needs, and let insurance companies develop new products and compete for the people's business.

The ACA upended insurance companies as the designers of insurance plans. Instead, the government designed a "one-size-fits-all" plan. It uses a tax called the "individual mandate," which penalizes people for buying any other kind of health insurance not deemed "ACA-compliant." It eliminated the nascent "health status insurance" market by forcing all people to pay, through their premiums, for the coverage of people with costly pre-existing conditions.

The ACA ended the practice of premiums for individuals that was calculated depending on statistical risk. Now everyone must be charged the same, regardless of pre-existing conditions or risky behavior. This snuffed out in the crib any other new innovations in health insurance product design. The ACA even determined the times of the year that people can buy health insurance. Imagine if there was only a designated time of year one was legally allowed to buy and sell cars, computers or cellphones.

The ACA ended health insurance as we define it. In its place it put a government-designed health plan, administered by the insurance companies, that every one is compelled to buy. It removed from insurance companies their definitive role of assessing risk and calculating individual premiums accordingly.

It changed the role of health insurance from that of spreading the cost of unforeseen, extremely expensive events to spreading the costs of everyday, totally predictable events. Health insurance companies were essentially transformed into money-transferring agen-

Today people in 300 counties find there is only one insurance plan available on the individual market. But even if there were more than one plan, the choices are minimal. It's reminiscent of the old days of airline regulation, in which the government determined the routes and the fares of the airlines, and their only differences pertained to the food and the amenities

The 115th Congress is poised to take up the matter of repealing and replacing the Affordable Care Act. Repeal advocates say they want to make health insurance truly affordable and accessible to as many people as possible.

A good place to start would be to unchain the people and the insurers from the mandates and constraints imposed by the planners in Washington. Let people shop for insurance that suits their individual needs, and let insurance companies develop new products and compete for the people's business.

Other critical reforms include breaking up the state-based insurance cartels by allowing health insurance consumers to shop across state lines. Congress should also give the people more control over when and how much to spend on health care through expanded tax-free Health Savings Accounts.

But we will never reach the goal of health insurance affordability and accessibility until we make innovative health insurance legal again.

# Panhandle pipe organ repairman

Norman Goad of Amarillo repairs and tunes pipe organs. "I take care of forty to forty-five pipe organs in the Texas panhandle, over into Eastern New Mexico and Western Oklahoma, then down to Lubbock and Midland."

Not many people do this kind of work. "I think the closest companies would be in Fort Worth and Denver. Other than that, I'm pretty much it in this part of the state.'

He works on fine, expensive pipe organs in churches and universities. I interviewed him in the sanctuary of Amarillo's St. Andrews Episcopal Church. The pipe organ there was built by the same people who built the pipe organ in the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City.

"There are people from around the world that actually play this organ. Many of them call the organist and choirmaster here and ask if they could do a concert at the church. They have to get on the list to do that."

The organ at St. Andrews is in the 24-hour temperature and humidity controlled sanctuary that resembles something you would find in Europe. "This organ has six thousand, sixtysix hundred



of them are behind a screen, mounted on architecturally designed shelves and enclosures. Some are eight feet tall and others are a quarter of an inch. To get to them, you have to climb stairs and ladders. I tune about twenty-four pipes to the electronic tuner. Everything else is tuned pipe to pipe, all by ear. I don't tune every one, just the ones that need tuning."

Some of the largest pipes are a foot across at the openings. Tuning them is a problem. "As you get close to the pipe the heat from your body adds length to the pipe. So as you get closer, the pitch goes lower. I have to sneak up on those

big pipes to tune them." He'll spend four days tuning the organ, and then he plays it to make sure everything works right. "It's a huge joy

not many pipe organs have." Norman demonstrated the full range of sounds the organ produces, including the chimes, flutes, strings, harps and trumpets. Then he played one of his favorite organ numbers. It was a joy to hear him play. "The control center of this organ is all computer-based, control-

ling 6,600 pipes and telling them exactly

to play this organ. It has features that

when you want them to play or not play." Norman has worked on organs nearly thirty years and has played organ since he was fourteen. He feels it is his responsibility to add to the spirituality of a religious service. "Sometimes the organ plays so soft it fills the sanctuary with reverence. Other times the wave of sound sweeps over the audience and they feel the awesome power of belief."

Norman is organist and choir director at the First Presbyterian Church in Amarillo.





Zell grew up in Donley County and began her teaching career in the Bairfield one-room schoolhouse on the JA Ranch at the age of 17. She was mentioned in "Ripley's Believe It or Not" when during one year she had only one student and there were only five taxpayers for the

school She later earned her Ph.D. and had a distinguished career at West Texas State University. In 1942, she was one of the first women in the Texas Panhandle to receive their pilot's license.

Upon her retirement, she returned to Clarendon in 1982 and purchased the historic S.W. Lowe House. She then funded and led the restoration of the landmark home, securing both state and national recognition for the property and setting an example for historic preservation in Clarendon. Zell also led the Donley County Historical Commission for a time, helped secure historical markers for the Goldston and Jericho cemeteries, and was active in Clarendon's Les Beaux Arts Club


### **Sickle Cell Disease Treatment Options**

An investigational drug called SelG1, showed a decrease in significant pain by nearly half of persons with Sickle Cell Disease (SCD). SelG1 helps to keep blood flowing, preventing pain crises. Five percent of those treated with the highest dose experienced side effects while taking the drug. Side effects included muscle pain, vomiting, and tiredness. This medication is reported to be a safe, effective, and welltolerated treatment for persons diagnosed with sickle cell disease, but more studies are needed.

SCD is an inherited blood disorder affecting red blood cells. Normal red blood cells have a round shape while patients with SCD have sickled (crescent shaped) red blood cells. Intense pain which can occur anywhere in the body is the main symptom of SCD. This is caused by the clogging of the small vessels in the body with these sickled cells. This decreases blood flow and oxygen to tissue, causing severe pain.



Borger jumped out with the early momentum in the first inning and was able to score one run. But the Broncos were able to answer right back in the second with four big runs.



"Certainly, not every denial by an entity of a groundwater pumping permit will constitute a taking," she said. "But this case shows that, under the right facts and with the right jury, a taking can occur and a landowner can be owed just compensation."

Another case, the City of Lubbock vs. Coyote Lake Ranch near Muleshoe, involves groundwater rights sold in 1953 to Lubbock. The city owned the right to come onto the land to search and drill for water, and in 2012, they proposed drilling 60 wells on the property.

The new landowner argued groundwater and had the right to drill wells, he was protected by the accommodation doctrine and should have some say in where those wells could be drilled and how other items like power lines needed for water

well use would be constructed.

This doctrine had only been applied with regard to mineral rights where the mineral estate is considered dominant, Dowell Lashmet said. The mineral owner has the right to use as much of the surface as is reasonably necessary to produce the minerals.

But, the accommodation doctrine requires them to do what they can to accommodate existing surface uses if the landowner can prove three factors: substantial impact on surface use, the mineral can be produced another way and the surface use cannot be made another way.

The Coyote Lake landowner She said the Edwards Aquifer argued that Lubbock could still drill their water wells, but should do so in a way that accommodates the existing surface use of the ranch - running cattle – in doing so.

> The Amarillo Court of Appeals said there was no accommodation doctrine for groundwater rights. The landowner appealed to the Texas Supreme Court, which issued an important ruling. First, they found the groundwater estate is dominant, like a mineral estate. Second, they found the accommodation doctrine can apply to a groundwater owner, if the three accommodation factors can be proven by the landowner.

> Now the case will go back to the trial court to determine if the landowner can meet these three required factors in order for the doctrine to apply in this case and offer some protection to the landowners.

> "That's important to keep in mind if you are buying property that has groundwater rights severed," Dowell Lashmet said.


> "This is a big deal for property owners," she said. "Groundwater owners have the implied right to use the surface of the land as much as is reasonably necessary to produce groundwater now."





On February 27, 2017, Greenlight Gas Company (the "Company"), filed a Statement of Intent to Increase Rates ("Statement of Intent") within its Incorporated Service Areas. The Statement of Intent was filed with each regulatory authority having original jurisdiction over the gas utility rates charged by the Company to customers within its incorporated service areas. The proposed change in rates will affect all customers within the incorporated areas of the Cities of Clarendon, Crowell, Dodson, Estelline, Hedley, Lakeview, Memphis, Paducah, and Wellington. The Company proposed that the requested rate changes take effect on April 3, 2017. The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the regulatory authority.

The proposed rates and tariffs are expected to increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$139,955, or 4.63% percent including gas cost or 11.62% percent excluding gas cost. Because the proposed changes in rates will increase the total aggregate revenues of the Company by more than two and one half percent, the proposed rate increase constitutes a "major change" in rates as Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code defines "major change". The impact of the rate change on individual customers will vary from the overall impact described in this notice based on customer class and location.


