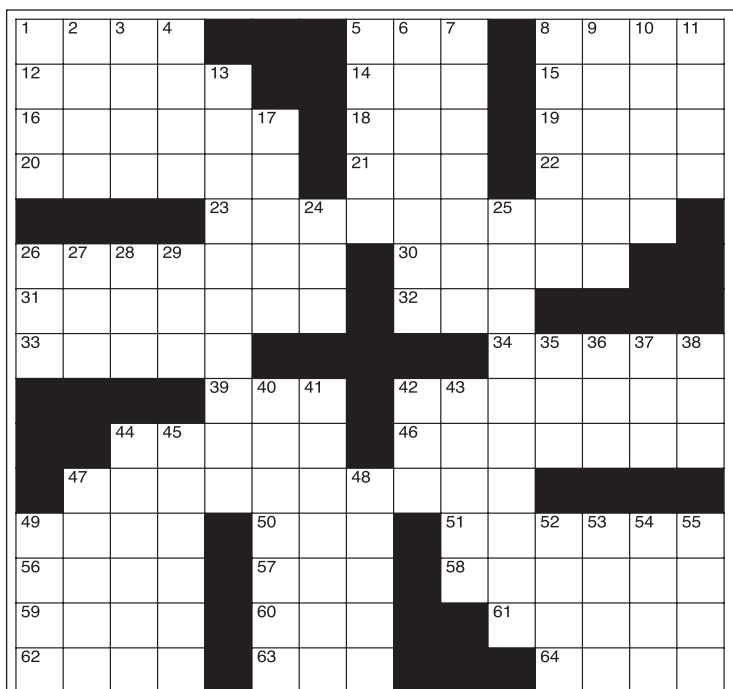

Hi, gang! Just one article this week, and it covers health related products that we all wonder and even spend our money. They are just a scam to get our money. Sometimes they even hurt us. Bob

"Miracle Health Claims from the Federal Trade Commission" People spend billions of dollars a year on health-related products and treatments that not only are unproven and often useless, but also sometimes are dangerous.

"Are You a Target for Health Fraudsters? Cancer HIV and AIDS Arthritis Avoiding Shady Sellers and Practitioners" by the FTC in cooperation with the FDA.

Are You a Target for Health Fraudsters? You've seen miracle claims for products related to health. It's no wonder. People spend billions of dollars a year on fraudulently marketed health-related products and treatments that not only are unproven and often useless, but sometimes also are dangerous.

Fraudulently marketed health products can have dangerous interactions with medicines people are already taking, and can keep them from getting a proper diagnosis and treatment from their own health care professional. Many unapproved treatments are expensive, too, and rarely covered by health insurance.

Health fraudsters often target people who are overweight, have serious conditions like cancer, or

conditions without a cure, like multiple sclerosis, diabetes, Alzheimer's disease, HIV/AIDS, arthritis. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC), the nation's consumer protection agency, and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) say it's important to learn how to evaluate health claims, especially if you have a serious condition.

Cancer: If you or someone you love has cancer, you may be curious about supposed "miracle" cancer-fighting products like pills, powders, and herbs that you've seen advertised or heard about from family and friends. Scammers take advantage of the feelings that can accompany a diagnosis of cancer.

The truth is that no single device, remedy, or treatment can treat all types of cancer. All cancers are different, and no one treatment works for every cancer or everybody. Even two people with the same diagnosis may need different treatments.

People with cancer who want to try an experimental treatment should enroll in a legitimate clinical study. The FDA reviews clinical study designs to help ensure that patients are not subjected to unreasonable

risks. For information about cancer treatments, contact the American Cancer Society. You can find your local chapter at cancer.org.

For free publications on cancer research and treatment, or to learn about clinical trials, call the National Cancer Institute's Cancer Information Service at 1-800-4-CANCER (1-800-422-6237) or visit cancer.gov.

Arthritis: There's no shortage of people selling unproven arthritis remedies, which include thousands of dietary supplements and so-called natural cures like mussel extract, desiccated liver pills, shark cartilage, CMO (cetylmyristoleate), honey and vinegar mixtures, and gimmicks like magnets and copper bracelets.

Avoiding Shady Sellers and Practitioners: It's easy to see why some people believe product claims, especially when successful treatments seem elusive. But pressure to decide on-the-spot about trying an untested product or treatment is a sure sign of a fraud.

For information about a particular hospital, clinic, or treatment center contact the state or local health authorities where the facility is located. If the facility is in a foreign country, contact that government's health authority to see that the facility is properly licensed and equipped to handle the procedures involved.

Report Scams: If you believe you've responded to a scam, file a complaint with: the FTC and your state Attorney General.

## Broncos defeat Bushland at home

The Clarendon Broncos took on Bushland at home Friday night and earned a 56-41 win.

Earlier in the week, the Broncos hosted Spearman and despite leading most of the game, finished with a 46-52 loss.

The Broncos took the early lead against Spearman at the end of the first eight minutes and led by seven at the break. Both teams were able to hold their own in the third quarter of play with the Broncos still in the lead.

However, the fourth quarter hurt the Broncos as the Lynx were able to take advantage of a momentum change to get the win. Colt Wood hit three three-pointers and made seven

of eleven from the bonus line for 22 points in the game. Isaac Dunham worked hard underneath and posted 11 points that include going five for seven from the free throw line. Bear Smith and Preston Elam each finished with four, Damarjae Cortez had three, and Noab Elam helped with two.

On Friday, the Broncos were able to regroup against a tall Bushland team and outplay them for the win.

Clarendon held a huge 15-point lead after the first half of play. They were able to continue in their offensive rhythm in the second half and stay on top of the Falcons.

They also were able to hit the offensive and defensive boards to

keep Bushland from gaining any momentum.

Smith led the Broncos with 16 points, and Cortez hit four threes and went two for two from the bonus line for 14. Wood put in nine, and Caton Grahn had six. Justin Christopher, Dunham, and Collin Butler each had three, and P. Elam put in two.

“It was good to get a couple of games in after the long break,” coach Blake Nichols said. “I like the improvements we are making; and while we aren’t where we need to be yet, I am excited about the progress we are making headed into district.”

The Broncos will begin district play on Friday, January 12, at home against Wellington beginning at 8:00 p.m.

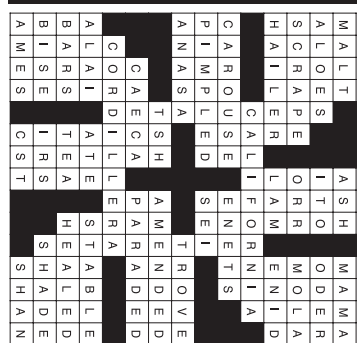
